The Department of Education and Children is committed to improving standards in all our schools, including a challenge to every case of unsatisfactory school attendance.

WHAT IS YOUR DUTY?

As a parent, you are legally responsible for:

- Ensuring your children receive education.
- Their regular attendance at school.

THIS MEANS THAT:

Your children must:

- Arrive at school on time.
- Attend regularly.
- Be suitably clothed.
- Be in a condition to learn.





WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Any absence can disrupt your child's education.

They should <u>only</u> be off:

- If the absence is authorised by the school eg: III or receiving treatment (GP or dentist).
- There has been a significant family event.
- It is a day of religious observance.

They <u>must not</u> be off school to:

- Mind the house.
- Visit relatives.
- For long weekends.
- To look after brothers or sisters.

These absences are unauthorised.

Avoid Family Holidays in Term Time:

- These disrupt the learning pattern.
- Can affect exam and test performance.
- You have no automatic right to such leave and absences may be unauthorised.

YOUR CHILD MISSING SCHOOL CAN:

- Disrupt their own and others learning opportunities.
- Interfere with the school's teaching routines and damage performance.
- Affect friendship patterns with peers.
- Encourage disaffection and harm long-term prospects.

WHAT WILL THE DEPARTMENT DO?

- Work with your child's school to identify absences.
- Meet with you to resolve unsatisfactory attendance.
- Consider prosecution in all cases of excessive unauthorised absences.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- The school must submit the attendance figures to the Department on a monthly basis.
- The school Education Liaison Officer regularly checks the school's register.

HOW CAN WE HELP?

Your children are very important to us all and deserve the best possible education.

But sometimes things go wrong.

So, every school has an Education Liaison Officer whose job it is to work in partnership with you and the school.

We can offer help by providing advice on:

- Attendance problems.
- Behavioural problems.
- Bullying.

The service is completely:

- 1. Confidential.
- 2. Free.
- 3. Non-discriminatory.
