NOTICE OF PROPOSAL TO REGISTER A BUILDING

In accordance with the Town and Country Planning (Registered Buildings) Regulations 2013, Regulation 6, the Department is required to give public notice that it proposes to enter the following building (as it appears that due to its special architectural or historic interest) in the Protected Buildings Register (the "register" is maintained in accordance with Section 14 of the Act):

Orrisdale Chapel Orrisdale, Michael Parish IM6 2HP

The effect of entry on the "register" will restrict the demolition, alteration or extension of the building in any way without the prior written consent of the Department as may be authorised under Part 3 of the Act ("registered building consent").

Factual Details

Name: Orrisdale Chapel

Location

Orrisdale Chapel, Orrisdale, Michael Parish IM6 2HP

History

The building dates from 1843, built on land donated by Patrick Cannell, and was erected by voluntary labour and contributions from local people. The building was initially opened as a Primitive Methodist Chapel. A porch was added in the 1950s.

Until its closure for regular worship in 2017, the chapel had served the pastoral needs of the surrounding rural community continually for over 170 years.

Since closure, the building's ownership has reverted to the Cannell family. Now non-denominational, the chapel is used for occasional services and exhibitions.

With very few families having access to private transport, coupled with a limited road network, rural communities on the island in the 19th century and early 20th century were much more isolated than they are today. The rural chapels were often the only civic building in a village, and the weekly services represented a rare opportunity for different family groups to interact. Chapels such as Orrisdale therefore had an important part to play in the cultural and social history of their community, in addition to their more obvious religious significance.

Details

MATERIALS: Rubble stone painted external walls with slated pitched roof. Single glazed cast iron windows with plain glass. Stained timber entrance and porch doors with fanlights above. Timber exposed collar trusses with roof underside boarded in stained timber.

PLAN: Centrally located southern porch, added in the 1950s, gives access off the highway. The main worship room is open plan with a raised northern section beyond the communion rail. The pews, whilst historic, are not fixed to building fabric.

EXTERIOR: Painted smooth render rubble stone walls and slated roof. Cast iron framed single glazed windows.


INTERIOR: Painted plaster walls. Stained timber boarded ceiling following the roof pitch, with collar trusses exposed. Stained timber floor boards.
