The Island is a Crown Dependency which, through its ancient parliament, Tynwald, enjoys a high degree of domestic legislative and political autonomy. Dating back to Viking origins over one thousand years ago, the Isle of Man's Tynwald is the oldest continuously operating legislature in the world.

The Island, at 221 square miles, is home to 83,314 people and occupies a central position in the Irish Sea and the British Isles, sitting between England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The Island is split into 21 districts comprised of 13 parishes, 4 towns, 2 villages, and 2 district authorities, which all have individual local government boards, or commissioners.

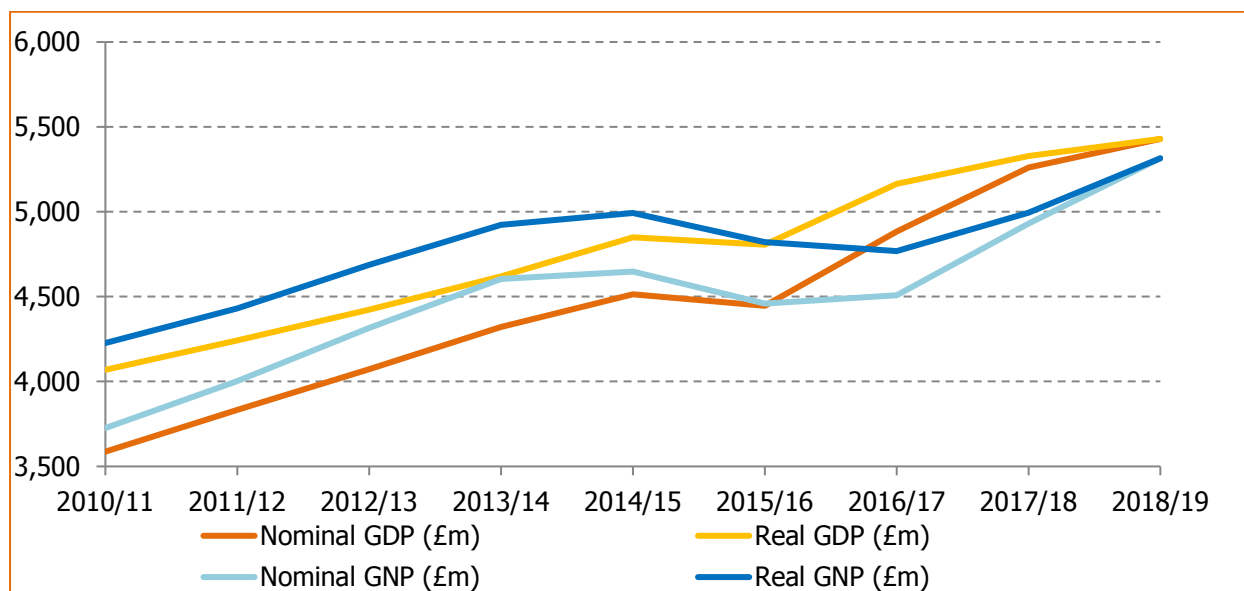

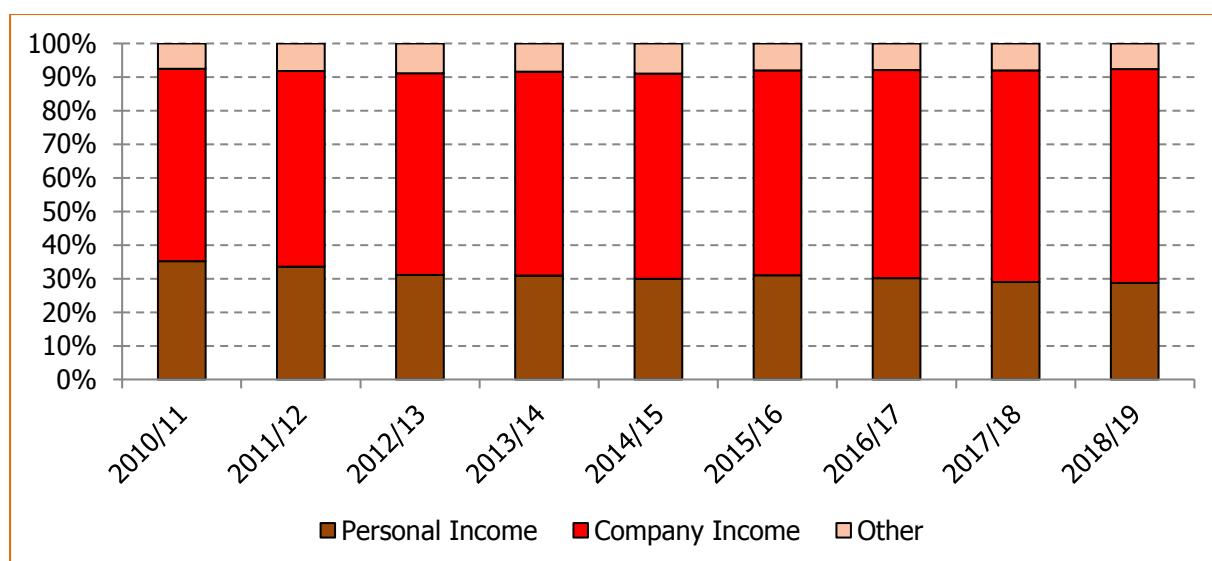
The Isle of Man prepares its National Income accounts using the income method for Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Gross National Product (GNP). This measure is therefore the sum of the Island's income (employed and self-employed income, company profits, rental income and profits from Government corporations), and is one of the principal measures of economic performance for the Isle of Man.

Gross National Product is GDP plus income coming to and leaving the Isle of Man through residents, non-residents and businesses.

Real GDP and GNP take into account the effects of inflation and, using the Consumer Price Index, the data has been presented in monetary values equivalent to March 2019.

The GDP and GNP figures above are calculated using ESA10 methodology and therefore the percentage changes for 2013/14 and 2014/15 may not correspond to those published previously under ESA95 methodology.

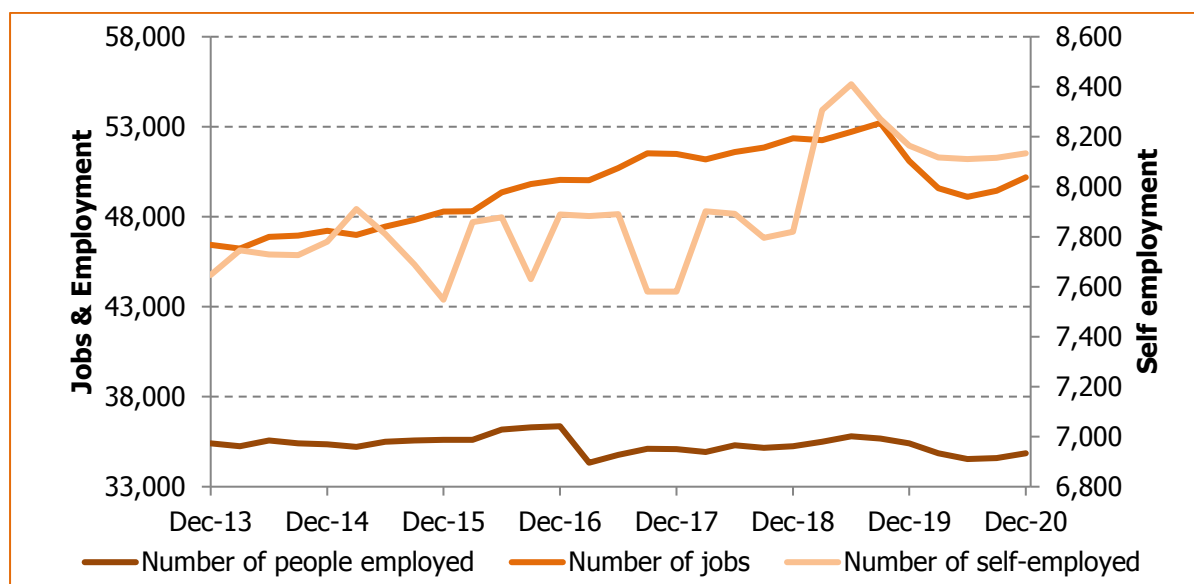
Figure 3 Economically Active Population, by Sex, by Employment Status, 2016

The economically active population is defined as comprising those who are currently employed, self-employed or actively seeking work. According to the 2016 Census, the total economically active population in 2016 was 42,777. Since multiple responses were possible in the Census, figure 3 above includes those who classified themselves in multiple categories, the sum of the graph will be greater than the total economically active population.

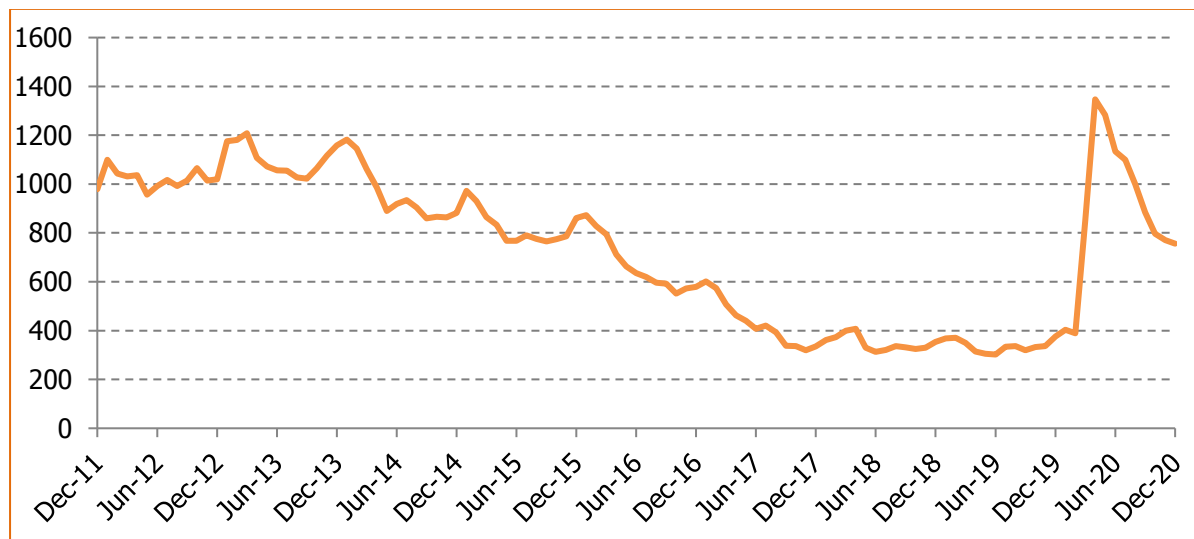
Figure 4 Working Population and Jobs

As at December 2020, the number of people in employment stood at 34,860 in 50,187 jobs. There were also 8,134 people who were self-employed. A person can be classified as both in employment and self-employed, so the total will be higher than the total of the economically active population. The number of self-employed should be read against the right hand axis.

Figure 5 Unemployment

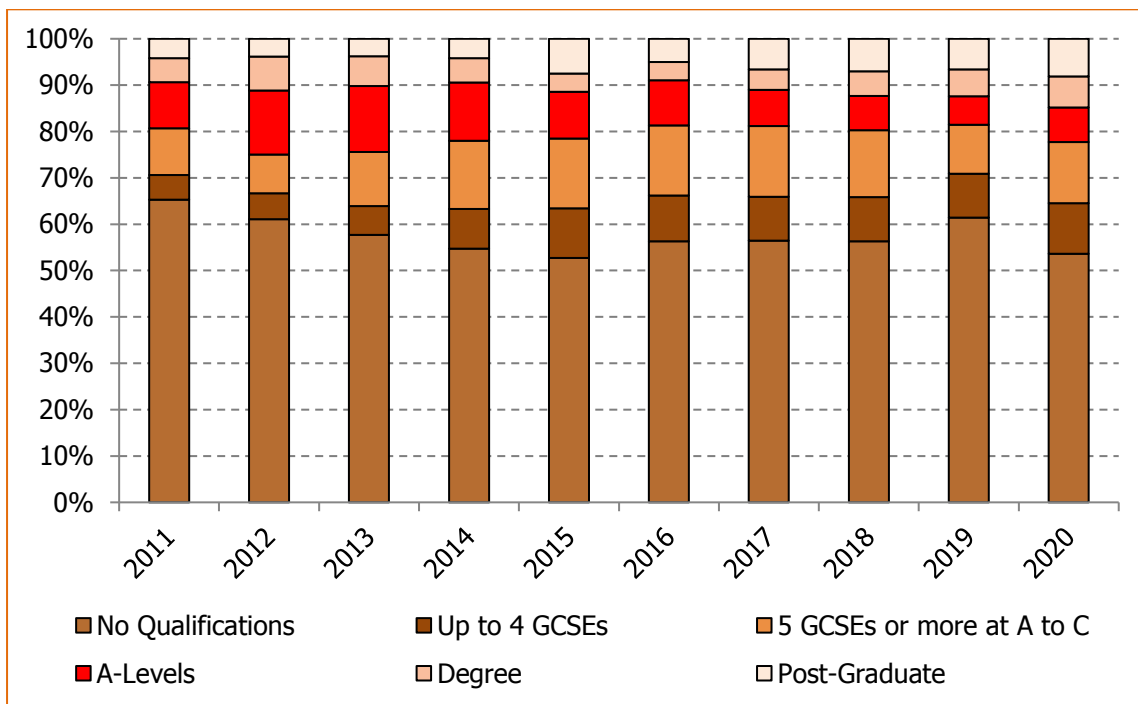

Unemployment as at December 2020 stood at 1.8% of the economically active population, or 756 people, of which 478 were men and 278 were women.

The Isle of Man rate of unemployment is calculated on a claimant count basis. Some other jurisdictions use various different methods, including the International Labour Organisation (ILO) definition of unemployment, which includes those people who may be actively seeking work, but are not registered as such. Since the 2016 Census, the Isle of Man has produced an estimate of the ILO unemployed rate. For December 2020, the estimated ILO unemployed rate was 2.8% or 1,201 persons.

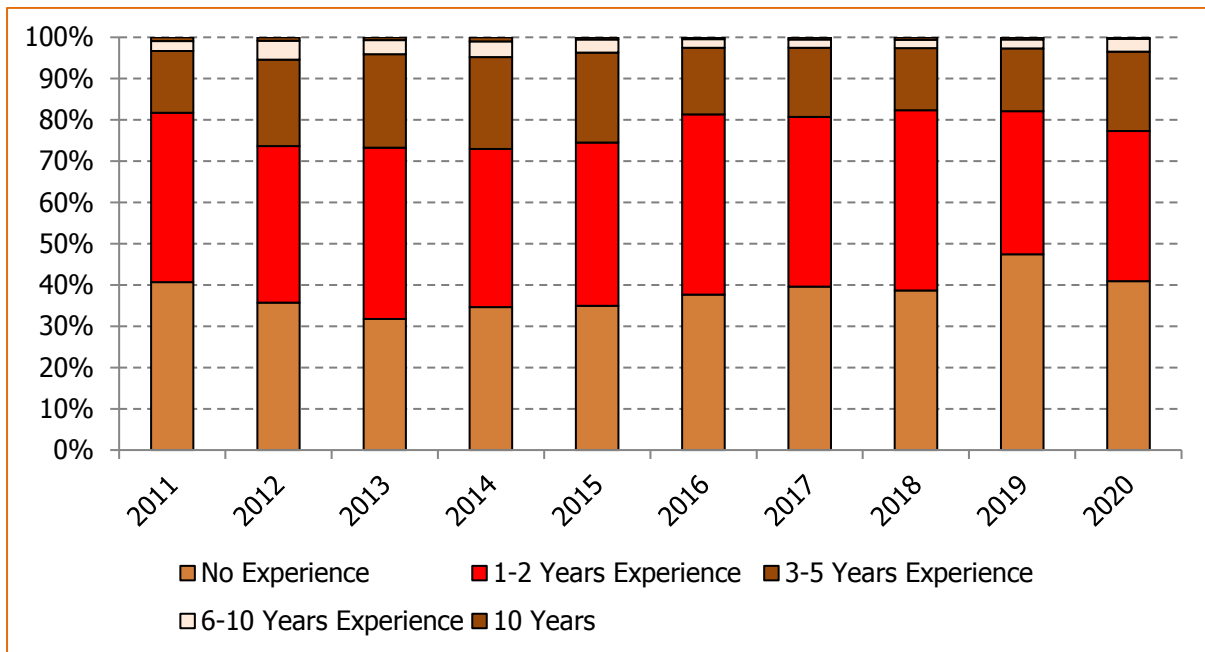
Figure 6 Job Vacancies by Required Qualifications

In 2020 of the 6,725 jobs advertised through the Jobcentre, 3,607 required no qualifications, 735 required up to 4 GCSEs at grade A to C or equivalent, 887 required 5 GCSEs at grade A to C or equivalent, 501 required A-Levels or equivalent, 448 required a degree or equivalent, and 547 required a postgraduate qualification.

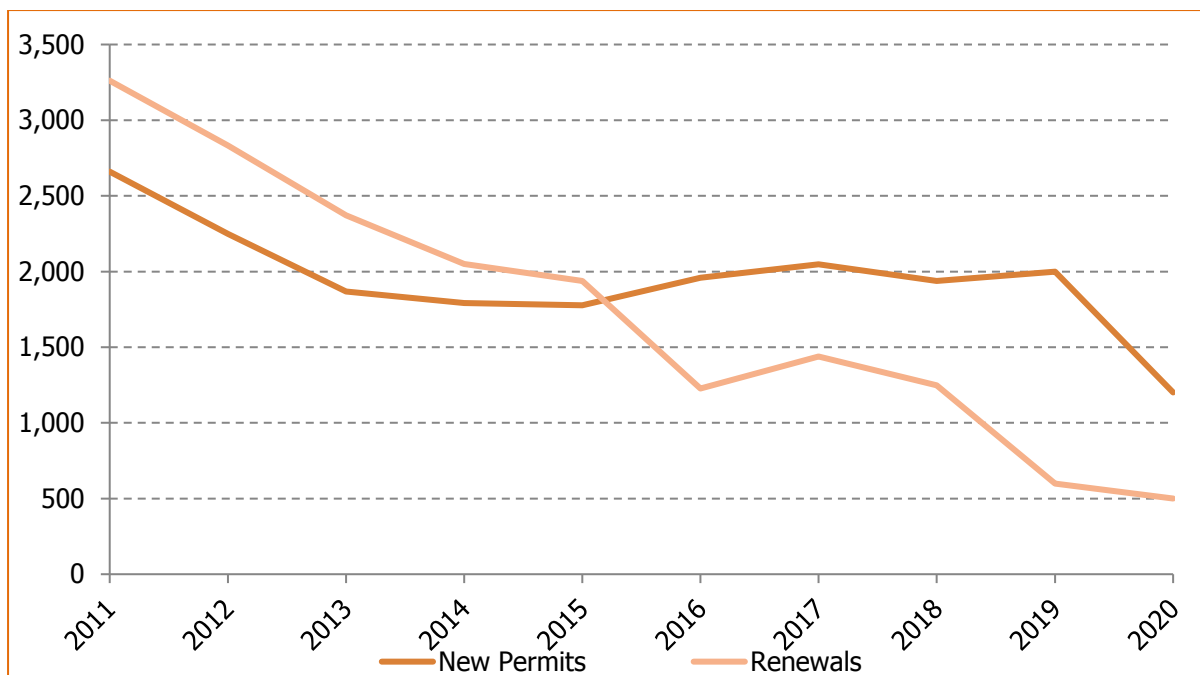
In 2020 there were 6,725 jobs advertised through the Jobcentre. 2,750 required no experience, 2,442 required 1-2 years of experience, 1,289 required 3-5 years of experience, 209 required 6-10 years of experience and 25 required at least 10 years of experience and 10 jobs with no specified required experience.

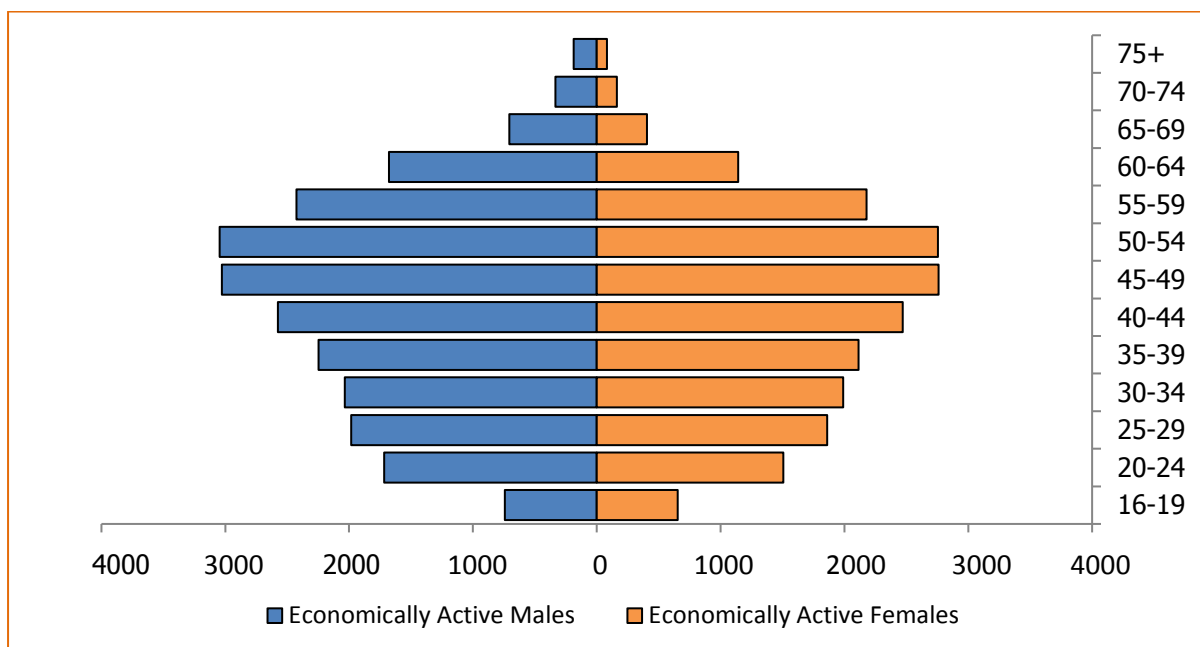
Figure 8 Work Permits

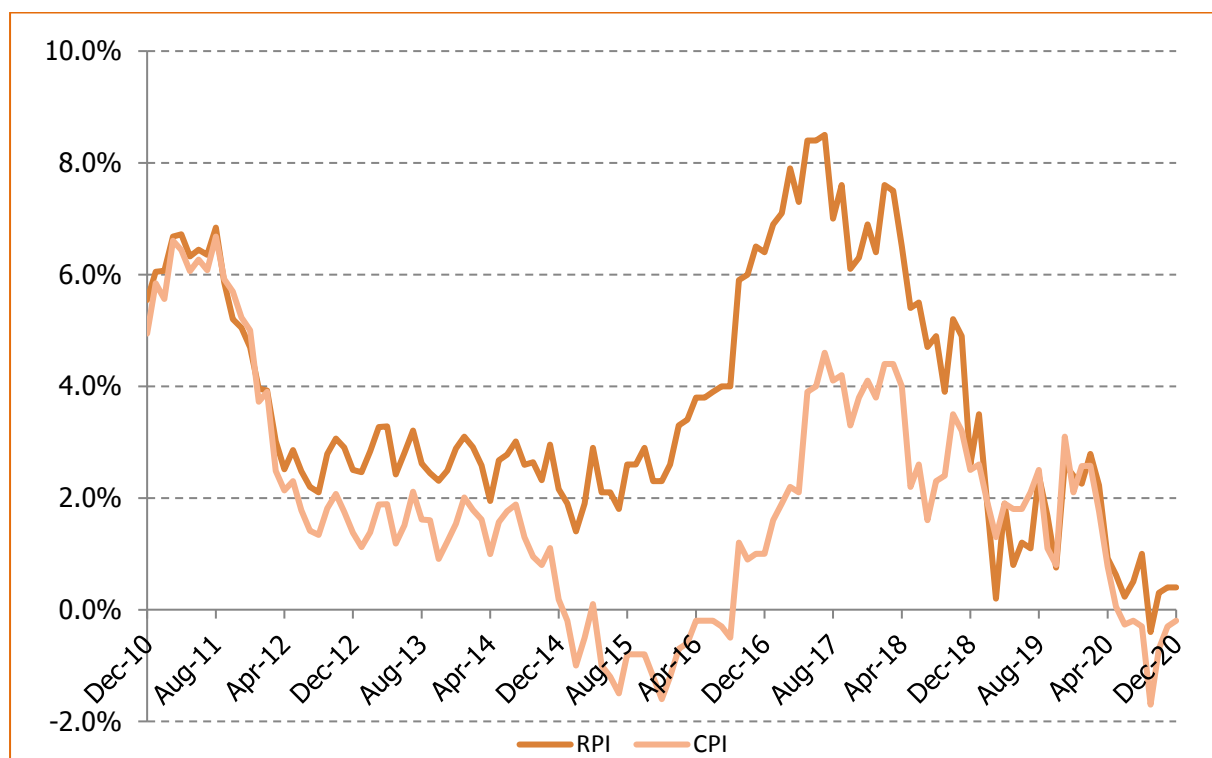
Figure 9 Age Distribution of Working Population, 2016

The reflation factors shown in Table 7 can be used to convert a price or monetary value into its real equivalent (i.e. in today's money) by multiplying by the appropriate reflationary factor. For example, using the CPI as the main inflationary measure, £100 in 2011 is the equivalent to £111.4 in 2020 ($£100 \times 1.114$). This means that to buy the same amount of goods and services as in 2011, you would need £111.4 in 2020.

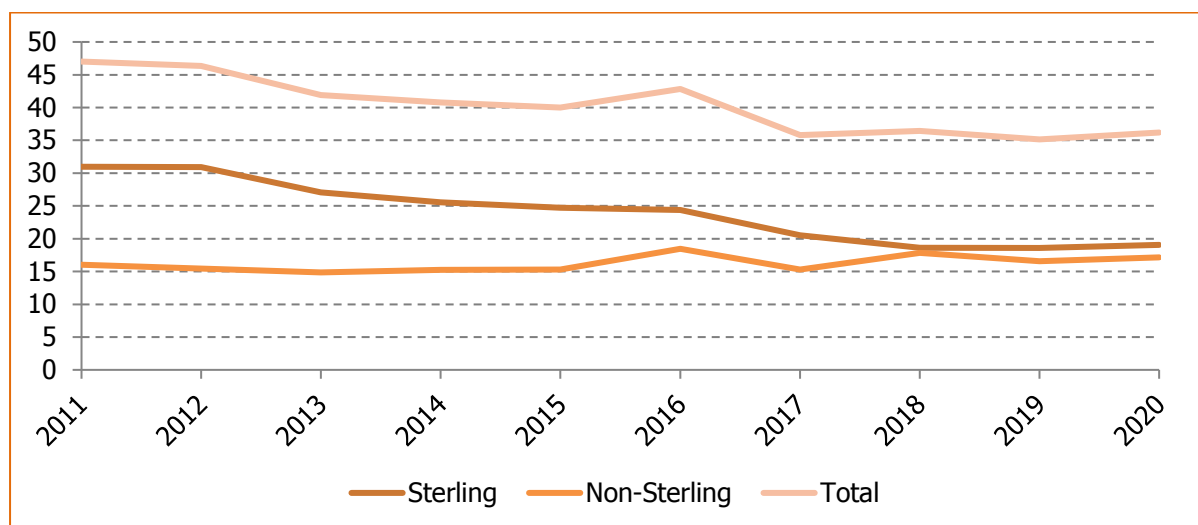

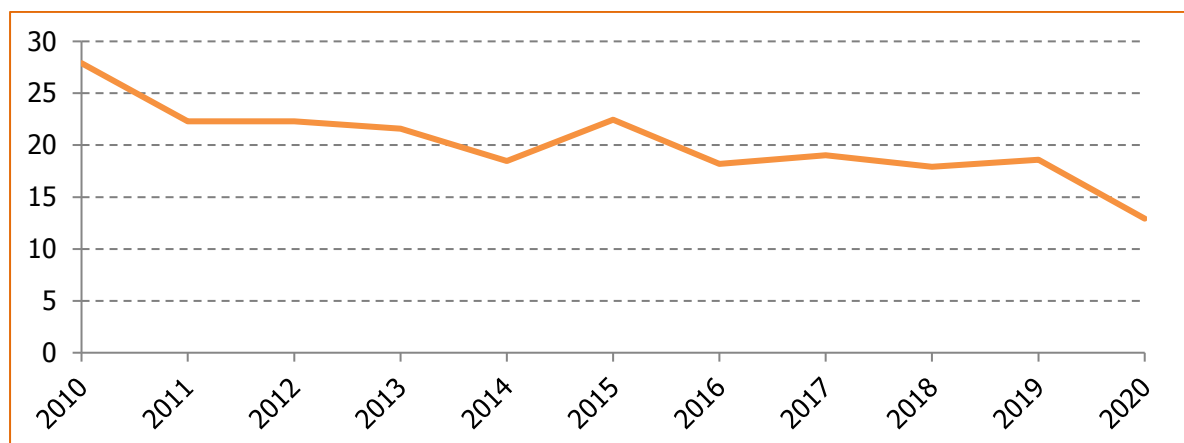
Figure 11 Bank Deposit Base (£ bn)

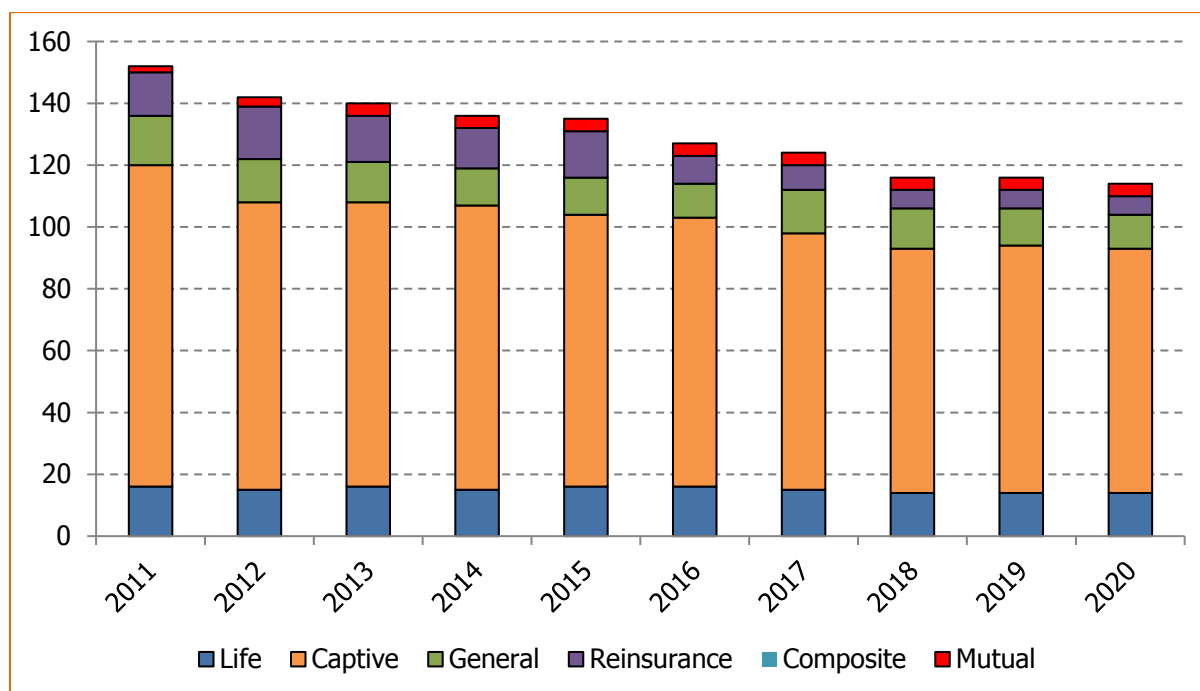
Figure 12 Funds under Management (US\$ bn)

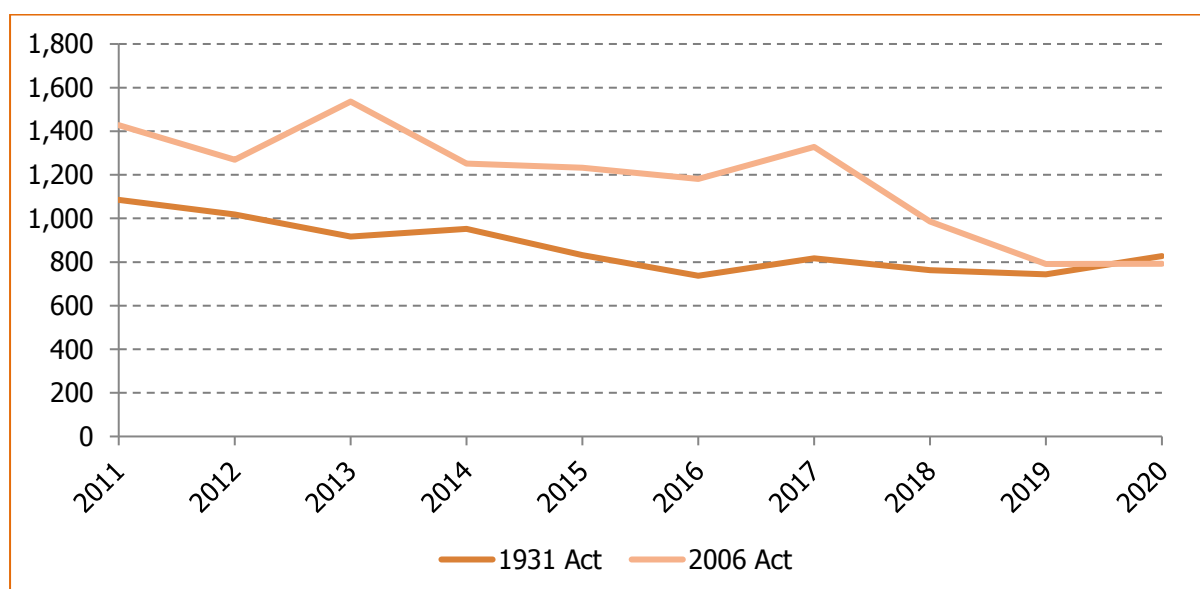
Figure 13 Authorised Insurers, by type

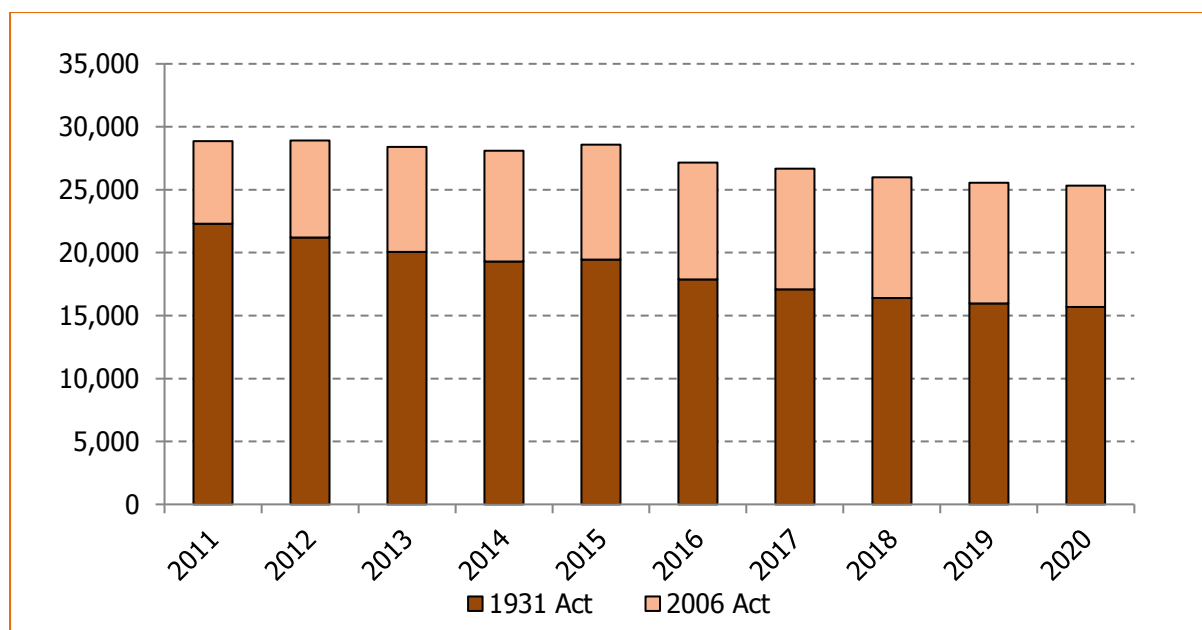
Figure 14 New Company Registrations

Figure 15 Total number of Companies Registered on the Isle of Man

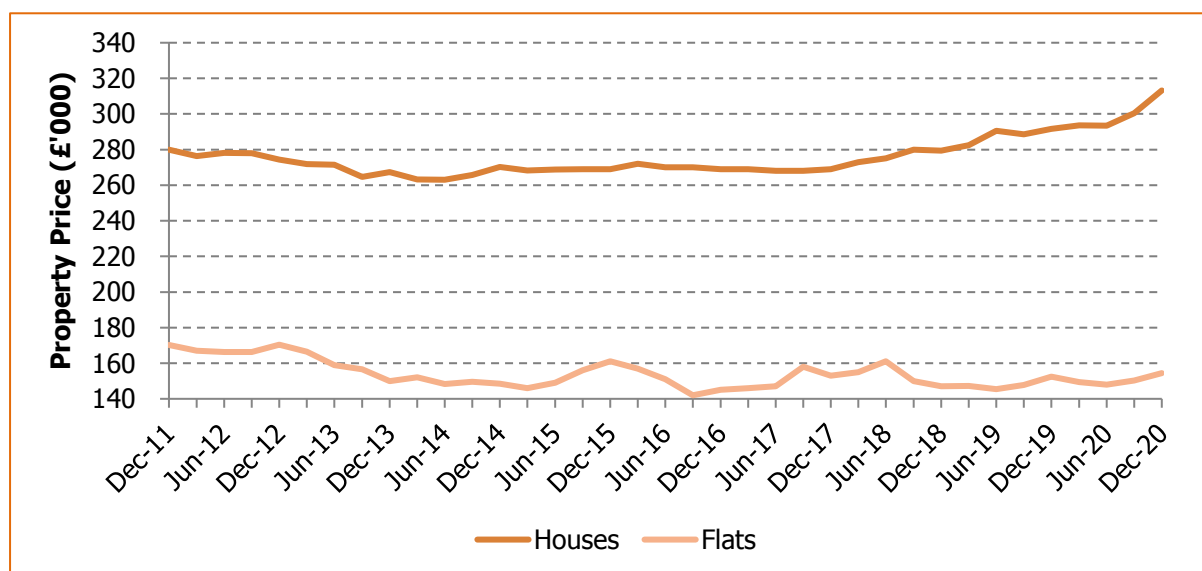

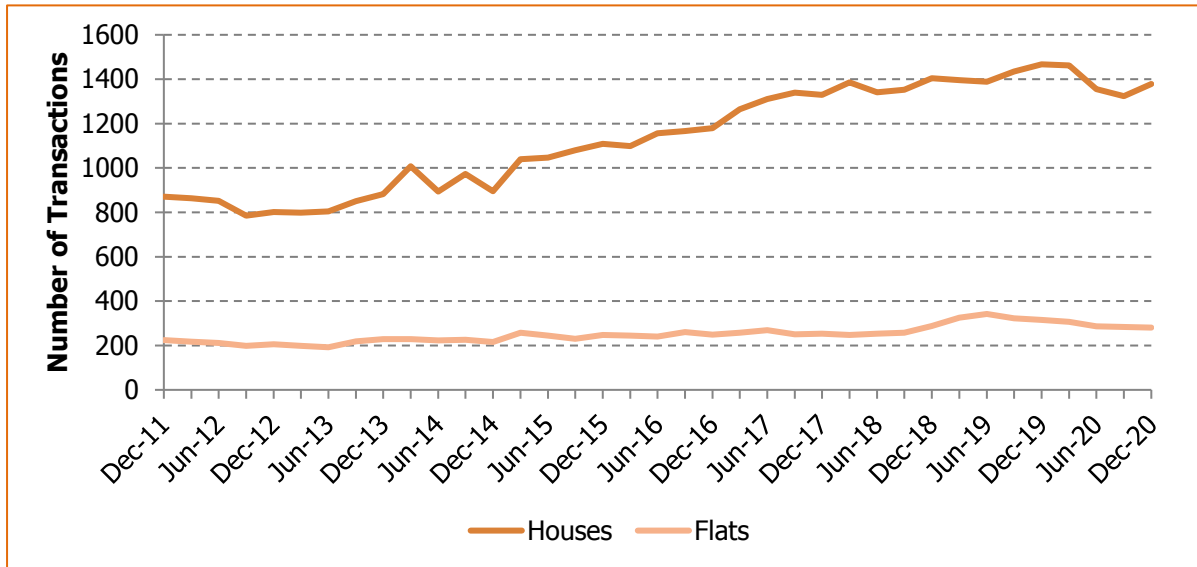
Figure 16 Average Property Price (£'000)

Figure 17 Number of Property Transactions

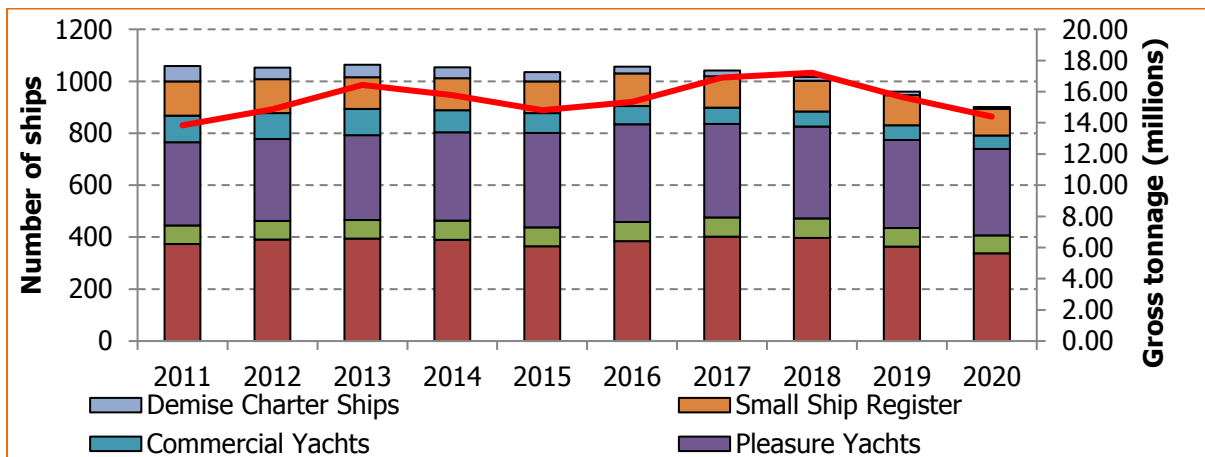

Figure 18 Ship Registry

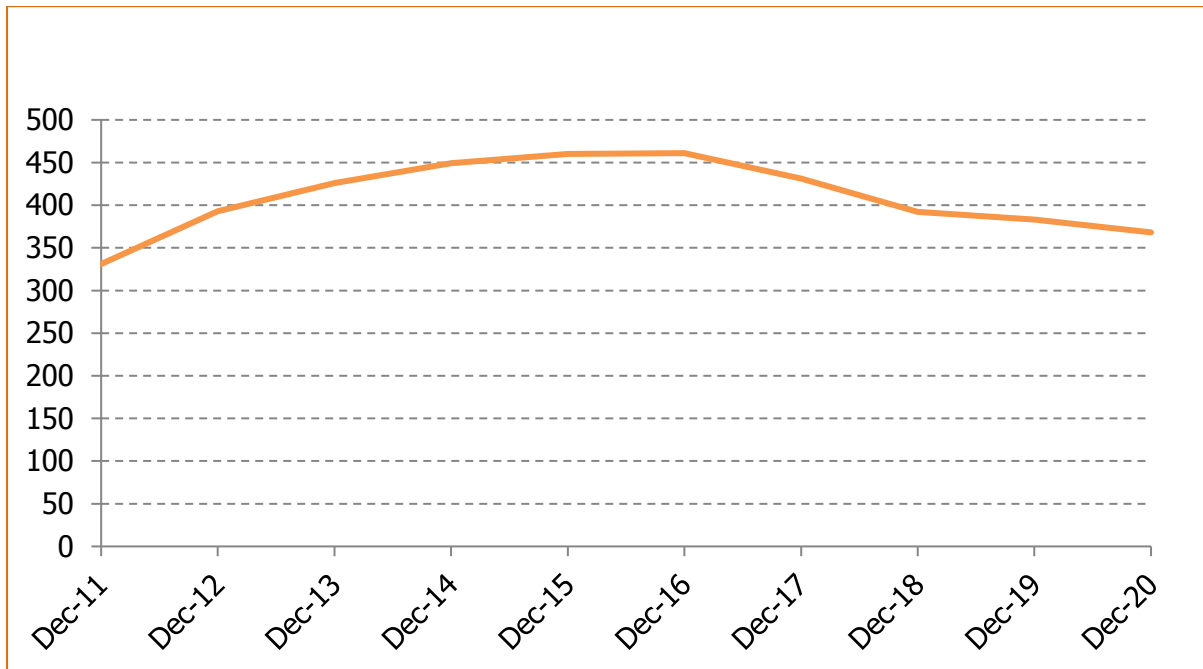

Figure 19 Number of Registered Aircraft

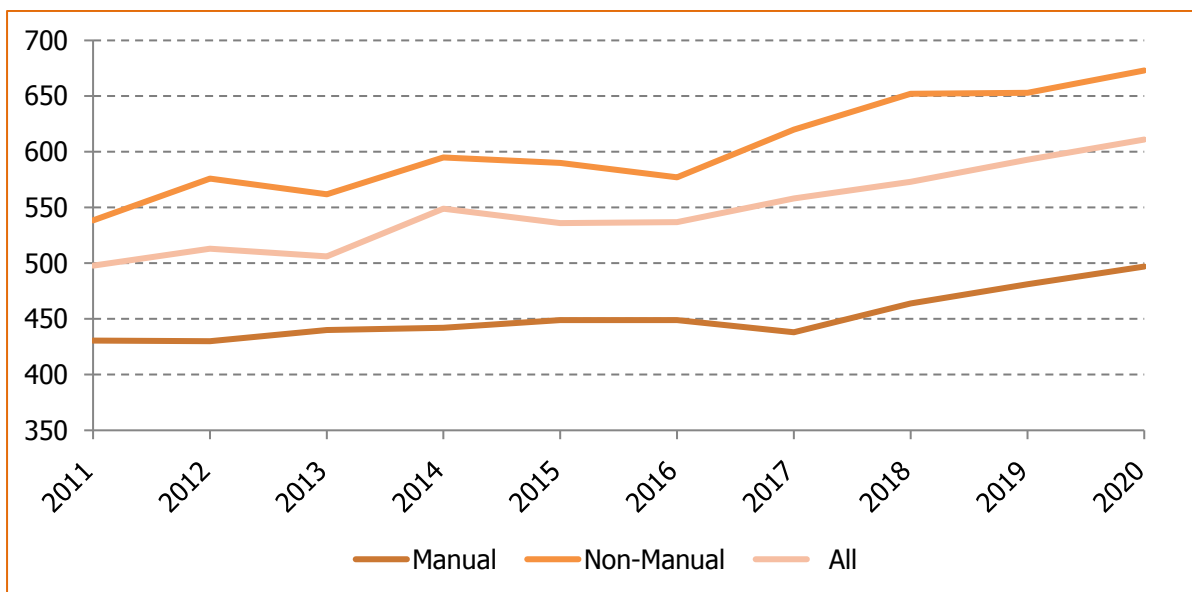

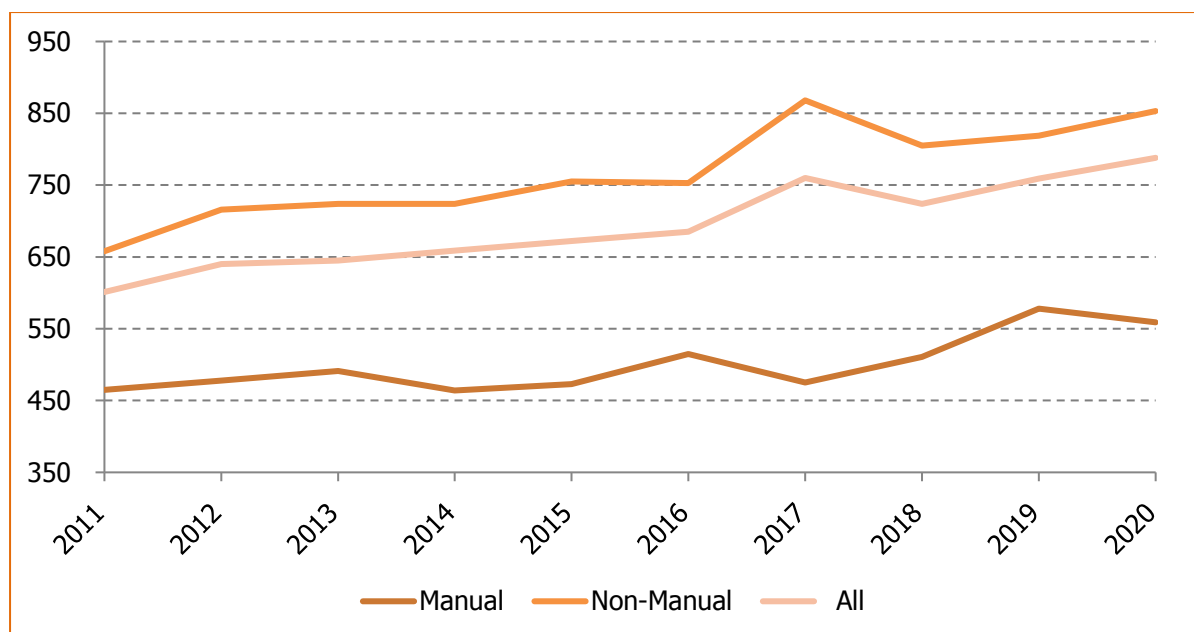

Figure 21 Average Weekly Earnings (£)

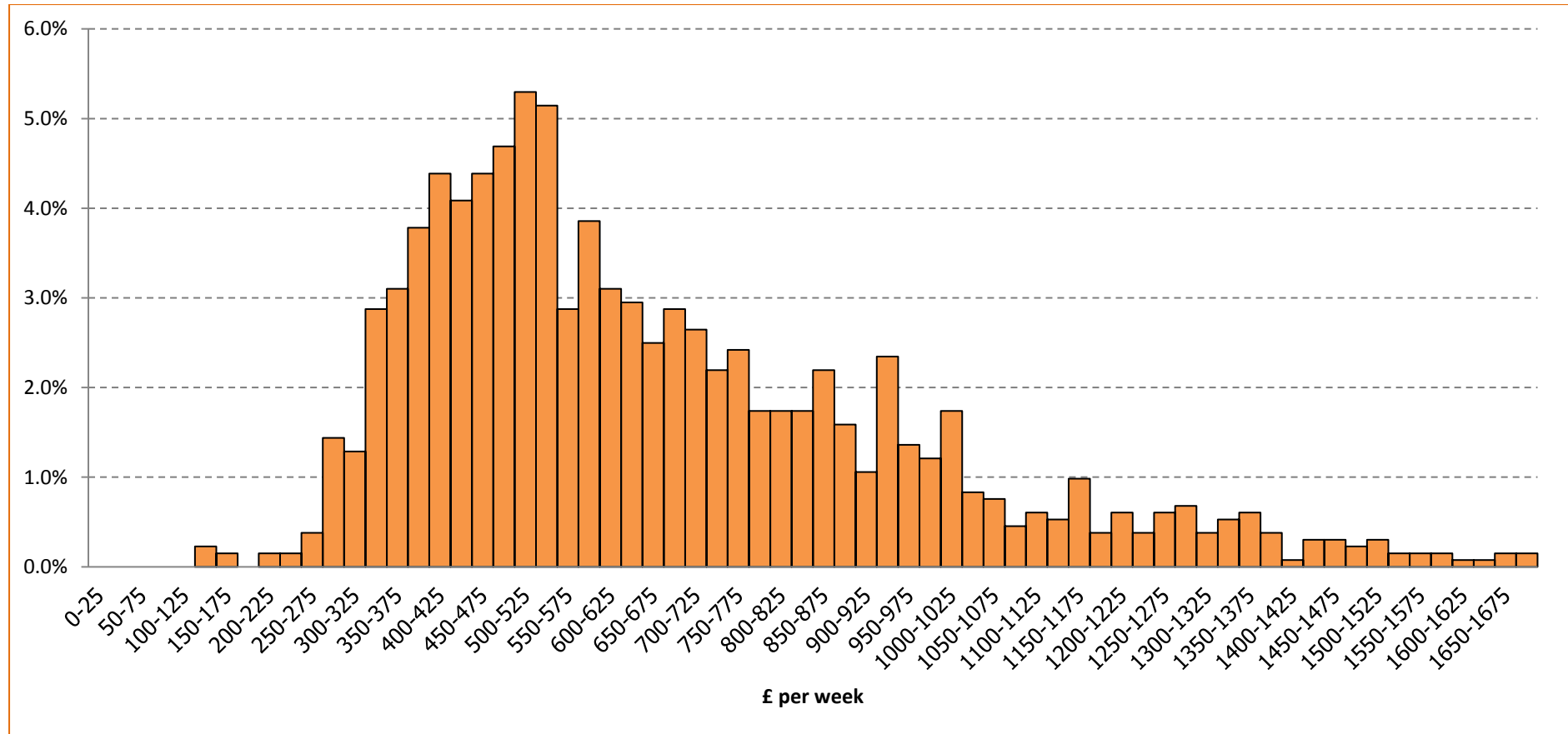

The earnings survey pay period relates to June. Both the median and average weekly earnings figures only include full time employees, on adult rates, whose earnings were not affected by absence. The median weekly earnings is the level of earnings such that half the sample has earnings greater, and the other half lower. A full time employee is classified as anyone working 30+ hours a week, with the exception of teachers.

The median weekly earnings for 2020 were £611, and the average weekly earnings were £788.

Figure 22 Distribution of Weekly Earnings 2020



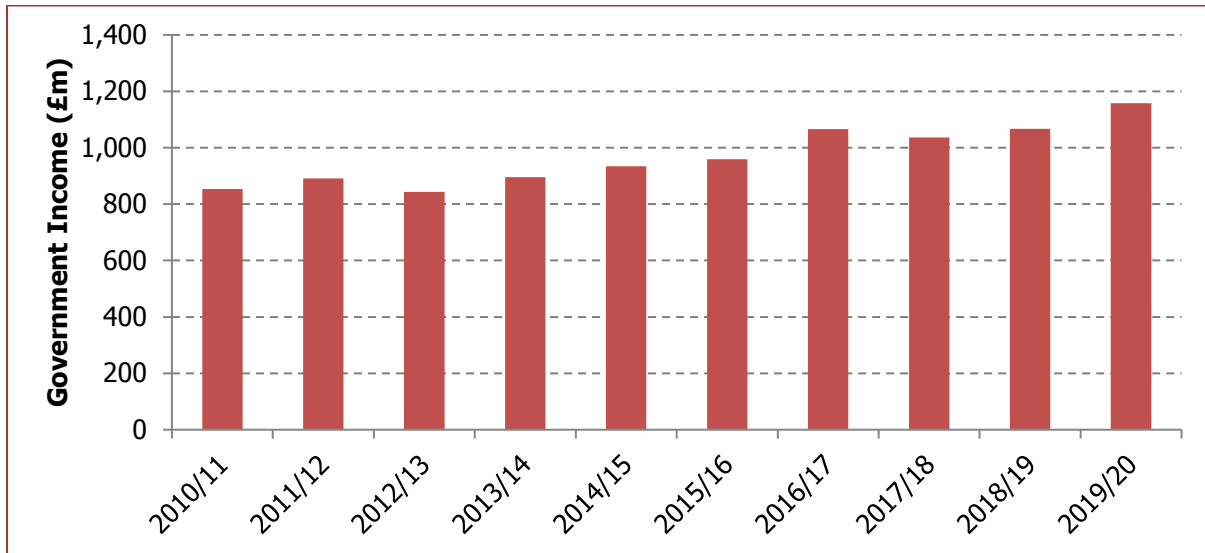

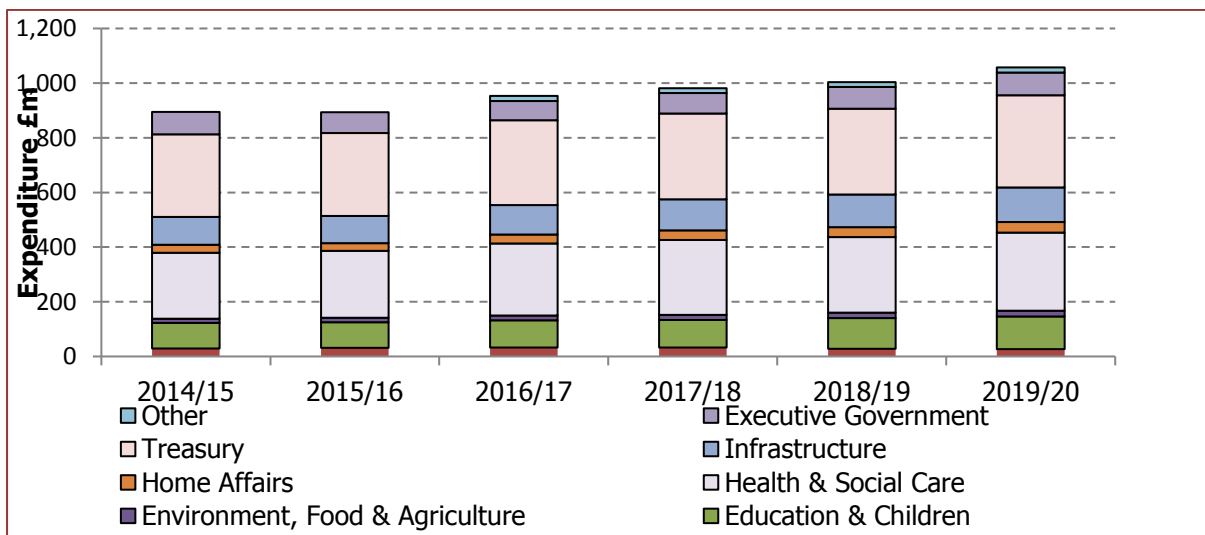
Figure 23 Government Income (£m)

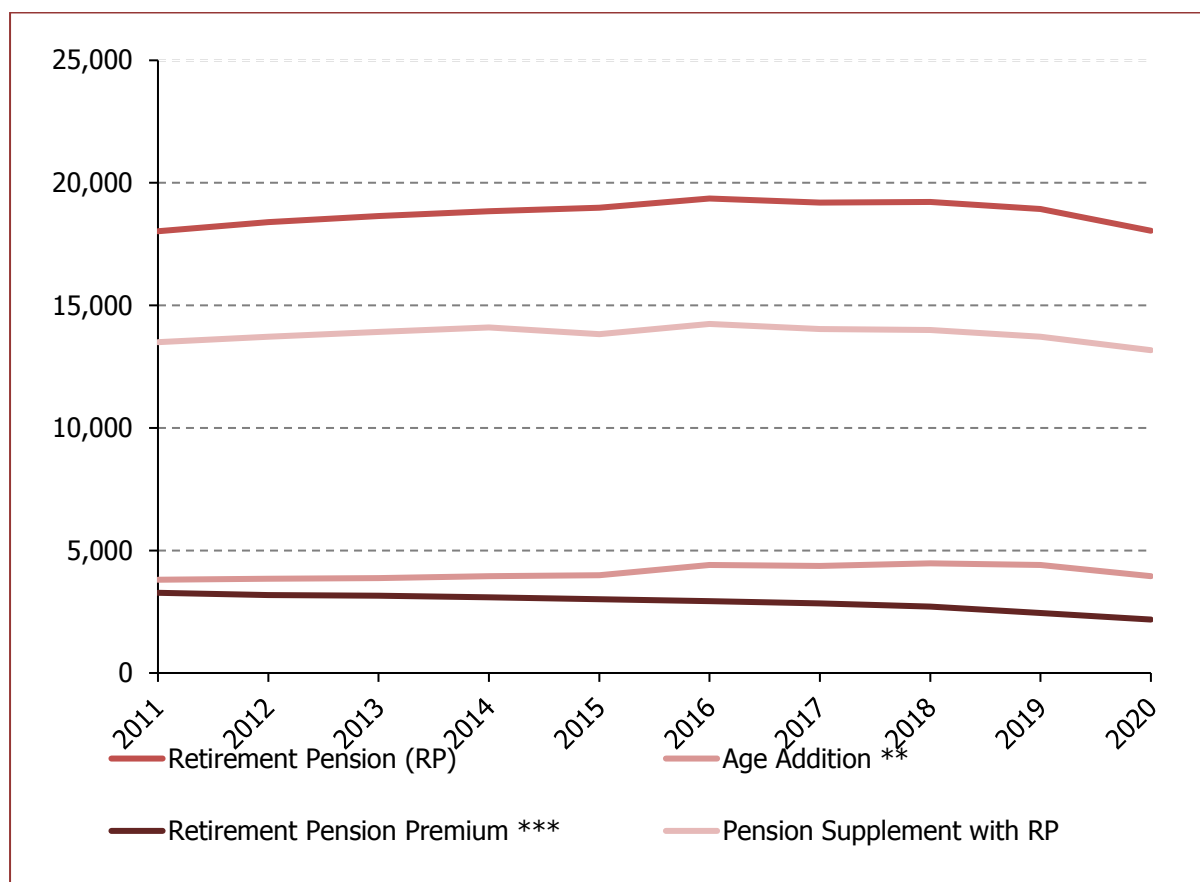

Figure 25 Pension and Other Retirement Related Benefits



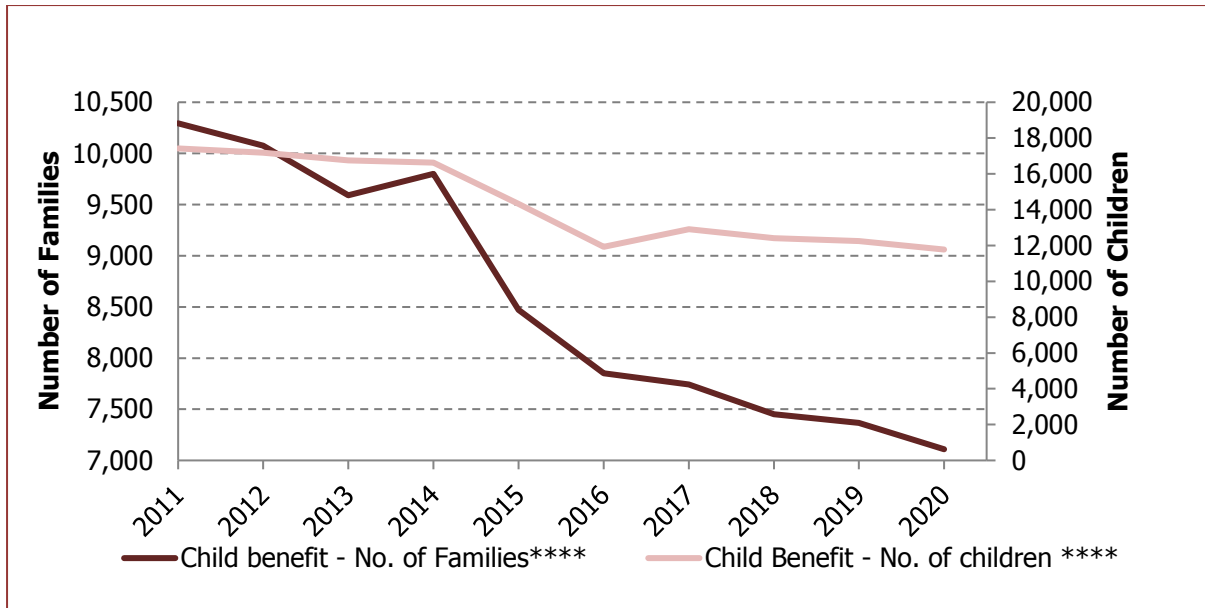

Figure 26 Child Benefit

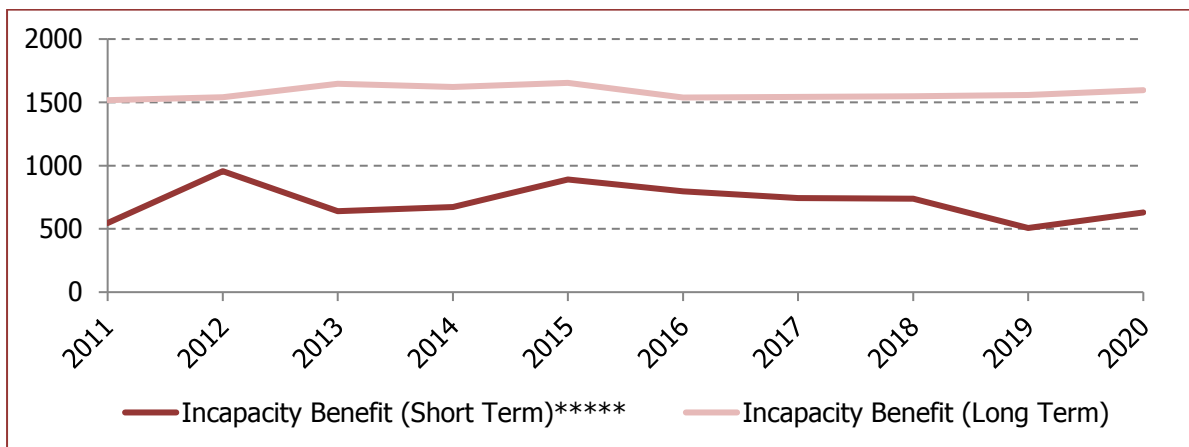

Figure 27 Incapacity Benefit Recipients

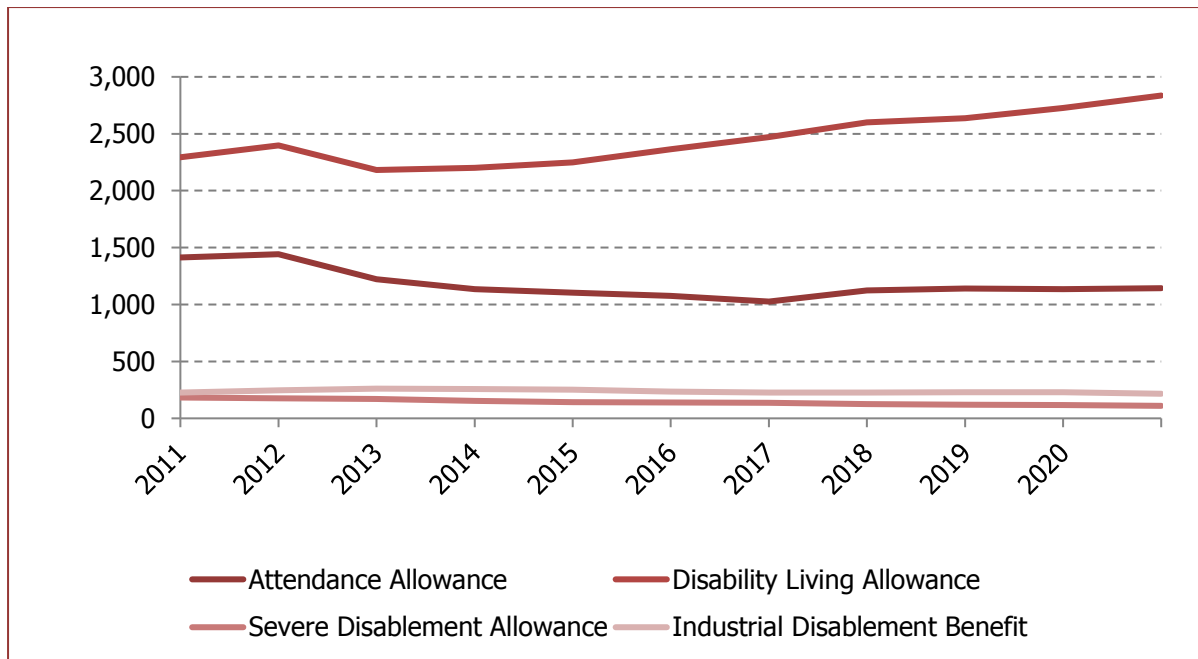

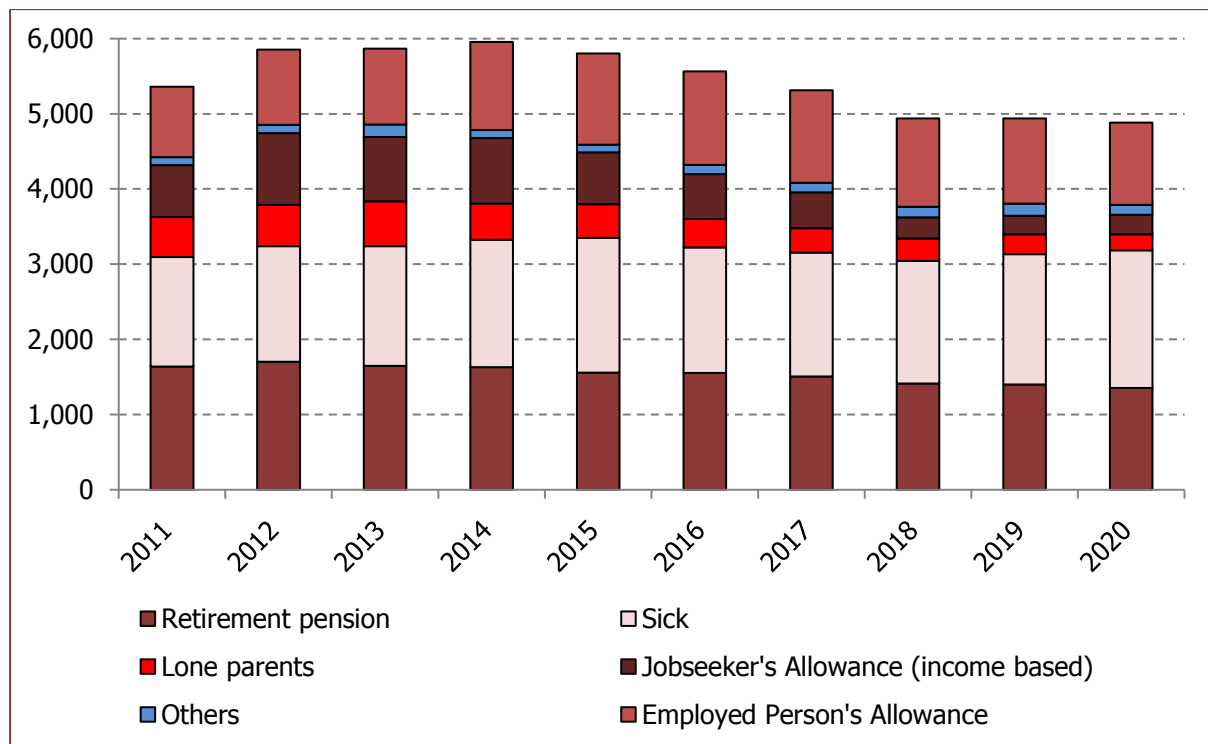
Figure 28 Attendance and Disability Living Allowances

Figure 29 Recipients of Employed Person's Allowance and Income Support, by type



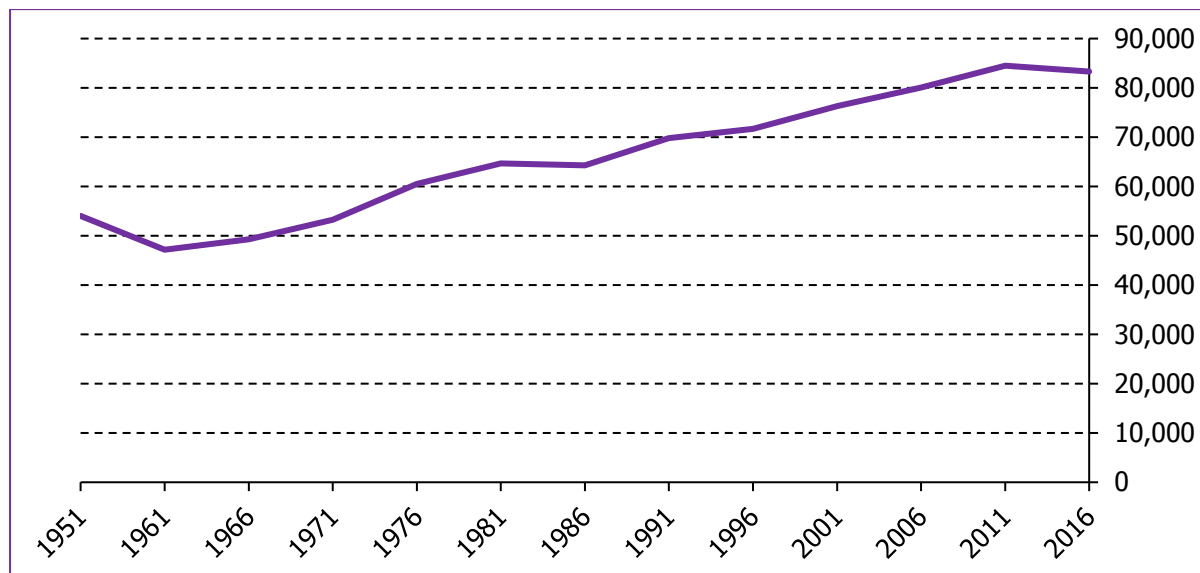

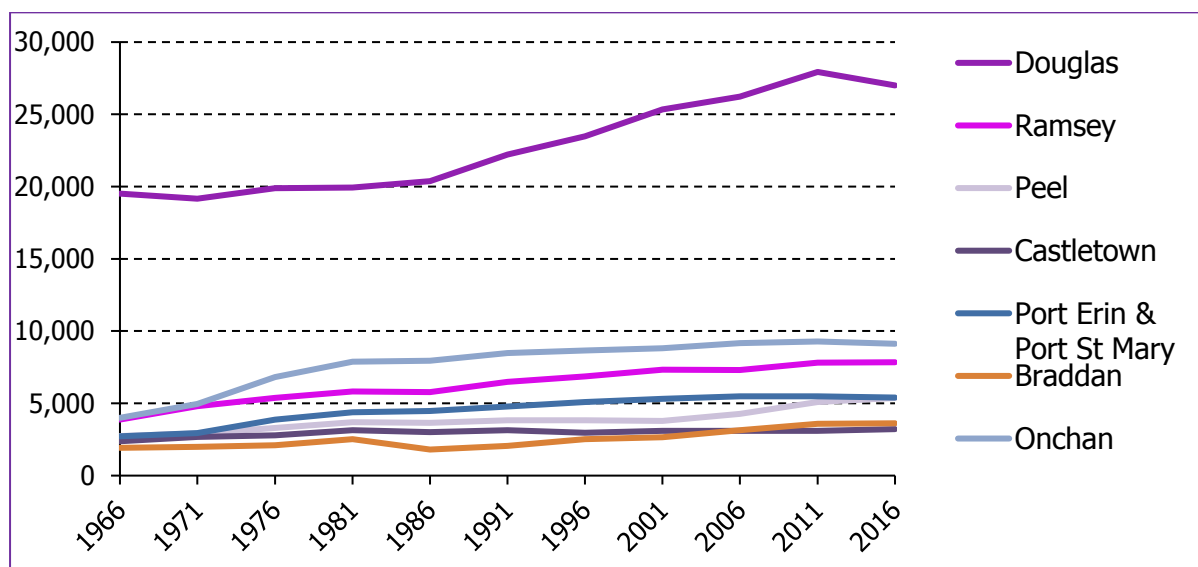

Figure 31 Population in Key Towns, 2016

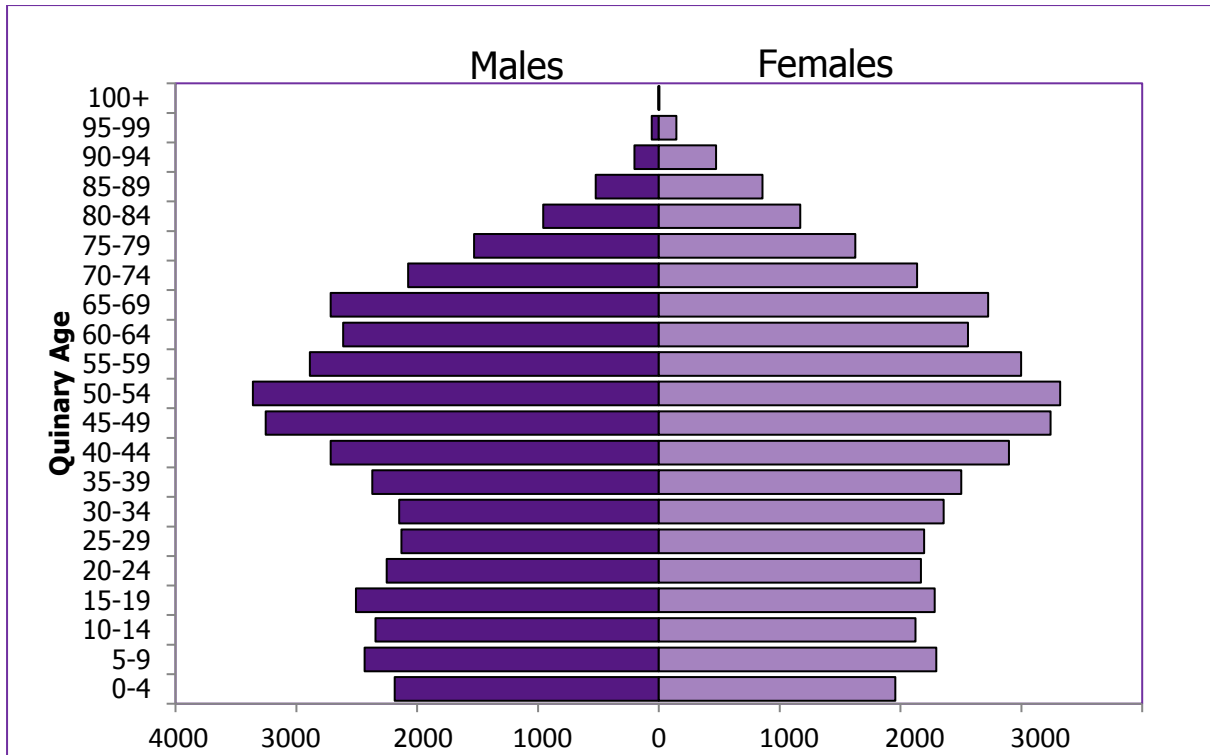

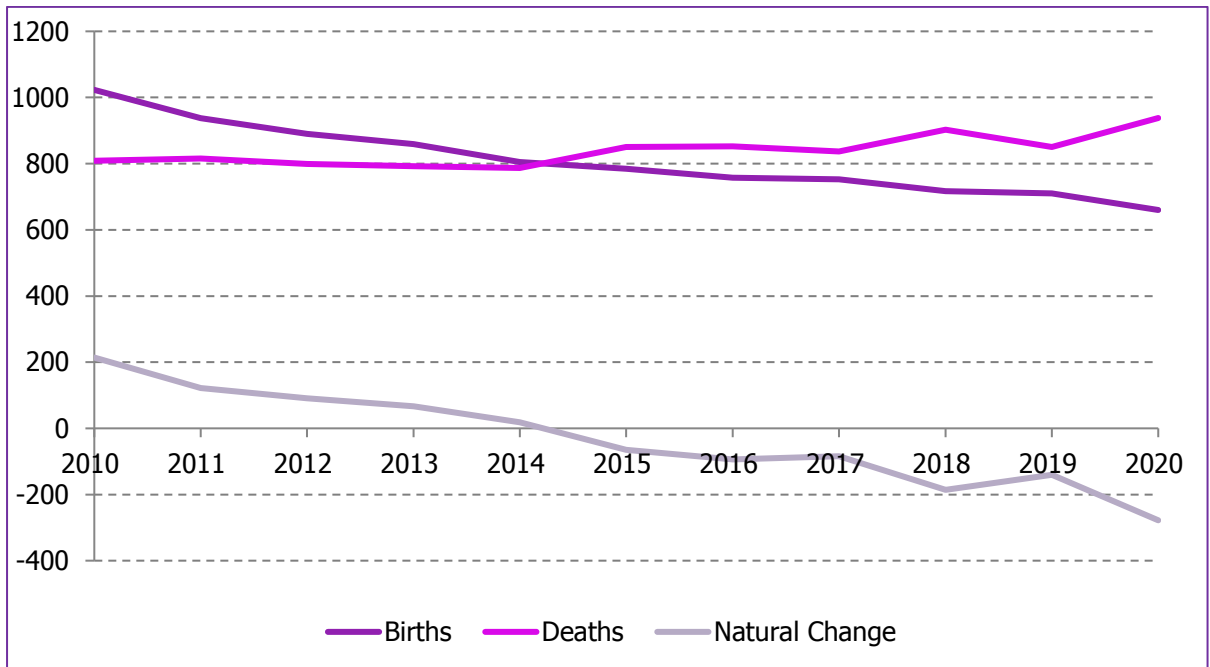

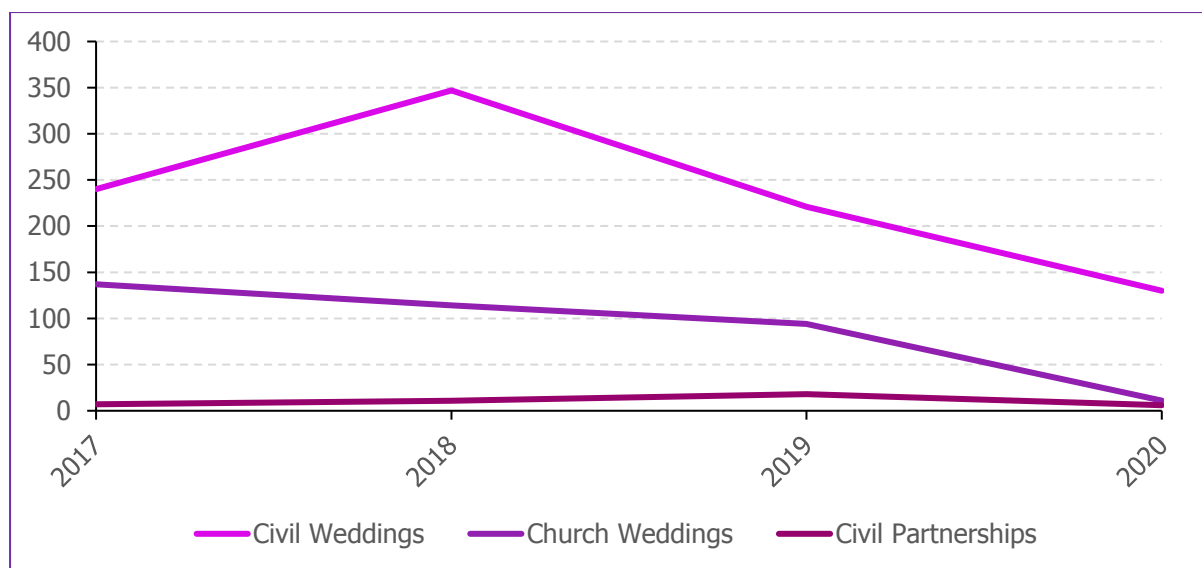
Figure 33 Isle of Man Births and Deaths

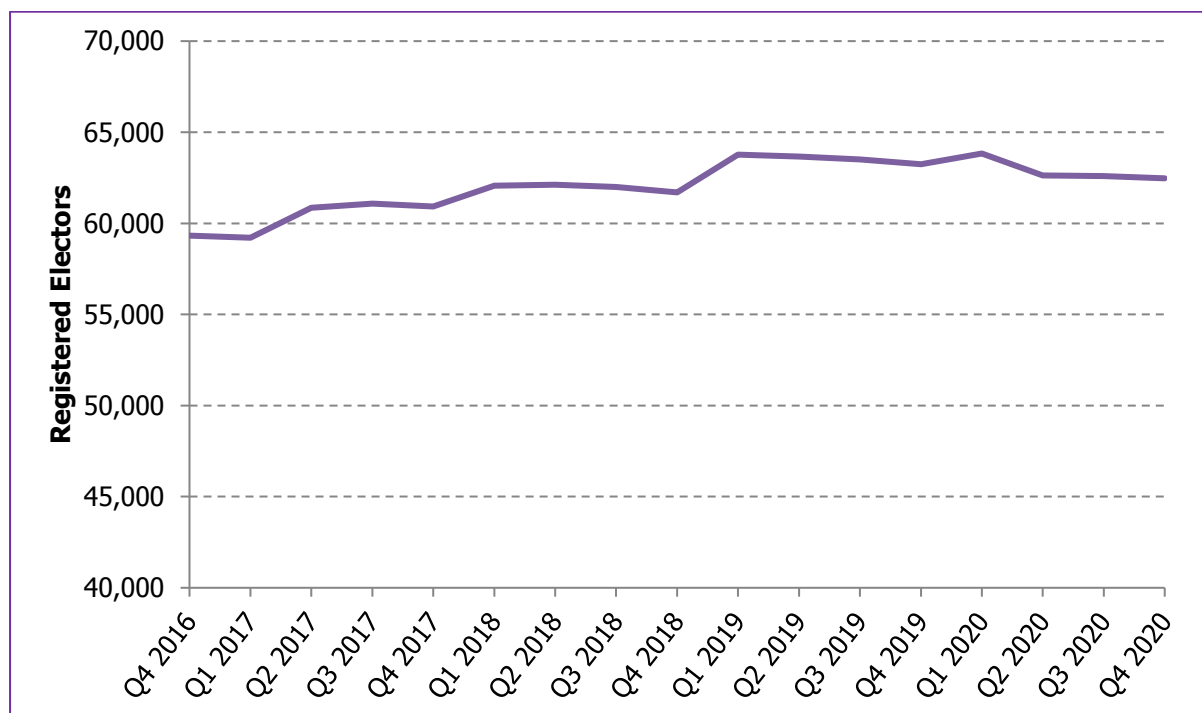
Figure 34 Church Weddings, Civil Weddings and Civil Partnerships Registered

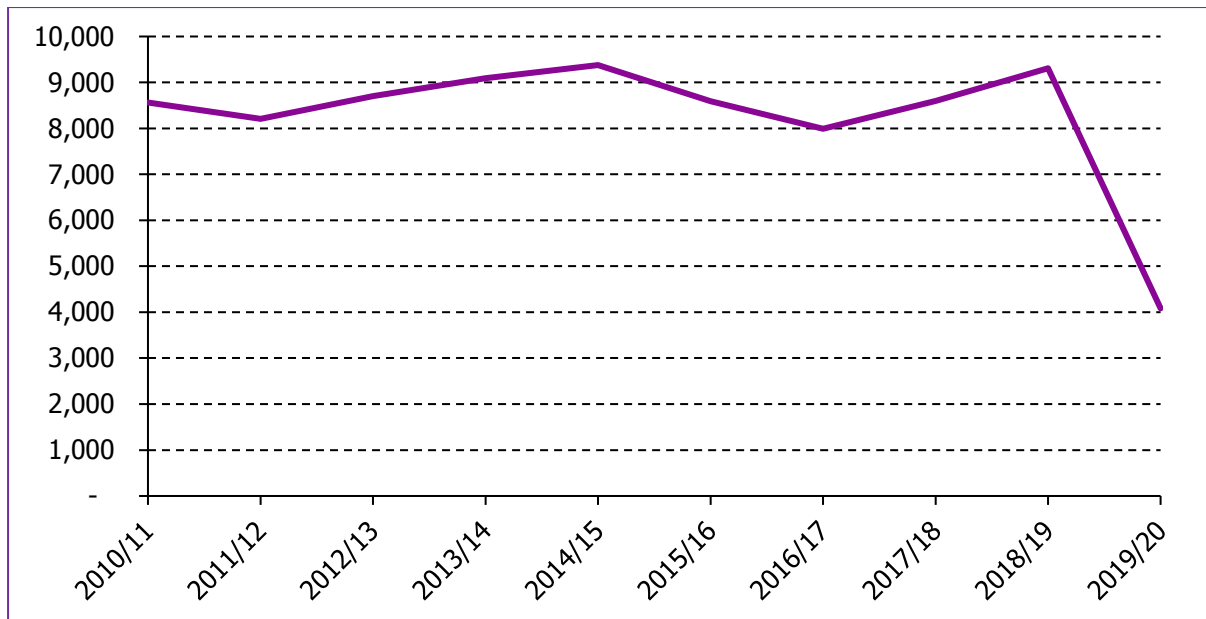

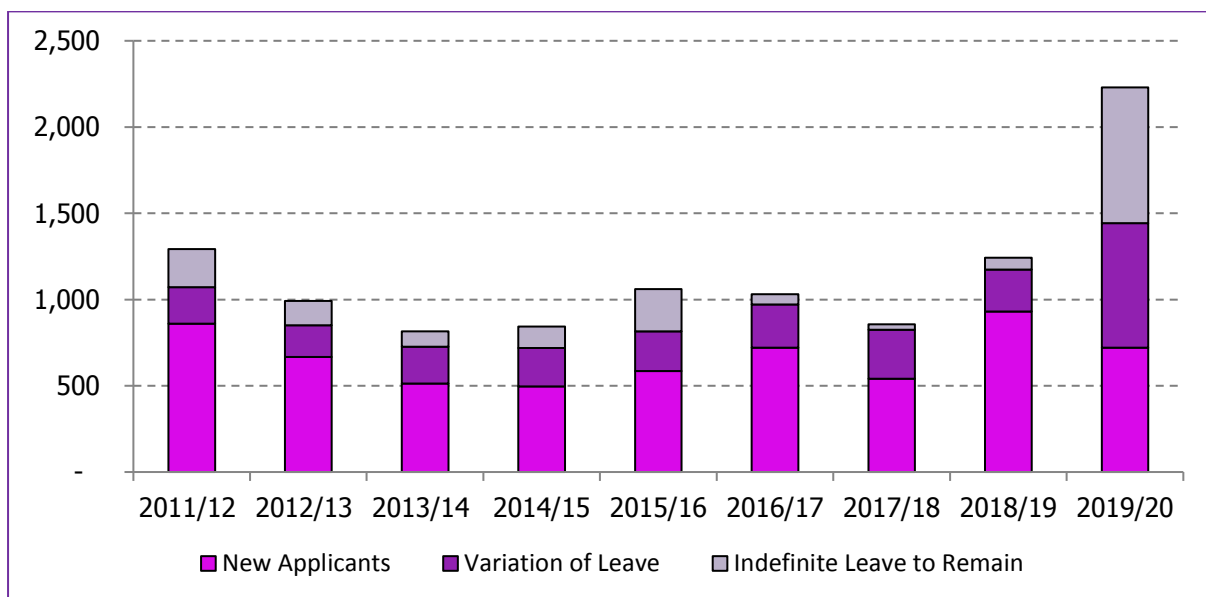
Figure 36 Number of Passports Issued

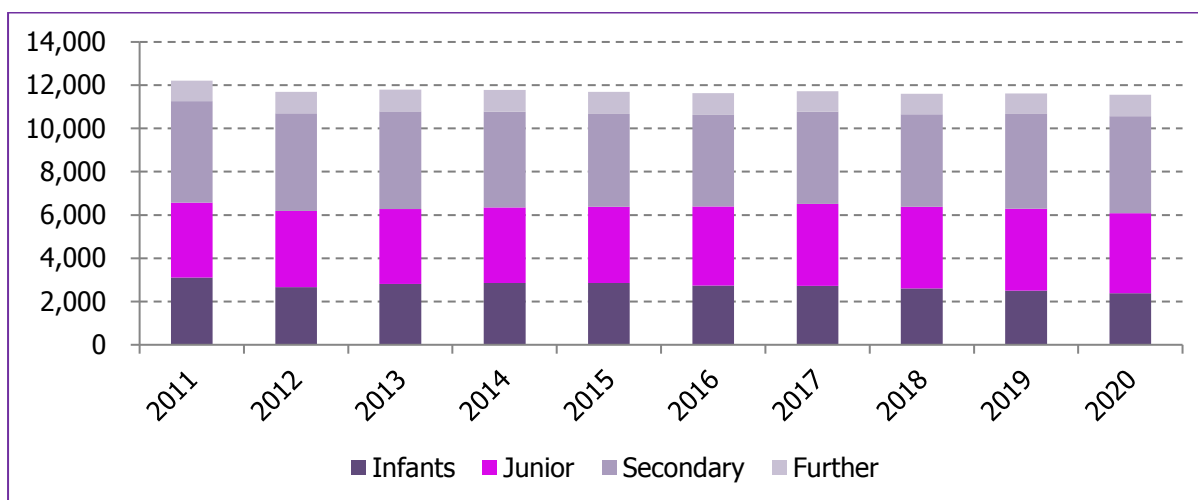

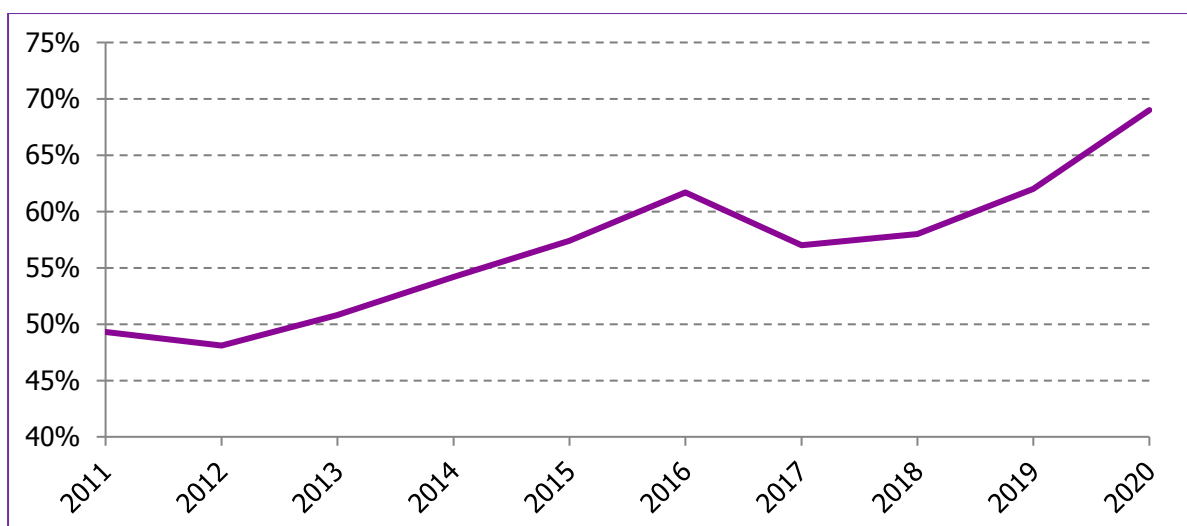
Figure 38 School Age Population

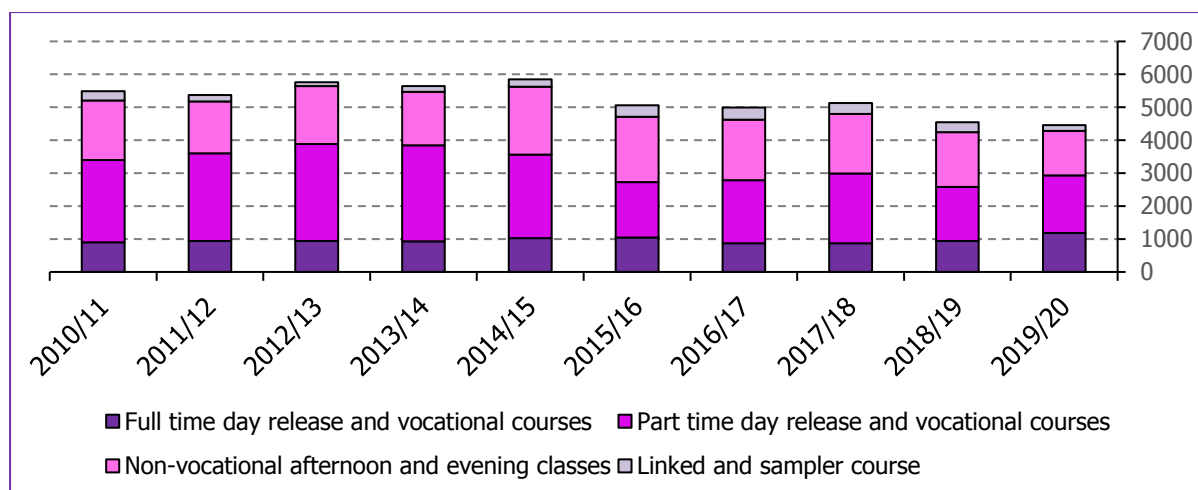
Figure 39 Percentage of students gaining 5 or more Level 2 Qualifications (including English and Maths)

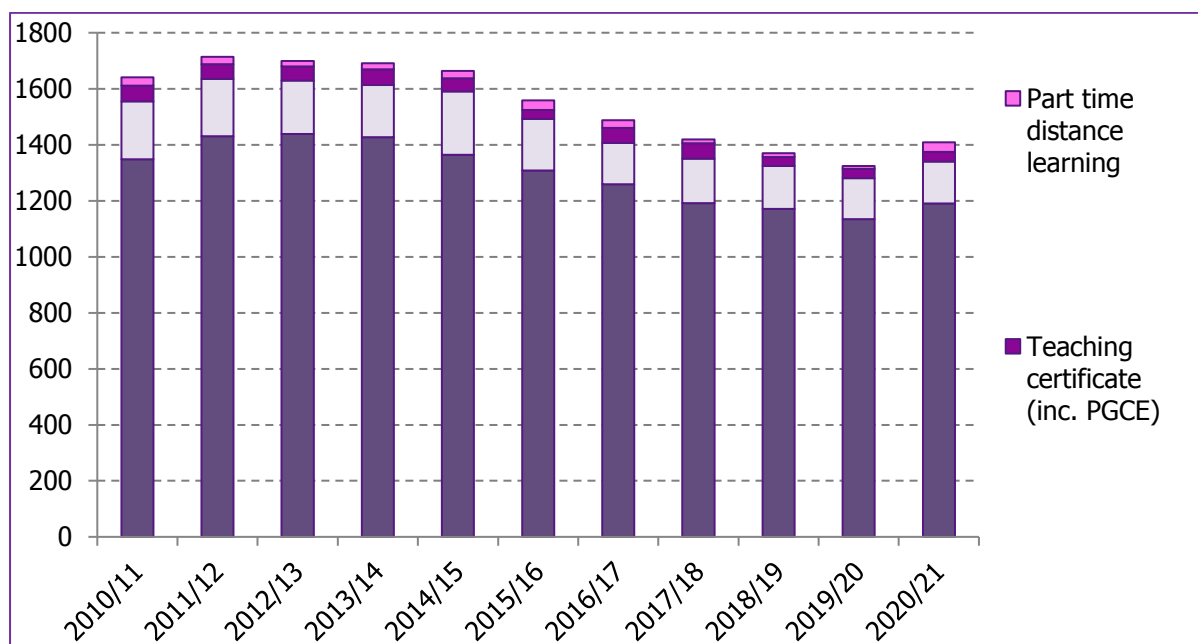
Figure 40 Students at University College Isle of Man

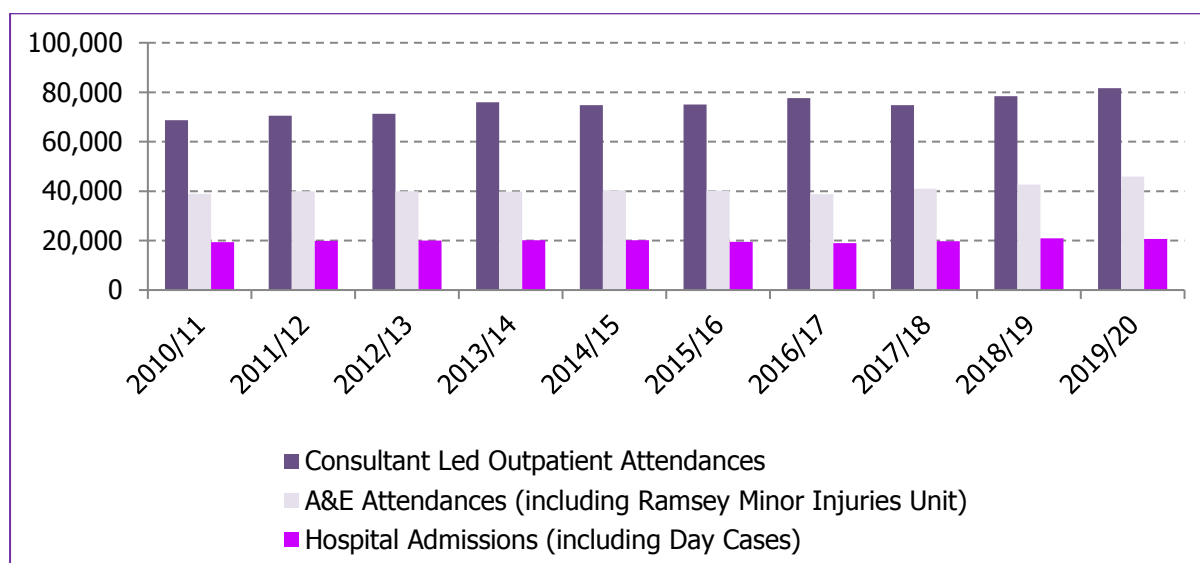

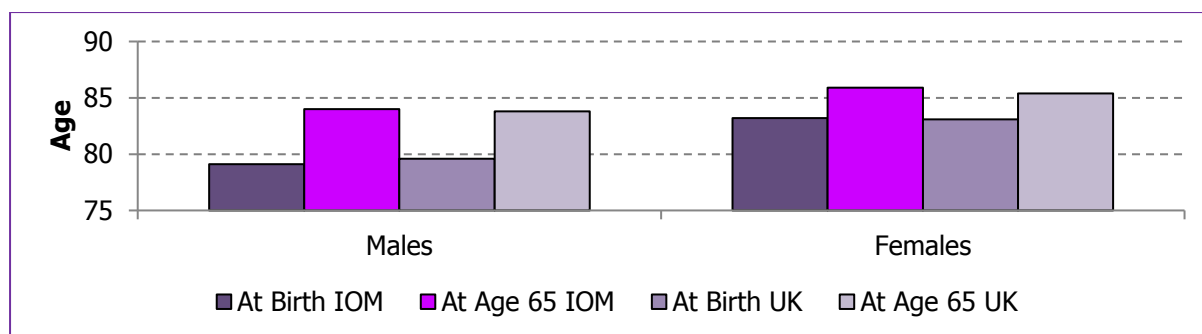
Figure 42 Noble's and Ramsey Cottage Hospital Activity (excluding Private Patients)

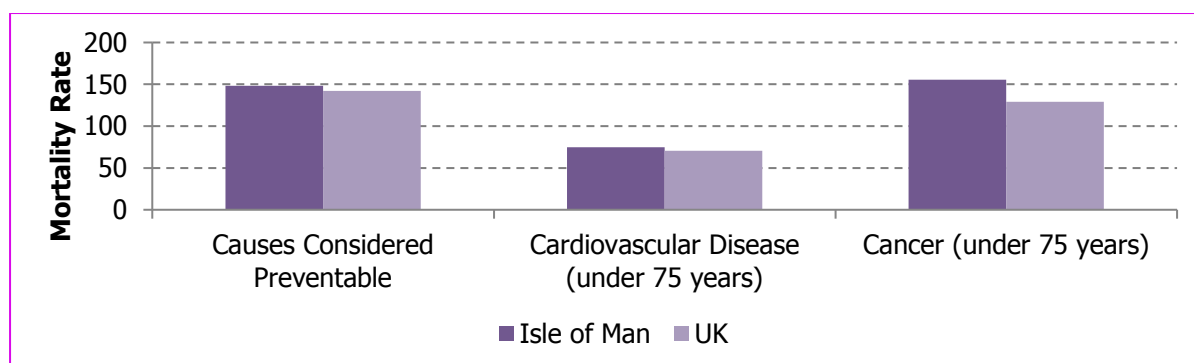
Figure 43 Life Expectancy

Life expectancy for males is expected to be 78.9 years at birth and 83.5 years at age 65 in the Isle of Man, compared with 79.6 years at birth and 83.9 years at age 65 in the UK. This compares to 83.0 years at birth and 85.8 years at age 65 in the Isle of Man, or 83.2 years at birth and 86.2 years at age 65 in the UK for females. The Department of Health and Social Care are currently undertaking an intensive study of life expectancy and mortality on the Isle of Man.

Over the period 2017-2019 mortality from causes considered preventable are those that, in the light of the understanding of the determinants of health at the time of death, all or most deaths from the underlying cause (subject to age limits if appropriate) could potentially be avoided by public health interventions in the broadest sense.

Over this period there were 148.4 deaths from causes considered preventable per 100,000 population in the Isle of Man and 142.2 per 100,000 population in England. Cardiovascular mortality rates were 74.7 per 100,000 population in the Isle of Man and 70.4 per 100,000 population in England. Mortality rates for all cancers were 155.6 per 100,000 population in

the Isle of Man and 129.2 per 100,000 population in England. Over the period Infant mortality rates were 3.9 per 1,000 per population in the England, there is a null entry for the Isle of Man due to small numbers.

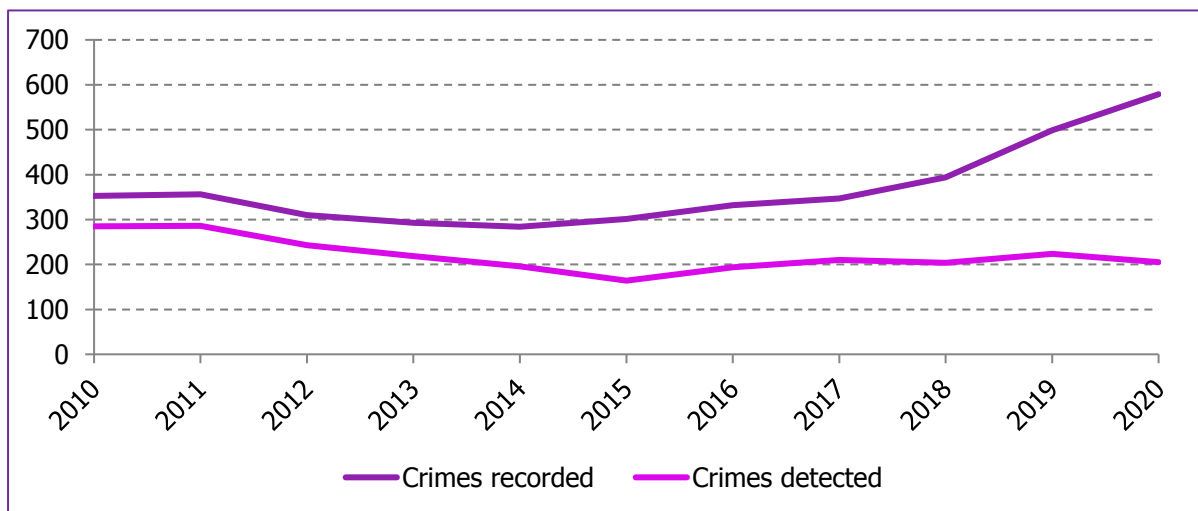

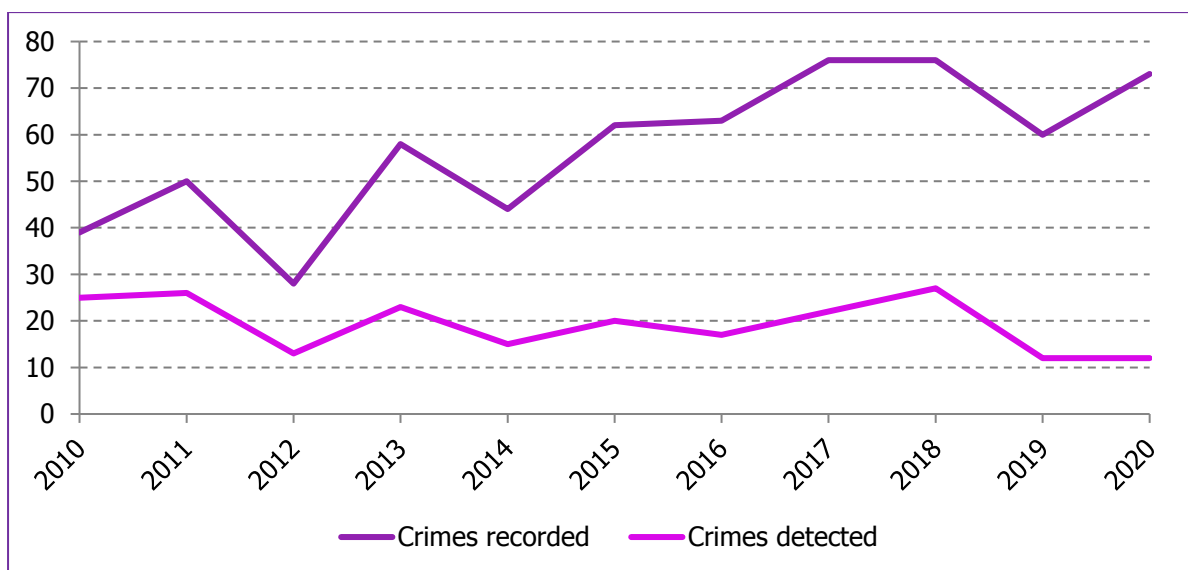
Figure 45 Offences against the Person

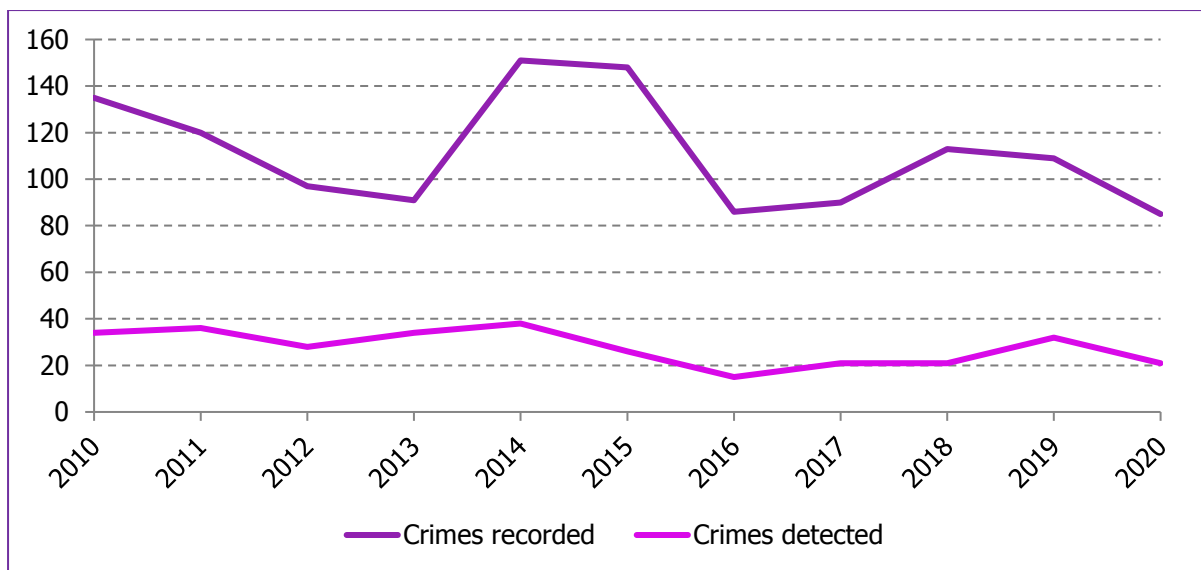
Figure 46 Sexual Offences

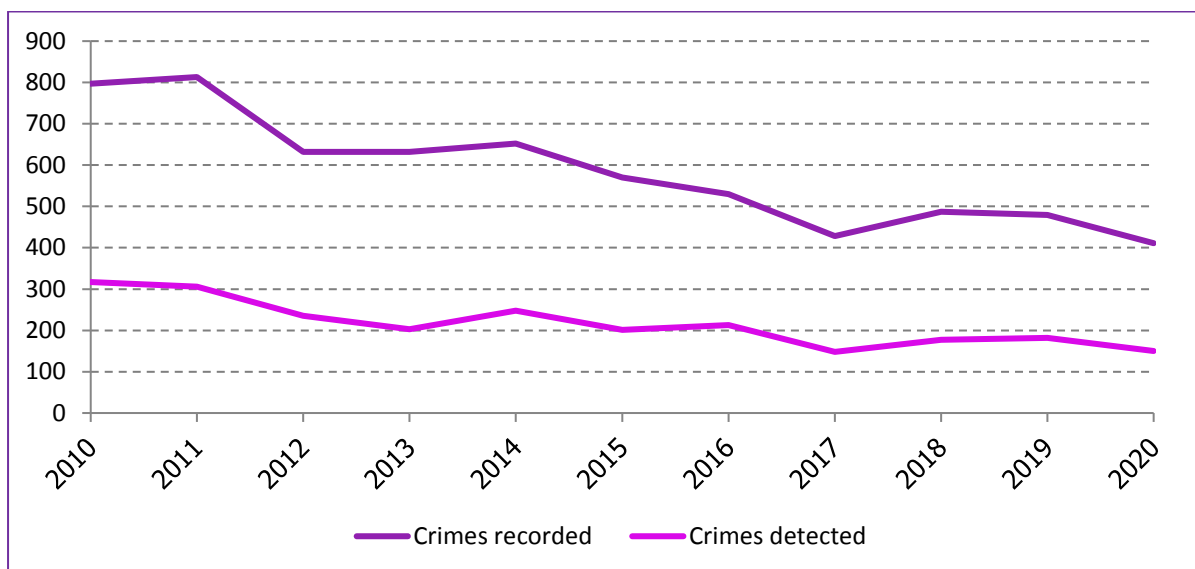
Figure 47 Burglary Offences

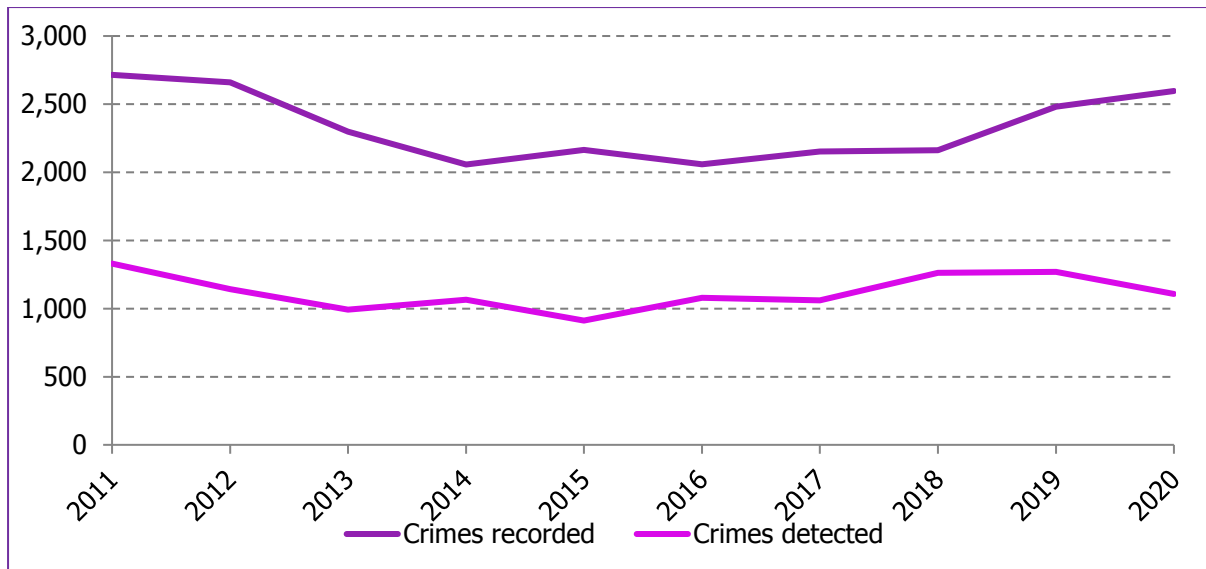
Figure 48 Theft Offences

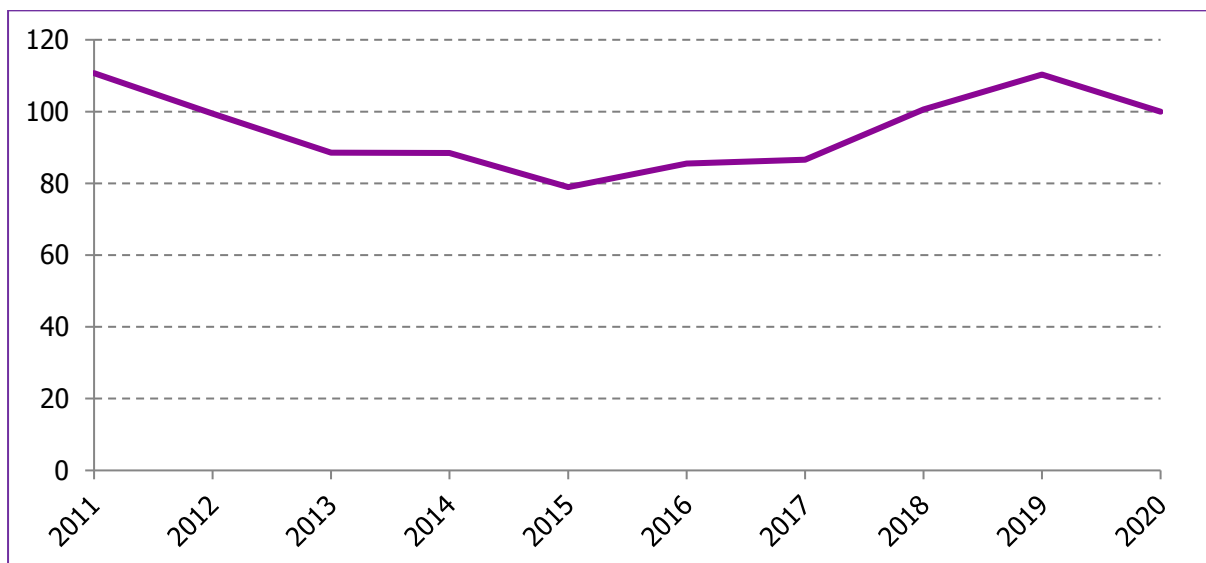
Figure 49 Total Offences

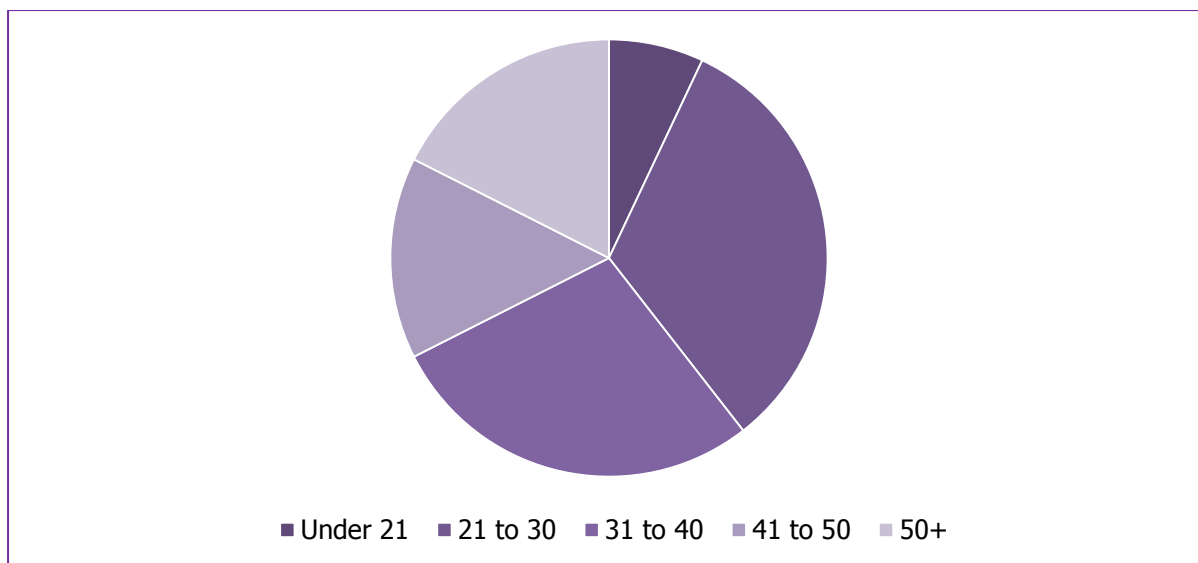
Figure 50 Average Prison Population

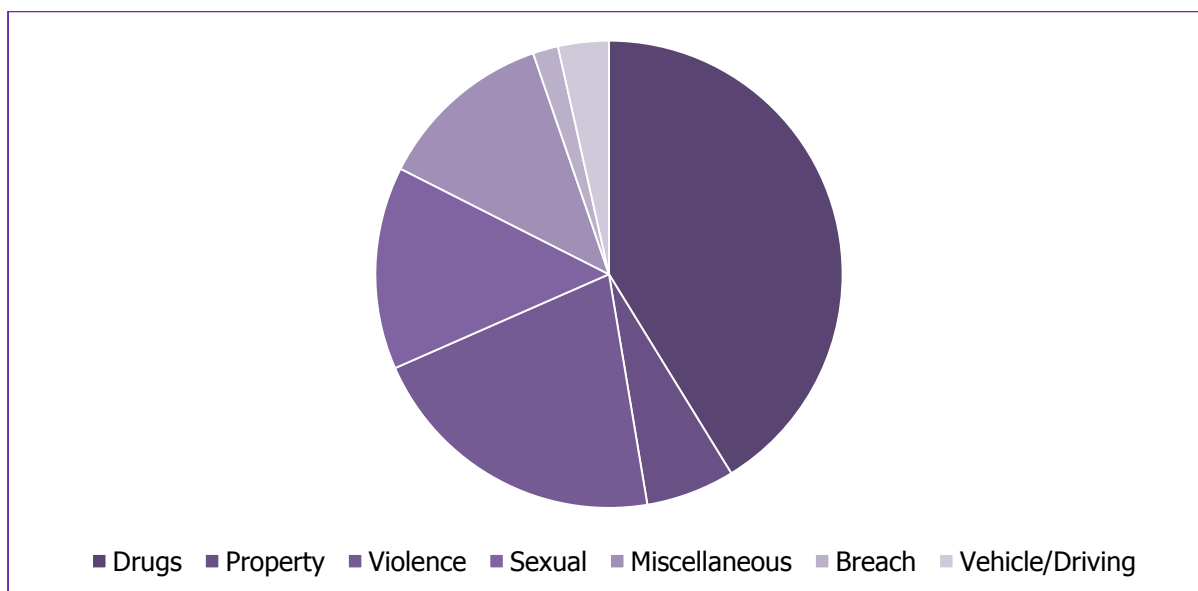
Figure 51 December 2020 Prison Population by Age

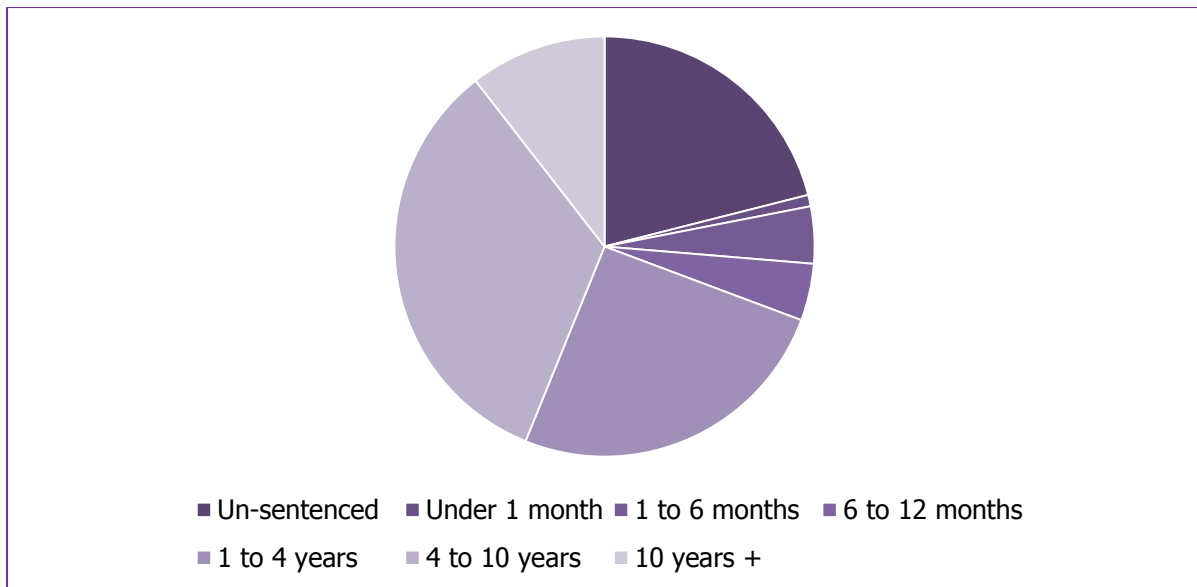
Figure 52 December 2020 Prison Population by Offence

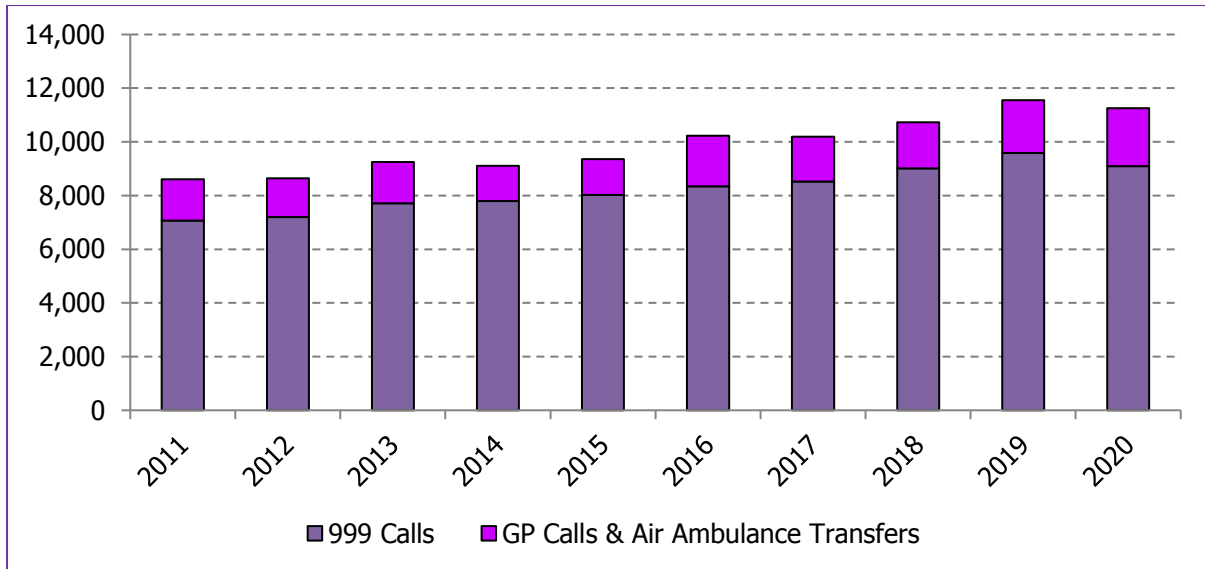

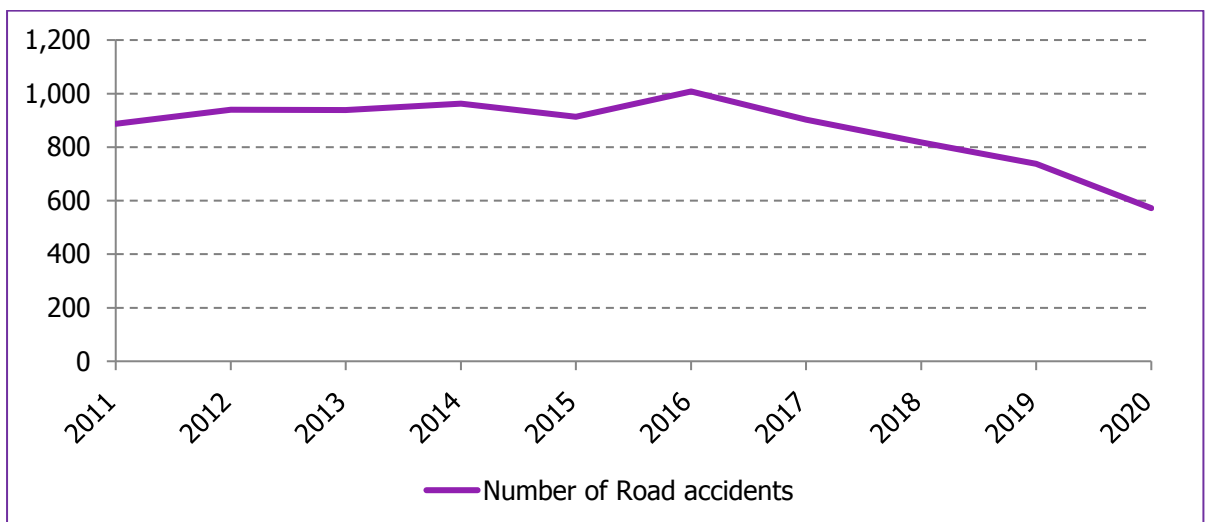
Figure 54 Ambulance Emergency calls

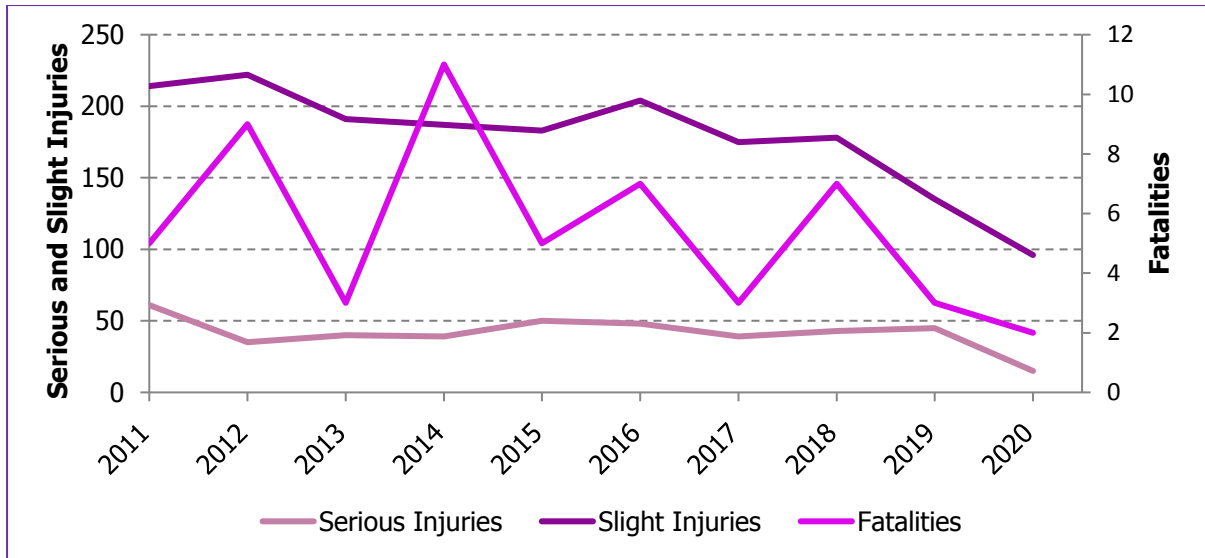
Figure 55 Number of Road Accidents

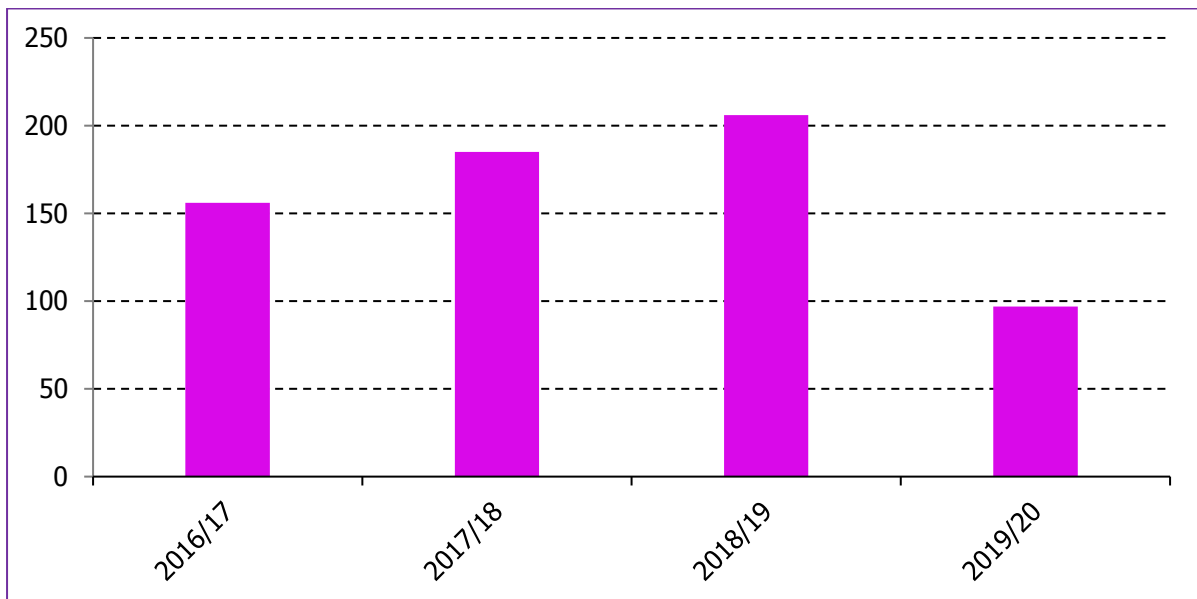
Figure 56 Injuries Sustained in Vehicle Accidents by

Figure 57 Debt Counselling New Clients

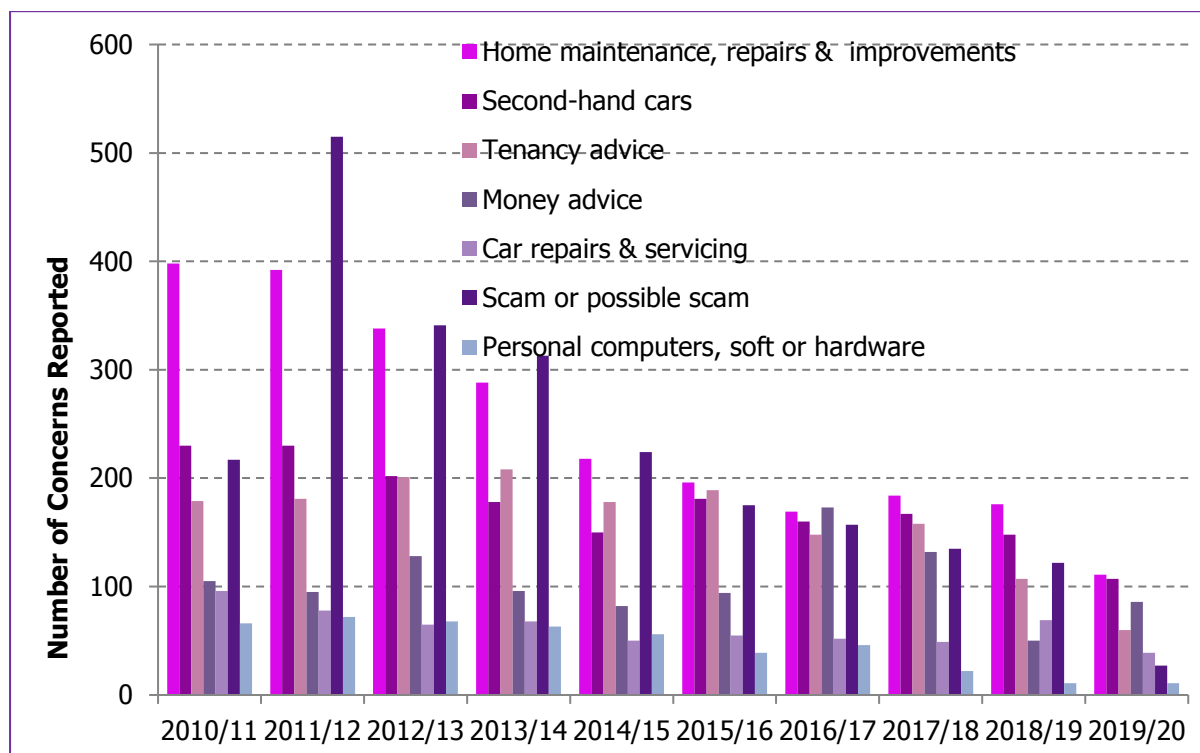

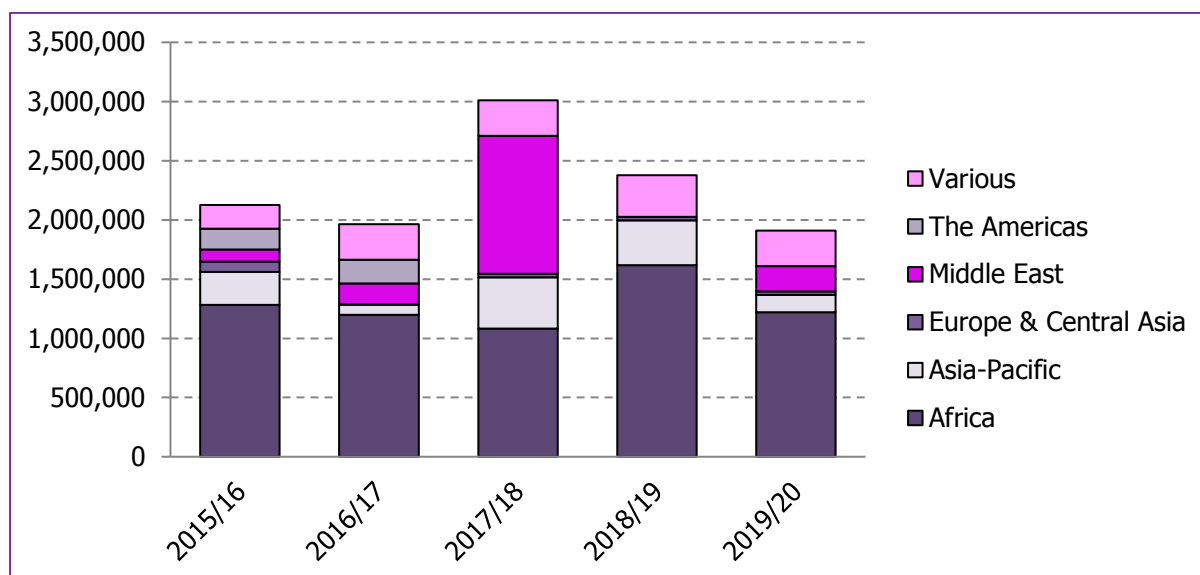

The Council of Ministers agreed in February 2017 to support the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) through a one-off donation of £973,000 to provide aid and humanitarian assistance to Syrian refugees in neighbouring countries.

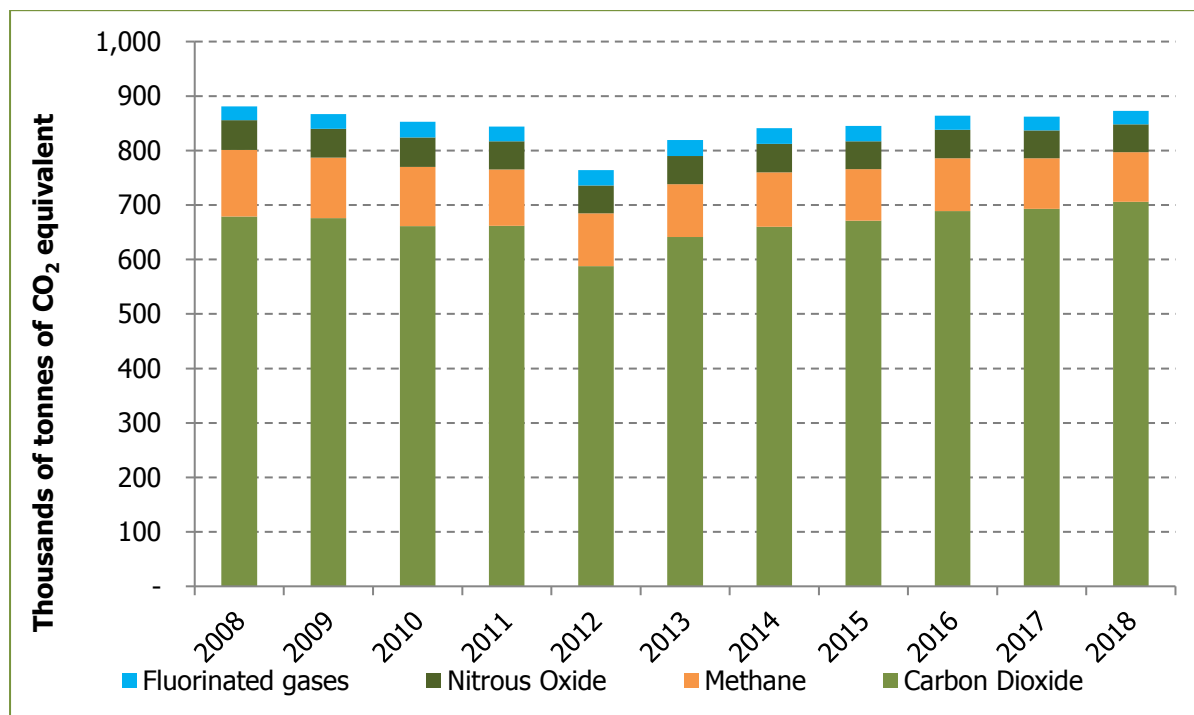

Figure 60 Greenhouse Gas Emissions, by Type

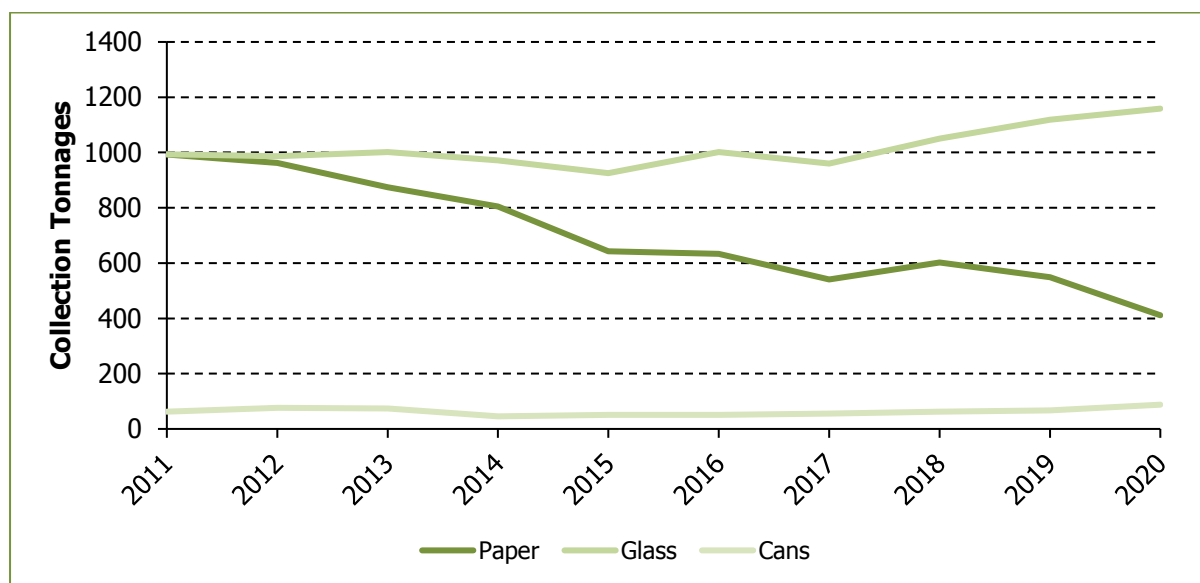

The most recent data available concerning emissions on the Isle of Man relates to 2018. In March 2013, the Isle of Man adopted a target to reduce CO₂ emissions by 80% by 2050, which is in line with targets in the United Kingdom. In 2018, the Isle of Man produced 706 kilotonnes of CO₂, 91 kilotonnes of methane, 51 kilotonnes of nitrous oxide and 25 kilotonnes of fluorinated gases (hydrofluorocarbons and sulphur hexafluoride).

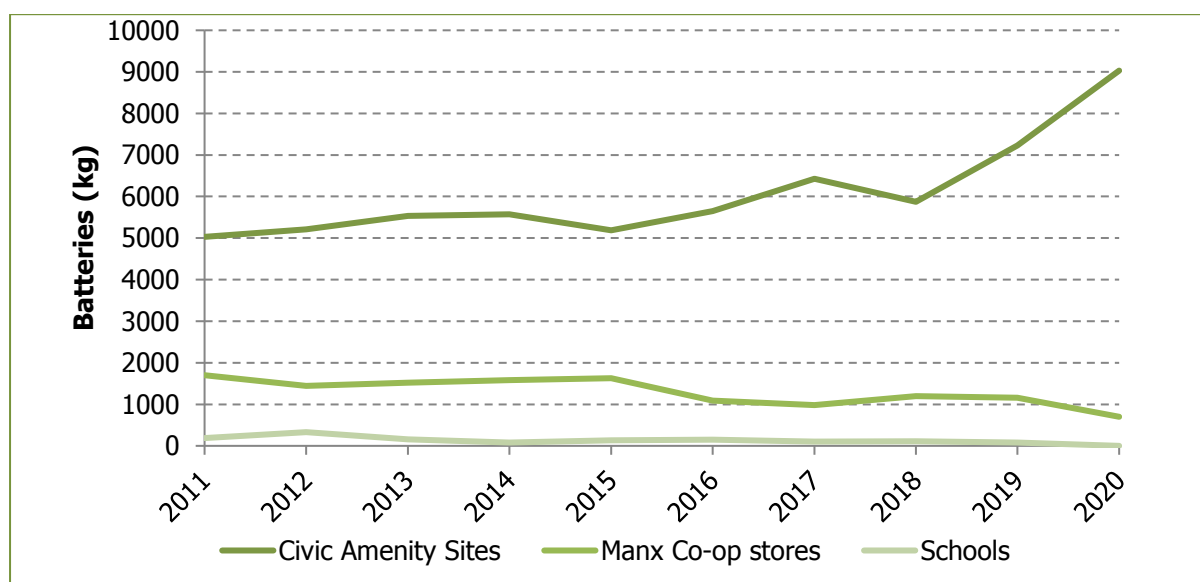
Figure 61 Tonnes of Materials Recycled Collected at Bring Banks

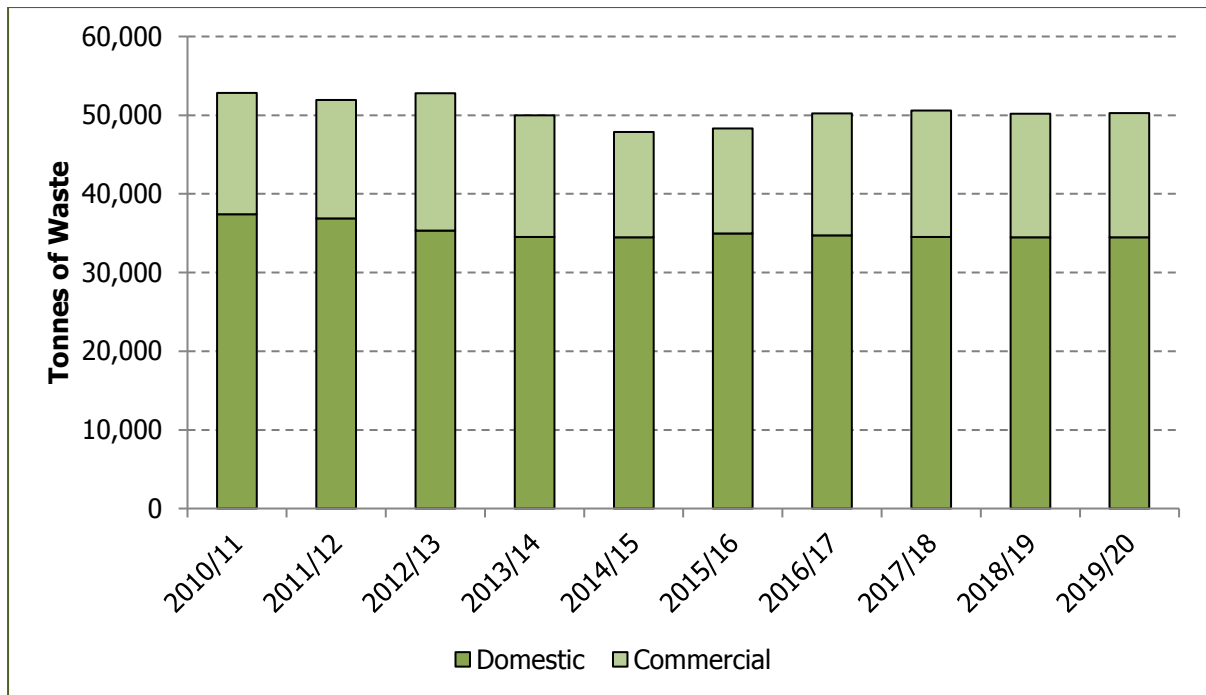
Figure 62 Kilograms of Dry Cell (Household) Batteries Recycled by Collection

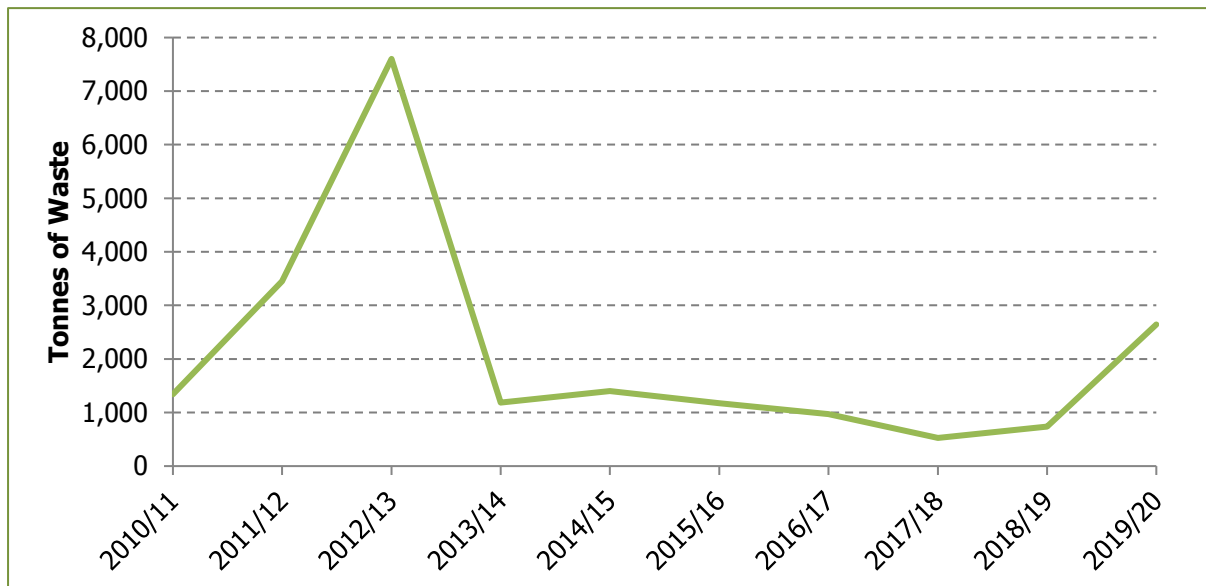
Figure 63 Tonnes of Waste Processed at the Energy from Waste Plant

Figure 64 Tonnes of Waste Processed at the Wrights Pit North

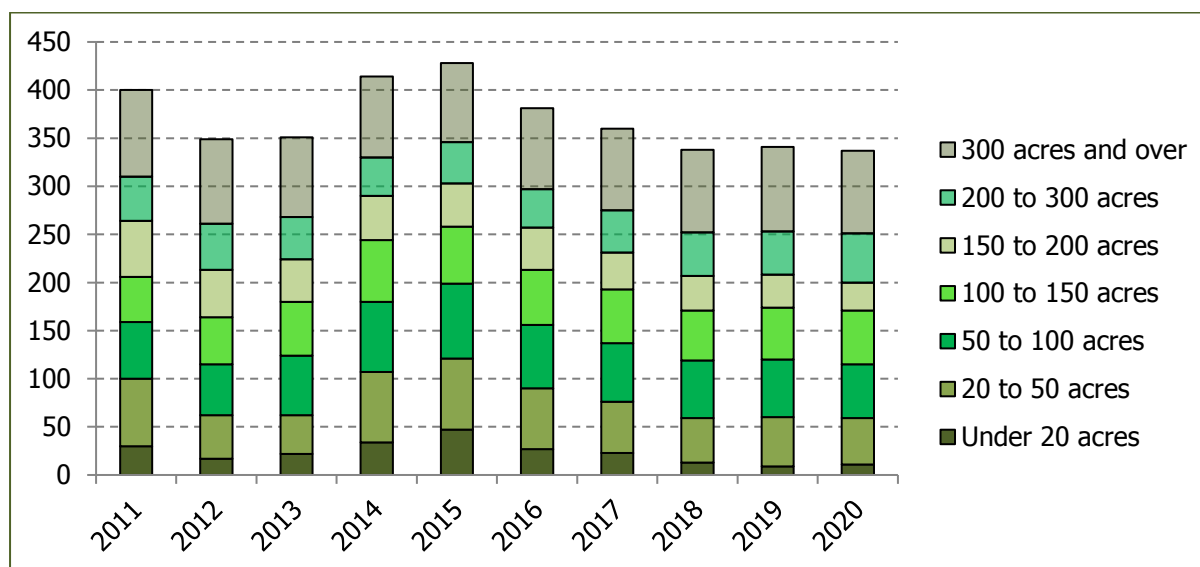

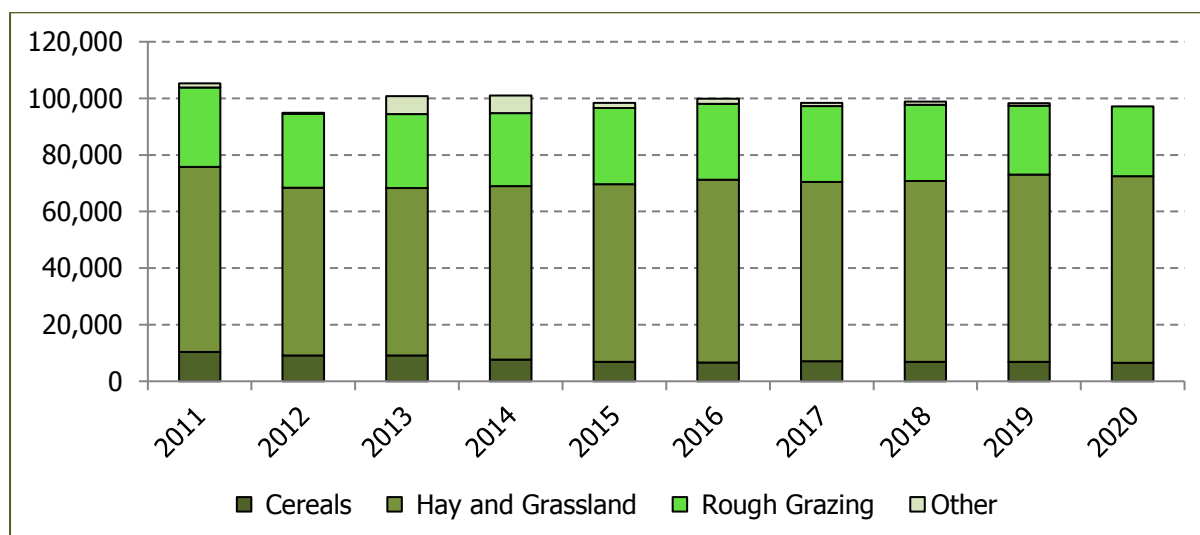
Figure 65 Agricultural Land Holdings, by Size (acres)

Figure 66 Agricultural Land Use (acres)

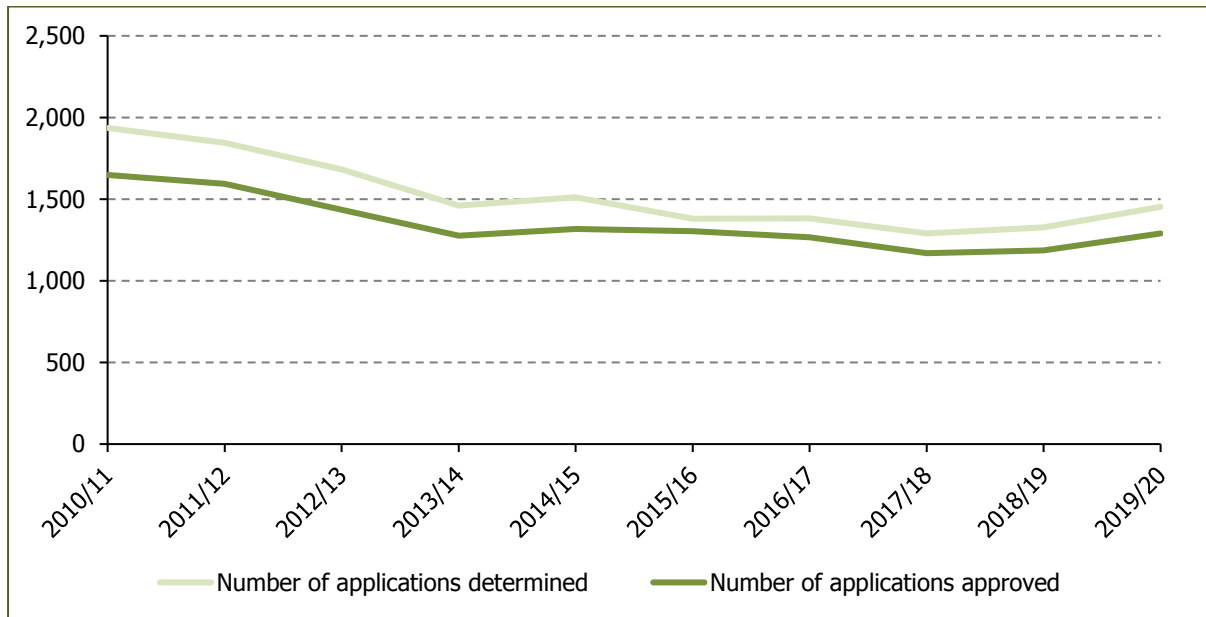

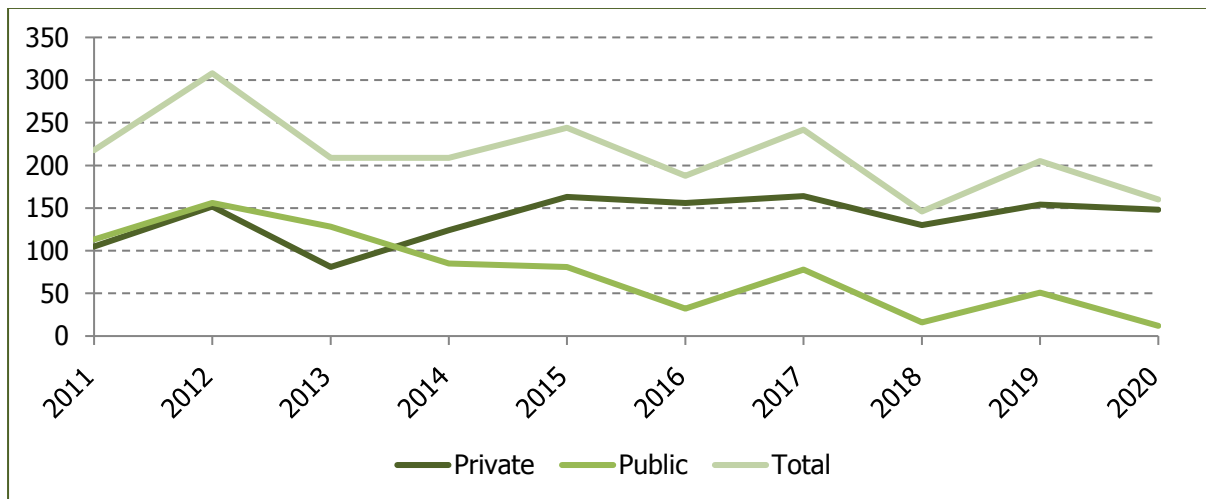
Figure 67 Planning Applications Determined and Approved

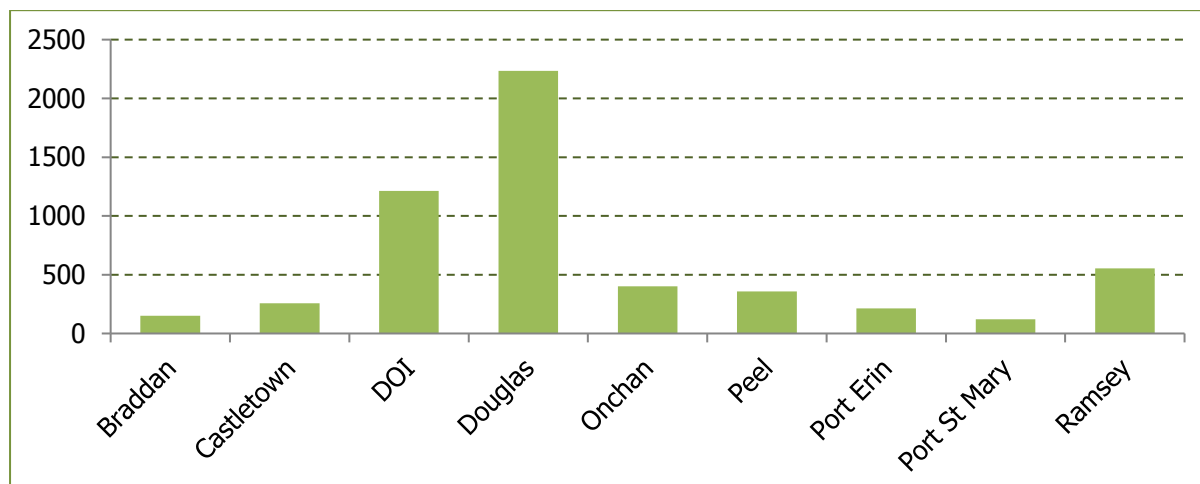

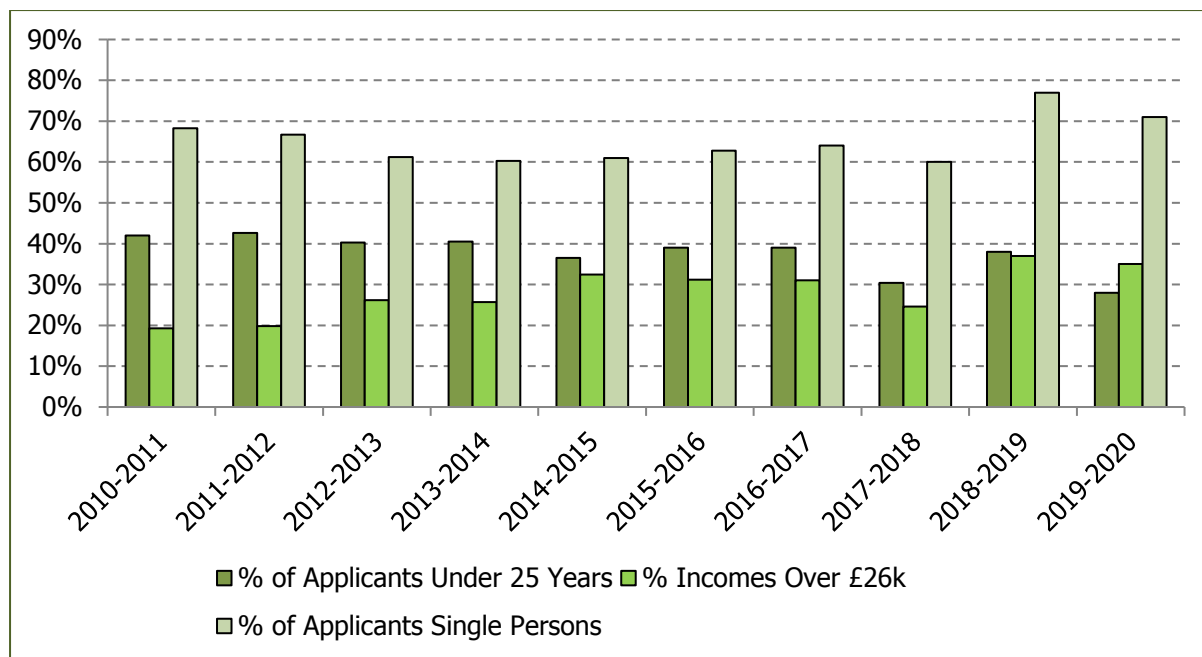

Figure 71 House Purchase Assistance Applicant Demographics

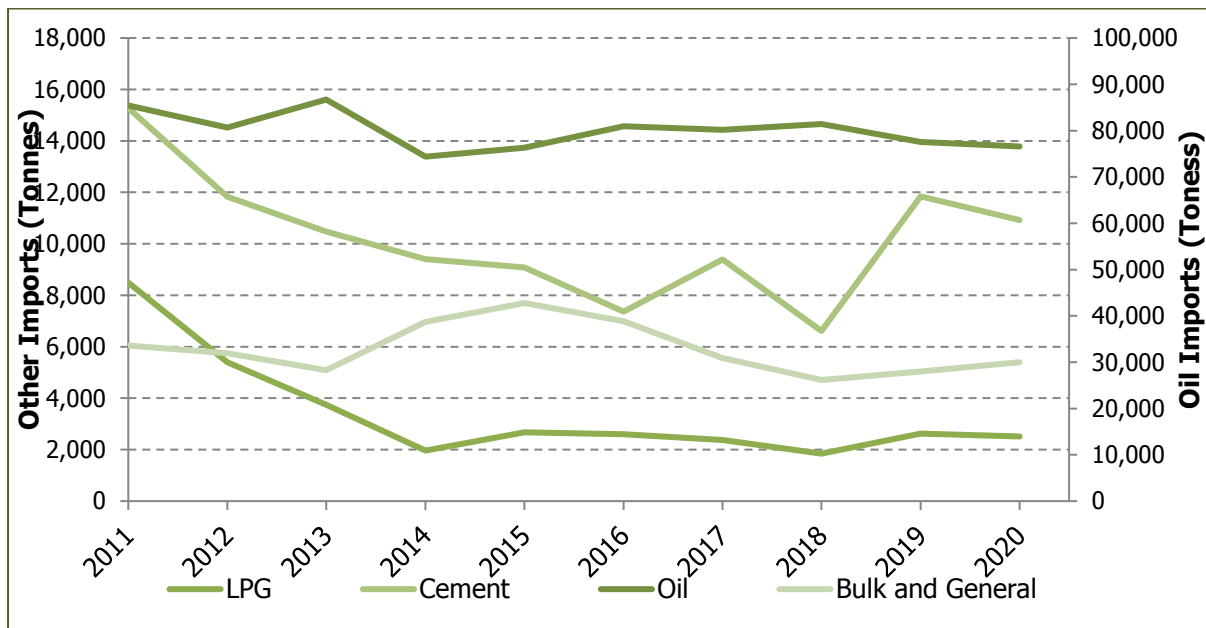

Figure 73 Electricity: Units sold (GWH)

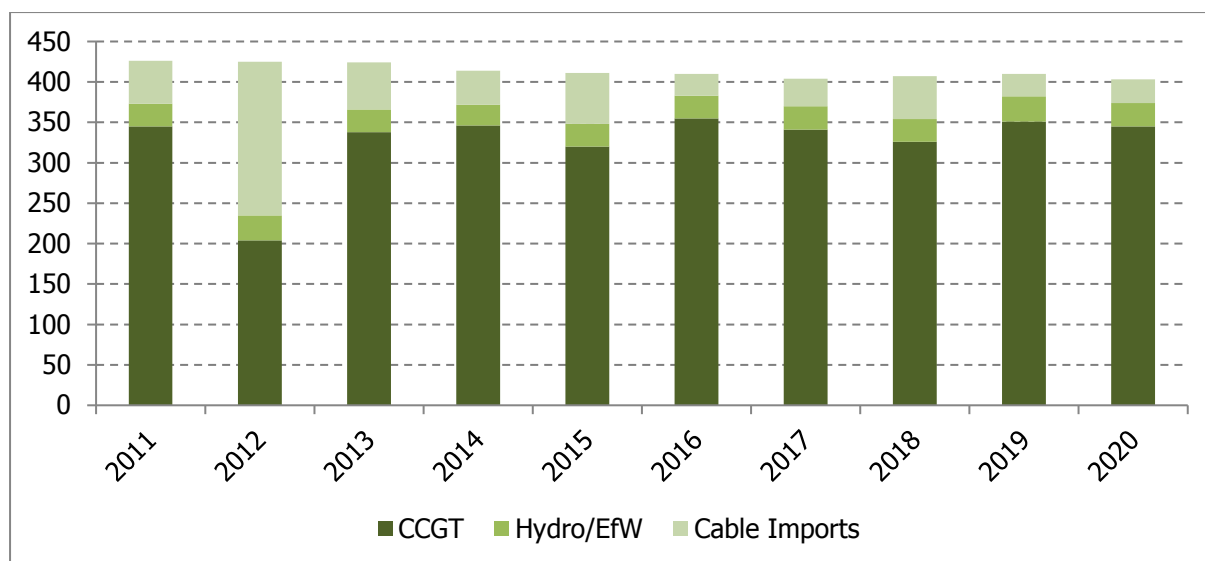

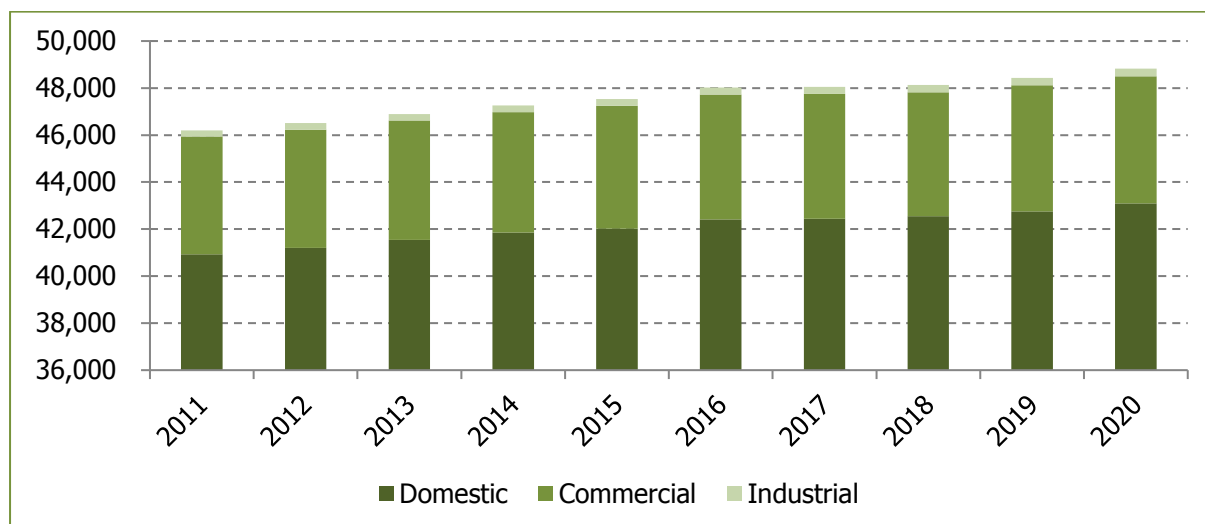
Figure 74 Electricity Generation Mix (GWH)

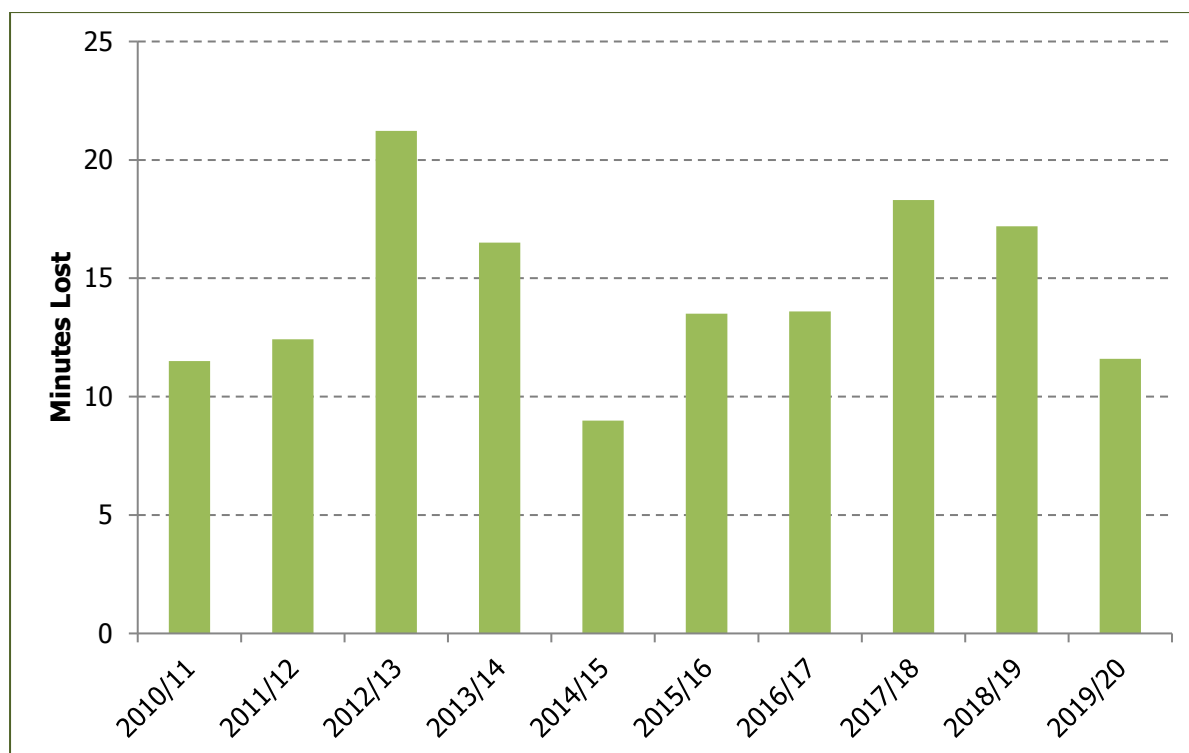
Figure 75 Number of Electricity Customers, by Type

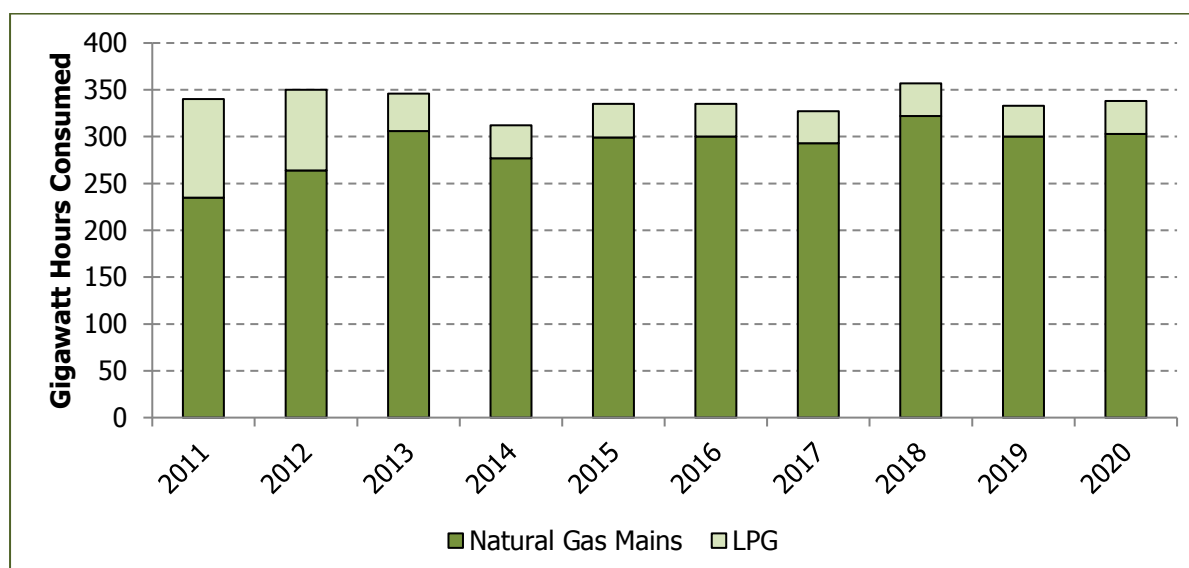
Figure 76 Number of Electricity Customer Minutes Lost

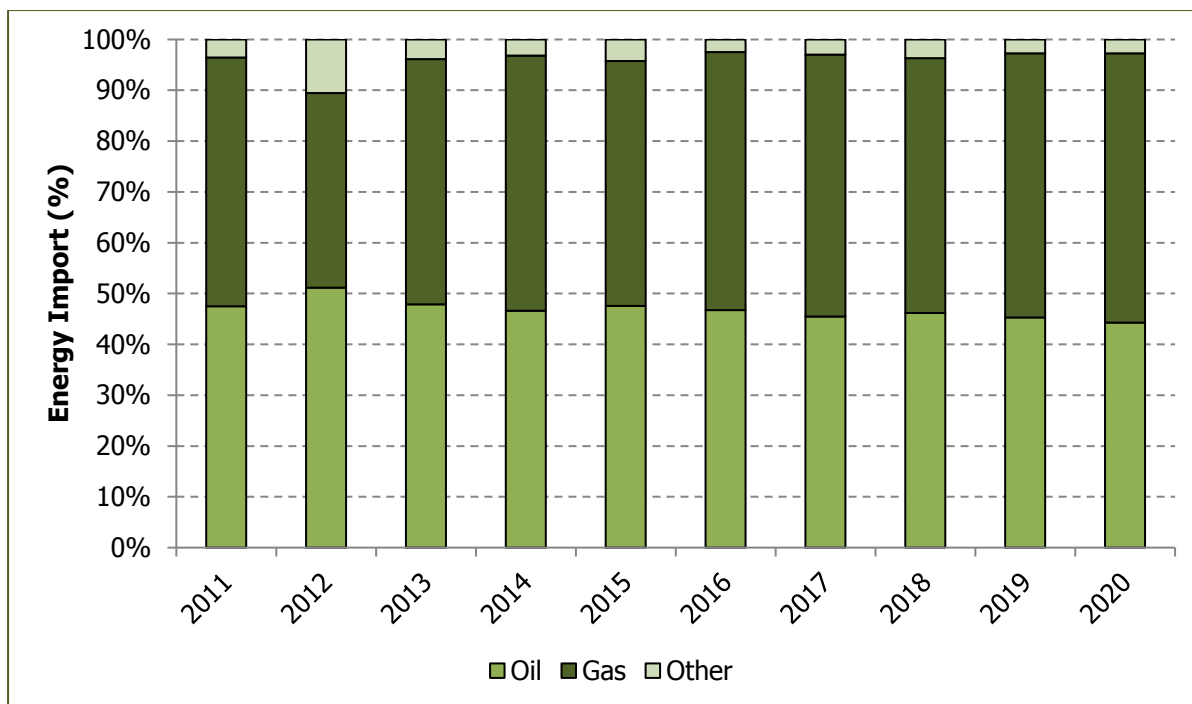
Figure 77 Gas Consumption, by Type

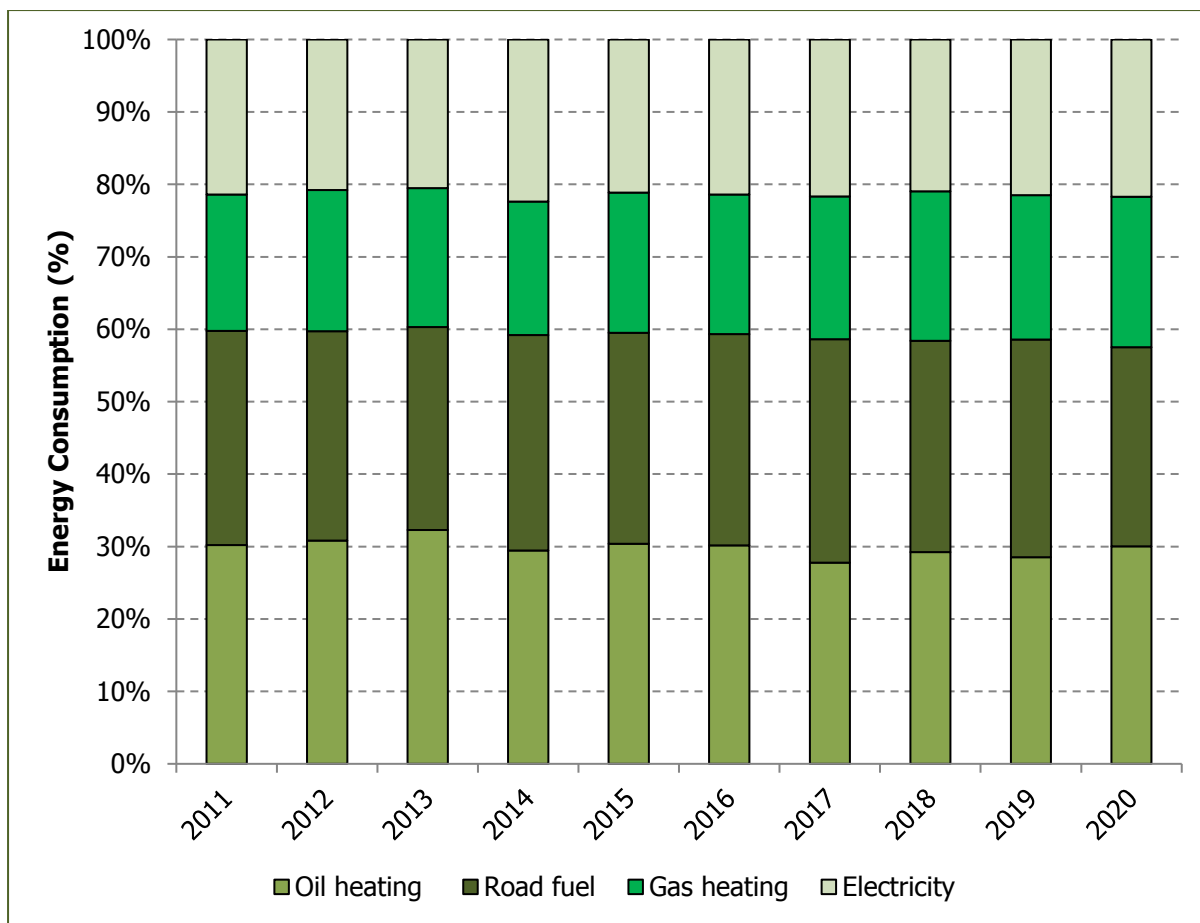
Figure 78 Fuel Types Imported into the Island

Figure 79 Fuel Types Consumed on Island

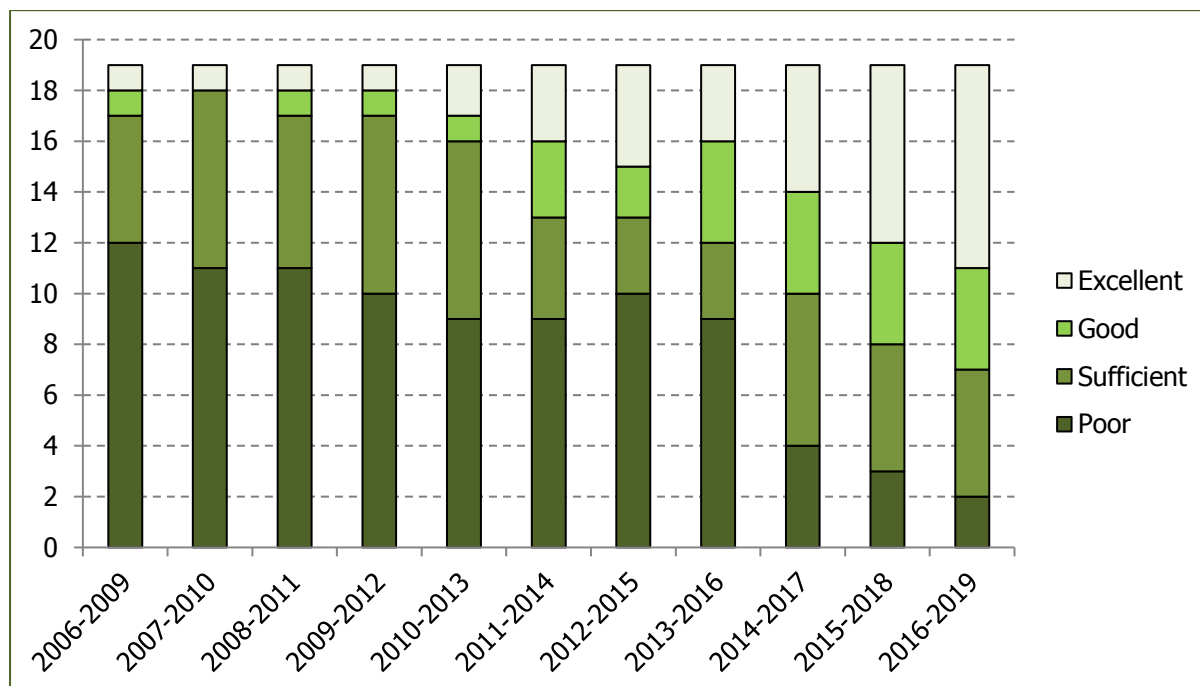

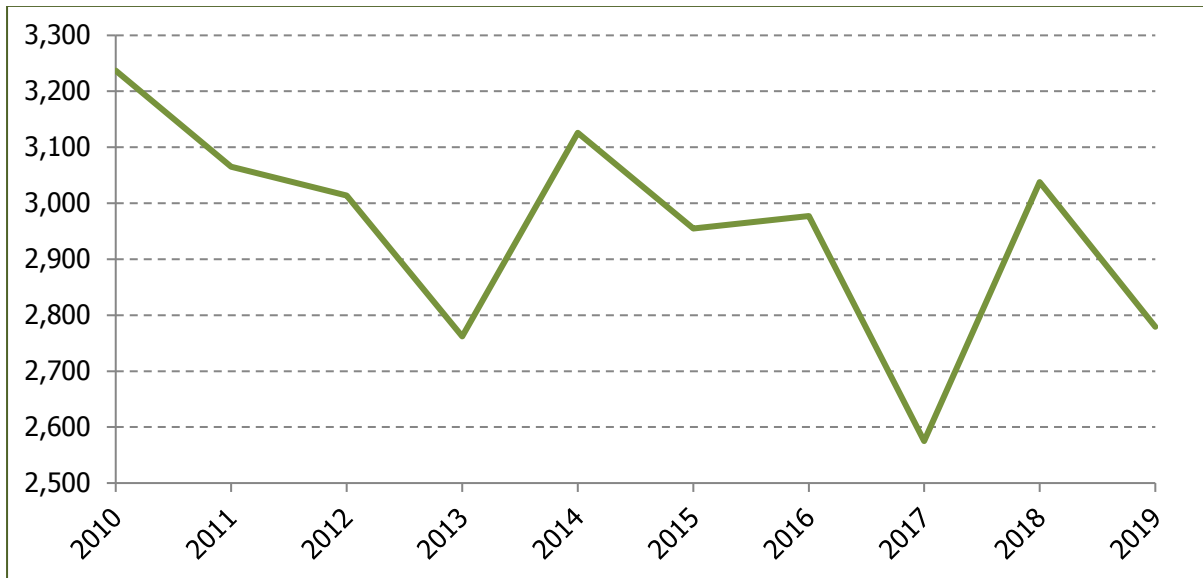

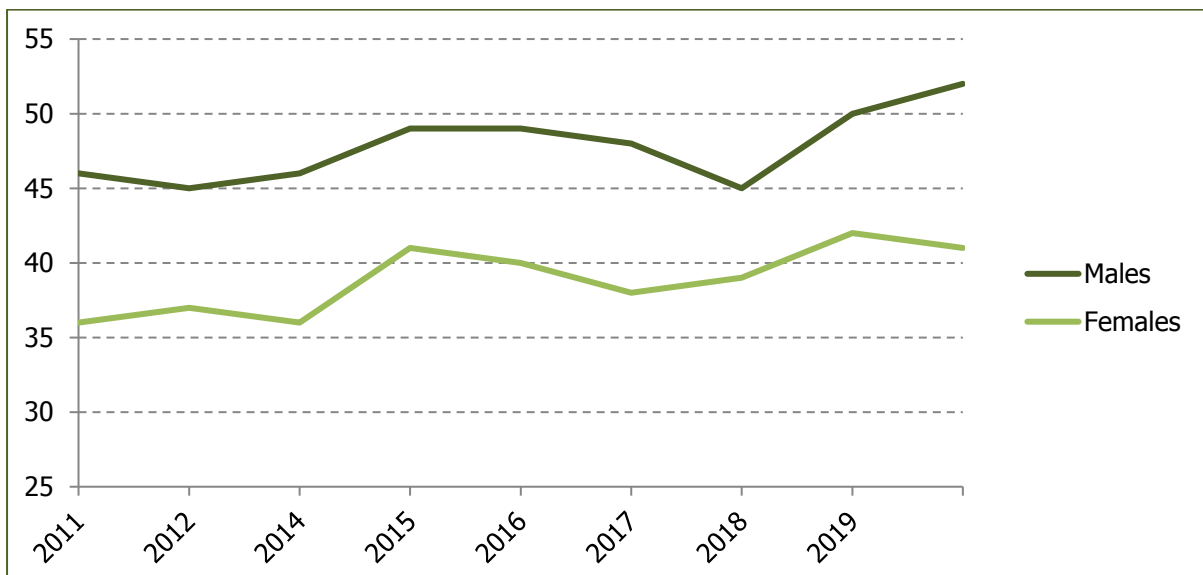
Figure 81 Numbers of Driving Tests Taken

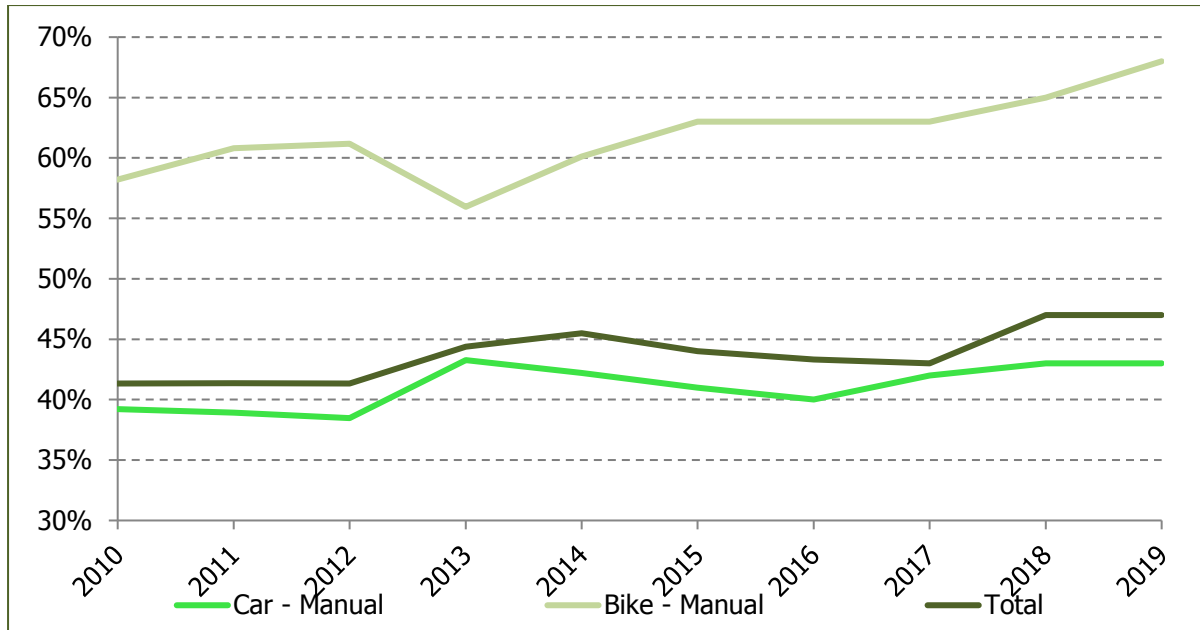
Figure 82 Driving Test Pass Rates by Gender (%)

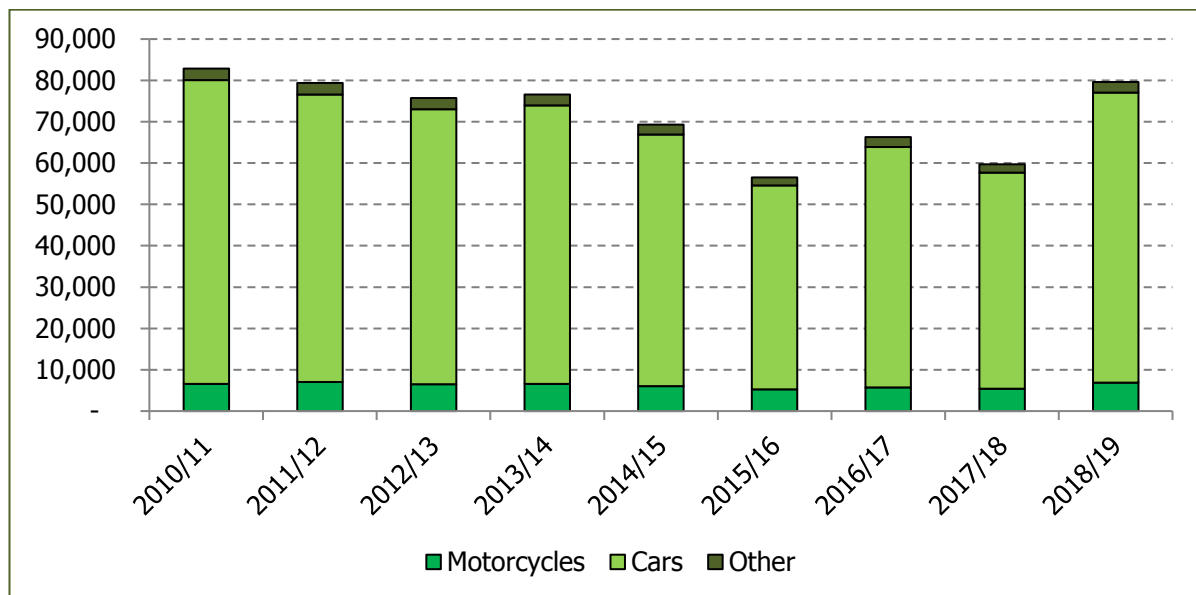
Figure 83 Driving Test pass rates by Vehicle
