## May Theme: Educational Games

Playing an evidence-based educational board game is an effective and memorable activity that can be incorporated in a staff onboarding, training, enrichment, or teaching module. Keyll Darree Library stocks healthcare-themed games developed in partnership with researchers or practitioners in their respective fields. Best of all, these games are available for loan to all our members.



Playing the ***Domestic Abuse Training Game*** will equip staff with the confidence and knowledge to respond to domestic abuse concerns by asking appropriate questions and offering support to victims. The game, covering all aspects of domestic abuse, will support training qualified professionals and social care students.



***The Priorities Game*** is a fun and engaging way to help student and qualified nurses develop their prioritisation skills. Learning how to prioritise time amid a caseload of patients can be difficult in a classroom or high-pressure clinical placement. The game simulates a ward, with patients that require admission, discharge and general care. It is a safe space to practice vitally important skills and think about how the whole ward team should work together and support one another.

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**The Dementia Inequalities Game** aims to raise the awareness of dementia as well as diagnosis and post-diagnosis inequalities. The game is suitable for anyone with an interest in dementia and inequalities, including caregivers, health and social care professionals, and students.

**Game of Stools** is an enjoyable and competitive board game, designed to teach healthcare professionals about *Clostridium difficile*, a bacterium found in the intestines that can cause bowel disease and infectious diarrhoea in hospitalised patients. The game encourages discussion between players about prevention and management of infection, and increases knowledge and confidence around *C. difficile*.



**Masterful Mentoring Game** is designed around NMC Standards to support nurse, midwife and AHP mentors during their annual updates. It provides a platform for reflective learning, sharing experiences and discussing what they could have done better.
