

Regulatory Services Sponsored by the Department

DEFA supplies staff and resources through service level agreements to operate the legally separate bodies of the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) and the Road Transport Licencing Committee (RTLC) which also operate from the Thie Slieau Whallian site in St Johns. DEFA is the political sponsor for the OFT and RTLC. This plan does not include objectives or actions for these bodies (with the exception of the legislative programme).

Office of Fair Trading

The OFT works to provide the appropriate legislation, advice, and compliance services to benefit and protect our Island's consumers and businesses from unfair trading practices.

Road Transport Licensing Committee

The RTLC acts as an independent tribunal body of Government with responsibility for regulating the operators, vehicles and drivers who transport passengers on public roads as well as regulating goods vehicles over 3,500 kg and the people who operate them.








6. Department Financial Position

The table below presents a summary of the Department's revenue expenditure budget, by division and end of year forecast for 2021/22.

The largest budget within the Division is for Agricultural grants which allows for up to almost £7m of support. The Division also includes the glens, plantations, uplands, the Sawmill & Wildlife Park.
Planning & Building Control	£319	£237	The favourable forecast position is due to the Division's income levels being £150k better than budget, which is partially offset by an overspend in employee costs, some of which are recoverable from internal funds.
Regulation	£3,247	£3,543	Regulation is perhaps the Division presenting the greatest financial challenge. Loss of income associated with Wool Control accounts for £170k of the budget position as well as Veterinary Services testing has a year to date income shortfall of £42k. This is as a result of testing income being received in 2020/21 but due to Covid restrictions, inspections were not actually undertaken until 2021/22. Employee cost pressures are also particularly high in the Division.
Environment Policy	£2,004	£1,930	The Division is expected to be well within its funding envelope for 21/22. Mines & Minerals expenditure budget is forecast to be £70k underspent, which assists in offsetting some of the Division's employee cost overspends.
