

APA Referencing Practice

1. Intext referencing

A reference or citation can be positioned at the beginning, middle or end of a sentence. When writing a reference, the year and page number(s) always go in parenthesis (). However, the author's name can be placed either in the text of the essay or in the citation. When citing multiple authors, use an '&' to separate them in the intext citation, and an 'and' in the body of the text.

a. Referencing at the beginning of a sentence, for example:

Author's name (Year, Page Number)

According to Howard (2017, p. 23) an approach to eating disorders that focuses only on physical symptoms is "unlikely to address the underlying causes or result in long term recovery".

b. Split reference, for example:

Author's name

Howard suggests that any approach to eating disorders that focuses only on physical symptoms is "unlikely to address the underlying causes or result in long term recovery" (2017, p. 23).

(Year, Page Number)

c. Reference at the end of a sentence, for example:

Approaches to eating disorders that focus only on physical symptoms are questionable because they are "unlikely to address the underlying causes or result in long term recovery" (Howard, 2017, p. 23).

(Author's name, Year, Page Number)

d. Activity

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2. Direct quotes

Direct quotes show where another person's original thoughts, words, ideas, images etc., have been used **word-for-word** in someone else's work.

Quotations, therefore, are used to:

- Acknowledge the source of your information, e.g. ideas, words, thoughts, images etc.,
- Enable the reader independent access to your (re)sources.

Using direct quotes

Direct quotes should be used sparingly, and particularly long quotes (see below). If you use too many, you are using the sources to write your assignment for you which does not demonstrate understanding. However, if you use mainly paraphrases or rewrite the reference in your own words using only a few direct quotes, you demonstrate that you really understand the topic or issue.

a. Short direct quotes:

Follow these steps to use direct quotes in your assignments;

- Copy the exact words from the original source
- Use quotation marks " " at the beginning and end of the copied text
- Reference the author, year and page number information.

It is essential that nurses "make informed recommendations to their patients about how appropriate exercise can bring health-related benefits" (Rogers, 2017, p. 34).

(Author's name Year, Page Number)

b. Long direct quotes (blockquotes):

For citations of more than four lines or 40 words (approx.) blockquotes should be used. A blockquote is indented and written as a separate paragraph. **It does not have quotation marks** around it.

For example, increasingly we are less physically active. According to Rogers:

(Authors name)

Inactivity is associated with an increased risk of cardiovascular disease and poor health. Common problems that can be attributed to an inactive lifestyle include: lack of time; insufficient social/financial support; bad weather; lack of exercise facilities; a simple dislike of exercise. Advances in technology are also systematically removing physical exertion from our daily lives with transport, TV, remote control, and escalators and lifts all serving as labour saving devices (2017, p. 37). (Year, Page Number)

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3. Paraphrasing

Paraphrasing is when you use someone else's ideas and put them in your own words. Even though you are not using the original author's exact words, you must cite the author as the source of your ideas.

Steps for paraphrasing

- Read the original text
- Write down your version of it, changing the keywords and structure of the sentence(s). It is best to close the book or journal so you do not copy word-for-word. It is important that the sentence structure and the vocabulary are different from the original.
- Complete citation process. **Page numbers are not given in paraphrases.**

Citing a paraphrase

Paraphrases are cited in a similar way to direct quotes. They can be placed at the beginning, be split or appear at the end of the citation.

Referencing at the beginning

Author's name, (Year)

According to Devlin (2016) stigma refers to prejudices against people with a mental illness and is often seen as a process whereby a specific label sets someone apart, linking them to undesirable characteristics resulting in discrimination and rejection.

Split reference

Author's name

Devlin claims that stigma refers to prejudices against people with a mental illness and is often seen as a process whereby a specific label sets someone apart, linking them to undesirable characteristics resulting in discrimination and rejection (2016). (Year)

Reference at the end

Stigma refers to prejudices against people with a mental illness and is often seen as a process whereby a specific label sets someone apart, linking them to undesirable characteristics resulting in discrimination and rejection (Devlin, 2016). (Author's name, Year)

Activity

Review the direct quote in the first paragraph and paraphrase it in the second. Then check your paraphrasing skills against the example.

Direct quote:

Exercise is essential in preventative strategies for a number of chronic conditions. However, "often the people who need exercise the most do not exercise at all and attribute their inactivity to medical problems" (Rogers, 2017, p. 36).

Paraphrase example:

An important strategy in the prevention of chronic health problems is exercise. However, the inactive often consider their lack of exercise is due to health issues rather than vice versa (Rogers, 2016).

4. Integrating ideas

The ability to write a cohesive argument rests upon your ability to link your arguments together. Look at the following example to see how the different parts are integrated together. Notice how the writer uses 'linking' words, for example, *similarly* to link the ideas. Also notice how the writer has used 'reporting' words, i.e. linking verbs, to introduce ideas or different authors, for example, *suggests that* and *according to*

Example of integrating ideas:

Mehta and Farina (1997) suggest that the less we hold the mentally ill responsible for their actions the more harshly we treat them. Similarly, Hinshaw (2005) believes that attributing genetic causation to mental illness leads to a form of tribal stigma which serves to justify harsh treatment. According to these theories, the mentally ill are not considered on the same level as the rest of the population and hence basic human rights need to be extended to this group.

The following parts of the text have been highlighted:

- a) The Mehta and Farina reference (paraphrase)
- b) The Hinshaw reference (paraphrase)
- c) Student analysis of the ideas of the cited authors
- d) The linking words that connects the ideas of the cited authors
- e) The linking verbs that integrate the arguments and citations together

5. Reporting words/phrases

The ability to write a cohesive argument rests on your ability to link your arguments. This is achieved through using reporting verbs to integrate your arguments and citations together.

The following phrases can be used to introduce references. It is poor writing to use the same verbs all the time, e.g. *says that*, *states that*. Verbs also allow the writer to indicate the degree to which they support the author of the research, e.g. *claims that*, *versus*, *argues that*. Please note that they can

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be used in different tenses and they need to be used appropriately in a paragraph.

The APA Referencing Style Guide

Updated August 2017

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WHAT IS REFERENCING?

Referencing is a system used in assignments to indicate where evidence, ideas, theories, facts, or any other information was found. By referencing your work you are demonstrating that you have read around your subject and are aware of relevant current thinking.

WHAT IS A REFERENCE?

A reference is a note giving information about a source you have used in a piece of coursework.

WHY IS REFERENCING IMPORTANT?

Referencing

- gives you credibility and reliability as a writer
- allows readers to easily locate your sources
- provides consistency
- validates your arguments
- demonstrates that you have considered relevant literature
- follows academic writing practice
- protects you from academic malpractice

Academic malpractice is the act of attempting to gain an unfair advantage in any form of assessment, or aiding another student in their attempt to gain such an advantage. It also includes any act designed to prevent another student from completing their assessment properly. Acts of academic malpractice include, but are not limited to:

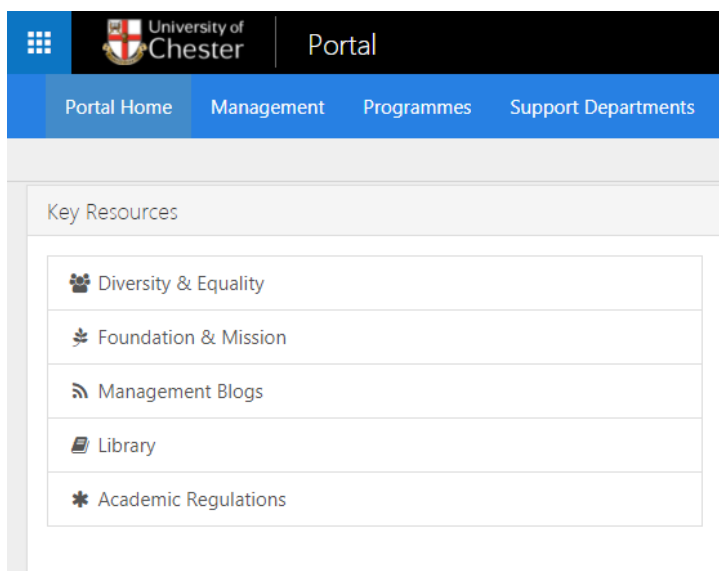
- Plagiarising the work of an academic or another student in your assessments
- Attempting to take unauthorised materials into an examination, such as notes or mobiles
- Buying your essays on the internet
- Communicating with, or copying from, another student during an examination
- Fabricating mitigating circumstances in order to receive an extension or altered grade

The main referencing style that is used at the University of Chester is the APA style. Some Faculties or Departments use variations on the APA referencing style, so please check with your Faculty or Department to see if their requirements vary from these guidelines.

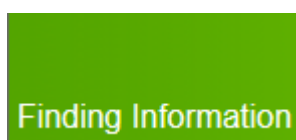

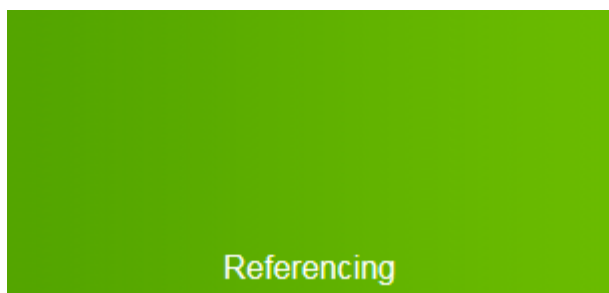

Noting References

It is always a good idea to note all the details of every reference that you plan to use as soon as you have read it. This will save you time, as it is often difficult to remember exactly where you found a reference a month or two after you consulted it. It is easy to record the information electronically, as sophisticated software packages have been developed for this purpose. One of them, EndNote, is available on all of the University's open-access computers.

[EndNote](#) is a piece of bibliographic referencing software that allows you to collect, store and organise your references. It also allows you to insert references into your Word documents in the correct bibliographic referencing style by using "cite while you write". However, please note it is always advisable to check your references against the University's APA guide before you submit your work. If you would like any more details about using EndNote, please contact your [Subject Librarian](#).

HOW TO REFERENCE

Firstly, you need to make a brief reference to the work in the body of your own text and secondly you need to create a much fuller list of references at the end of the assignment. The key point to remember is that the reference in your text must link accurately to the one in the list of references.

Citing a Reference in Your Text (In-Text Citation)

You should make a note in the text of the work of the author and date of the publication you are referencing. This is called the author-date system. You can do this in three ways:

- In 2012, evidence by Rivers argued that ...
- It has been argued (Rivers, 2012) that ...
- Rivers (2012) argued that ...

Examples:

This conclusion is supported by research reported by Mackenzie (2002) ...

Mackenzie supported this conclusion in his 2002 research.

In 2001, Dickinson demonstrated conclusively that ...

In a particularly moving description of the effects of child abuse (Anonymous, 1998) ...

L. M. Smith (2000) found that This claim was questioned in an article by S. P. Smith (2003) ...

However, this research (L. M. Smith, 2000) has recently been questioned (S. P. Smith, 2003) ...

Work by G. Black, Young, and Knight (2000) contradicted that of K. Black, Phillips, and White (2000).

Use initials when there is more than one author with the same surname, even if the dates of publication are different as this helps to avoid confusion for the reader.

If you are placing the in-text citation within brackets, you must separate the author and date with a comma and place any full stops after the brackets, not inside the brackets.

Multiple citations

When more than one source supports your argument, you can cite them inside the same set of parentheses. Within the parentheses, place them in alphabetical order and separate them with semicolons. If you are citing works by the same author but published in different years, order them by year of publication.

Examples:

Various studies have supported this argument (Andrews, 2001; Smith & Jones, 2005; Zachary, 2010).

Works by Jones (2010, 2011) have supported this claim.

If you wish to give specific prominence to the work of one author, you should list that author first, followed by 'see also'.

Example:

This methodological approach has been adopted by several leading experts in the field (Walker, 1990; see also Donaldson, 2000; Flowers, 2012; Michelson, 2014).

Secondary citations

A secondary citation refers to a source that you found in another source, for example, a book by Matthews that refers to the work of Willis. Ideally, you should avoid using secondary citations – instead you should locate the original source and cite it directly. By doing this you can check that the citation actually supports the point that you are making.

Example:

It appears from research undertaken by Willis (as cited in Matthews, 2002) ...

(In your reference list you would reference Matthews as the author as this is the book you have read).

Multiple authors

When you are listing your authors in the text, use 'and' before the final author. If you are listing the authors in parenthesis, use '&' before the final author.

Examples:

In 2013, research by York and Lancaster indicated that ...

Recent research (York & Lancaster, 2013) ...

Picard, Troi, and Riker (1998) have commented on...

...whereby many people were lost (Picard, Troi, & Riker, 1998).

The date

The date needed for the reference is the year of copyright. If the work has been re-copyrighted (e.g. © 1995, 2001), use the most recent copyright year for your reference. If you are using a website, use the date the page was written or copyrighted, or when it was last updated. Normally the date will be on the homepage. If no date is available and you still trust the source, use 'n.d.', which stands for 'no date':

Example:

The BBC (n.d.) has also indicated that...

Referencing your own work

The University of Chester's *Academic Malpractice Procedures* specifically forbids

incorporating material which has been submitted, previously or simultaneously, in support of an application for academic credit from the university or any other awarding body, except for the purposes of drawing attention, for reference purposes only, to such work, or where resubmission of previously failed work has expressly been permitted.

Students are advised to check with their department if they wish to reference previously used work.

In the text, you should state the format and provide the submission date.

Examples:

My previous work (portfolio, September 12, 2011) indicated that ...

In my previous assignment, I came to the conclusion that "lifestyle changes can have a significant impact on cancer mortality rates" (essay, May 1, 2011, p. 6).

Do not make an entry for this source in your list of references at the end of your work, as it does not provide what is known as "recoverable data". In other words, someone reading your work would not be able to look at your source themselves if they wished to do so.

QUOTATIONS

Material quoted directly from another writer's work should normally be reproduced word for word. The page number must be included in the reference. Short quotations (fewer than 40 words) should be enclosed in double quotation marks and included within your own text:

Examples:

Archaeological evidence has demonstrated that the Welsh were "the best castle builders in mediaeval times" (Tudor, 2012, p. 28).

Warwick and Neville (1950) described Hawarden Castle as "one of the finest examples of the Gothic style in Western Europe" (p. 72), a statement echoed by Richmond in 2012.

Section 7 of the Public Health Act 1900 stated that local authorities “must ensure that people have access to adequate health provision”.

Note the correct use of punctuation before quotation marks in the following examples:

To identify the speaker of a quotation before the quotation appears, put a comma after the speaking-related verb (said, stated, etc.).

Example:

Davies (2014) stated, “Although traffic was very congested at peak times, during the night there were few problems with traffic” (p. 32).

To present a quotation after a complete sentence, put a colon after the introductory sentence and before the quotation marks.

Example:

Although most people think road traffic is always worse first thing in the morning, research has indicated as follows: “Road traffic patrols found traffic along the main motorways around Manchester to be as highly congested at evening rush hour as in the morning” (Clinton, 2014, p. 13).

If you wish to leave out any of the original text, you will have to include three dots ... at the relevant point to make it clear that something has been omitted. On the other hand, if you want to add a few words of your own to the quotation, to make it clearer, you will have to put your added words in square brackets.

Example:

Welch (1999) has commented that Gaskell’s work “had fundamentally changed how we look at working-class women’s lives ... [and] their relationship with the land” (p.5).

Longer quotations (40 words or more) should be presented in a block, without any quotation marks. This quotation should be indented and start on a new line.

Example:

Matters came to a head early in 1890. [Principal] Allen put views he had apparently stated openly into a letter in which he expressed himself out of harmony with the governing body and dissatisfied with the existing educational system. In his report for 1899, he had added to his current and repeated protests the complaint that the curriculum was all examinations. (Bradbury, 1975, p. 172)

For a longer quotation which might span multiple sentences you will need to use four dots (instead of three) to indicate any omission between two sentences, the first dot being the full stop at the end of the first sentence quoted, followed by the three dots to indicate an omission.

Example:

Call, Nyberg, and Thatcher (2015) theorized that star employees “may be motivated to remain with organizations that provide opportunities to influence others or be involved in strategic decision-making. . . . providing such influence opportunities may help organizations retain stars more than they help retain other employees” (p. 633).

Quotes from poetry and dramatic works should be cited in blocks.

Example:

Such a father-daughter relationship is vividly portrayed in Shakespeare's *King Lear* (1608/1952):

Lear. Darkness and devils!

Saddle my horses; call my train together.

Degenerate bastard! I'll not trouble thee:

Yet have I left a daughter

Gon. You strike my people, and your disorder'd rabble

Make servants of their betters. (1. 4. 260-5).

NB. The English department does not use the APA referencing system.

Many electronic sources do not provide page numbers. If paragraph numbers are available, use them instead of page numbers. Do not use Kindle location numbers.

Example:

In the 2009 study, Green and Black argued that the government's 5-a-day campaign has made "no discernible impact" (para. 7) upon children's eating habits.

If paragraph numbers are not available, cite as much information as needed for the reader to locate the material. For example, chapter number, section heading, and paragraph number within the section:

Example:

De Smit commented that "the 2012 London Olympics were generally acknowledged as the best ever" (2012, chapter 5, London 2012, para. 1).

If you are quoting from an audiovisual source (television programme, film, YouTube video, radio programme), you should use a timestamp to indicate the point at which the quotation begins.

Example:

Student Fred Jones described the psychology programme at the University of Chester as "the best in England." (University of Chester, 2014, 2:33).

Although Fred Jones is quoted, the author of the audiovisual extract is the University of Chester.

LIST OF REFERENCES

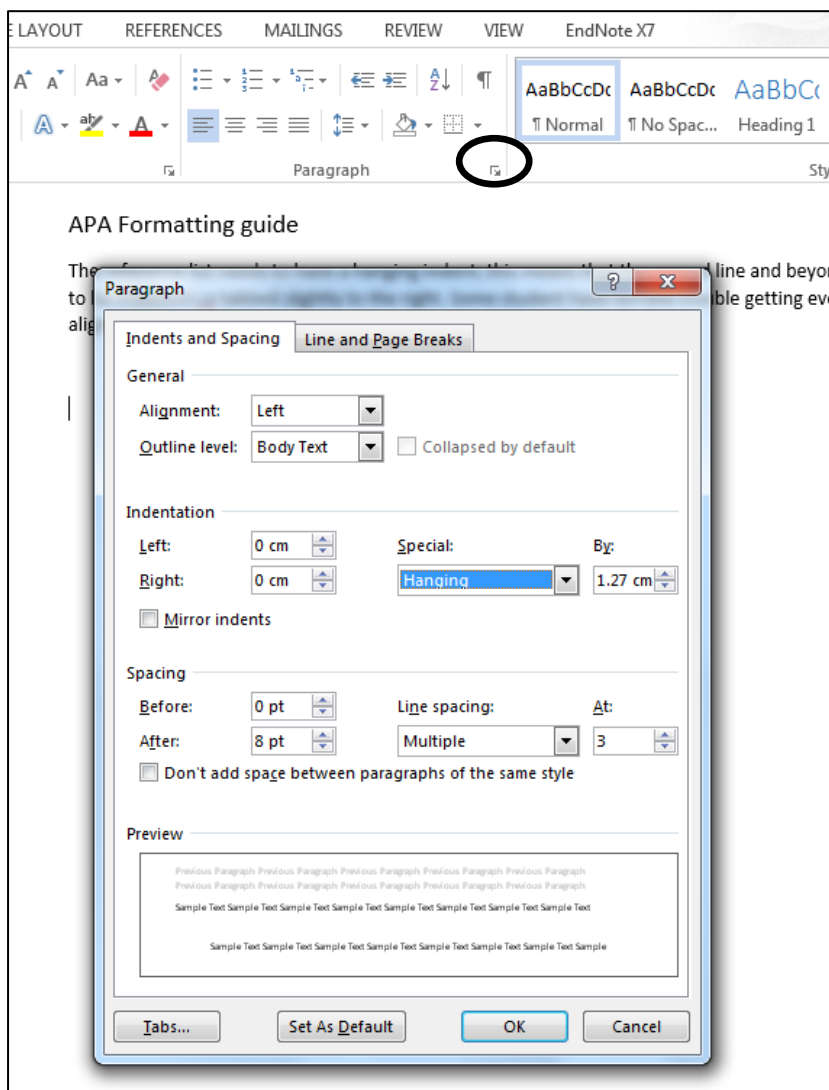
The other key aspect of referencing is compiling your list of references. It is a list of all the works that you have read for this assignment and referred to in your text and is placed at the end of your assignment.

Do not include in your “List of References” anything that you may have read when preparing your work, but not referred to in your text (unless you have specifically been told to do so by your tutor). In this case, you should call your list a “Bibliography”, not a “List of References”.

ARRANGING YOUR LIST OF REFERENCES

Your list of references should be placed at the end of your assignment. APA uses double-line spacing with a hanging indent – please check with your Faculty or Department as to their preference. Second and subsequent lines of the reference should be indented. To create a hanging indent:

1. On the **Home** tab in Word click the **Paragraph settings** button circled below.
2. A new window will open as shown below. You can now choose **Hanging** located under **Indentation** and **Special**.
3. Click **OK**



You should arrange them as a single alphabetical list and not sub-divide them into sections, unless you have been specifically told to do so by your tutor.

The references should be arranged alphabetically, by the surname and initials of the author, followed by the date.

An easy way to do this is to let Word sort the list for you using the button at the top of the document.

1. Highlight the text.
2. On the **Home** tab click **Sort**.



3. Click **Ascending** (A to Z)
4. Click **OK**.

If there is more than one author, they should be arranged by the surname and initials of the first-named author, then by the surname and initials of the other authors, and then by the date of the work. Use lowercase letters – a, b, c – to differentiate works by the same author published in the same year.

Example:

Ellis, T. H. (1974). *Recollections of a sheep farmer*. London, United Kingdom:

Macmillan.

Ellis, T. H. (1979a). Does counting sheep help you sleep? *Sleep Research*, 5, 17-58.

Ellis, T. H. (1979b). *Further recollections of a sheep farmer*. London, United Kingdom: Macmillan.

Ellis, T. H., Harris, T. C., & Brown, A. (1967). *The encyclopaedia of sheep*. London, United Kingdom: Routledge.

A note about punctuation, capitalisation, and using italics

There should be a full stop and a space between an author's initials.

When listing multiple authors, there should be a comma between each author.

Each element of the reference ends with a full stop.

The first word of the title and sub-title should be capitalised. All other words should be lower case unless they are a proper noun (e.g. place or a person).

Journal titles should be in italics and capitalised, except for words such as 'a' or 'the' when they are not the first part of the title or subtitle.

Examples:

O'Hara, S. G., & Butler, R. (1866).

Loughan, B., Knight, K. P. G., & White, F. G. (1984).

All titles fall into three categories:

Type 1

Work published inside a larger work (e.g., chapter in book, article from journal). (Do not italicize). Capitalize only the following: (a) first word, (b) first word after a colon, (c) proper nouns, (d) abbreviations.

Type 2

Work published alone (e.g., book, stand-alone Internet document, brochure, report, dissertation).

(Italicize). Capitalize only the following: (a) first word, (b) first word after a colon, (c) proper nouns, (d) abbreviations.

Speed, R. (2003). *Race relations in the UK since the 1950s*. Oxford, United Kingdom: Oxford University Press.

Type 3

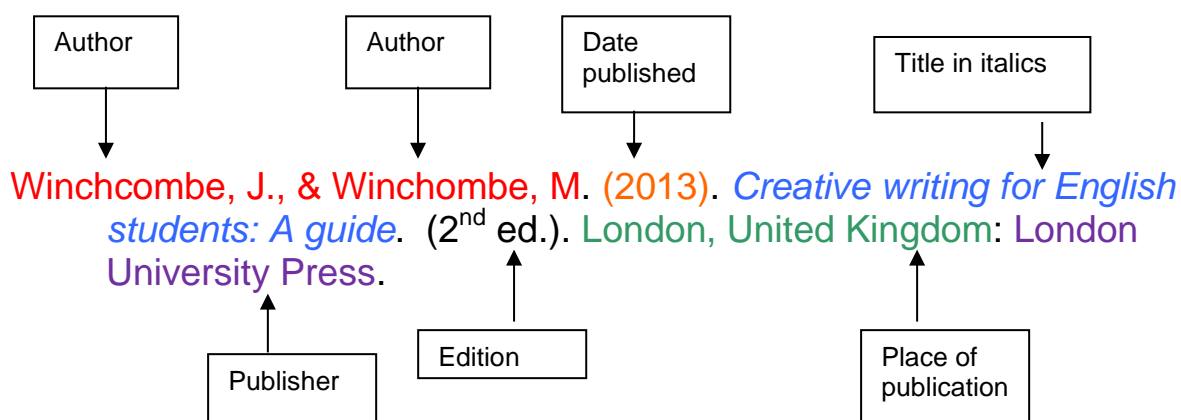
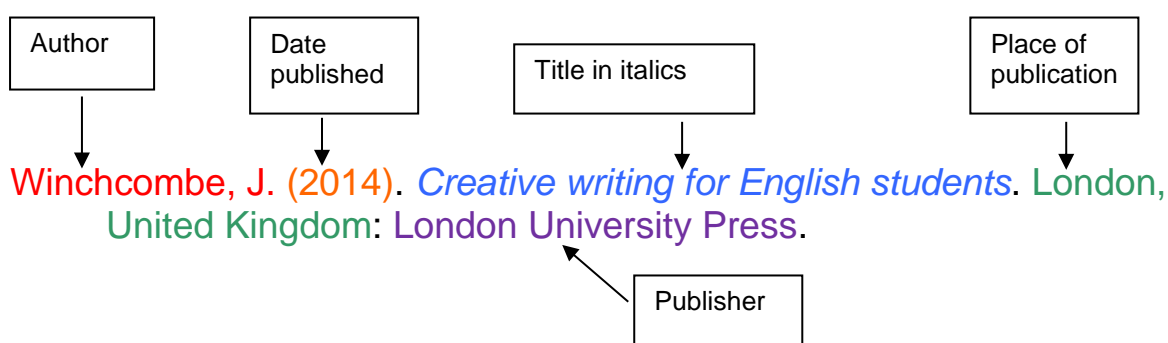

Italicize the title of the periodical, except for words such as 'a' or 'the' when they are not the first part of the title or subtitle.

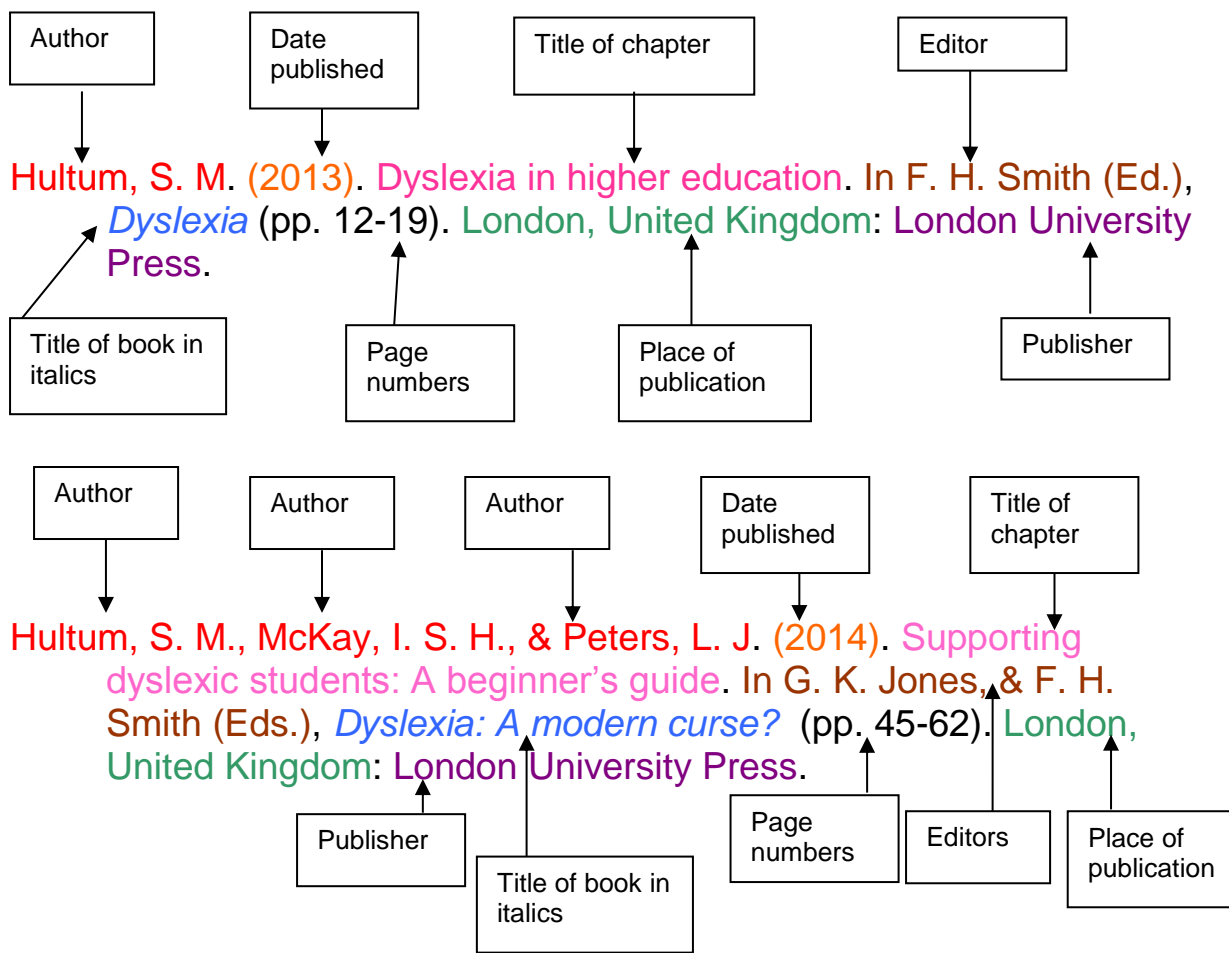

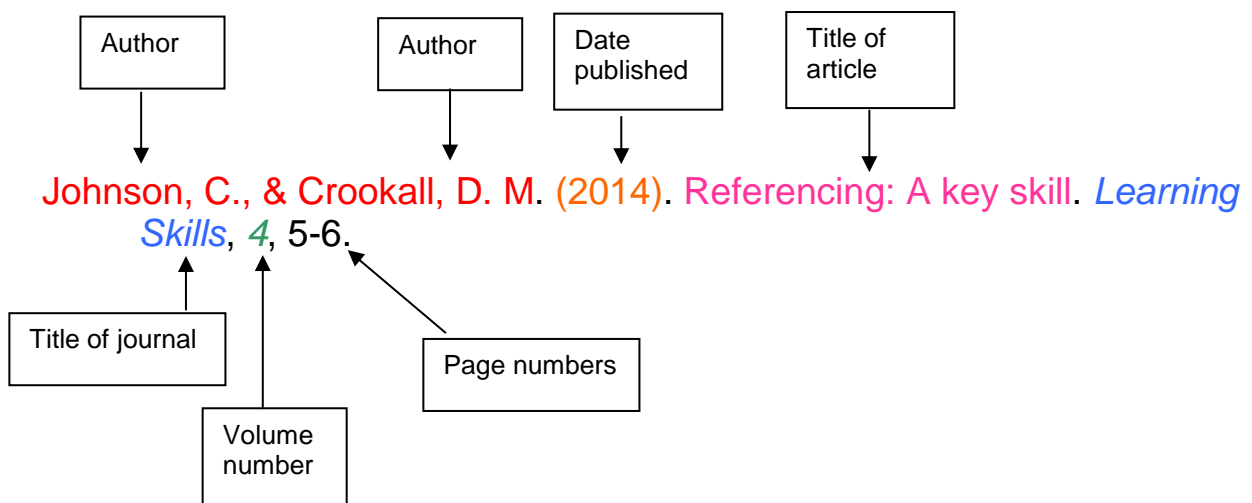
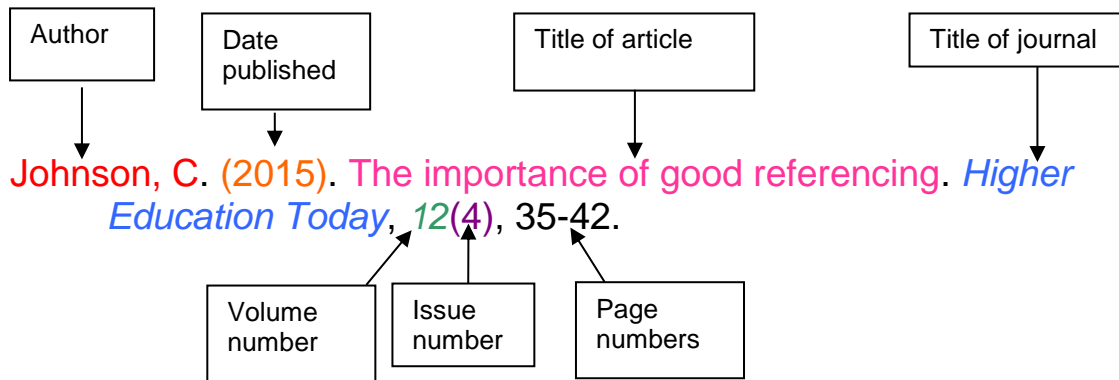

4. The **Editor/s.** After In, place the editor's initials before their surname.
5. The **title of the book** should be in italics. Apart from the first word of the title and the first word of the subtitle, no other words should be capitalised unless they are proper nouns (such as places and people).
6. The **page numbers** must be in round brackets.
7. The **place of publication.** Give the country of publication or the abbreviation of US state for books published in the USA. If two or more publisher locations are given in the book, give the location listed first or, if specified, the location of the publisher's home office. Separate the city and country / state information with a comma.

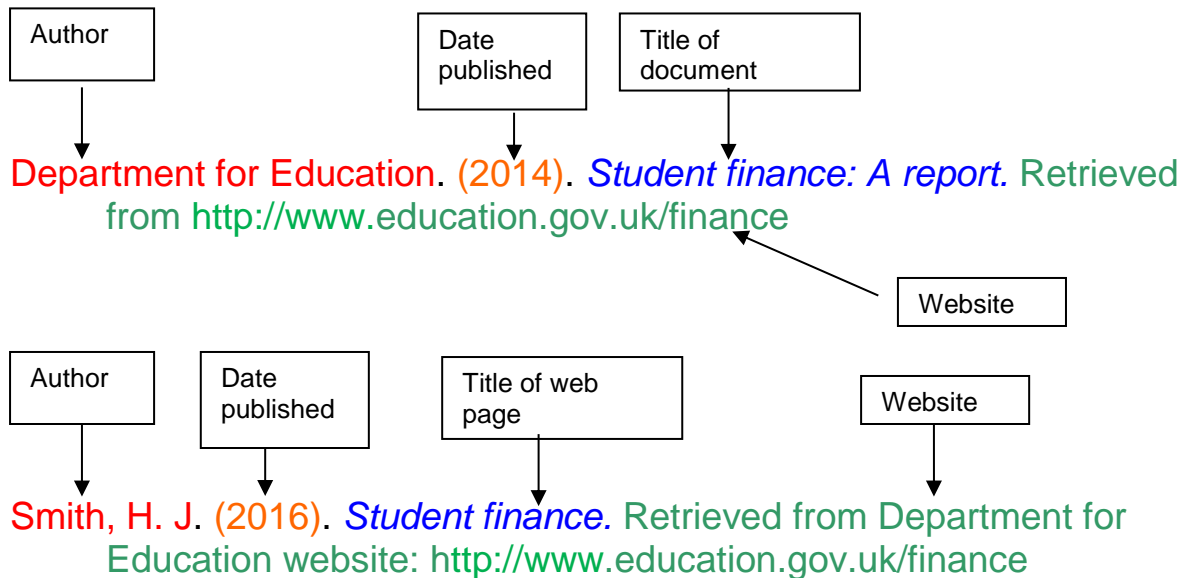

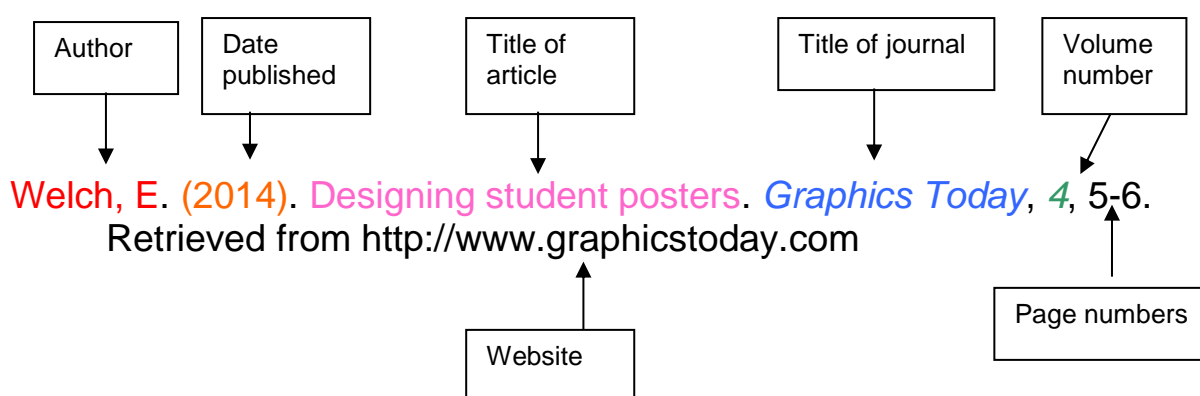
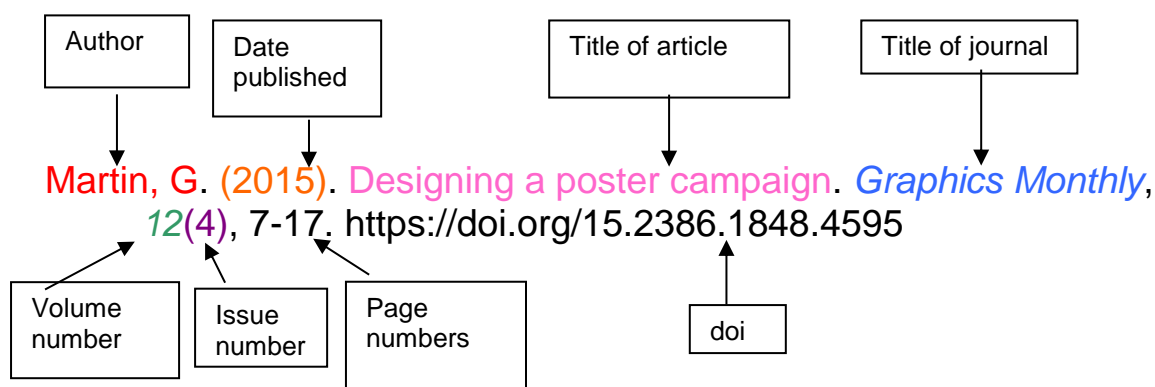

If a document has eight or more authors, give the full names and initials of the first six authors, followed by ... and then the name of the last author.
2. The **date of publication** must be in round brackets.
3. The **document/page title** should be in italics. Apart from the first word of the title and the first word of the subtitle, no other words should be capitalised unless they are proper nouns (such as places and people). You should not cite the entire website – refer specifically to the document.
4. The **website.** You should not cite the entire website – refer specifically to the document. When the author is not the publisher, include publisher information in the retrieval statement. A retrieval date is only used when the information is likely to alter.

2. The **date of publication** must be in round brackets.
3. **Title of article.** Apart from the first word of the title and the first word of the subtitle, no other words should be capitalised unless they are proper nouns (such as places and people).
4. **Journal titles** should be in italics and capitalised, except for words such as 'a' or 'the' when they are not the first word of the title or subtitle.
5. The **volume number** should be in italics.
6. The **issue number** (if available) should be in round brackets, should not be in italics and there should not be a space between the volume number and the issue number.
7. The **page numbers** should not have pp.
8. **Location of the article.** Many journal articles now have a doi (digital object identifier) which should be used. If a doi is not available, use the URL of the journal homepage.

OTHER ELEMENTS OF STYLE

Numbers

The general rule is to use numerals to express numbers 10 and above, and words to express numbers below 10.

Examples:

Scientists found that the most likely age to take up smoking was 19 years old.

The module leader recommended that students use at least six journals for the essay.

There are exceptions however, so refer to *Publication manual of the American Psychological Association* (2009) of which there are copies in the library. One example would be that any number that begins a sentence, title or text heading should use words to express the number.

Example:

Twelve students improved, and 12 students did not improve.

Commas in numbers

Use commas between groups of three digits in figures of 1,000 or more.

Examples:

2,500

9,090,098

Plurals of numbers

To form the plurals of numbers, add s or es alone, without an apostrophe.

Examples:

Fours and sixes NOT ~~four's and six's~~

1950s NOT ~~1950's~~

10s and 20s NOT ~~10's and 20's~~

The possessive apostrophe

The apostrophe is used for two reasons: contraction and possession.

Contractions

This apostrophe is used to indicate that a letter or letters has/have been removed. If you follow this rule then it will avoid confusion about where the apostrophe should be.

Examples:
He is = he's

I am = I'm

Possession

If the possessor is a singular noun, an -'s is added to the end of the noun. This is true for both proper nouns (people and places beginning with a capital letter) and common nouns (other nouns). APA style states that the possessive of a singular name is formed by adding an apostrophe and an s, even when a name ends in s; the possessive of a plural name is formed by adding an apostrophe.

Examples:
Freud's ideas were crucial to the development of dreaming

The Freuds' new car was a lovely shade of purple

James's new book was a terrific read

The Jameses' new house looked ugly
