## 2019/20 Performance Overview: Community Nursing

Community Nursing produces monthly data sets or 'scorecards' demonstrating activity, which are available on request. Similar to other areas, work is currently underway to develop a dedicated dashboard for Community Nursing to supplement the data that currently exists.
