A Day in the Life... Stacey Astill, Senior Library Assistant



Thank you for joining me for a day in the library! I'm writing this on Wednesday the 4th of October and hope you'll enjoy finding out a little more about what we do in a day (spoiler: it's not just reading and shelving!)

Getting started: The first thing I do is check my emails (unless there's any library users to help) and there's often something there to derail whatever I thought I'd be doing. Today it was a response from a journal supplier confirming they're raising the prices well above industry standard (again!) and a teacher from St Ninian's requesting our annual outreach session. I add doing battle with Taylor and Francis, a publisher, and planning teaching to my 'to do' list.

Electric Nightmares: We're not even an hour in and the printer's broken, the wifi isn't working in seminar 1, and we're down to one phone - it's my job to try and con someone into fixing it all - thankfully GTS are really helpful and the printer is working by the end of the day!

Fighting a journal: How does one do battle with a major journal supplier? Largely unsuccessfully, but it's always worth a go! The key to it is an extensive spreadsheets and a knowledge of what the industry standard increase should be. It also helps to invoke the (imaginary) concept of a terrifying meeting with your manager to whom you'll have to justify the horrifying price increases (16.79%!!!! 7% is usually the max)



Planning Meeting: During the morning I have a catch up with Mand about some forward planning for the back end of the year. We have to send out the User Needs Analysis survey (to make sure we're the service you need us to be), arrange journal renewals, write up the Randomised Coffee Trial feedback, organise the winter book promotion, and, most importantly, plan the library Christmas photo. We spend an hour or so coming up with a plan of action and reworking the survey so it's suitable. We'll get Alan's feedback and get it sent out!

Themes

Teaching Planning: What do movies and literature searching have in common? It's a tool I use to help teach about analysing articles. We note down key actors/directors (authors) and publication years, then write a summary and themes. When we look at a range of films we can find 'gaps in the research' (would

adding vampires to *Titanic* lead to better outcomes?), and find the 'seed papers' (*Jurassic Park* led to lots of sequels!)



Teaching Session: It's time to deliver a literature searching refresher for the third-year nursing students. It's hard to balance showing them everything they need and keeping the session interesting and I don't always manage it, literature searching isn't the most exhilarating topic to most people. We also have a chat about AI and how it might impact literature searching in future.

Journal Payments: One of my last tasks today is getting the *New England Journal of Medicine* paid, they're based in America so I can't ring up until after 4. Thankfully it's mercifully fast today, success!

GTS: The last task of the day is getting in touch with GTS again. We recently upgraded our Heritage library system and there's still a few gremlins we're chasing out with brooms, I've been in contact a few times today so I give them a last update.

Home time! I put on a different hat and go to give a lecture for my level-six students at UCM about prisoners of war in WWII.

Get Yourself Warm

Central heating at Keyll Darree has been recalibrated so its performance improved noticeably. We placed more furniture near radiators for users who prefer being near a heat source.



The Library also has a number of oil-filled heaters. You are welcome to use them or move them around even when the library is not staffed. Just remember to turn off the heaters when they are not in use or when you leave.

Get Your Caffeine Fix

Users unfamiliar with Keyll Darree may not know there is a self-service kitchenette with hot water supply (near the emergency exit) on the opposite side of the hallway from the library. 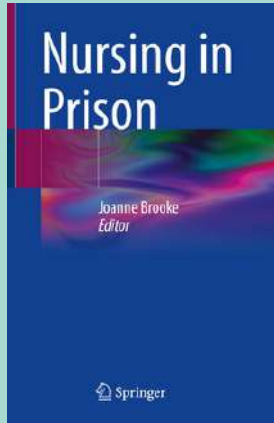
- 1 VIA INTERNAL MAIL**
Please use the label provided and a padded or sturdy cardboard envelope to protect the book. Drop off points: Southern Group Practice, Peel Medical Centre, Ramsey Hospital, or Central Community Health Centre.
- 2 BRING IT BACK TO LIBRARY**
Library is open and staffed Monday to Friday 9am-5pm, Friday 9am-4pm. If you have a Nobles proximity card or have one issued to you, you can come in 24/7.
- 3 DROP-OFF BOX AT NOBLES**
In Thie Bee Staff Restaurant on the first floor of Noble's Hospital, there's a lounge behind the swing doors. There's a red book return box by the back wall.

Access Card Not Working?

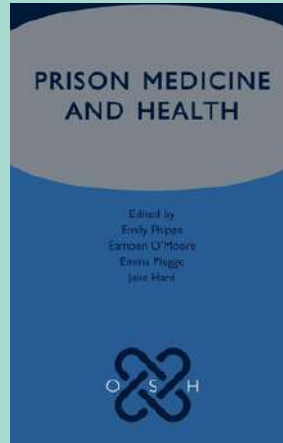

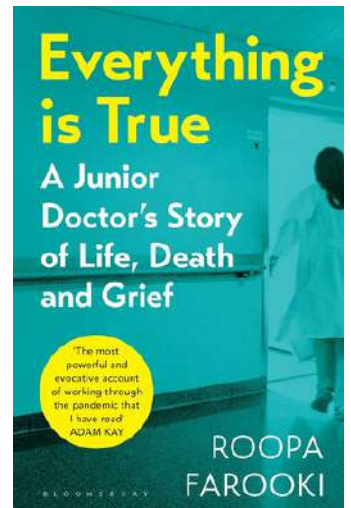
It's a graphic novel which is beautifully drawn and there's so much detail in every panel of the city. It's a fun and funny combination of horror and satire and great to look at to boot!

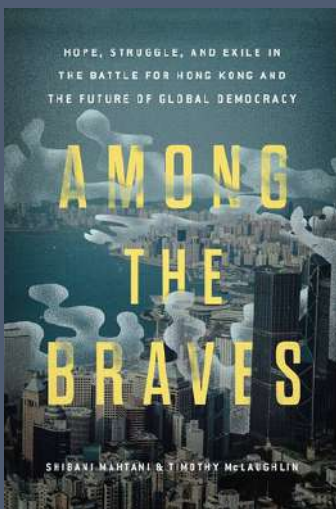
Mand — *Everything is True: A junior doctor's story of life, death and grief in a time of pandemic*

In early 2020, junior doctor Roopa Farooki lost her sister to cancer. But just weeks later, she found herself plunged into another kind of crisis, fighting on the frontline of the battle taking place in her hospital, and in hospitals across the country.

Everything is True is the story of Roopa's first forty days of the COVID-19 crisis from the frontlines of A&E and the acute medical wards, as struggling through her grief, she battles for her patients' and colleagues' survival. Working thirteen-hour shifts, she returns home each evening to write through her exhaustion, chronicling the devastating losses and slowly eroding dehumanisation happening in real time on the ward.



Alan — Just published! *Among the Braves: Hope, Struggle, and Exile in the Battle for Hong Kong and the Future of Global Democracy* contextualises and portrays the 2019–2020 Hong Kong protests through four main characters: a pastor who led Hong Kong's decades-long pro-democracy movement; a fine art student who made the daring 320-km (for comparison, the English Channel is 240 km at its widest) escape from Hong Kong on a Zodiac boat; a surveyor-turned-online-activist who managed to fundraise for and place, within a week, frontpage ads for the Hong Kong cause in major newspapers in virtually all G20 nations during the G20 meeting; and a woman journalist livecasting solo a government-orchestrated (the book reveals) mob attack on train passengers. My friends Shibani Mahtani (former Hong Kong bureau chief of the *Washington Post*) and Tim McLaughlin (contributing writer of *The Atlantic*) braved more than teargas and rubber bullets to write this well-researched and gripping account of the struggle of a people who wanted nothing more than the freedom and autonomy they had been promised to them when the British left 26 years ago.

Pumpkin Soup

Ingredients

1 large onion, chopped
2 carrots, peeled and chopped
2 garlic cloves
1 bay leaf
25g/1oz unsalted butter
2 tbsp olive oil
1 medium pumpkin (prepared weight about 850g/1lb 14oz) deseeded and roughly chopped
1 medium-sized floury potato, such as Maris Piper, roughly chopped
1 litre/1¾ pint vegetable or chicken stock, a little extra may be needed
100ml/3½ fl oz double cream
3 tbsp pumpkin seeds
salt and freshly ground black pepper



Method

Put the onion, carrots, garlic bay leaf, butter and half the olive oil into a large pan. Cook over a low–medium heat for about 10 minutes until the vegetables are tender but not coloured.

Add the squash and potato, mix to combine and cook for a further 2–3 minutes. Pour in the stock, season well and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to a gentle simmer, half cover the pan with a lid and continue to cook for about 40 minutes until the squash is really tender when tested with the point of a knife.

Pick out the bay leaf and blend the soup until smooth using a stick blender.

Add the cream and a little more stock if the soup is on the thick side, taste for seasoning, adding more salt and pepper as required.

Meanwhile, heat the remaining oil in a frying pan over a medium heat and add the pumpkin seeds and fry quickly until the seeds start to pop. Remove from the pan.

Ladle the soup into bowls and serve with a swirl of cream and the toasted pumpkin seeds.
