#### History

Sited on the western side of The Lhen Trench adjacent to The Lhen Bridge and the track to the shore, the property appears on an Asylum Plan dated 1840, as well as the first edition ordinance survey map dated 1868. On the Asylum Plan the cottage is stated as being the property of the 'Venerable Archdeacan Moore'. The Woods Gazetteer 1867 records the land as Freehold.

The property is now in the ownership of Manx National Heritage, and is available to rent as self-catering tourist accommodation.

#### **Form and Materials**

The property has a simple three bay historic form, with a 20<sup>th</sup> century flat roofed extension on the southern gable. Internally the cottage has been subdivided with a bedroom, living room, kitchen and shower room.

The cottage is constructed of stone walls with a whitewashed finish, a pitched thatched roof, stone chimney stacks on both gables, timber windows and doors. Bwoid Suggane thatch ties and chimney stack slate projections are still in evidence.

Internally the cottage has been renovated, with little historic fabric in evidence.

# **Reasons for Registration**

Yn Thie Thooit (Bridge Cottage), The Lhen, is included in the Protected Buildings Register for the following reasons:

# **ARCHITECTURAL INTEREST:**

• A surviving example of a vernacular thatched cottage likely to date from the early 19<sup>th</sup> century or late 18<sup>th</sup> century, with various elements of historic fabric and detailing.

### **HISTORIC INTEREST:**

• A surviving example of a vernacular thatched cottage in a rural setting adjacent to the historic Lhen Bridge road crossing; illustrating important aspects of the nation's social and cultural history.
