Schedule 2 The Protected Buildings Register

Notifications of entries on register etc.

- 2 (1) As soon as may be (practical) after a building has been entered in the register, or the register has been amended by removal of a building from it, the Department shall serve a notice on the owner and the occupier of the building stating that it has been entered in or removed from the register.
 - (2) The owner or the occupier of, and any other person having an interest in, a building which has been entered in the register may apply to the Department to remove the building from the register-
 - (a) within the prescribed period after service on him of a notice under sub-paragraph (1);
 - (b) after the expiration of the prescribed period after the decision of the Department on a previous request under subsection in relation to the building.

Register entry description

History

The building dates from 1789, and was built by Captain George Quayle, son of John Quayle, Clerk of the Rolls. The building was constructed as a boathouse, dock and stable block; ancillary accommodation for the Bridge House and Bridge Court complex. The site housed the pleasure craft Peggy, a unique vessel dating from the late 18th century.

The site was bequeathed to the Manx nation in 1935, and opened as a museum in 1950. It remains in this use to the present day.

Details

MATERIALS: Locally sourced Limestone, with a stone floor to the boathouse and dock. Upper floors and roof structure formed of timber. Roofs finished in slate tiles. Parts of the south eastern wall are clad in slate, while the south-western (harbour) wall has received a concrete finish.

PLAN: Two storeys, additionally with an attic in the section facing Bridge Street. Essentially L-shaped, the lower level contains a boathouse and dock, with a shed alongside and a stable block in a wing along the harbour wall. The upper level contains a cabin room over the boathouse, a void over the dock, an exhibition space over the shed below, and the upper level of the stable block. A courtyard fills the area between the museum buildings and Bridge Court/Bridge House.

EXTERIOR: Horizontally laid local Limestone, with parts of the building clad in hanging slates. The building's south-western wall forms the harbour wall, and this has received a concrete finish. Parts of the courtyard facing walls have elements of brickwork. The Bridge Street elevation features recently installed timber doors in a traditional style, with glazed screening behind. Roofs are finished in natural slate laid in diminishing courses. Windows are single glazed timber sliding sash units, generally with Georgian bars in a six over six pattern.

INTERIOR: The boathouse has a stone cobbled floor, although the slipway section has been temporarily filled with gravel to bring the level up to that of the adjacent floor. On the upper level, the cabin room is timber panelled, with a historic fireplace and various hidden storage spaces and access panels. The Bridge Street facing section, currently the public entrance/exit, has an attic space with exposed A-frame timber roof structure.

Subsidiary Features: The private dock within the site is formed of stone, and features a low level arched access to the outer harbour area, over which is a walkway/viewing platform.

Reason for Registration Decision

The Nautical Museum, Castletown, is recommended for entry into the Protected Buildings Register for the following reasons:

•ARCHITECTURAL INTEREST:

Unique late 18th century boathouse complex including Cabin Room and Private Dock.

•HISTORIC INTEREST:

Unique surviving 18th century complex of buildings used to house a pleasure boat and associated activity of a high status family.

•CLOSE HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION:

Built by Captain George Quayle, son of John Quayle, Clerk of the Rolls. Both Captain George Quayle and his father were significant figures of their period.

•Age and rarity:

Unique private recreational maritime complex dating from the late 18th century.
