The Island is a Crown Dependency which, through its ancient parliament, Tynwald, enjoys a high degree of domestic legislative and political autonomy. Dating back to Viking origins over one thousand years ago, the Isle of Man's Tynwald is the oldest continuously operating legislature in the world.

The Island, at 221 square miles, is home to 84,069 people and occupies a central position in the Irish Sea and the British Isles, sitting between England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The Island is split into 21 districts comprised of 13 parishes, 4 towns, 2 villages, and 2 district authorities, which all have individual local government boards, or commissioners.



The Isle of Man prepares its National Income accounts using the income method for Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Gross National Product (GNP). This measure is therefore the sum of the Island's income (employed and self-employed income, company profits, rental income and profits from Government corporations), and is one of the principal measures of economic performance for the Isle of Man.

Gross National Product is GDP plus income coming to and leaving the Isle of Man through residents, non-residents and businesses.

Real GDP and GNP take into account the effects of inflation and, using the Consumer Price Index, the data has been presented in monetary values equivalent to March 2020.

The GDP and GNP figures above are calculated using ESA10 methodology and therefore the percentage changes for 2013/14 and 2014/15 may not correspond to those published previously under ESA95 methodology.

The economically active population is defined as comprising those who are currently employed, self-employed or actively seeking work. According to the 2021 Census, the total economically active population in 2021 was 44,751. Since multiple responses were possible in the Census, figure 3 above includes those who classified themselves in multiple categories, the sum of the graph will be greater that the total economically active population.

As at December 2021, the number of people in employment stood at 35,391 in 51,437 jobs. There were also 8,099 people who were self-employed. A person can be classified as both in employment and self-employed, so the total will be higher than the total of the economically active population. The number of self-employed should be read against the right hand axis.




**Figure 5 Unemployment**

Unemployment as at December 2021 stood at 0.7% of the economically active population, or 291 people, of which 193 were men and 98 were women.

The Isle of Man rate of unemployment is calculated on a claimant count basis. Some other jurisdictions use various different methods, including the International Labour Organisation (ILO) definition of unemployment, which includes those people who may be actively seeking work, but are not registered as such. Since the 2016 Census, the Isle of Man has produced an estimate of the ILO unemployed rate. For December 2021, the estimated ILO unemployed rate was 1.7% or 736 persons.


In 2021 of the 10,431 jobs advertised through the Jobcentre, 5,384 required no qualifications, 922 required up to 4 GCSEs at grade A to C or equivalent, 1,113 required 5 GCSEs at grade A to C or equivalent, 720 required A-Levels or equivalent, 780 required a degree or equivalent, and 584 required a postgraduate qualification.

Due to technical issues in July 2021, there were 928 jobs that couldn't be classified by their qualification requirements, and these have been classed as 'Unknown'. It is also no longer possible to report job vacancies by experience required as has been done previously.


**Figure 8 Work Permits**

The reflation factors shown in Table 7 can be used to convert a price or monetary value into its real equivalent (i.e. in today's money) by multiplying by the appropriate reflationary factor. For example, using the CPI as the main inflationary measure, £100 in 2012 is the equivalent to £116.4 in 2021 (£100 x 1.164). This means that to buy the same amount of goods and services as in 2012, you would need £116.4 in 2021.




Figure 11 Bank Deposit Base (£ bn)







Figure 15 Total number of Companies Registered on the Isle of Man



**Figure 18 Ship Registry** 



**Figure 19 Number of Registered Aircraft** 



Figure 20 Median Weekly Earnings (£)







Figure 21 Average Weekly Earnings (£)

The earnings survey pay period relates to June. Both the median and average weekly earnings figures only include full time employees, on adult rates, whose earnings were not affected by absence. The median weekly earnings is the level of earnings such that half the sample has earnings greater, and the other half lower. A full time employee is classified as anyone working 30+ hours a week, with the exception of teachers.

The median weekly earnings for 2021 were £613, and the average weekly earnings were £769.

Figure 22 Distribution of Weekly Earnings 2021




Figure 23 Government Income (£m)



**Figure 25 Pension and Other Retirement Related Benefits** 





As of 31 March 2021, there were 17,275 people claiming the Retirement Pension, with 12,549 in receipt of the Pension Supplement. Those in receipt of the Retirement Pension Premium numbered 1,747 and 3,435 for the Age Addition benefit.

**Figure 26 Child Benefit** 



**Figure 27 Incapacity Benefit Recipients** 




**Figure 28 Attendance and Disability Living Allowances**

Figure 29 Recipients of Employed Person's Allowance and Income Support, by type







Figure 32 Population Distribution by Quinary Age Group, 2021




Figure 33 Isle of Man Births and Deaths




Figure 34 Church Weddings, Civil Weddings and Civil Partnerships Registered








Figure 41 Number of Support Grants Provided to Students, by course




Figure 42 Noble's and Ramsey Cottage Hospital Activity (excluding Private Patients)


**Figure 43 Life Expectancy**

Over the period 2017-2019 mortality from causes considered preventable are those that, in the light of the understanding of the determinants of health at the time of death, all or most deaths from the underlying cause (subject to age limits if appropriate) could potentially be avoided by public health interventions in the broadest sense.

Over this period there were 165.9 deaths from causes considered preventable per 100,000 population in the Isle of Man and 142.2 per 100,000 population in England. Cardiovascular mortality rates were 74.7 per 100,000 population in the Isle of Man and 70.4 per 100,000 population in England. Mortality rates for all cancers were 155.2 per 100,000 population in the Isle of Man and 129.2 per 100,000 population in England. 




**Figure 46 Sexual Offences**




**Figure 48 Theft Offences**


**Figure 50 Average Prison Population**




Figure 52 December 2021 Prison Population by Offence






**Figure 57 Debt Counselling New Clients**

Figure 58 Consumer Concerns Recorded by the OFT - Subject Matters Consistently in the Top 10





The Council of Ministers agreed in February 2017 to support the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) through a one-off donation of £973,000 to provide aid and humanitarian assistance to Syrian refugees in neighbouring countries.

This donation was made in the 2017- 2018 financial year and was provided by £654,953 which was accrued from the 2016-2017 budget, and the remaining amount of £318,047 originating out of the transition from the multi-year grant funding to the newly created International Development Partnerships budget.

Note: Total expenditure in 2020/21 was lower than budgeted due to the Covid-19 pandemic. All unspent funds at the end of the financial year were re-allocated or accrued into the 2021/22 budget to cover the cost of postponed projects due to Covid-19.

Figure 60 Greenhouse Gas Emissions, by Type



The most recent data available concerning emissions on the Isle of Man relates to 2020. In March 2013, the Isle of Man adopted a target to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions by 80% by 2050, which is in line with targets in the United Kingdom. In 2020, the Isle of Man produced 516 kilotonnes of CO<sub>2</sub>, 89 kilotonnes of methane, 44 kilotonnes of nitrous oxide and 24 kilotonnes of fluorinated gases (hydrofluorocarbons and sulphur hexafluoride).

The data collection has been improved which has allowed for the estimates previously used to be replaced with local, accurate data.


**Figure 61 Tonnes of Materials Recycled Collected at Bring Banks**




Figure 63 Tonnes of Waste Processed at the Energy from Waste Plant


Figure 64 Tonnes of Waste Processed at the Wrights Pit North

**Figure 66 Agricultural Land Use (acres)** 




**Figure 67 Planning Applications Determined and Approved**




Figure 69 2021 Local Authority Housing Stock by Location




**Figure 71 House Purchase Assistance Applicant Demographics**

Figure 73 Electricity: Units sold (GWH)



To December 2021, 56% of electricity on the Isle of Man was produced by the Combined Cycle Gas Turbine facility at Pulrose, Douglas. Imported electricity made up 38% of the generation mix which is a large increase on previous years, with renewable sources such as Hydro power making up 5%. The remaining 1% is made up by Diesel.





Figure 78 Fuel Types Imported into the Island




Figure 80 Bathing Water Quality at Island Beaches

Under the assessment period of 2017-2020, no beaches on the Isle of Man were deemed to have poor bathing water quality under the European Parliament directive, with three being deemed as sufficient, three as good and one as excellent.

Because of COVID the bathing water monitoring was reduced significantly in 2020, and in 2021 there was a reduction in the number of samples as there are now only four designated beaches. Seven samples were collected on a weekly basis from Port Erin, Port St Mary, Douglas Central, Douglas Broadway, Douglas Summerhill, Ramsey South and Ramsey North. Castletown beach was added in 2021.





Figure 83 Driving Test pass rates by Vehicle
