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# Introduction

The Isle of Man in Numbers 2023 presents a comprehensive range of economic and social data relating to the Isle of Man.

The information contained in this publication is mostly provided in two ways. In part it is generated by Statistics Isle of Man, through exercises such as the Census and the Earnings Survey. All other information is provided by a wide range of contributors within other Departments, Boards and Offices of Government.

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The Island is a Crown Dependency which enjoys a high degree of domestic, legislative and political autonomy through its ancient parliament, Tynwald. Dating back to Viking origins over one thousand years ago, Tynwald is the oldest continuously operating legislature in the world.

The Island, at 221 square miles, is home to 84,069 people and occupies a central position in the Irish Sea and the British Isles, sitting between England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The Island is split into 21 districts comprised of 13 parishes, 4 towns, 2 villages, and 2 district authorities, all of which have individual local government boards, or commissioners.

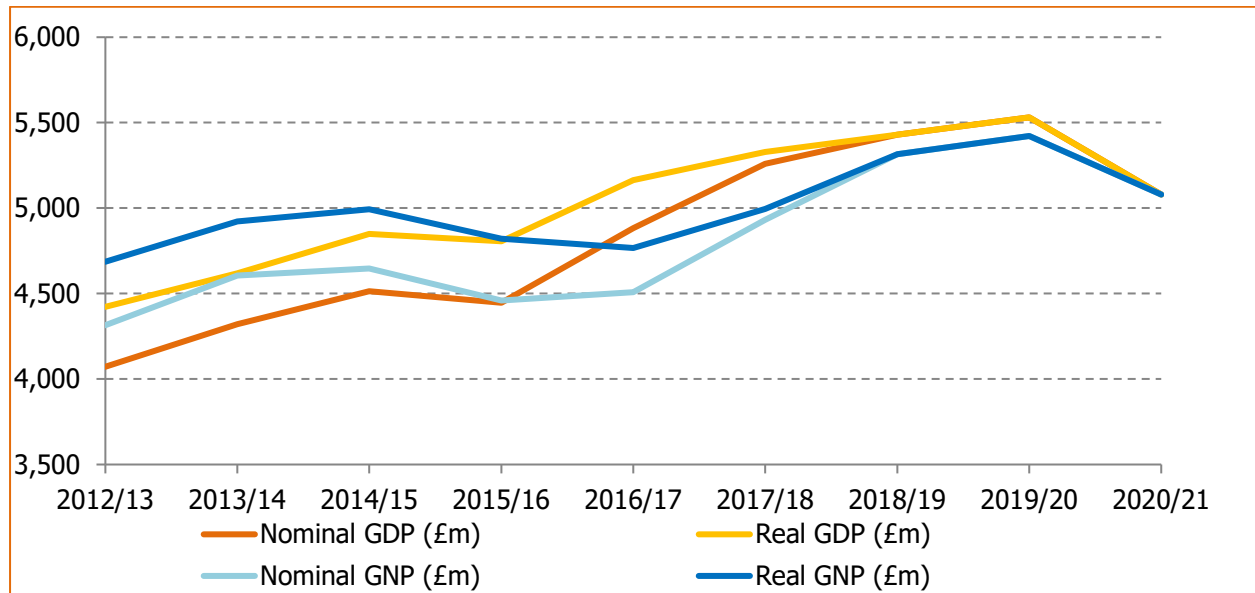

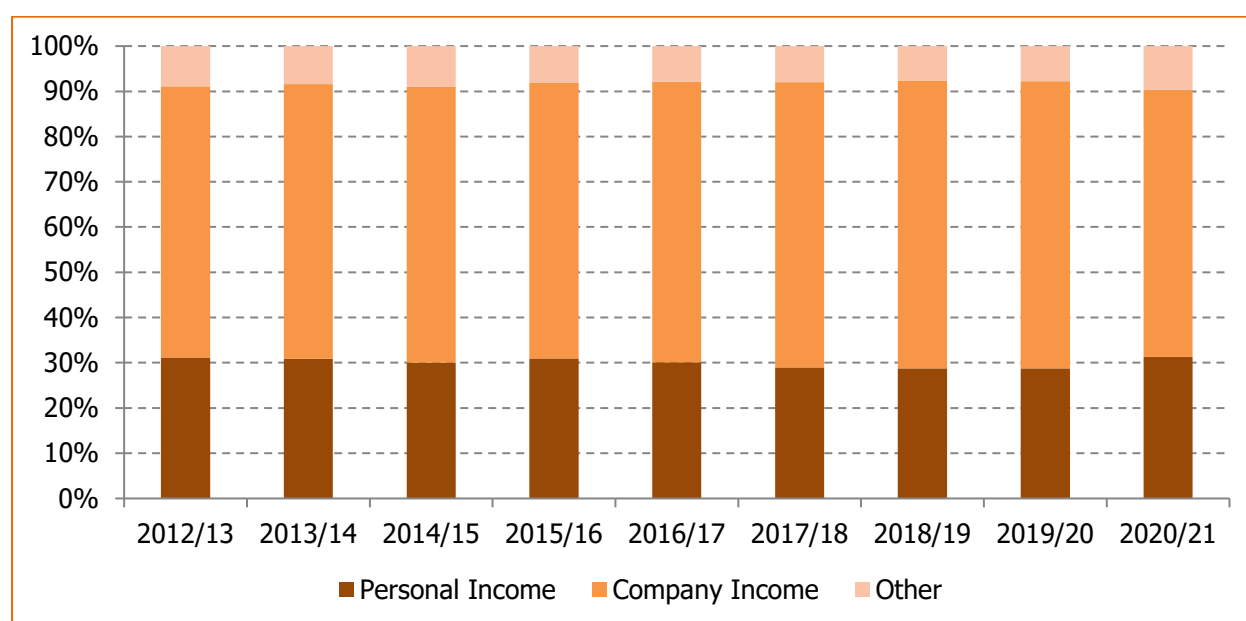
The Isle of Man prepares its National Income accounts using the income method for Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Gross National Product (GNP). This measure is therefore the sum of the Island's income (employed and self-employed income, company profits, rental income and profits from Government corporations), and is one of the principal measures of economic performance for the Isle of Man.

Gross National Product is GDP plus income coming to and leaving the Isle of Man through residents, non-residents and businesses.

Real GDP and GNP take into account the effects of inflation and, using the Consumer Price Index, the data has been presented in monetary values equivalent to March 2020.

The GDP and GNP figures above are calculated using ESA10 methodology and therefore the percentage changes for 2013/14 and 2014/15 may not correspond to those published previously under ESA95 methodology.

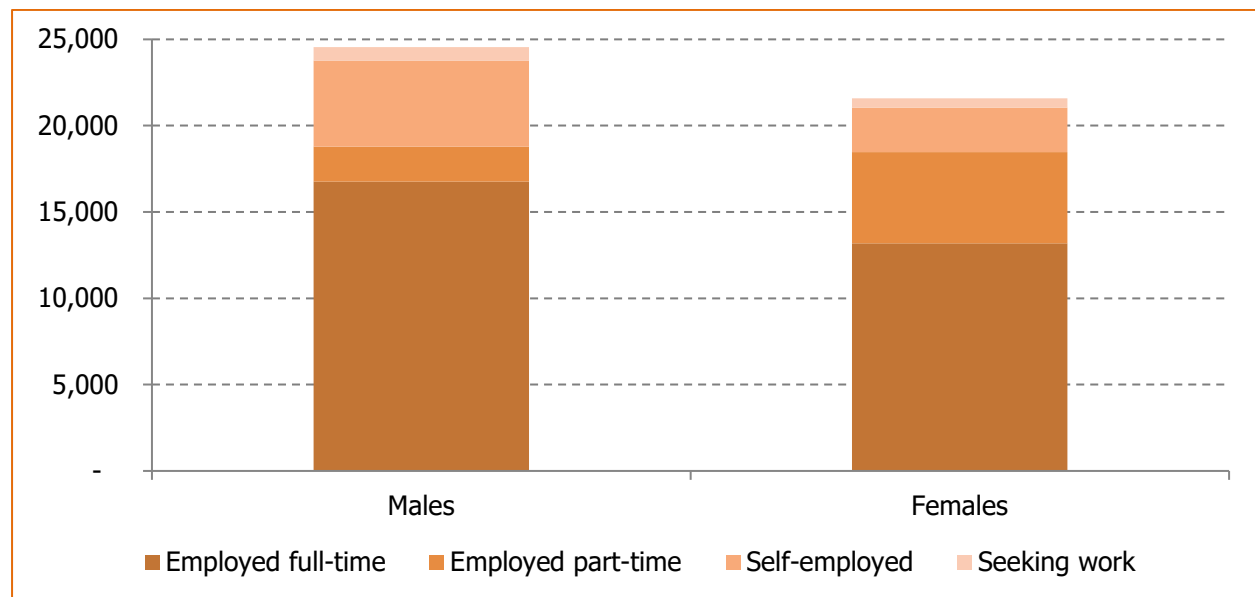

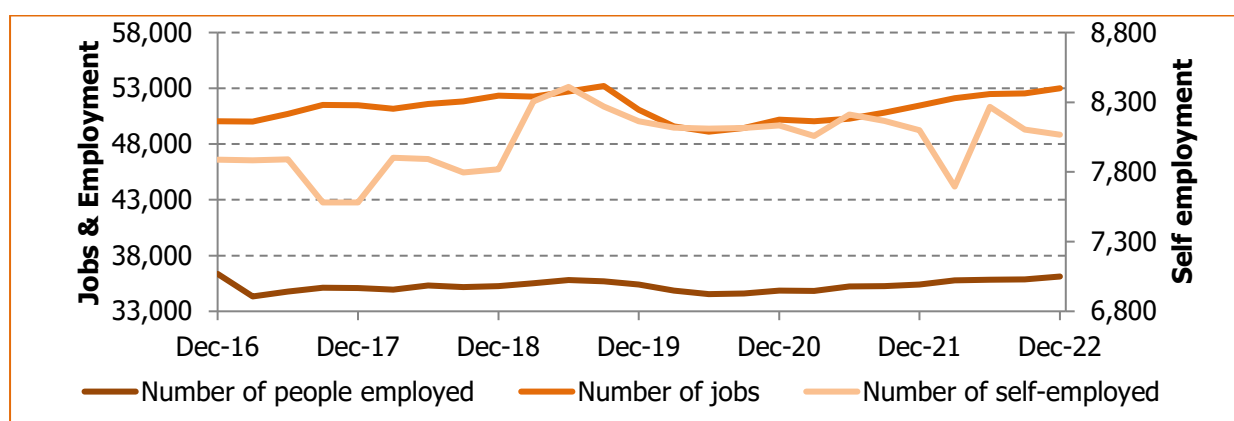
**Figure 3 Economically Active Population, by Sex, by Employment Status, 2021**

The economically active population is defined as comprising those who are currently employed, self-employed or actively seeking work. According to the 2021 Census, the total economically active population in 2021 was 44,875. Since multiple responses were possible in the Census, figure 3 above includes those who classified themselves in multiple categories, the sum of the graph will be greater than the total economically active population.

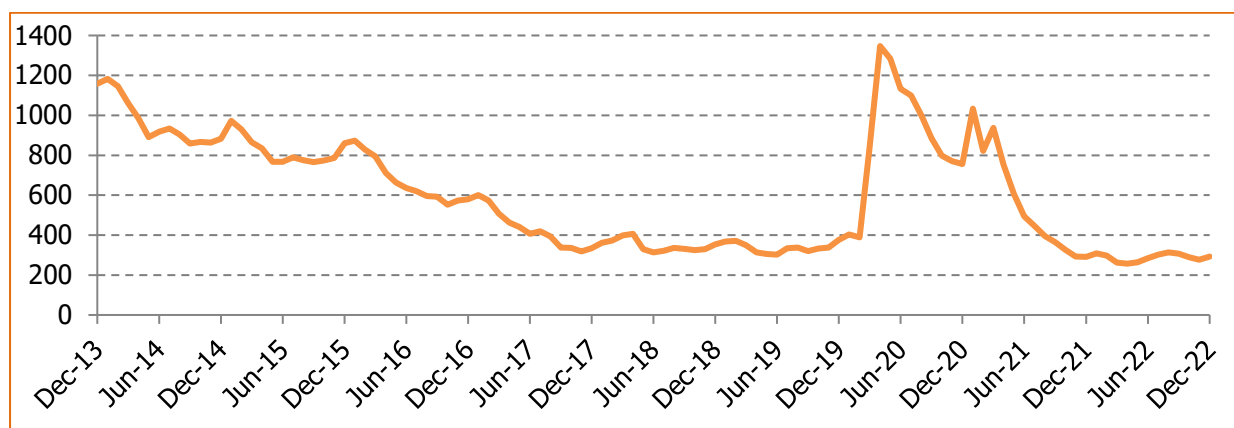
**Figure 4 Working Population and Jobs**

As at December 2022, the number of people in employment stood at 36,107 in 52,999 jobs. There were also 8,066 people who were self-employed. A person can be classified as both in employment and self-employed, so the total will be higher than the total of the economically active population. The number of self-employed should be read against the right hand axis.

**Figure 5 Unemployment**

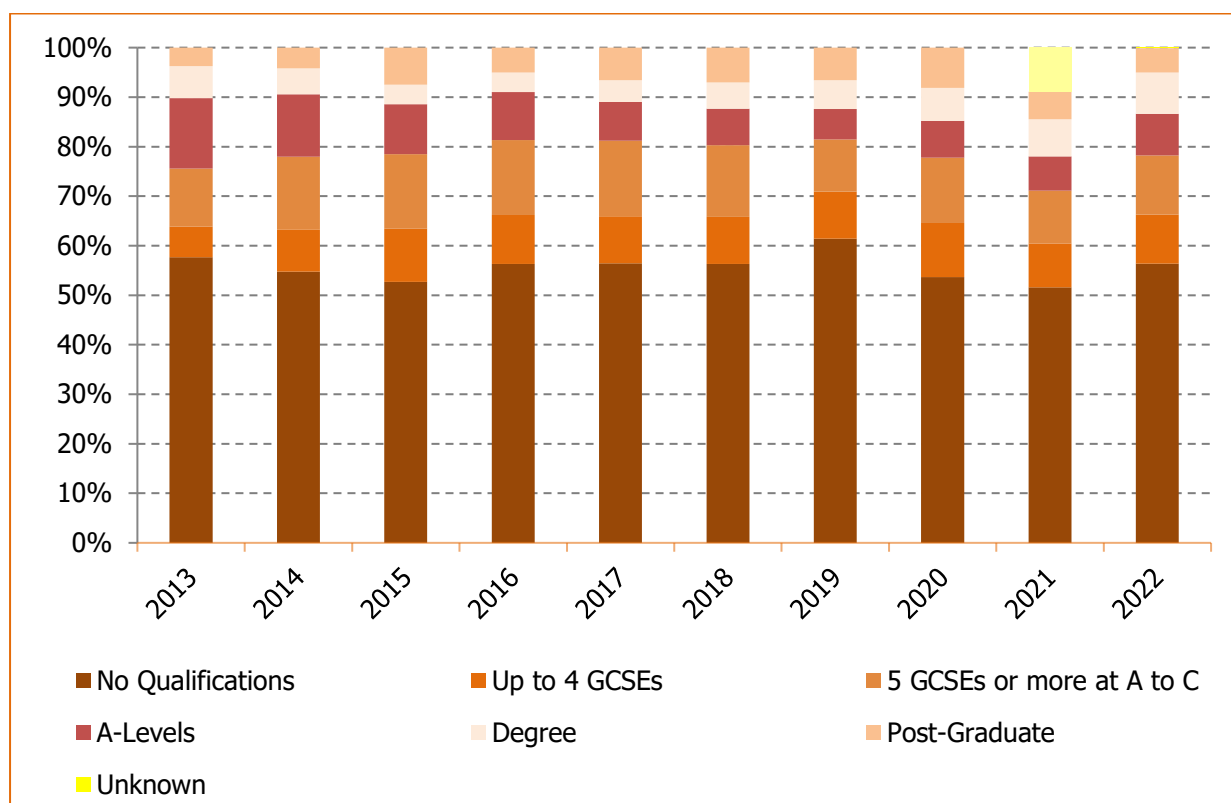

Unemployment as at December 2022 stood at 0.7% of the economically active population, or 292 people, of which 182 were men and 110 were women.

The Isle of Man rate of unemployment is calculated on a claimant count basis. Some other jurisdictions use various different methods, including the International Labour Organisation (ILO) definition of unemployment, which includes those people who may be actively seeking work, but are not registered as such. Since the 2016 Census, the Isle of Man has produced an estimate of the ILO unemployed rate. For December 2022, the estimated ILO unemployed rate was 1.6% or 737 persons.

In 2022 of the 11,664 jobs advertised through the Jobcentre, 6,577 required no qualifications, 1,150 required up to 4 GCSEs at grade A to C or equivalent, 1,401 required 5 GCSEs at grade A to C or equivalent, 978 required A-Levels or equivalent, 972 required a degree or equivalent, and 576 required a postgraduate qualification.

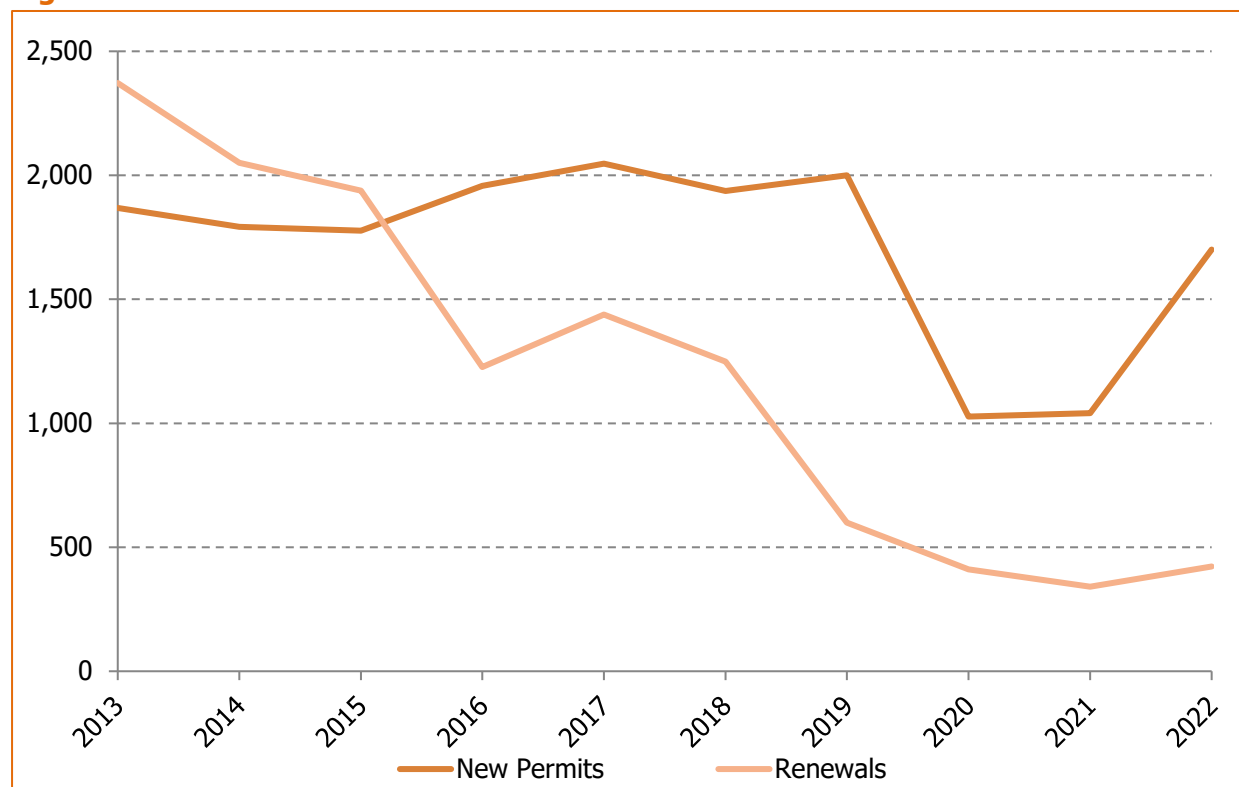
Due to technical issues in July 2021, there were 928 jobs that couldn't be classified by their qualification requirements, and these were classed as 'Unknown'. It is also no longer possible to report job vacancies by experience required as was done previously.

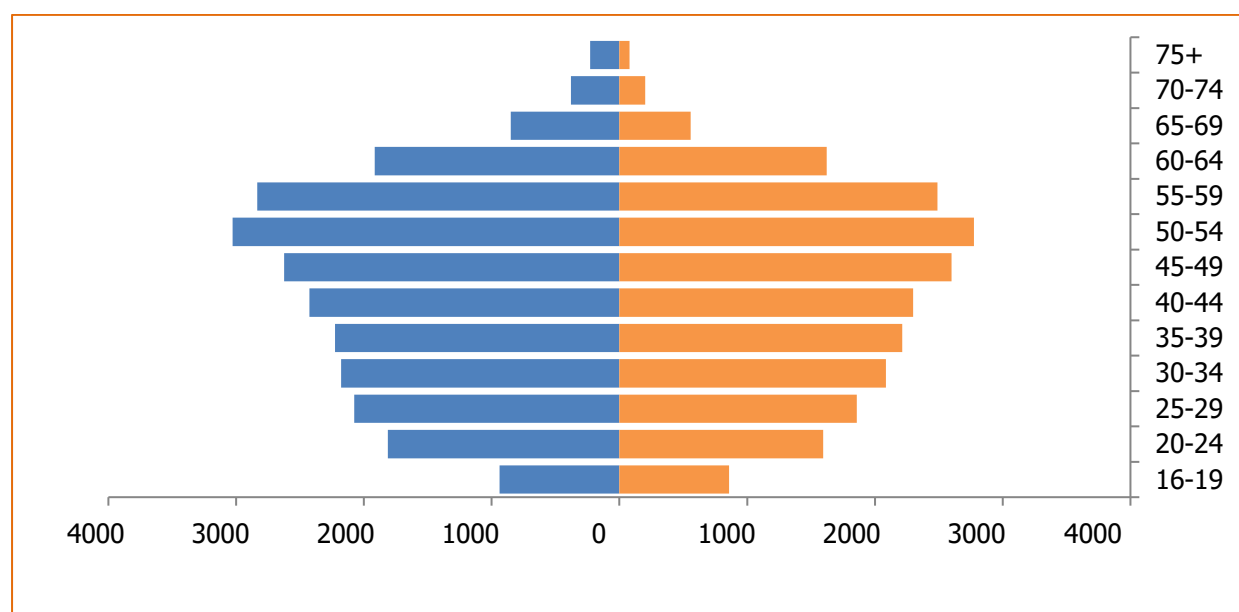
**Figure 7 Work Permits**

During 2022 there were 1,701 new permits issued, with 423 renewals also occurring during the year.

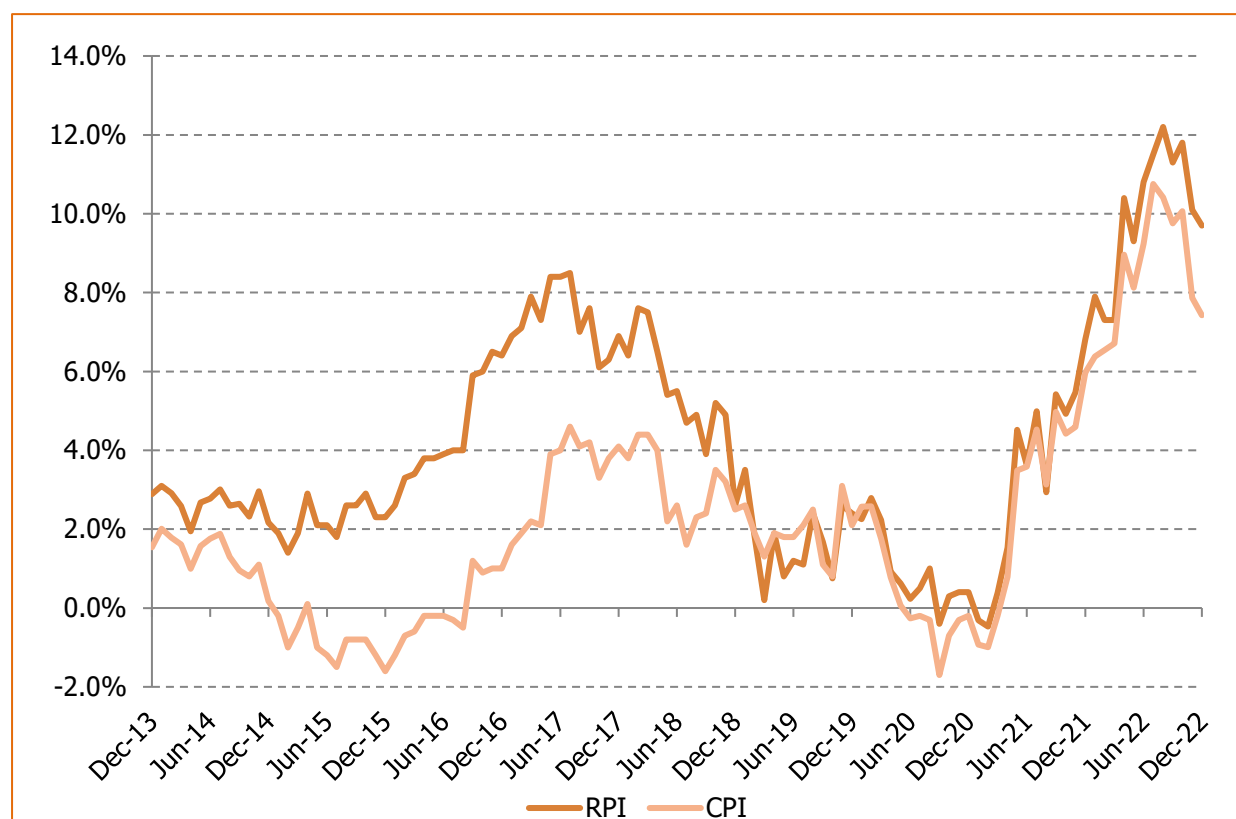
**Figure 8 Age Distribution of Working Population, 2021**

The reflation factors shown in Table 7 can be used to convert a price or monetary value into its real equivalent (i.e. in today's money) by multiplying by the appropriate reflationary factor. For example, using the CPI as the main inflationary measure, £100 in 2012 is the equivalent to £126.8 in 2022 (£100 x 1.268).

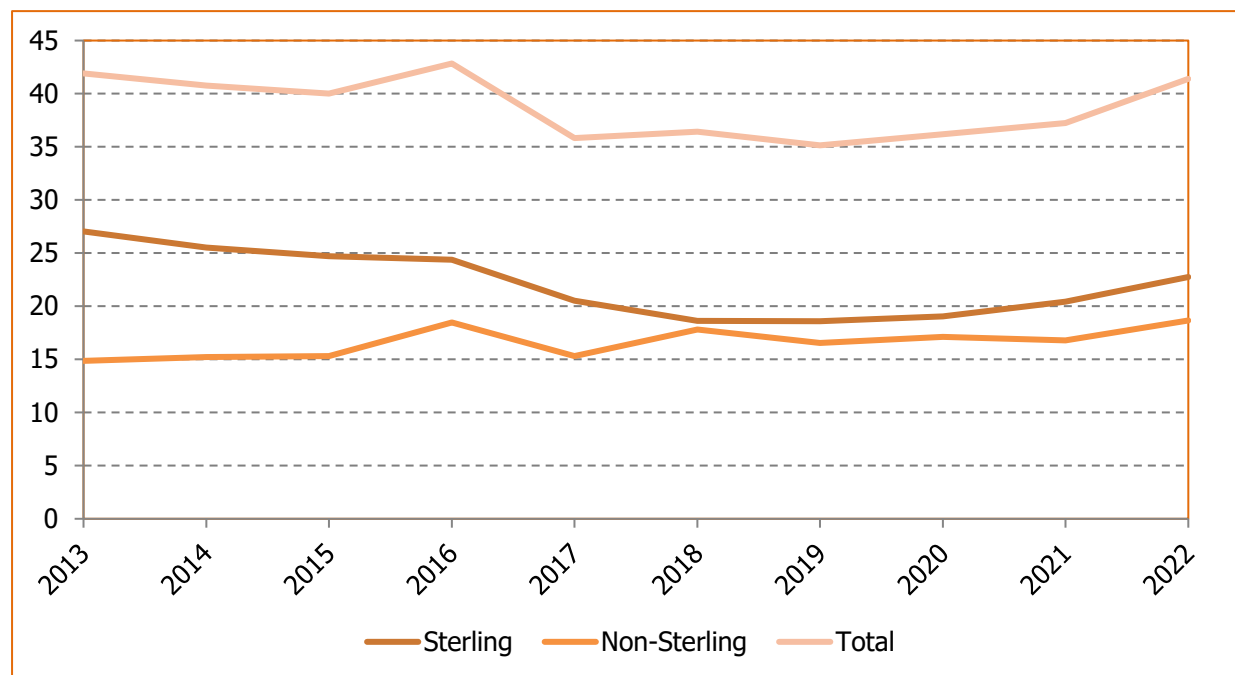

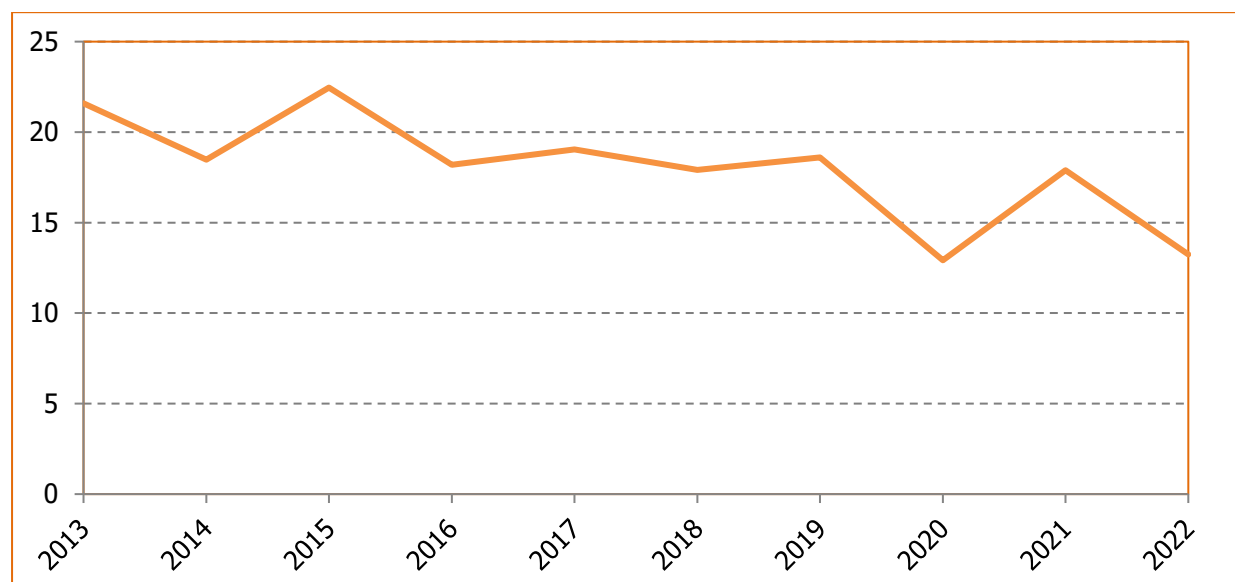
**Figure 10 Bank Deposit Base (£ bn)**

As of December 2022, sterling bank deposits stood at £22.74bn, non-sterling at £18.66bn, with total deposits standing at £41.40bn.

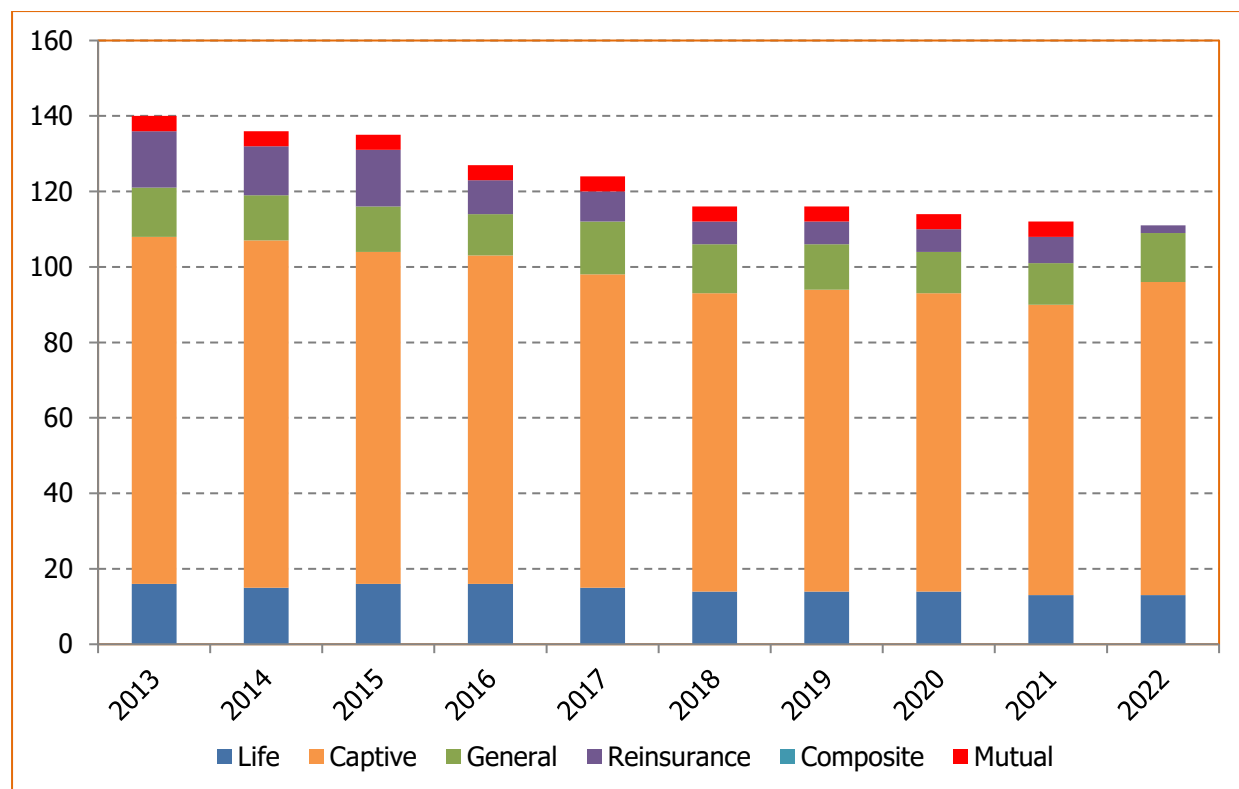
**Figure 11 Funds under Management (US\$ bn)**

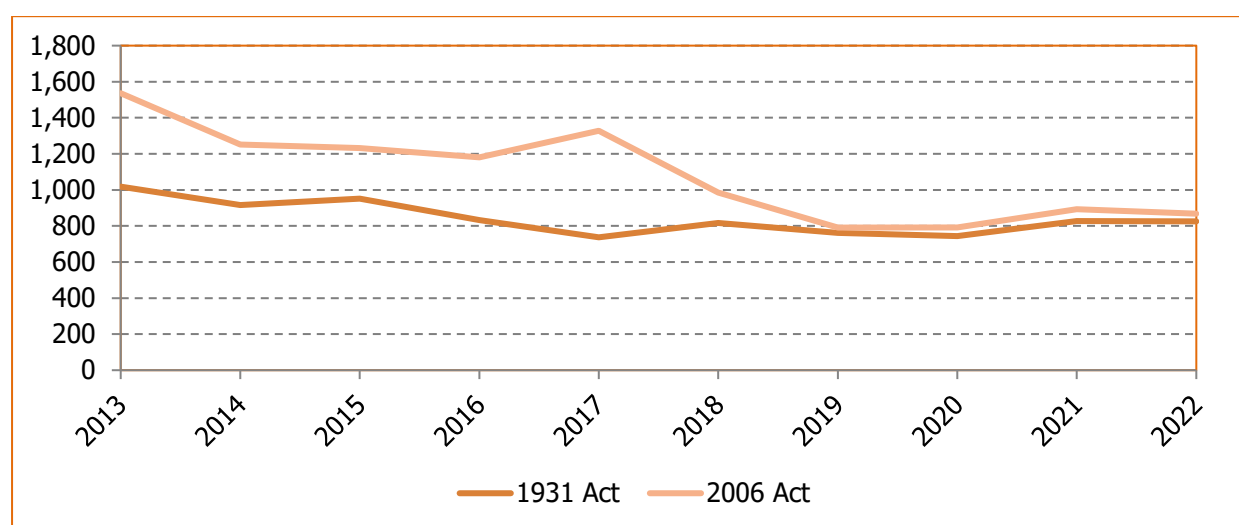
**Figure 12 Authorised Insurers, by type**

As at December 2022, the total number of authorised insurers on the Isle of Man was 111, with 83 of these licences relating to Captive Insurers and 13 to Life Insurance.

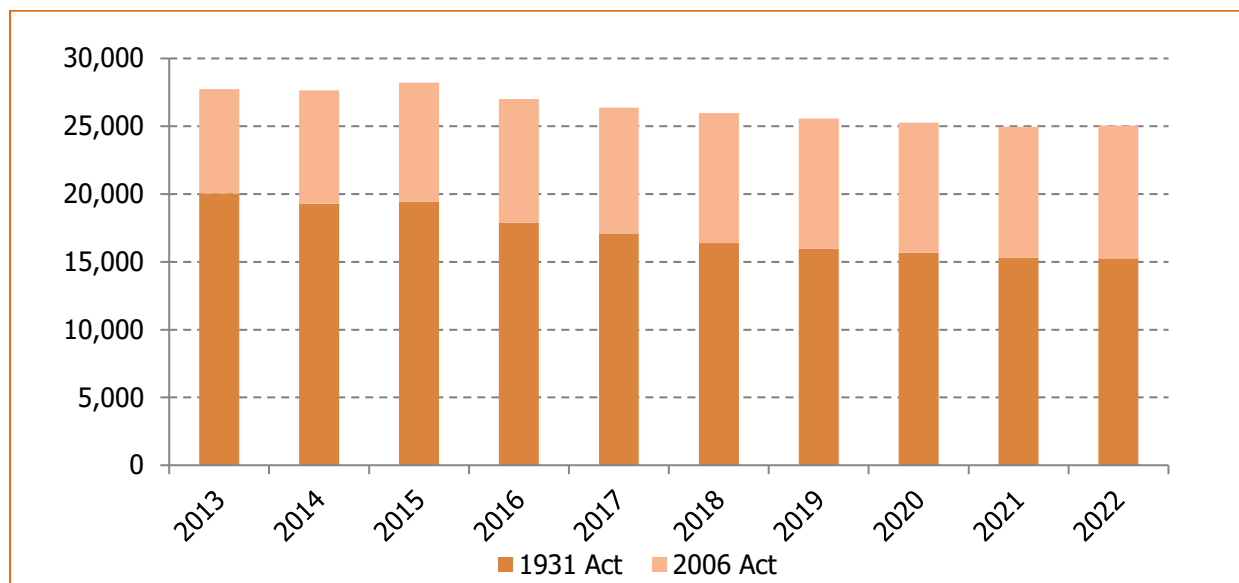
**Figure 13 New Company Registrations**

**Figure 14 Total number of Companies Registered on the Isle of Man**

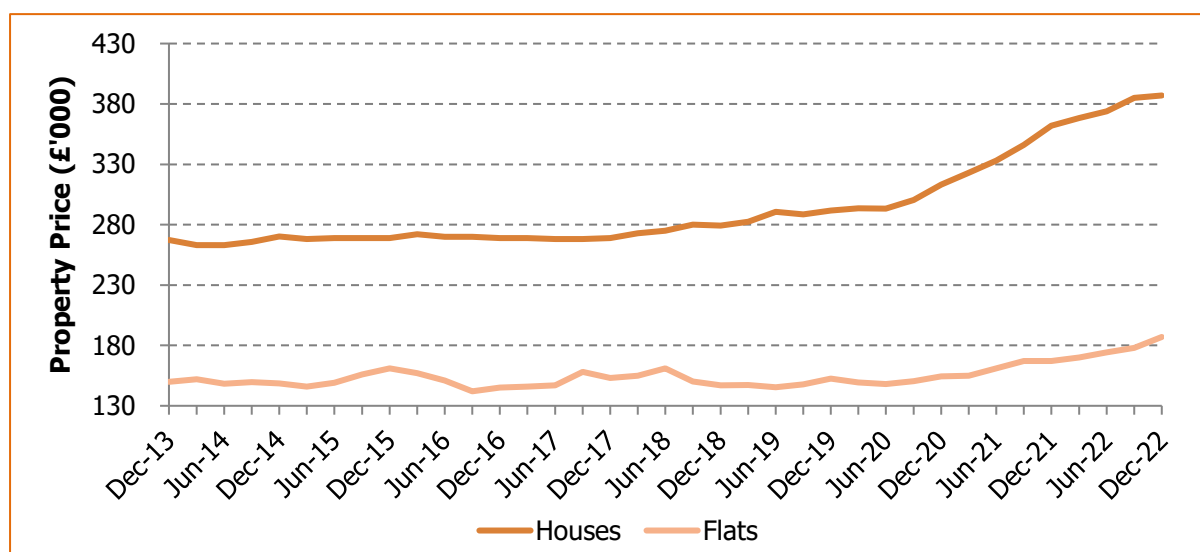

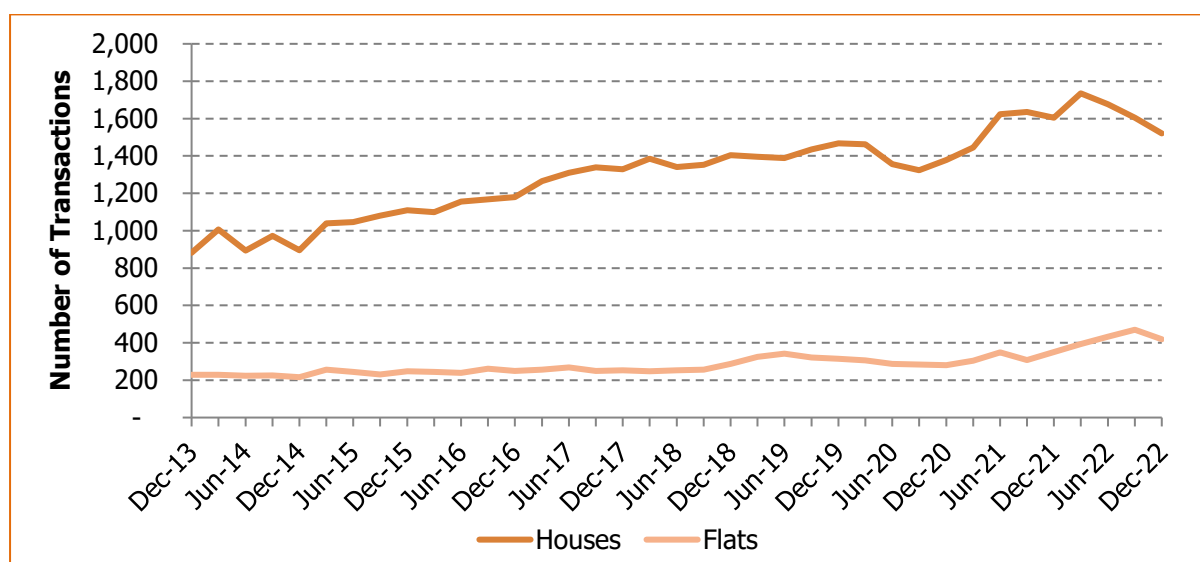
**Figure 15 Average Property Price (£'000)**

**Figure 16 Number of Property Transactions**

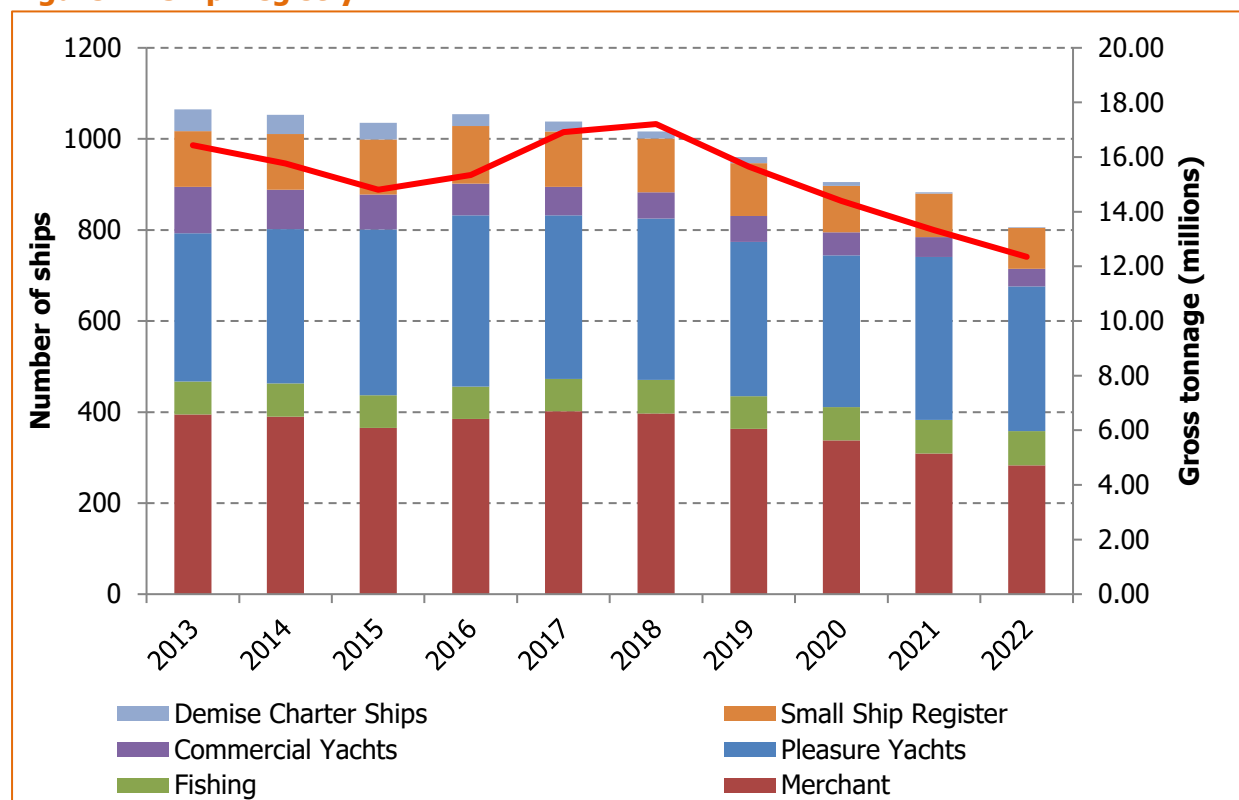

**Figure 17 Ship Registry**

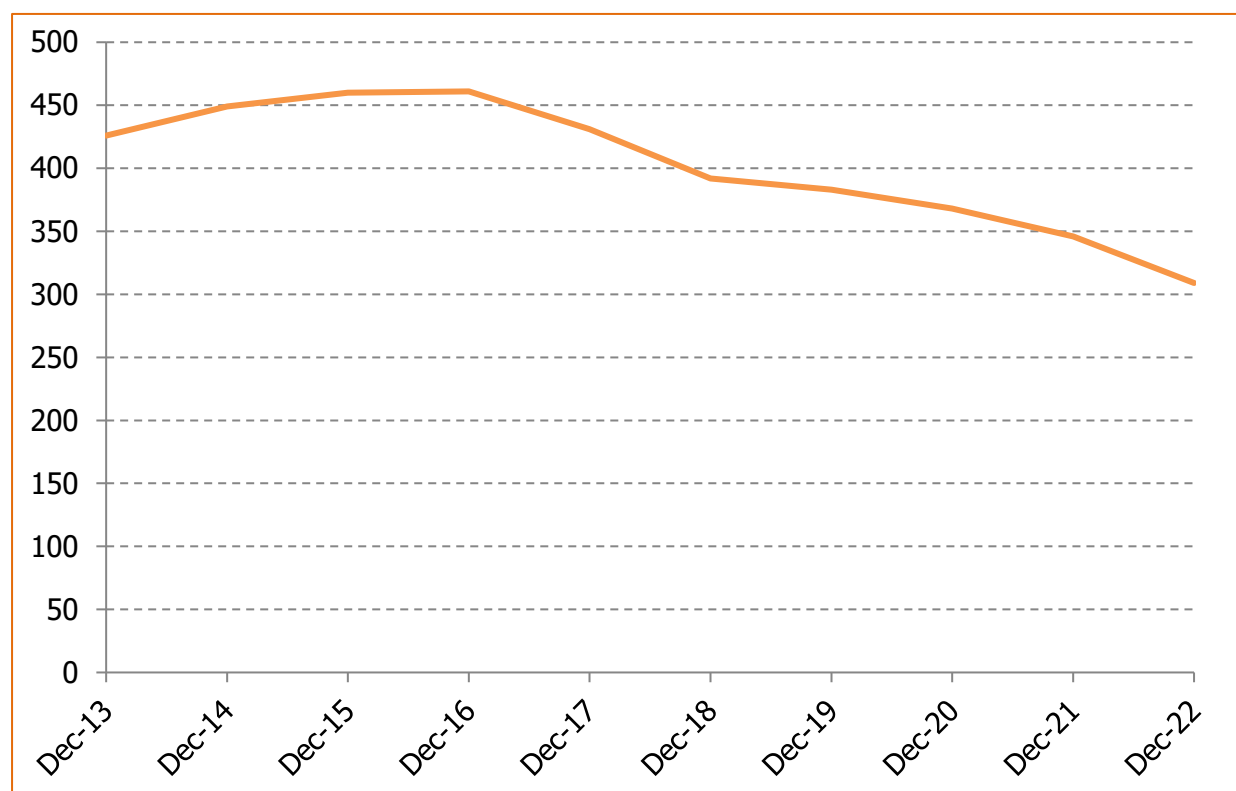

As at 31 December 2022, there were 283 merchant ships, 66 fishing vessels, 318 pleasure yachts, 39 commercial yachts and 1 demise charter ships registered in the Isle of Man. The Small Ship Register also had 90 ships registered at the end of the year. The gross tonnage for all ships registered amounted to 12.35 (millions) tonnes.

Figure 18 Number of Registered Aircraft



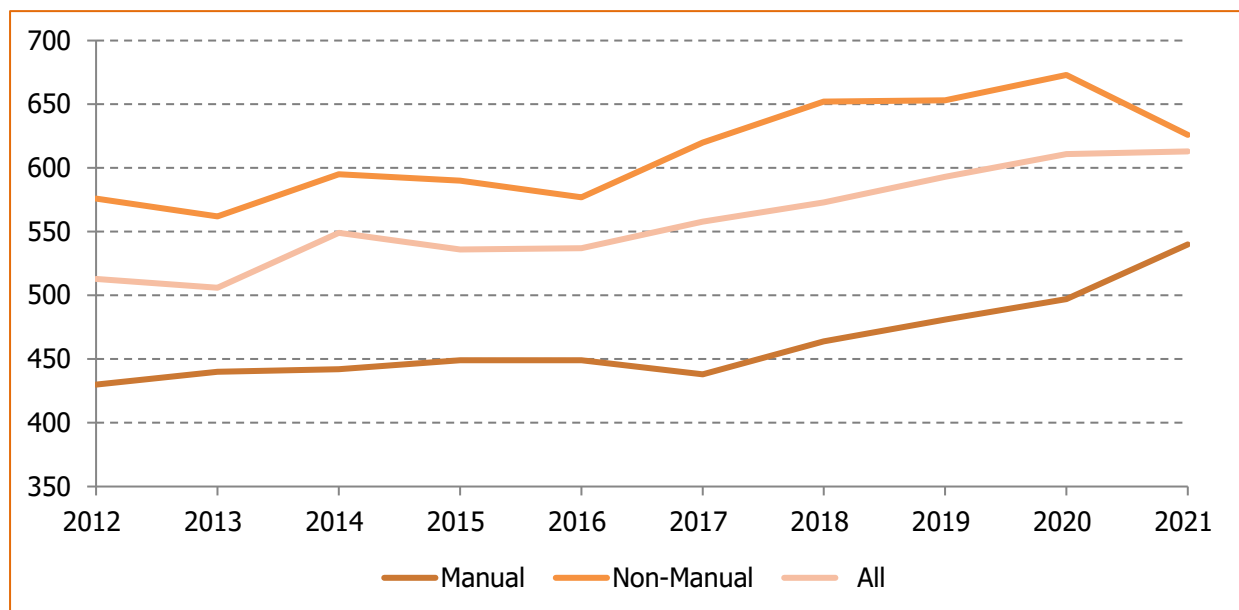

As at the 31 December 2022 the total number of aircraft registered in the Isle of Man was 309. The following comment has been supplied by the aircraft registry:

“Ongoing international Political and financial uncertainty combined with challenging international market conditions, and the CV19 pandemic, plus BREXIT, have resulted in aircraft being sold and thus leaving the register. Following the invasion of Ukraine, the requirement to deregister 22 aircraft based on sanctions and a Political directive to exit all business associated with Russia and Belarus, has resulted in a further reduction in the size of the aircraft registry and its activity levels”.

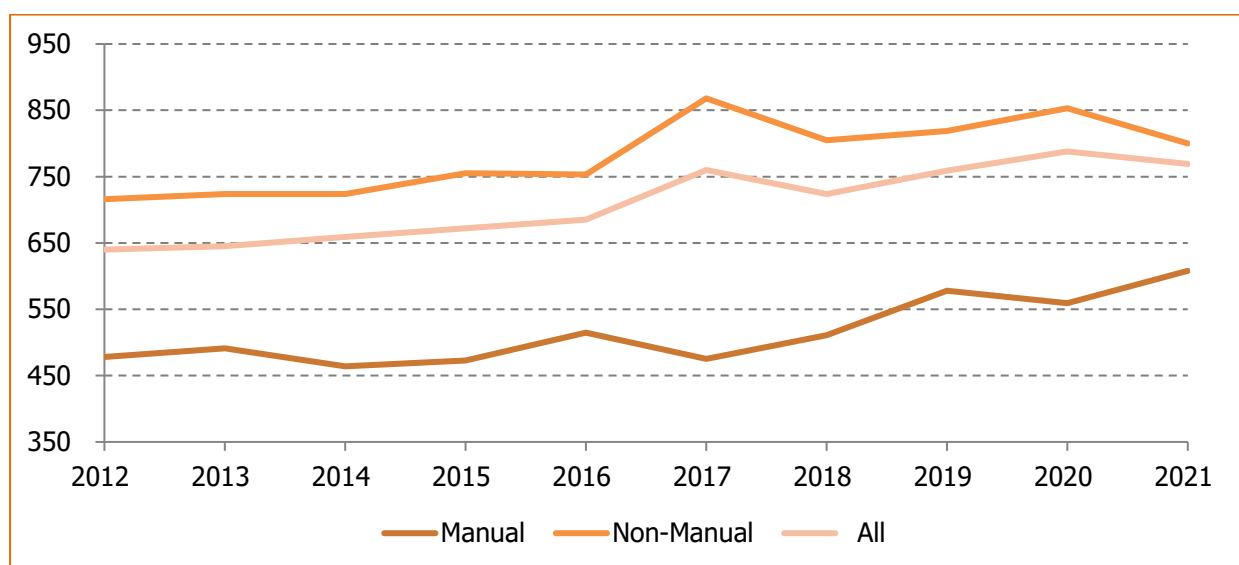

**Figure 20 Average Weekly Earnings (£)**

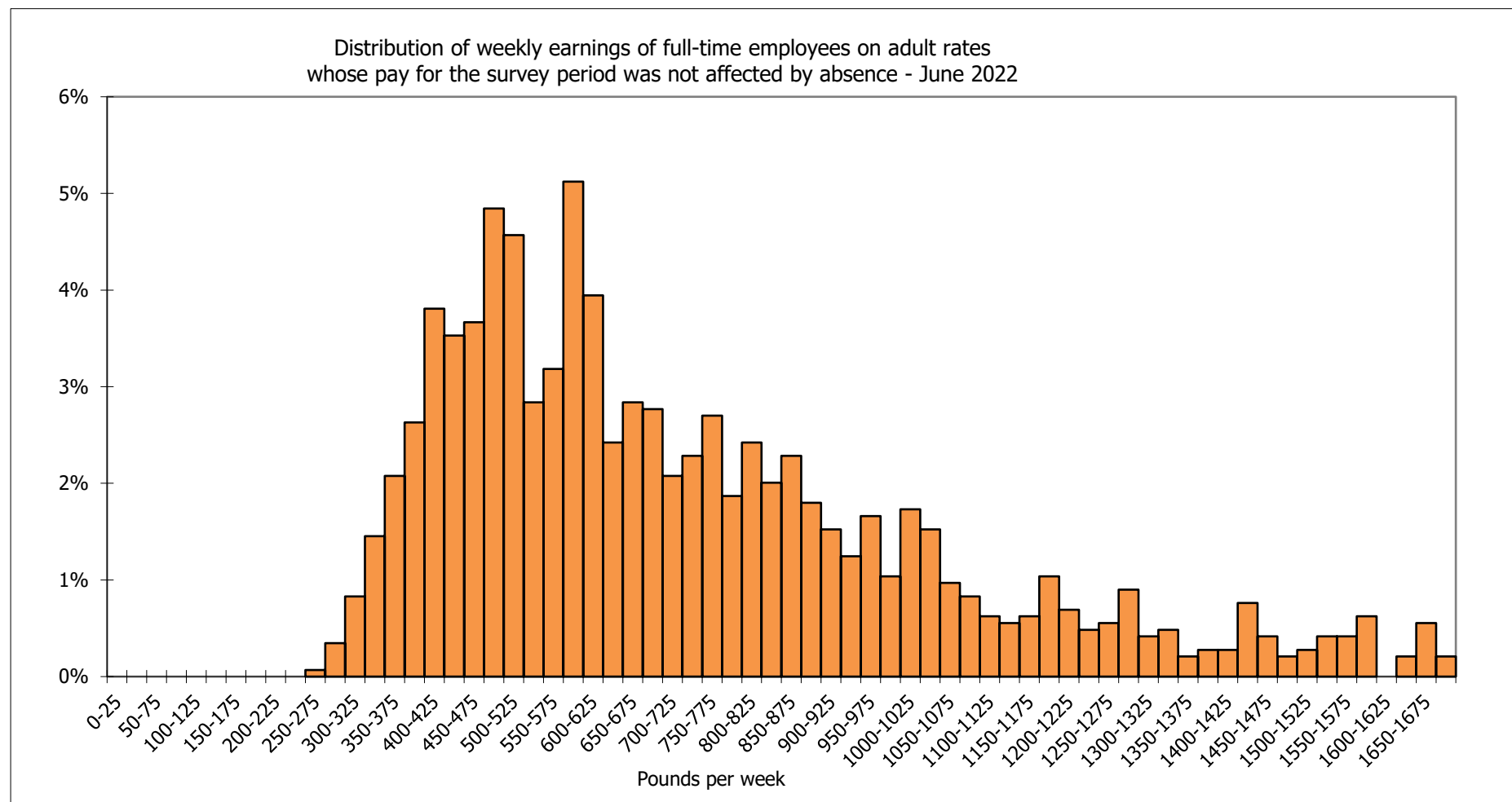

The earnings survey pay period relates to June 2021. Both the median and average weekly earnings figures only include full time employees, on adult rates, whose earnings were not affected by absence. The median weekly earnings is the level of earnings such that half the sample has earnings greater, and the other half lower. A full time employee is classified as anyone working 30+ hours a week, with the exception of teachers.

The median weekly earnings for 2021 were £613 and the average weekly earnings were £769.

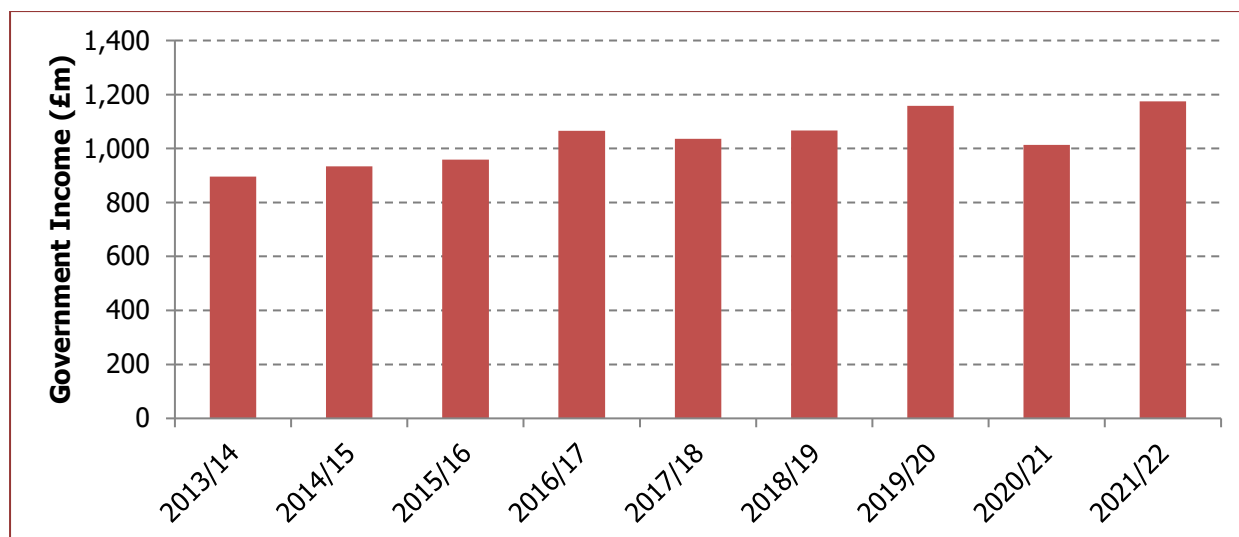

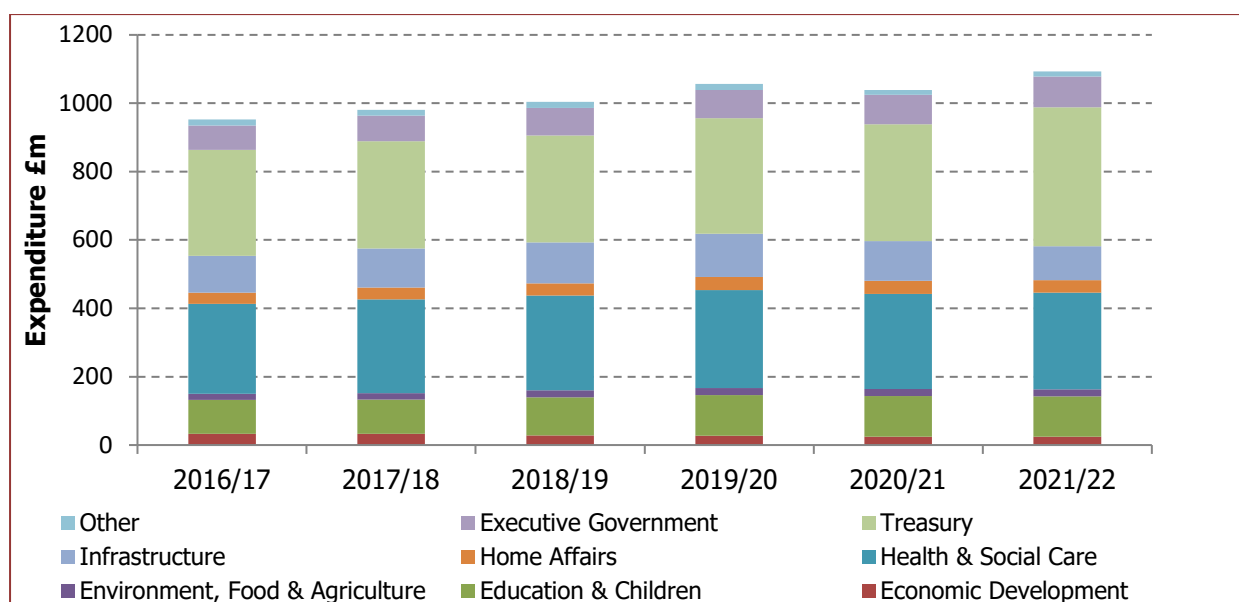
**Figure 22 Government Income (£m)**

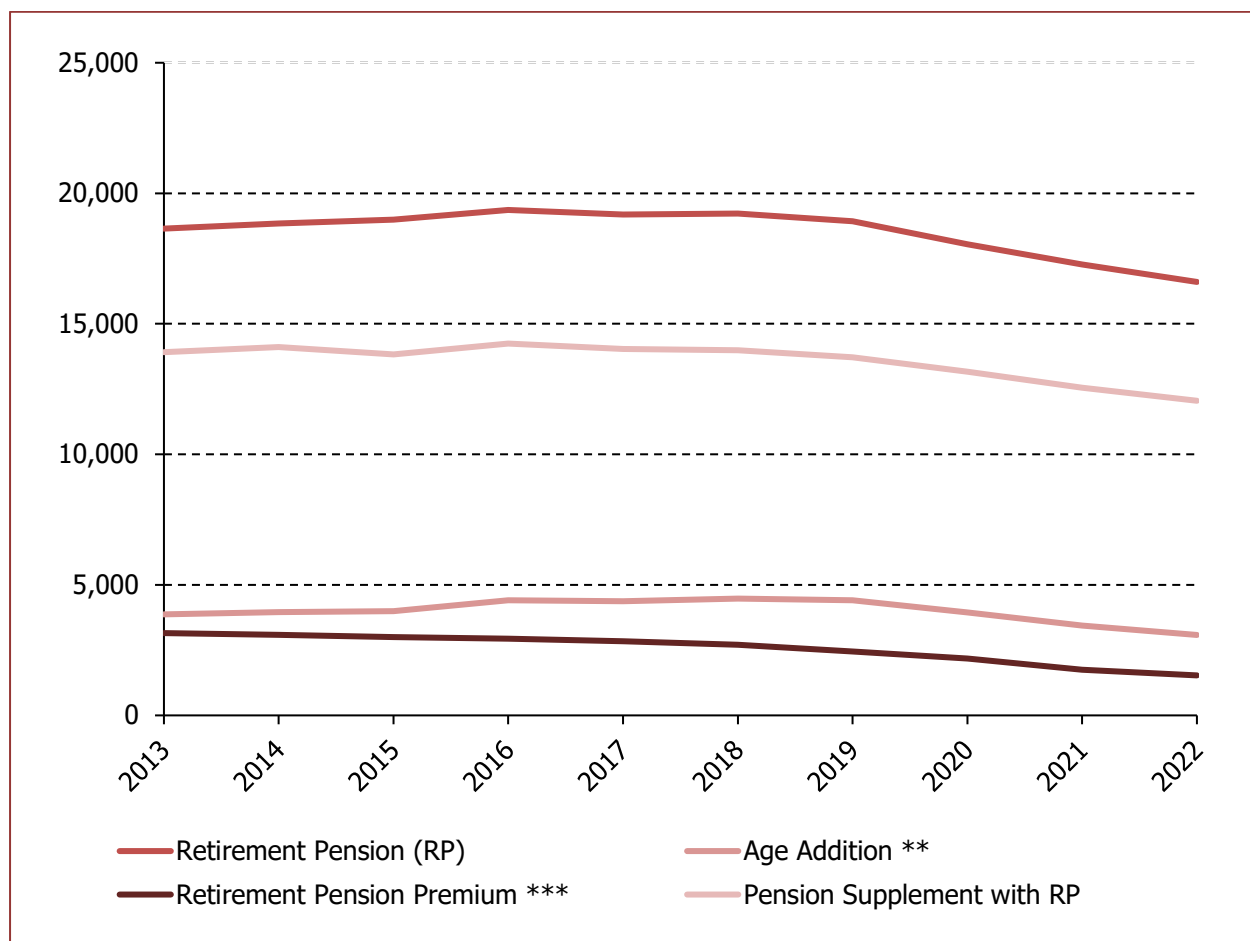

As of 31 March 2022, there were 16,604 people claiming the Retirement Pension, with 12,052 in receipt of the Pension Supplement. Those in receipt of the Retirement Pension Premium numbered 1,532 and 3,081 for the Age Addition benefit.

There were also 2,779 people claiming the Manx State Pension (MSP)\*, and 1,806 people claiming the Pension Supplement with MSP.

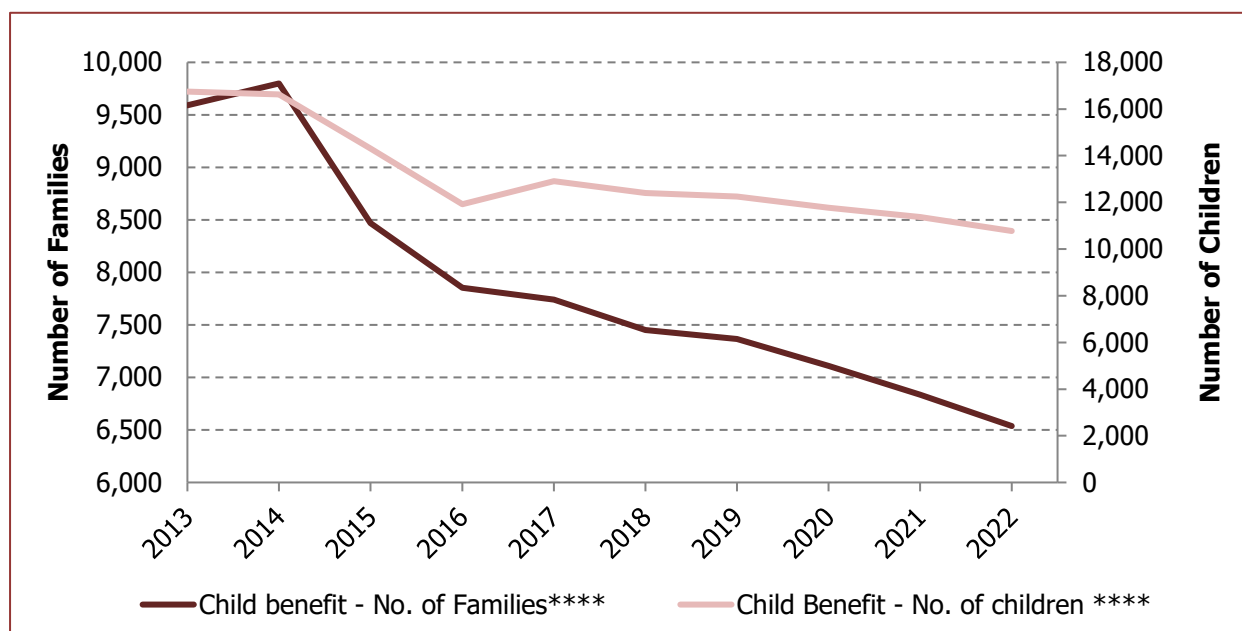

**Figure 25 Child Benefit**

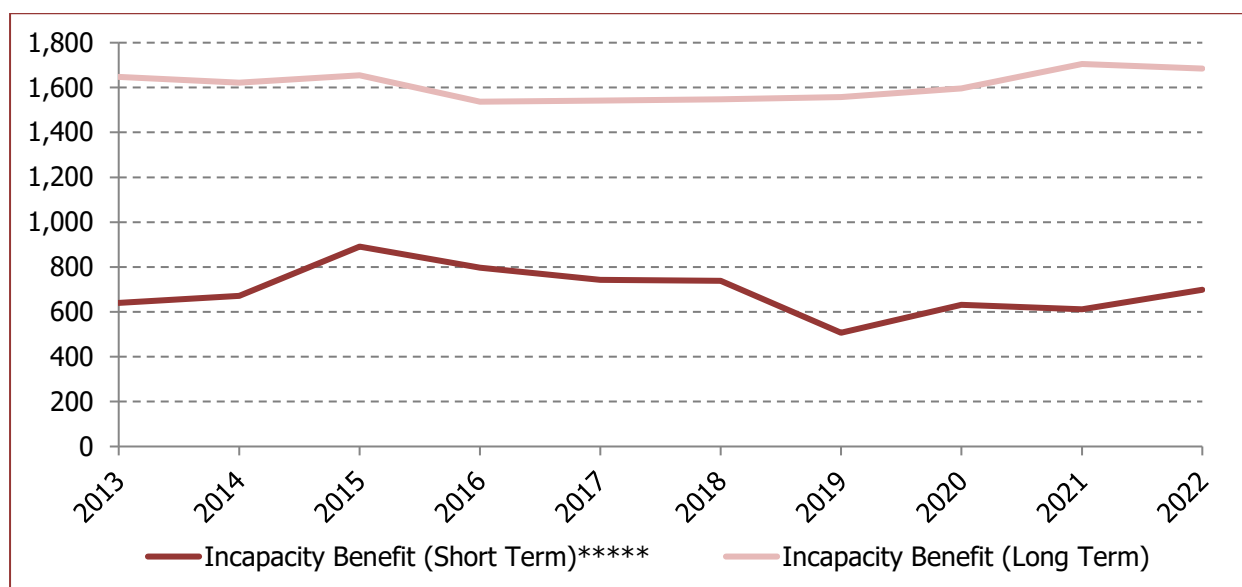

**Figure 26 Incapacity Benefit Recipients**

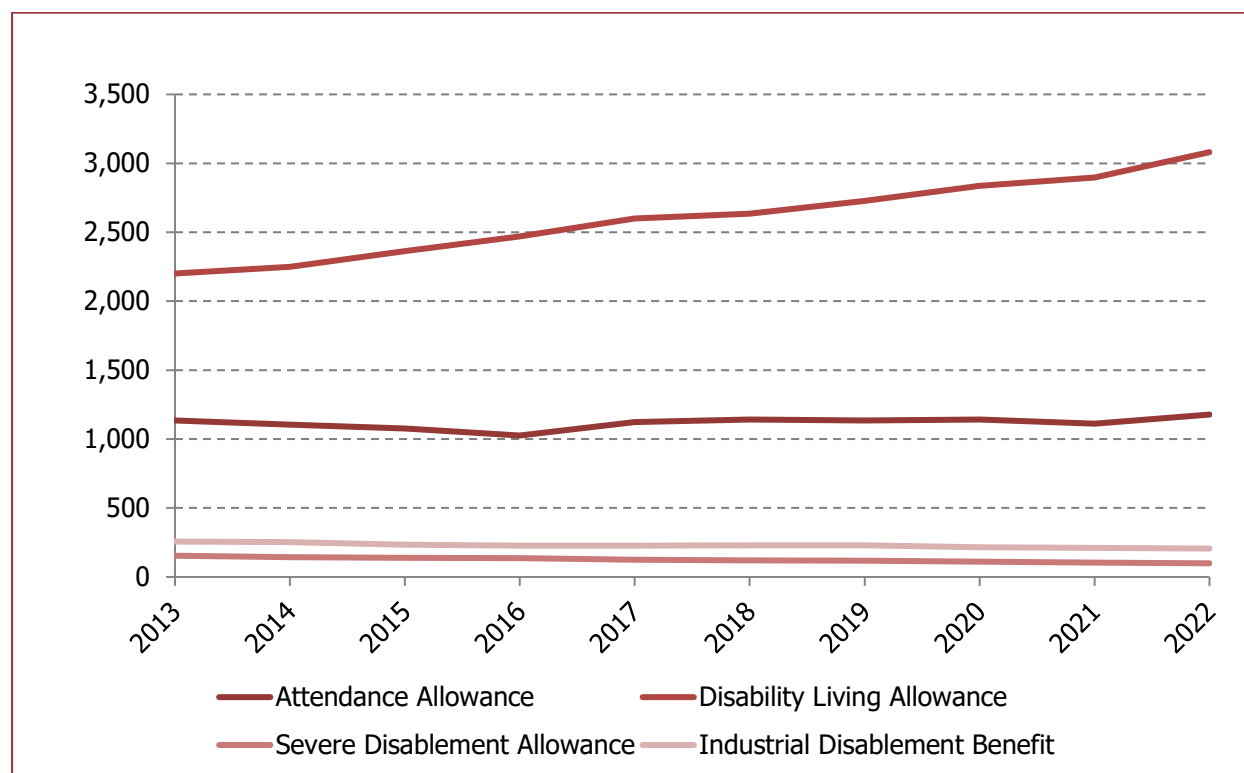

**Figure 28 Income Support, Jobseeker's Allowance & Employed Person's Allowance**



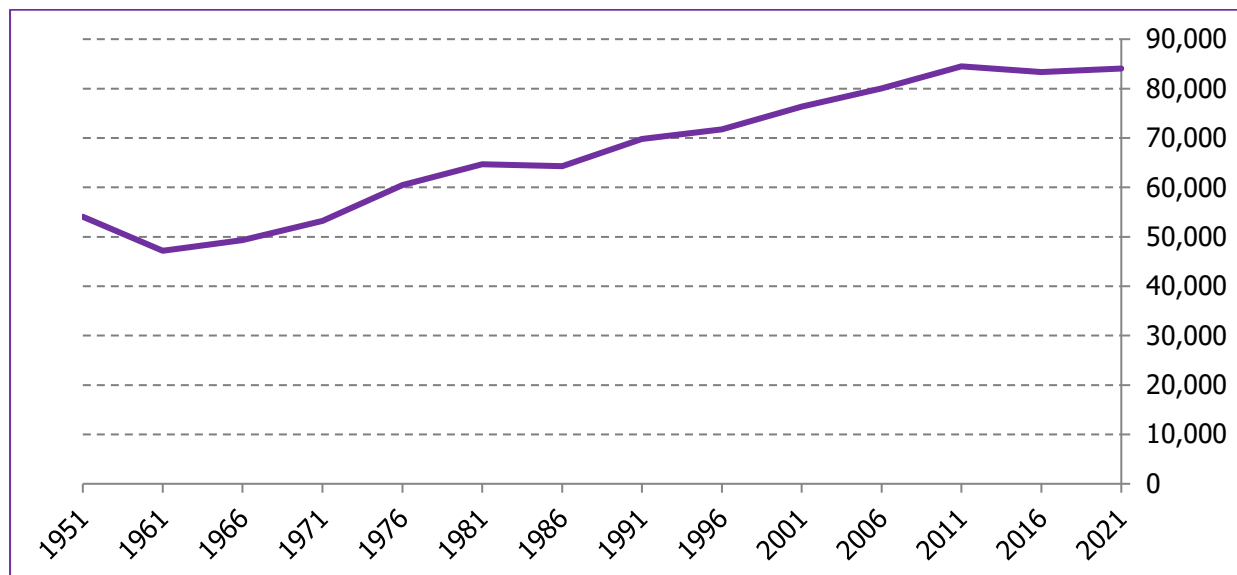

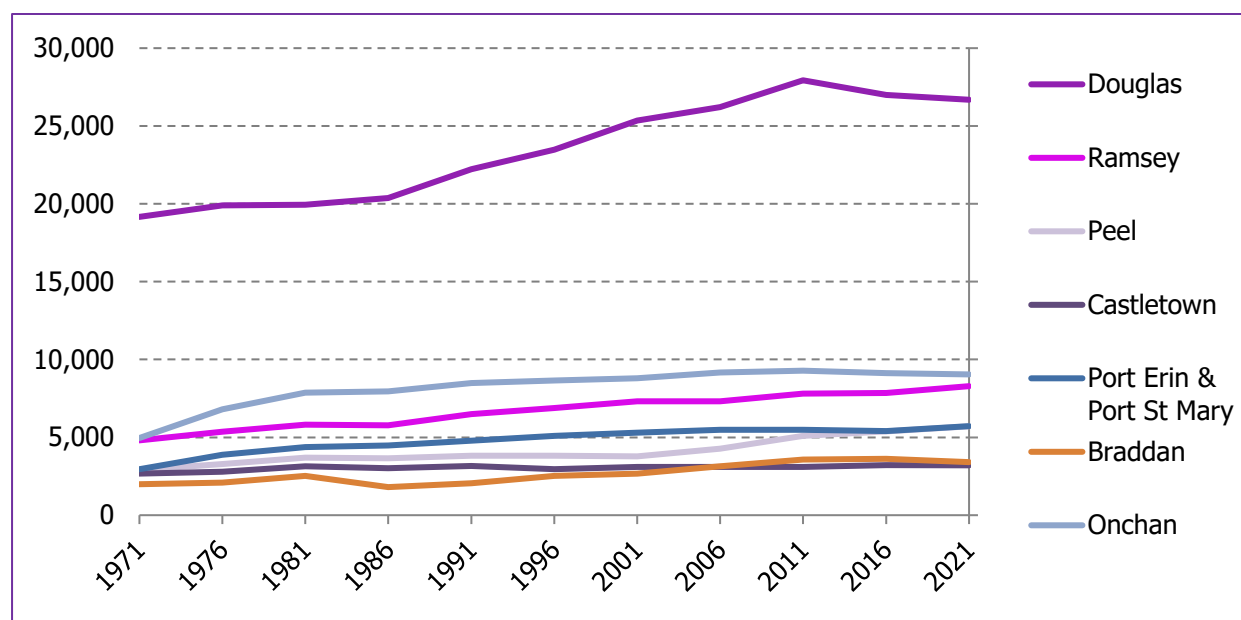

**Figure 30 Population in Key Towns, 2021**

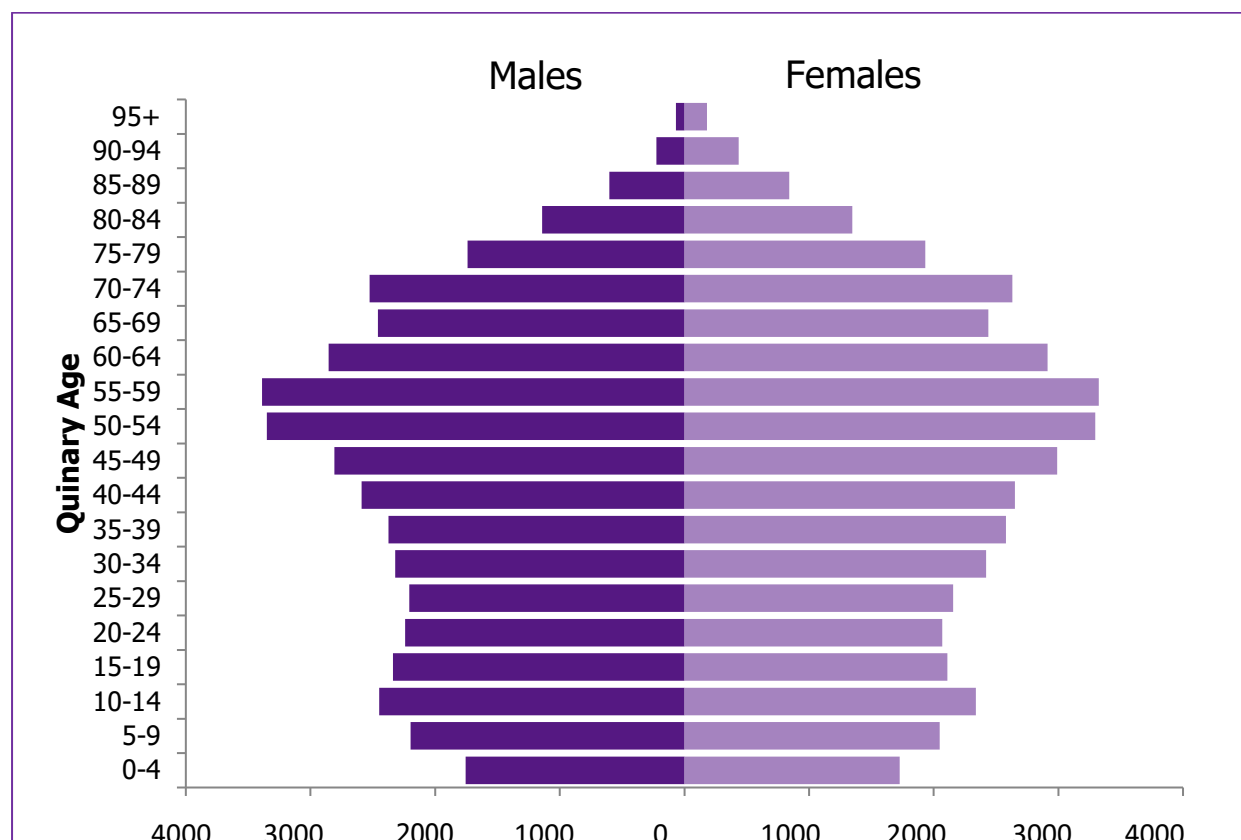

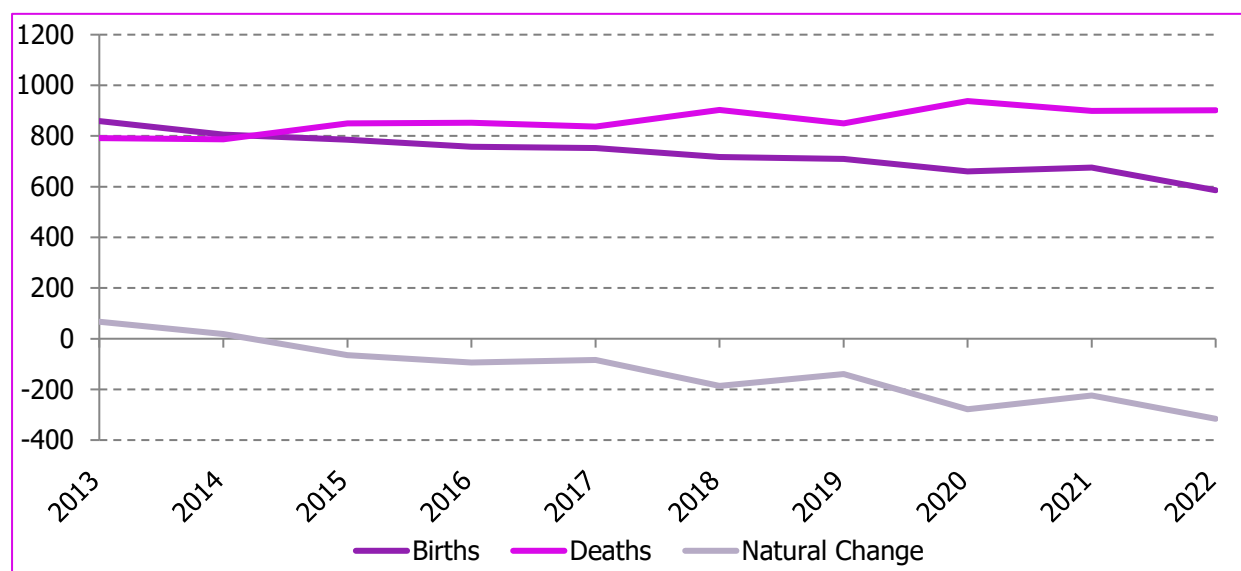

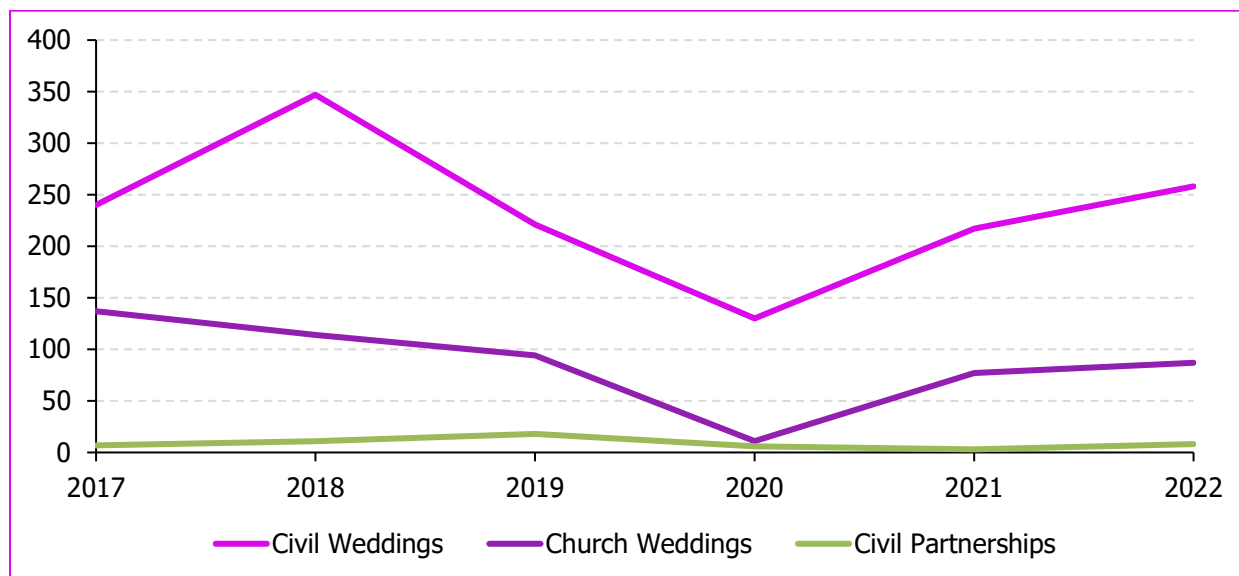
**Figure 32 Isle of Man Births and Deaths**

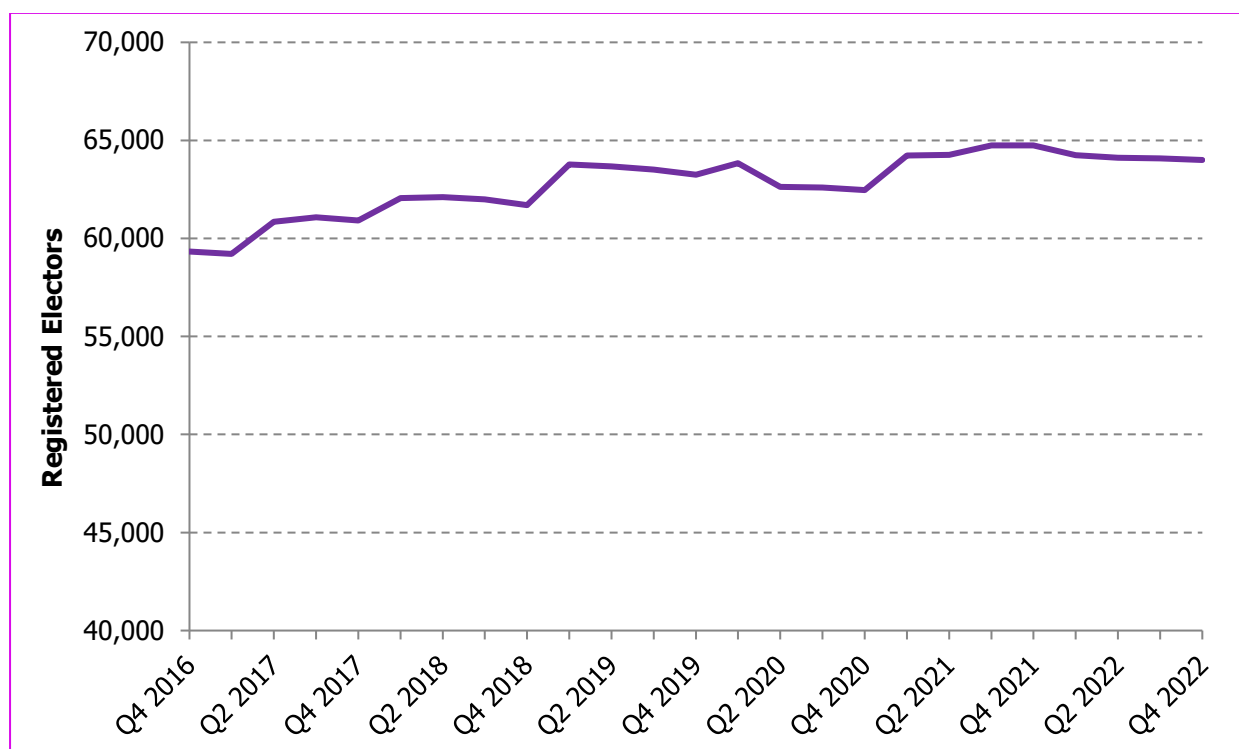
**Figure 33 Church Weddings, Civil Weddings and Civil Partnerships Registered**

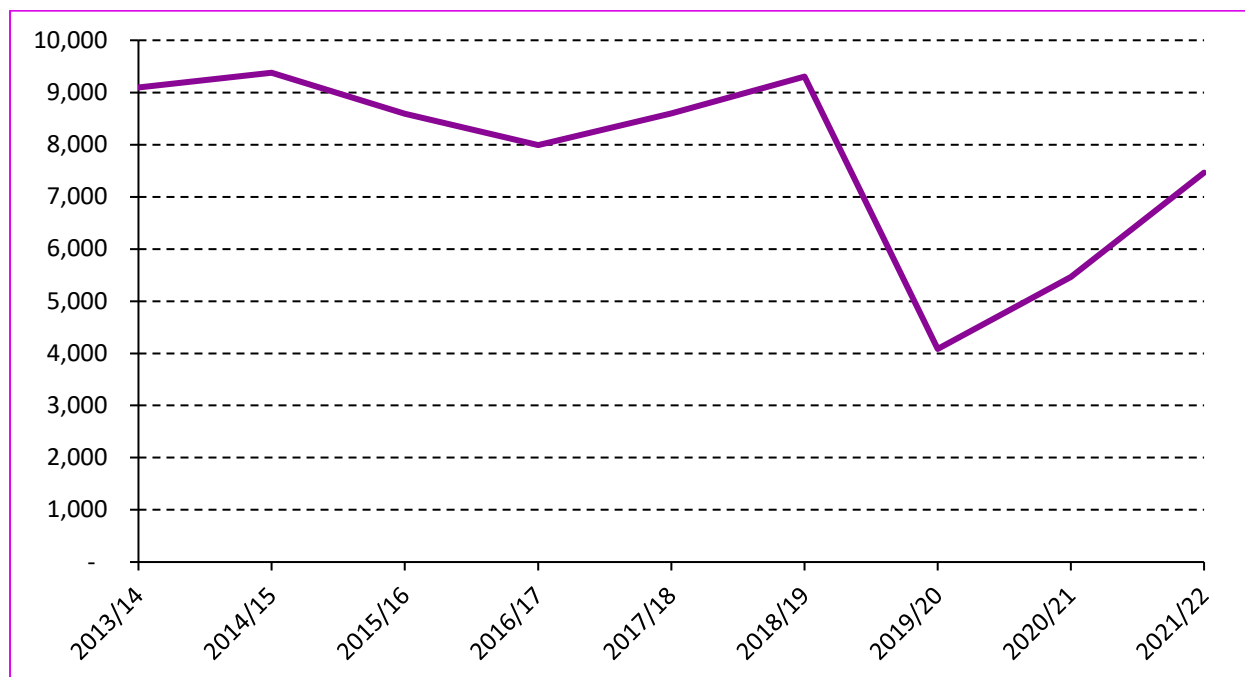

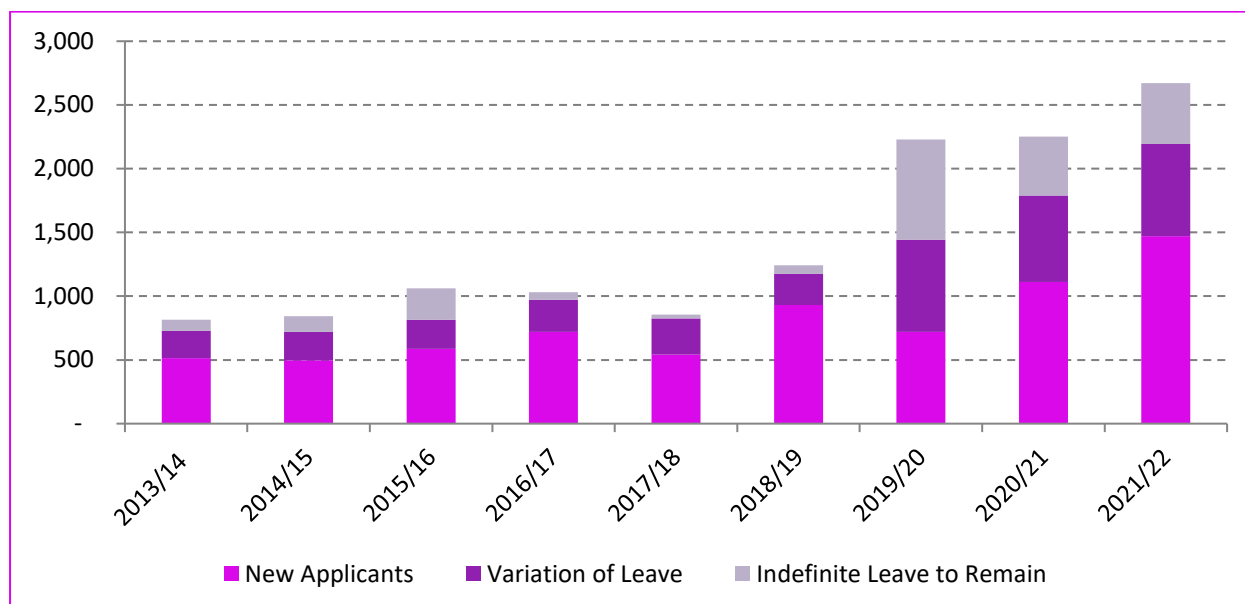
**Figure 35 Number of Passports Issued**

British citizenship is one of the six different forms of British nationality. Some of these were defined in the British Nationality Act 1981, which came into force on 1 January 1983. The forms of nationality are:

- British citizenship;
- British overseas citizenship;
- British overseas territories citizenship;
- British national (overseas);
- British protected person; and
- British subject.

British nationality is complicated and is defined in law. Whether a person has a claim to British nationality can be determined by applying the definitions and requirements of the British Nationality Act 1981 and related legislation to the facts of their date and place of birth and descent.

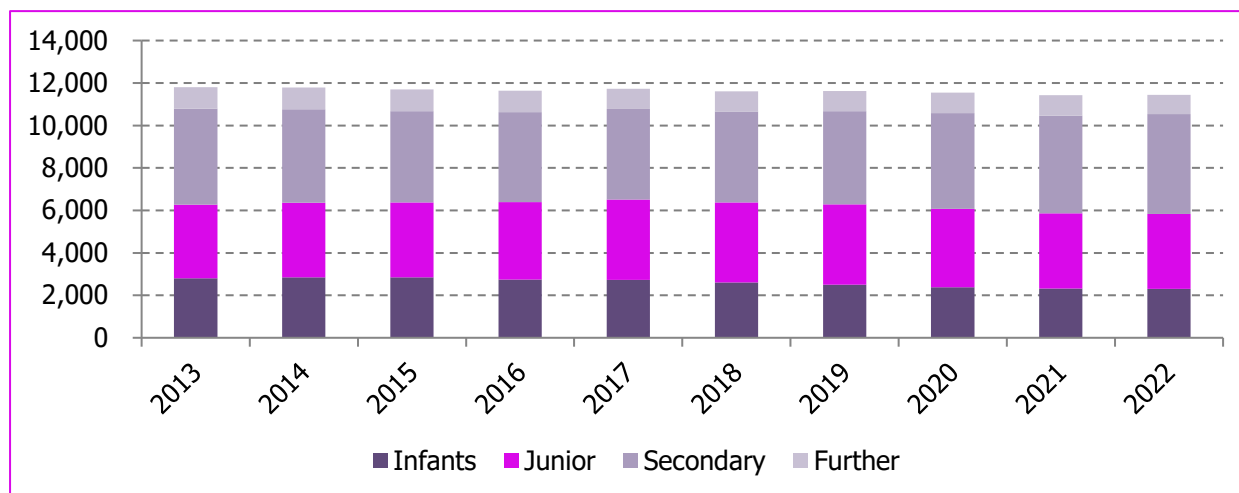

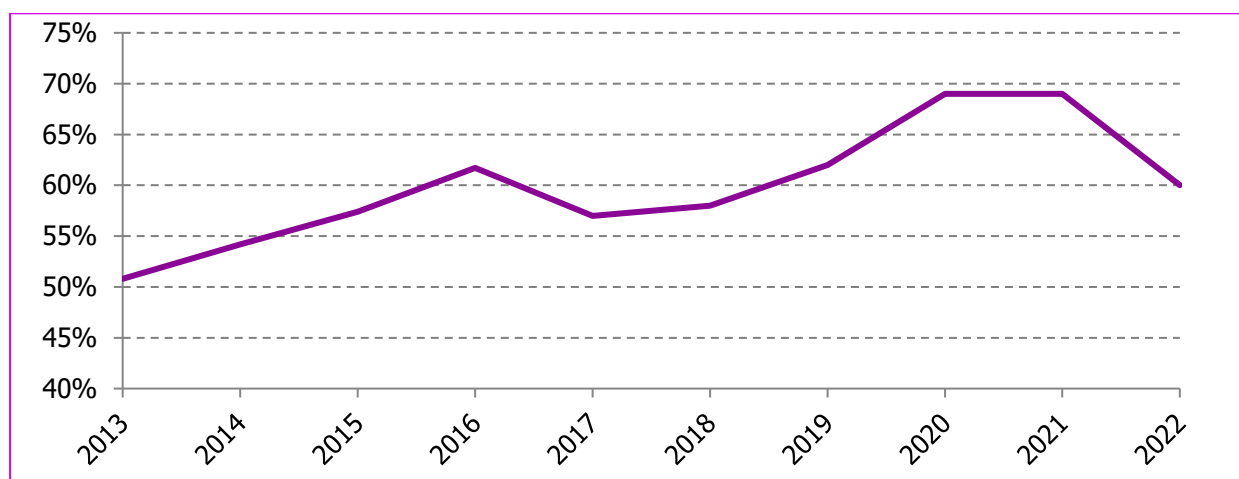
**Figure 37 School Age Population**

**Figure 38 Percentage of students gaining 5 or more Level 2 Qualifications (including English and Maths)**

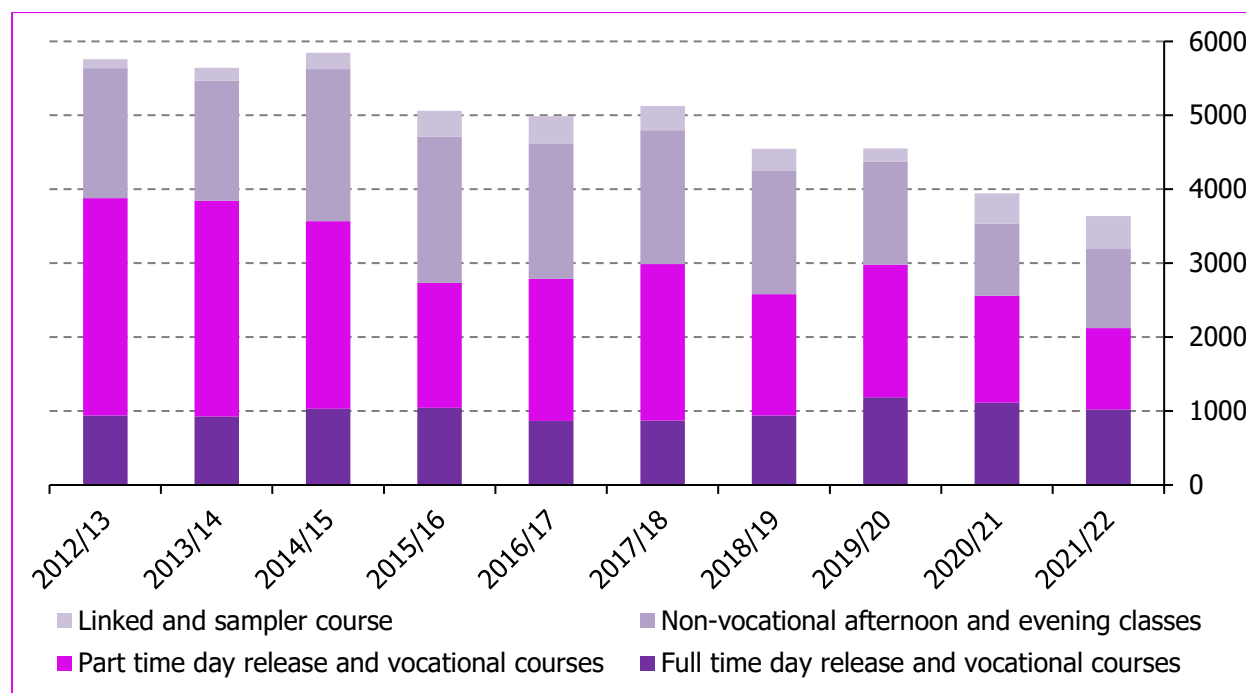

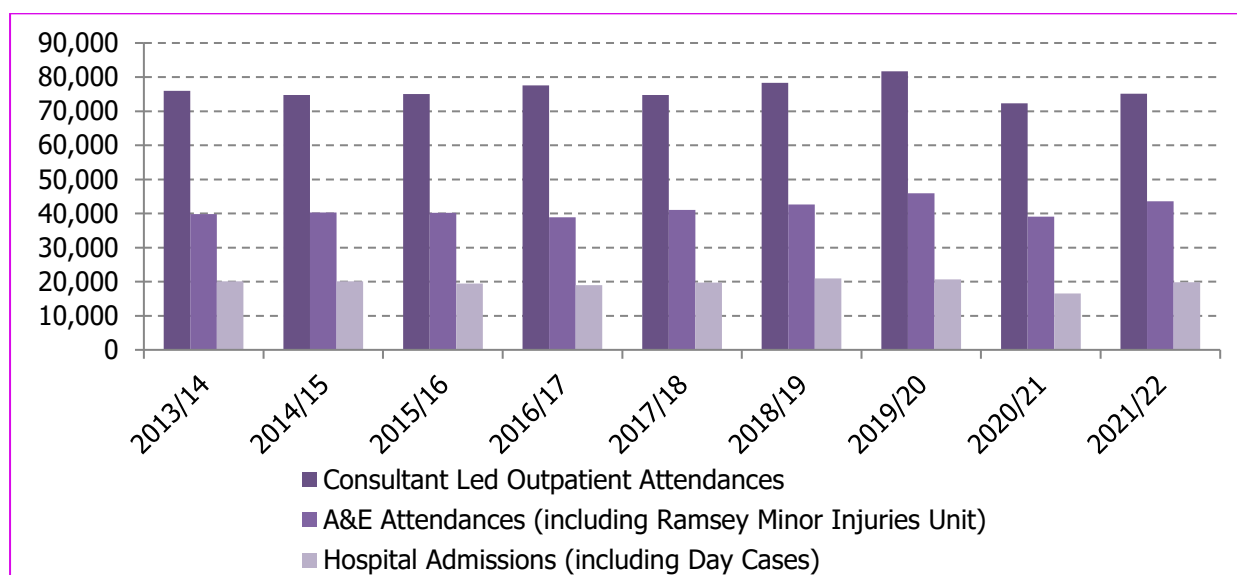

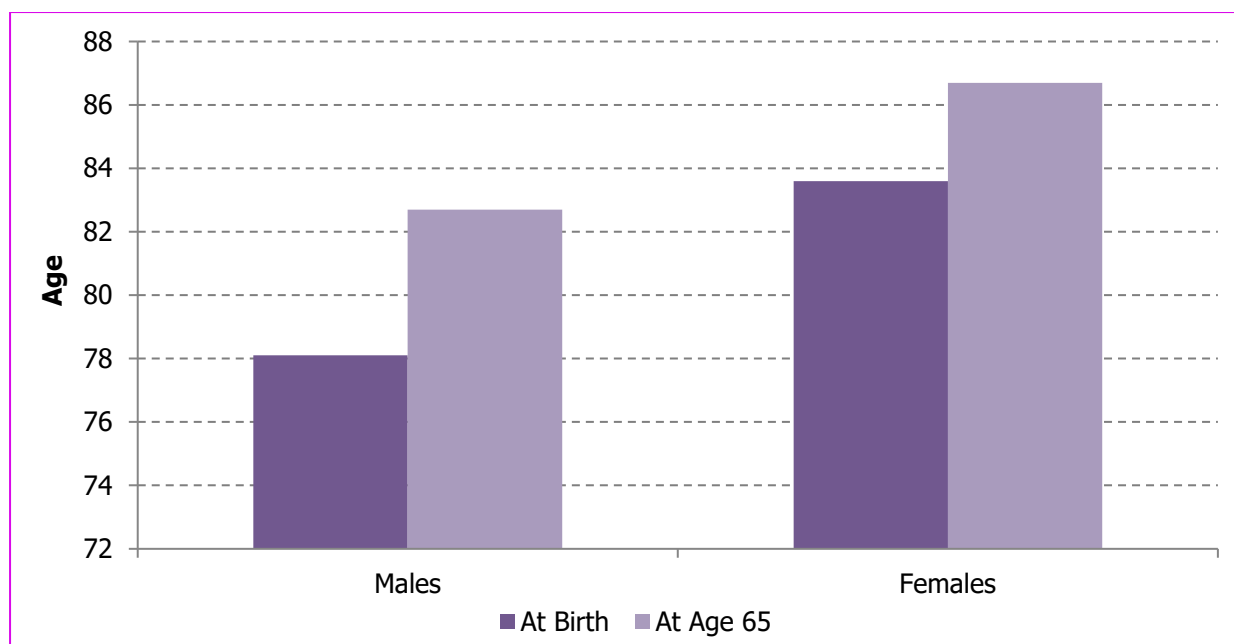
**Figure 41 Noble's and Ramsey Cottage Hospital Activity (excluding Private Patients)**

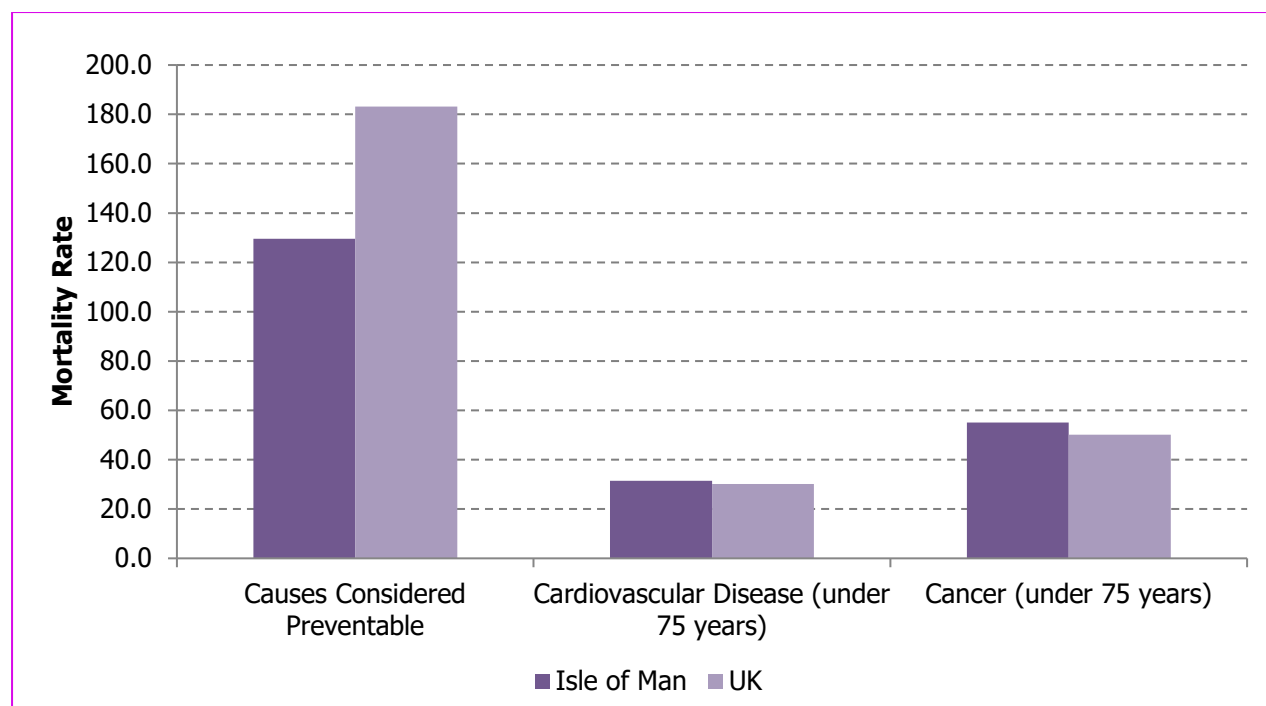
**Figure 42 Life Expectancy**

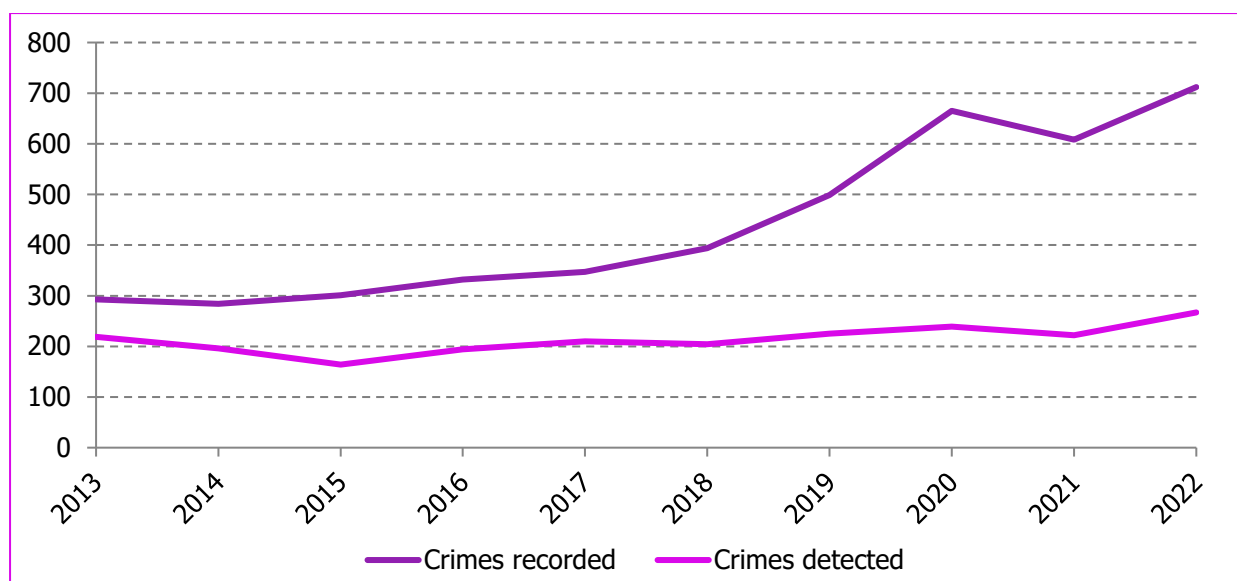

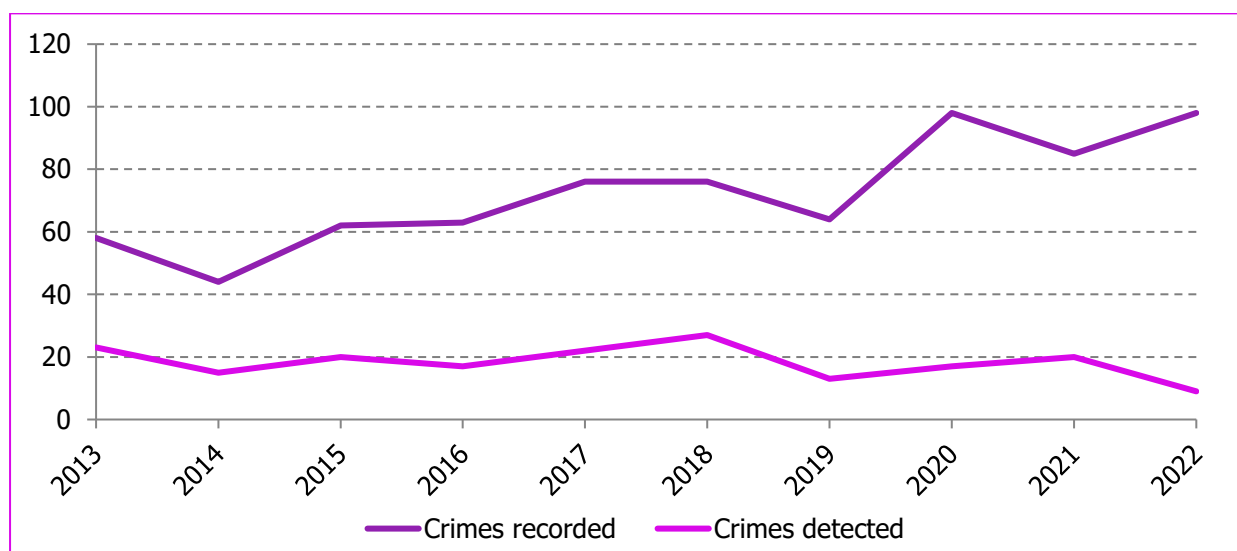
**Figure 44 Offences against the Person**

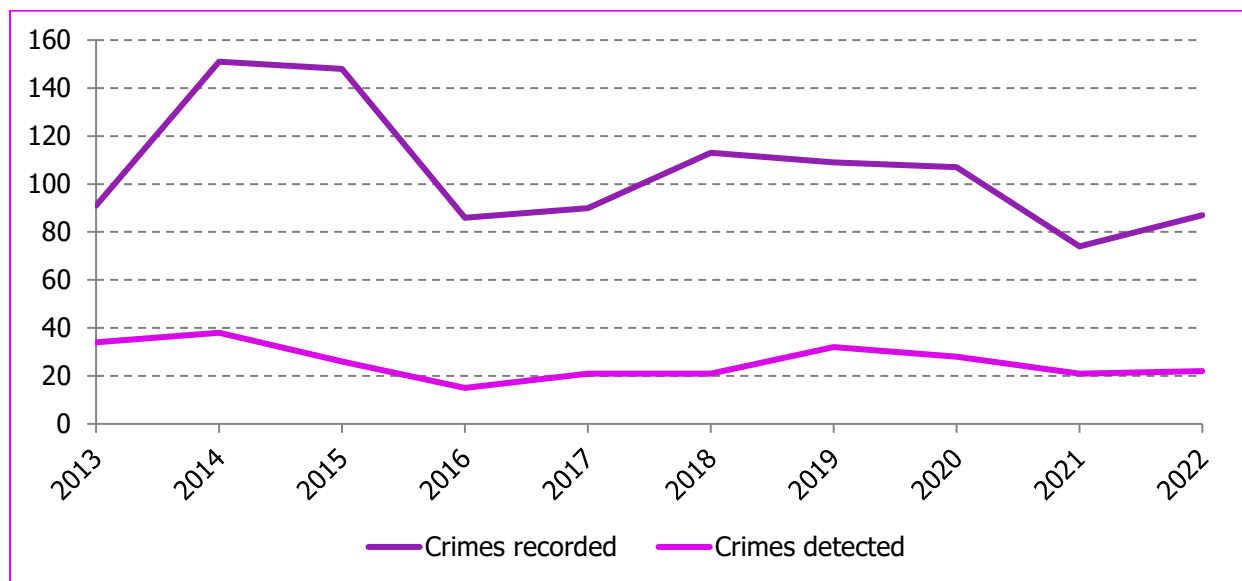
**Figure 45 Sexual Offences**

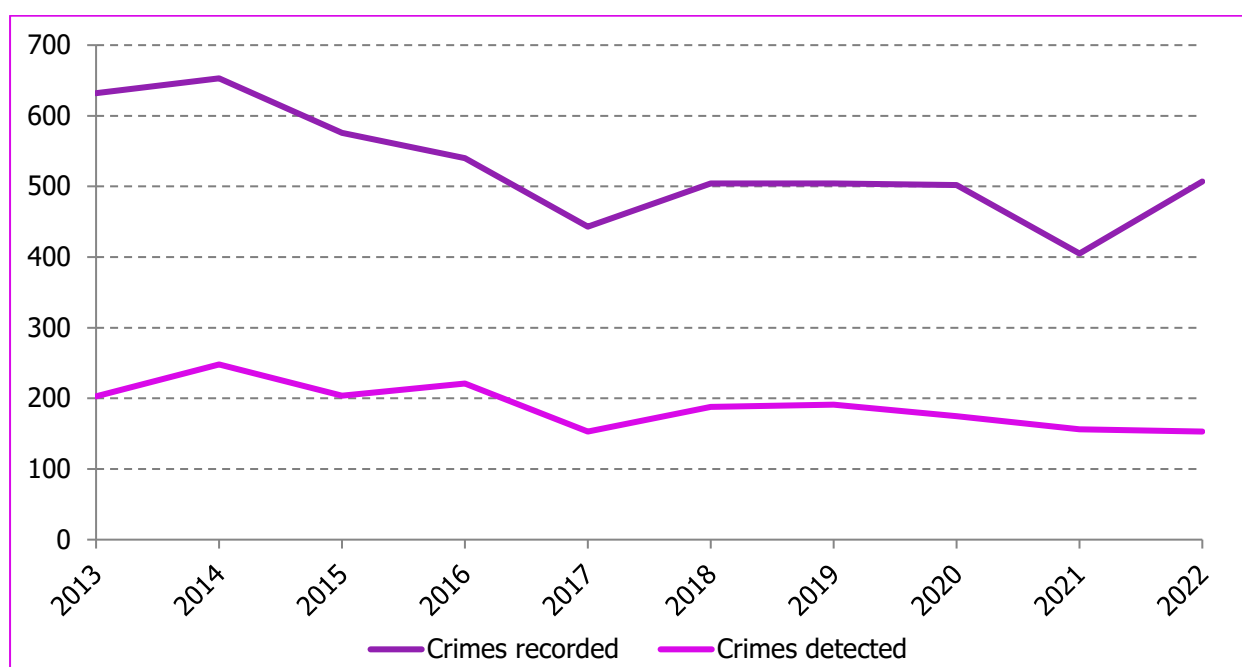
**Figure 46 Burglary Offences**

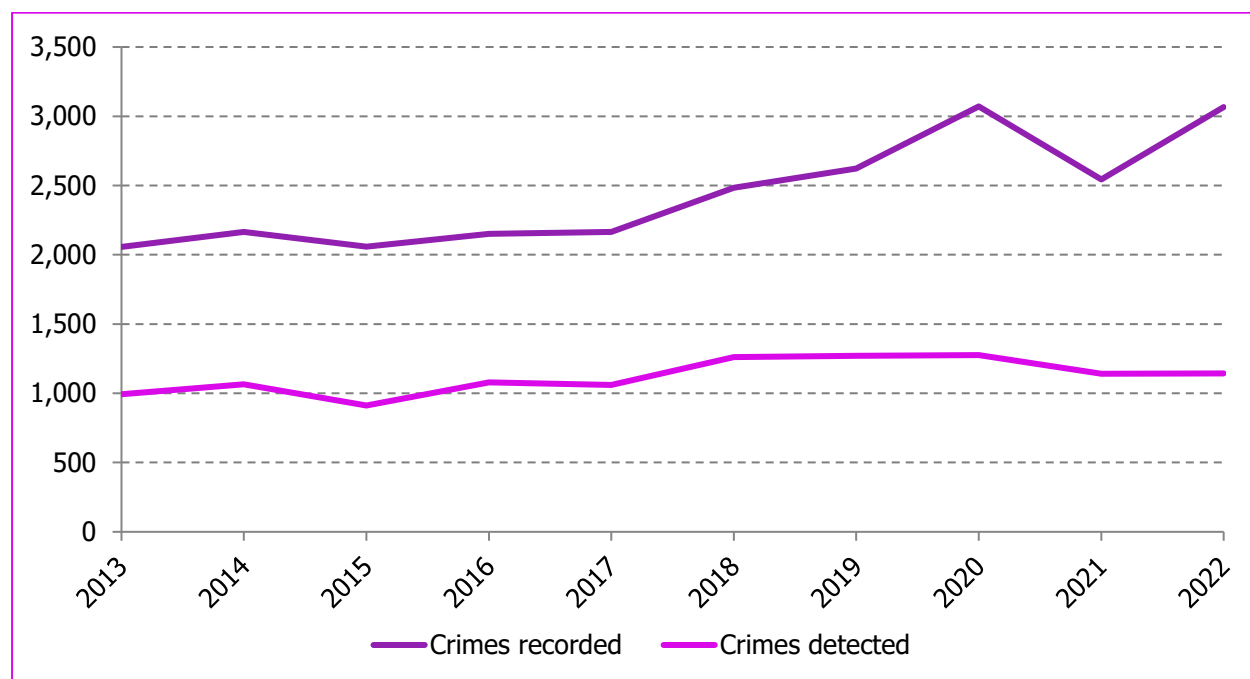
**Figure 47 Theft Offences**

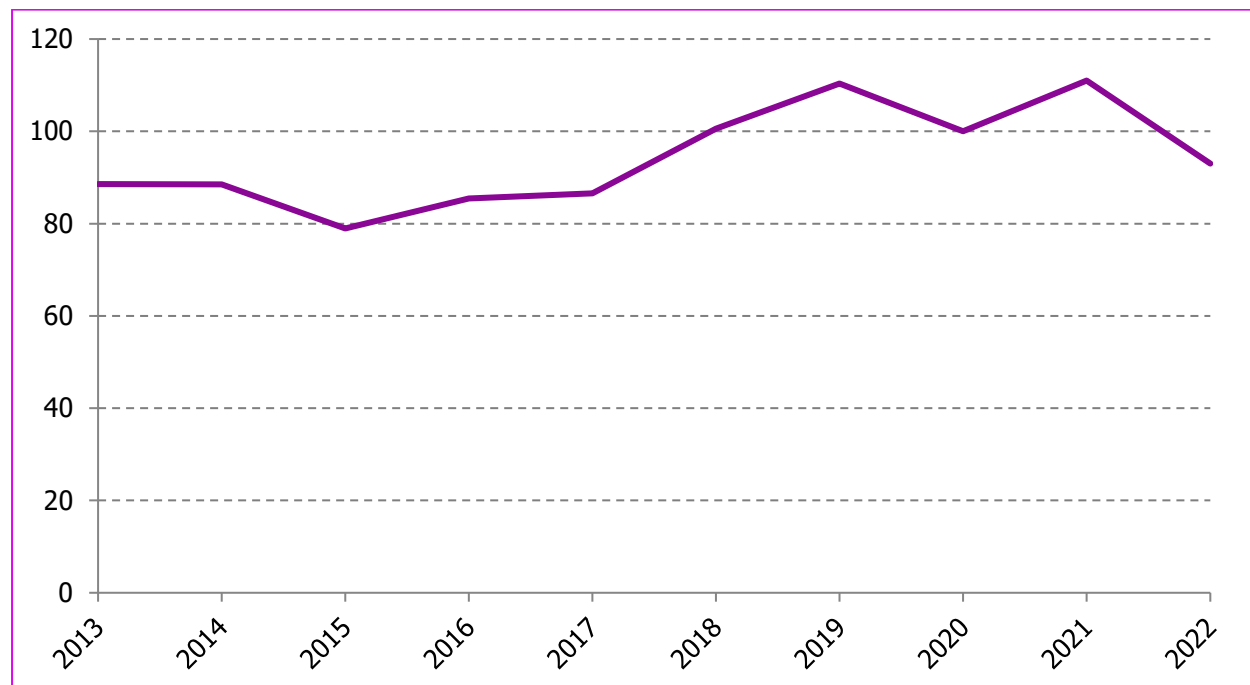
**Figure 48 Total Offences**

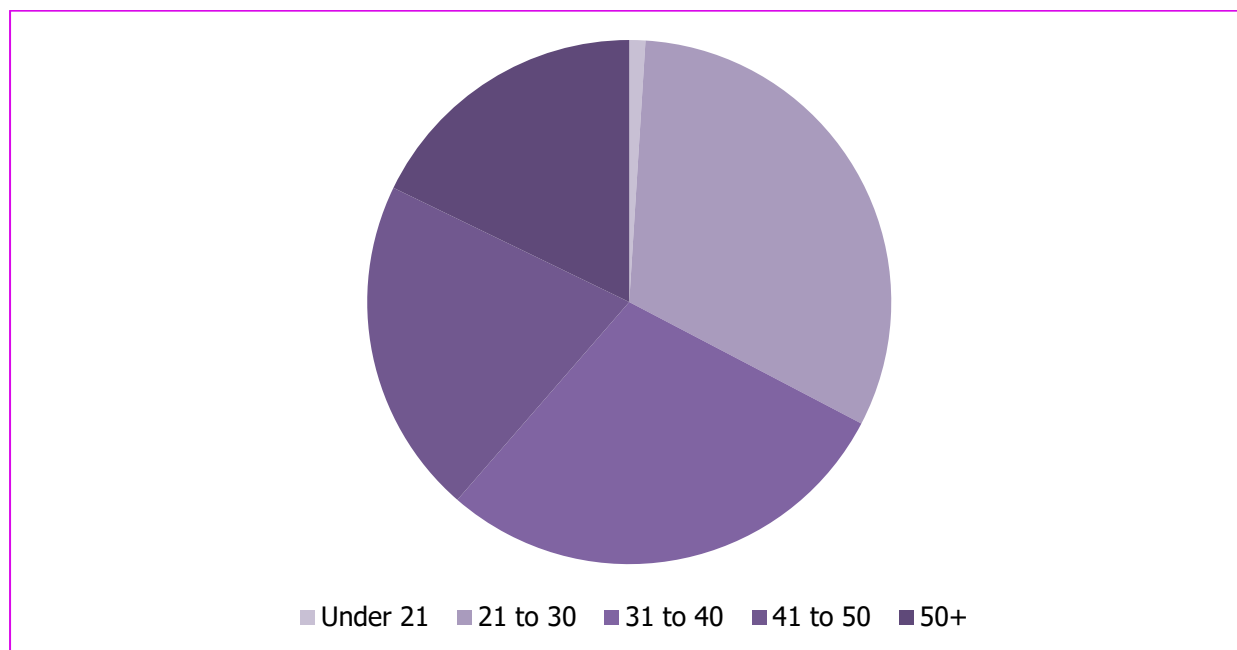
**Figure 49 Average Prison Population**

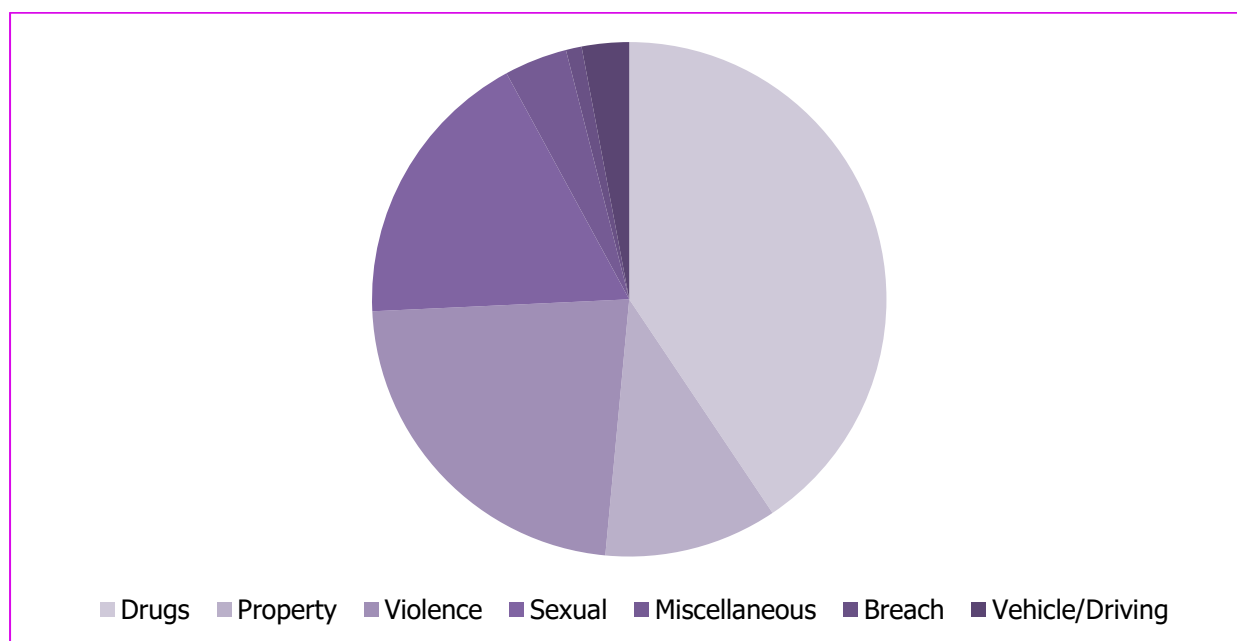
**Figure 50 December 2022 Prison Population by Age**

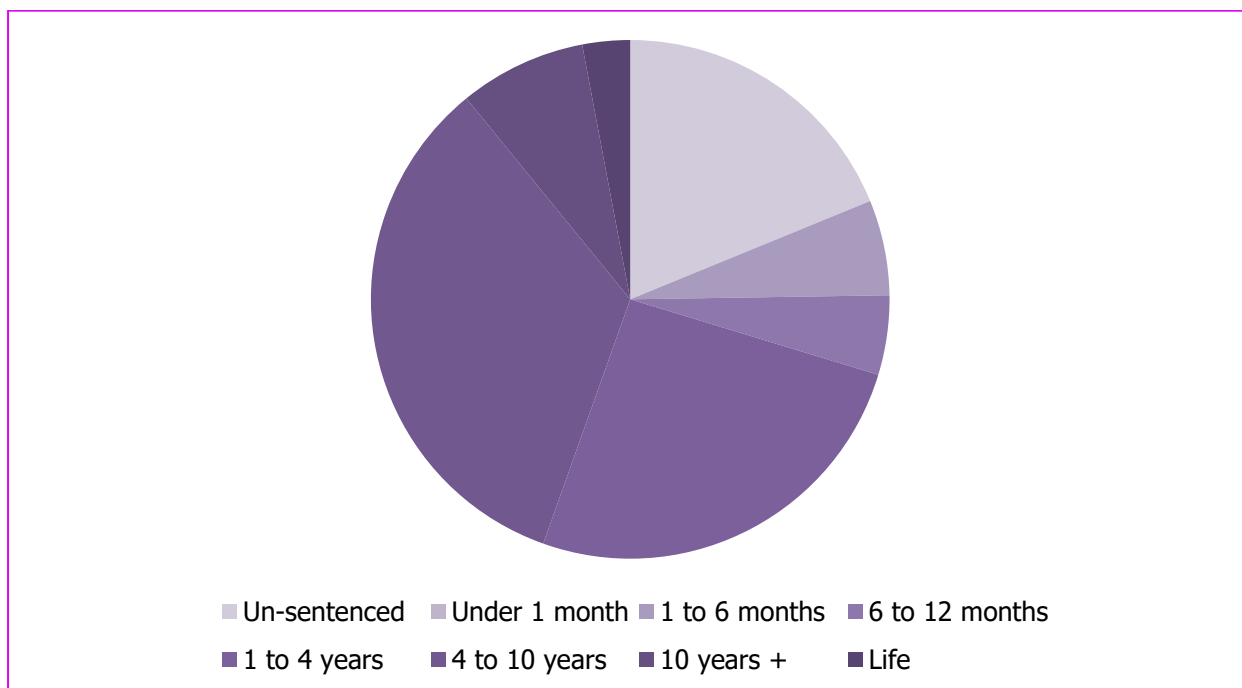
**Figure 51 December 2022 Prison Population by Offence**

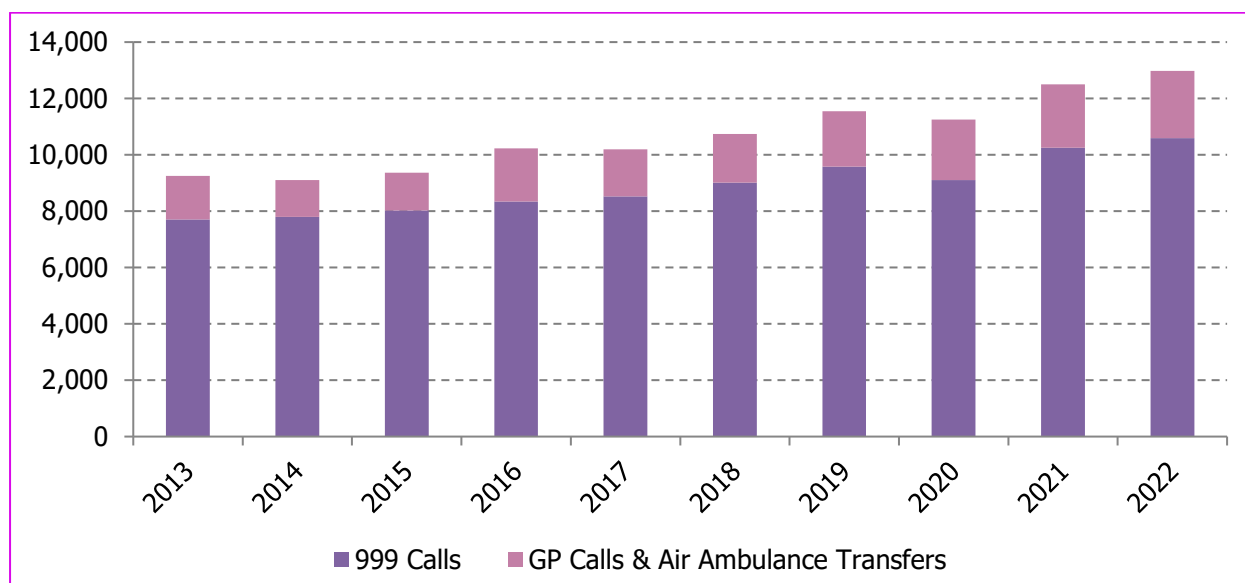

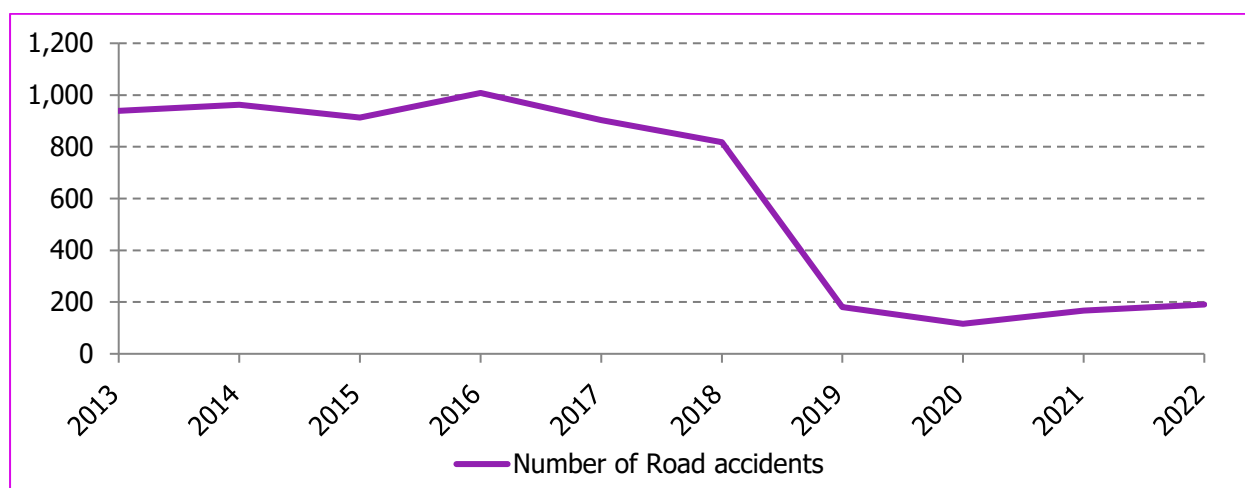
**Figure 53 Ambulance Emergency calls**

**Figure 54 Number of Road Accidents**



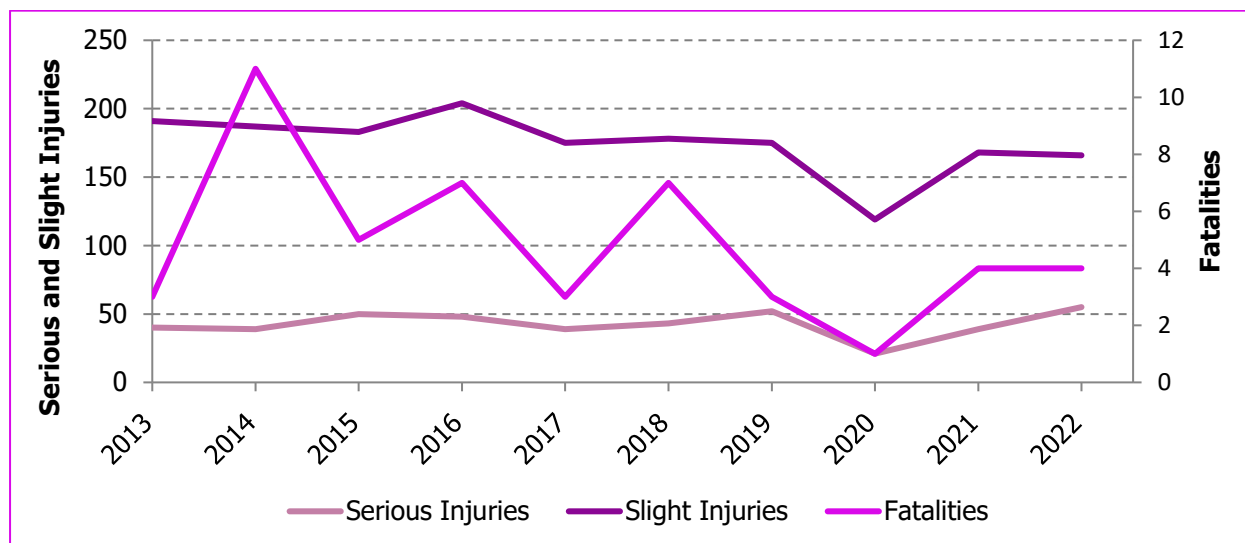

**Figure 55 Injuries Sustained in Vehicle Accidents by Type**

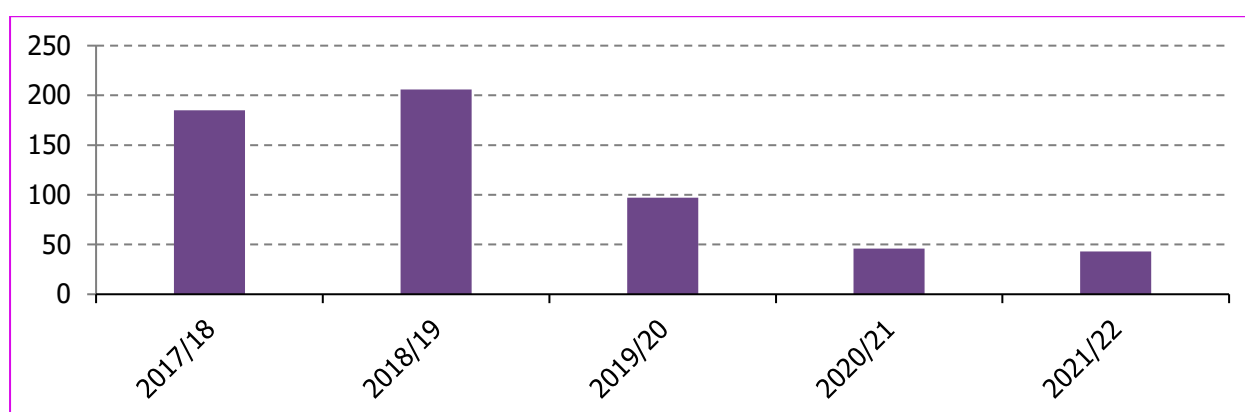

**Figure 56 Debt Counselling New Clients**

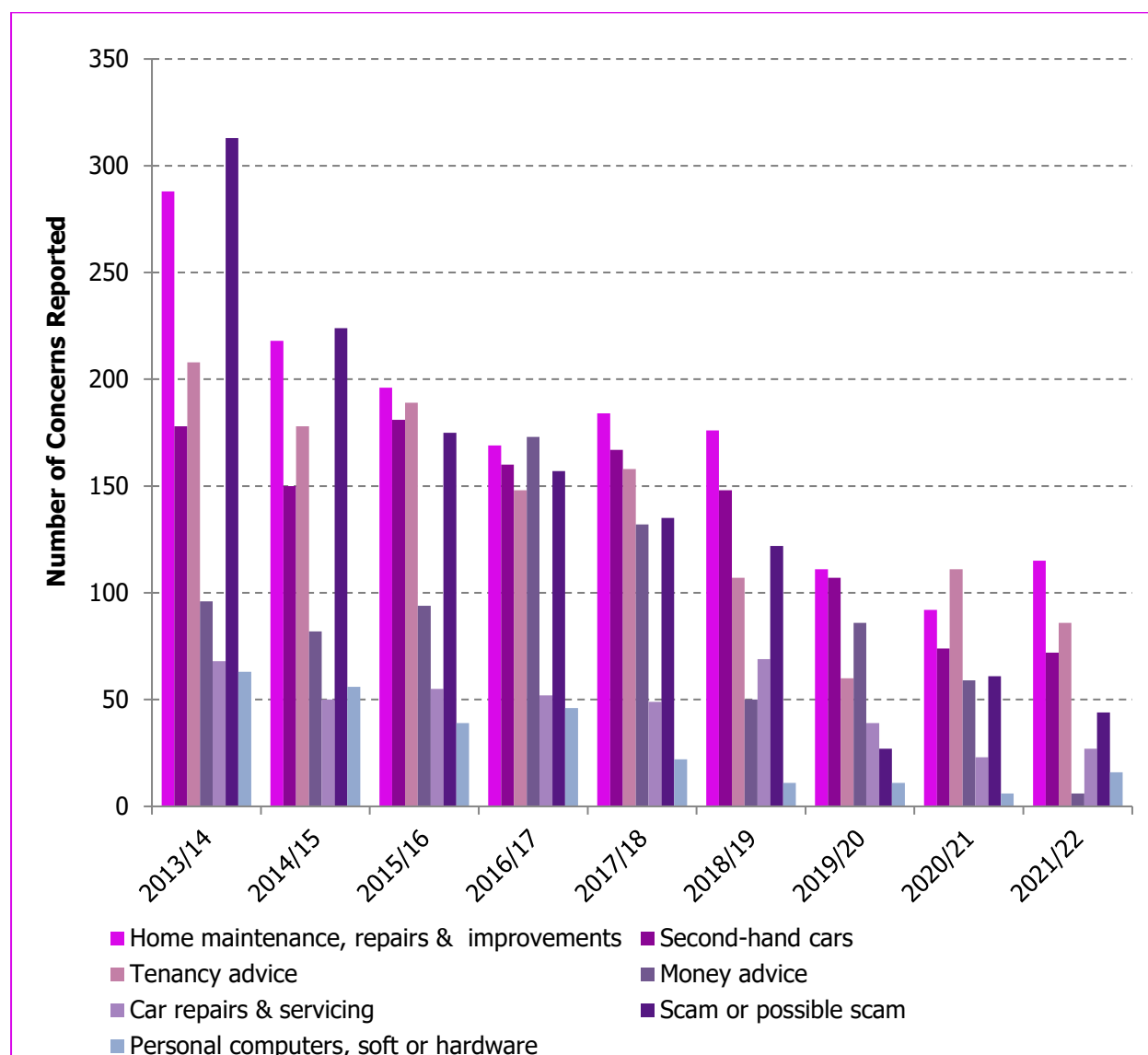

**Figure 57 Consumer Concerns Recorded by the OFT - Subject Matters Consistently in the Top 10**



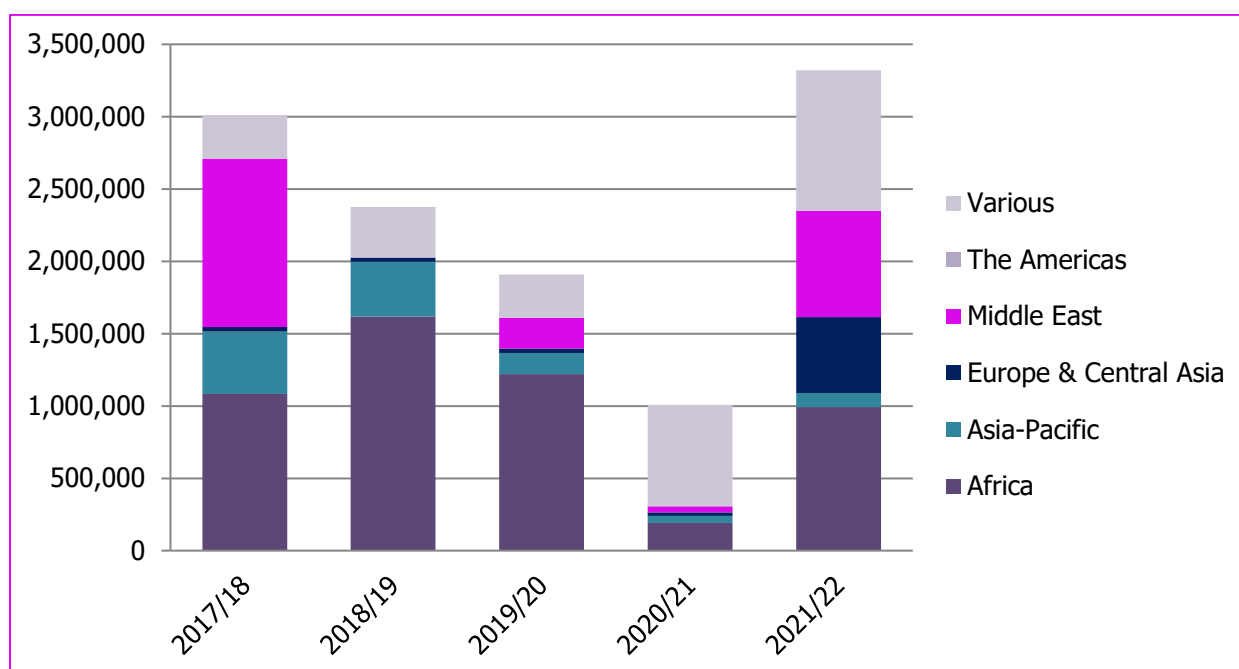

In 2021/22 there were 115 complaints regarding home maintenance, repairs and improvements, 72 regarding second hand cars, 86 regarding tenancy advice, 6 regarding money advice, 27 regarding car repairs and servicing, 44 regarding scams or possible scams and 16 regarded personal computers, software or hardware.

"Money advice" does not include advice provided to clients of the OFT's debt counselling service.

The Council of Ministers agreed in February 2017 to support the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) through a one-off donation of £973,000 to provide aid and humanitarian assistance to Syrian refugees in neighbouring countries.

This donation was made in the 2017- 2018 financial year and was provided by £654,953 which was accrued from the 2016-2017 budget, and the remaining amount of £318,047 originating out of the transition from the multi-year grant funding to the newly created International Development Partnerships budget.

Note: The annual budget for International Development since the 2018/19 financial year has been £2.5m. However, the actual amount expended during a financial year may fluctuate due to payments being staggered or delayed. The above information reflects actual expenditure in each financial year.

Total expenditure in 2020/21 was lower than budgeted due to the Covid-19 pandemic. All unspent funds at the end of the financial year were re-allocated or accrued into the 2021/22 budget to cover the cost of postponed projects due to Covid-19.

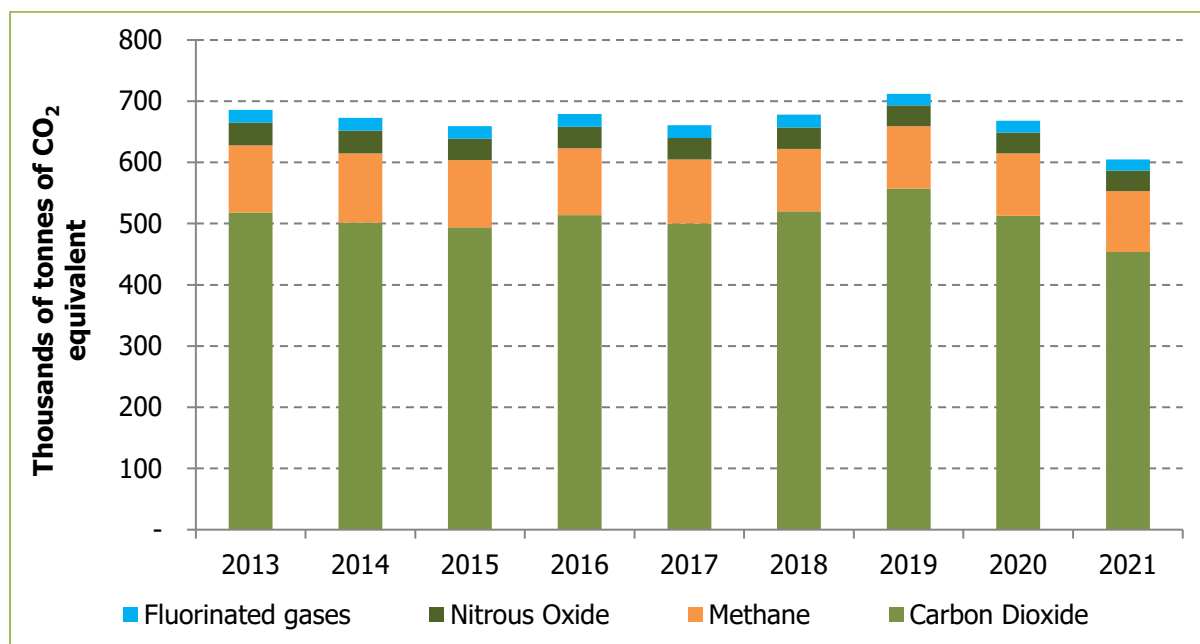

Figure 59 Greenhouse Gas Emissions, by Type



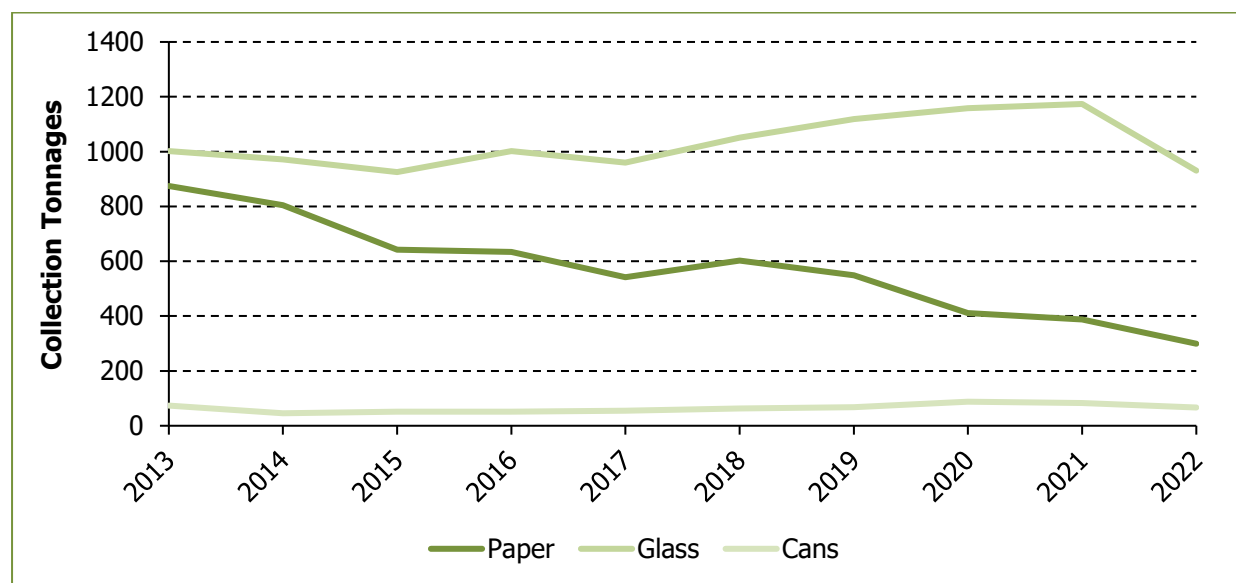

The most recent data available concerning emissions on the Isle of Man relates to 2021. In March 2013, the Isle of Man adopted a target to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions by 80% by 2050, which is in line with targets in the United Kingdom. In 2021, the Isle of Man produced 453.85 kilotonnes of CO<sub>2</sub>, 99.02 kilotonnes of methane, 33.50 kilotonnes of nitrous oxide and 18.53 kilotonnes of fluorinated gases (hydrofluorocarbons and sulphur hexafluoride).

The data for previous years is updated each year, as the methodology for how the data is collected changes on an annual basis. Data for 2022 was not available at the time of publishing.

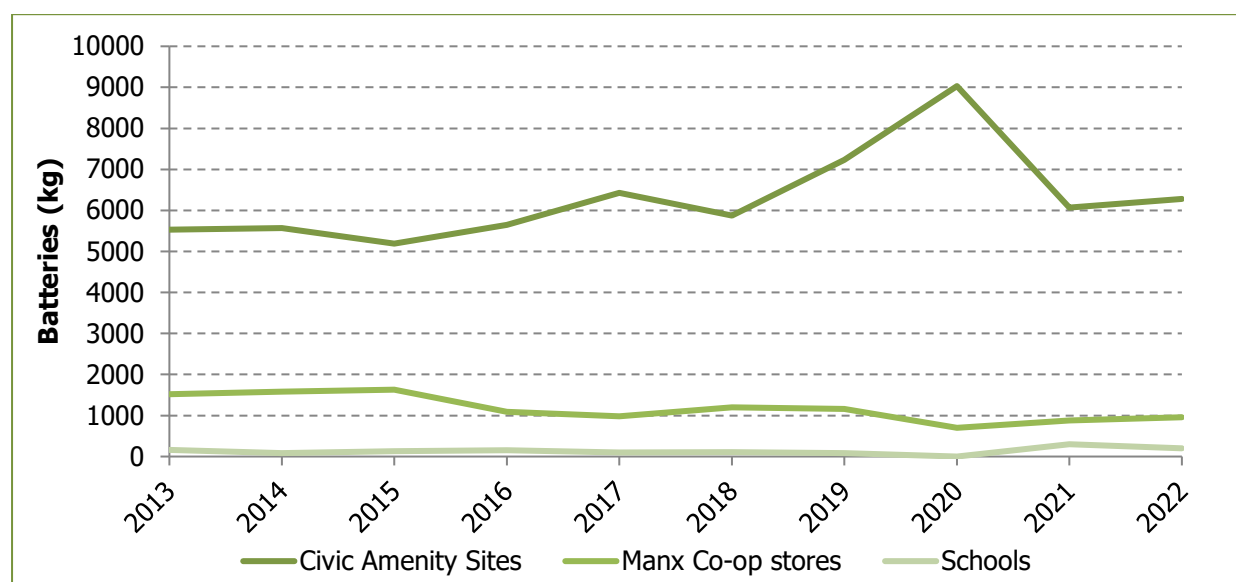
**Figure 60 Tonnes of Materials Recycled Collected at Bring Banks**

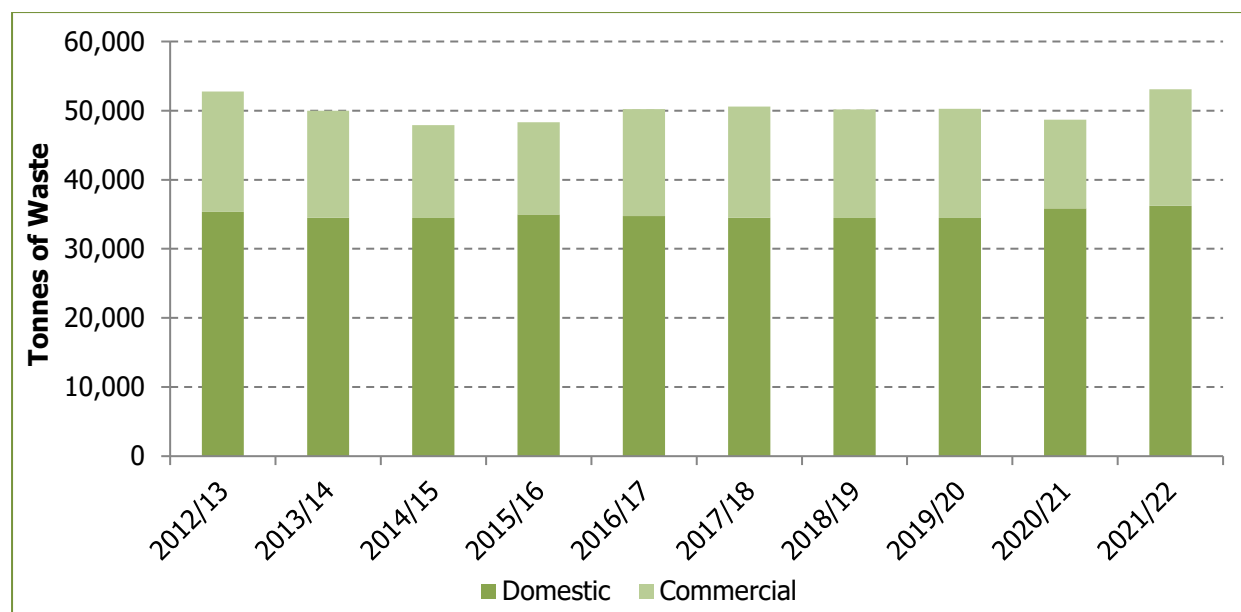
**Figure 61 Kilograms of Dry Cell (Household) Batteries Recycled by Collection**

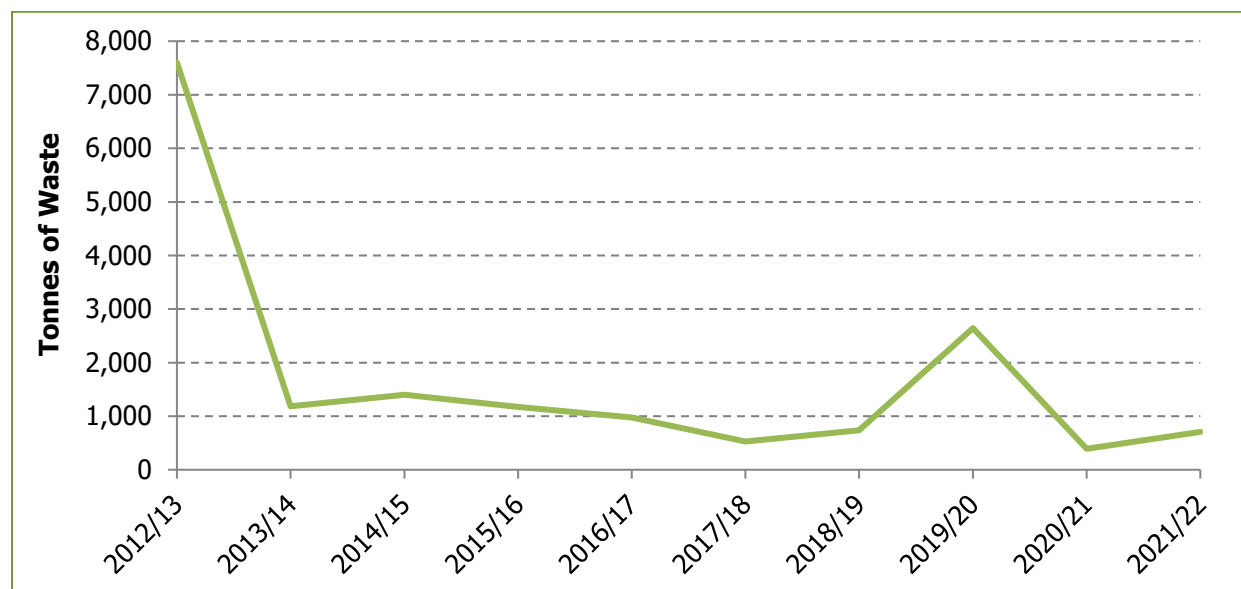
**Figure 62 Tonnes of Waste Processed at the Energy from Waste Plant**

**Figure 63 Tonnes of Waste Processed at the Wrights Pit North**



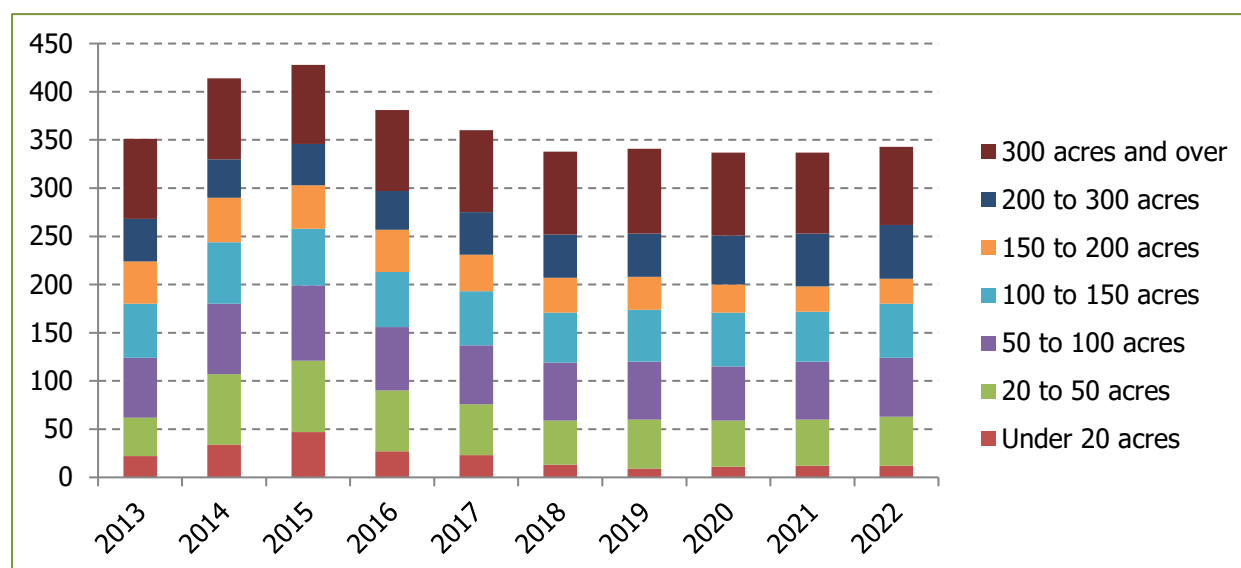

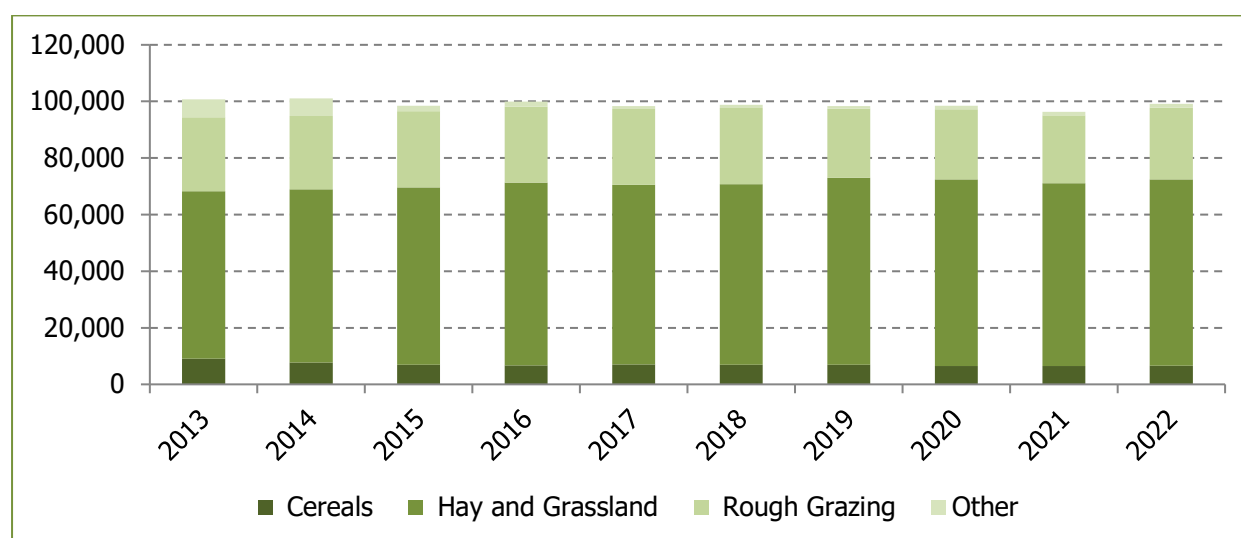
**Figure 64 Agricultural Land Holdings, by Size (acres)**

**Figure 65 Agricultural Land Use (acres)**

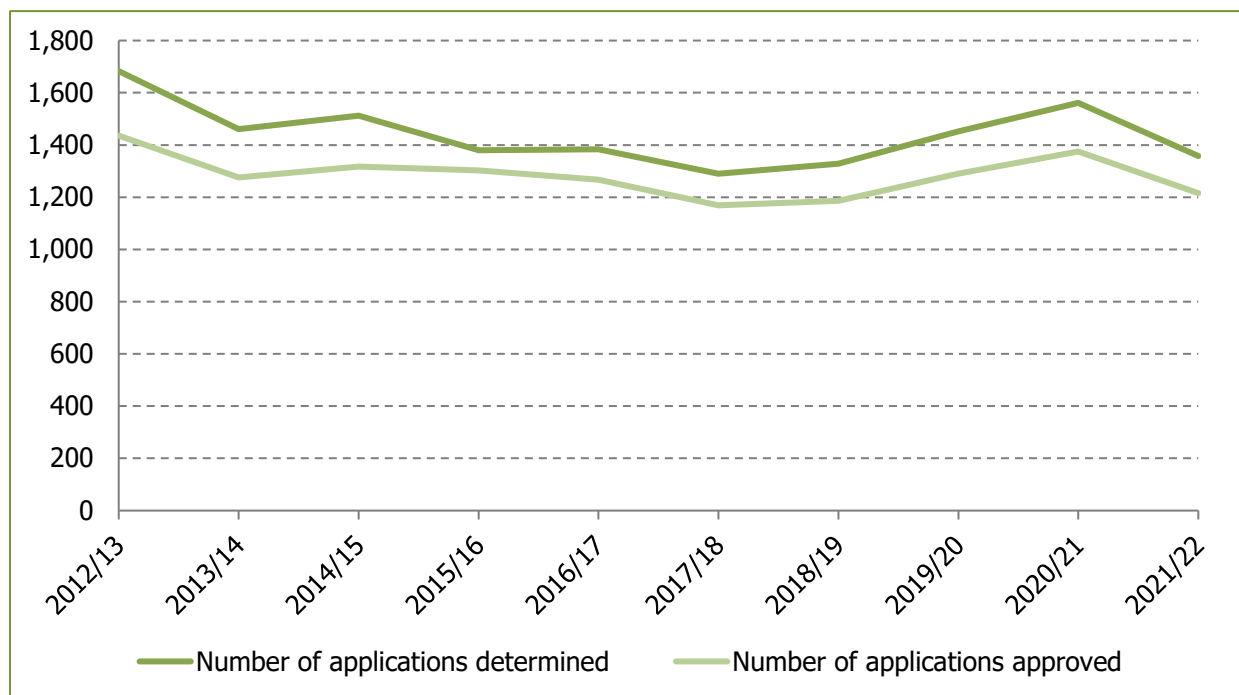

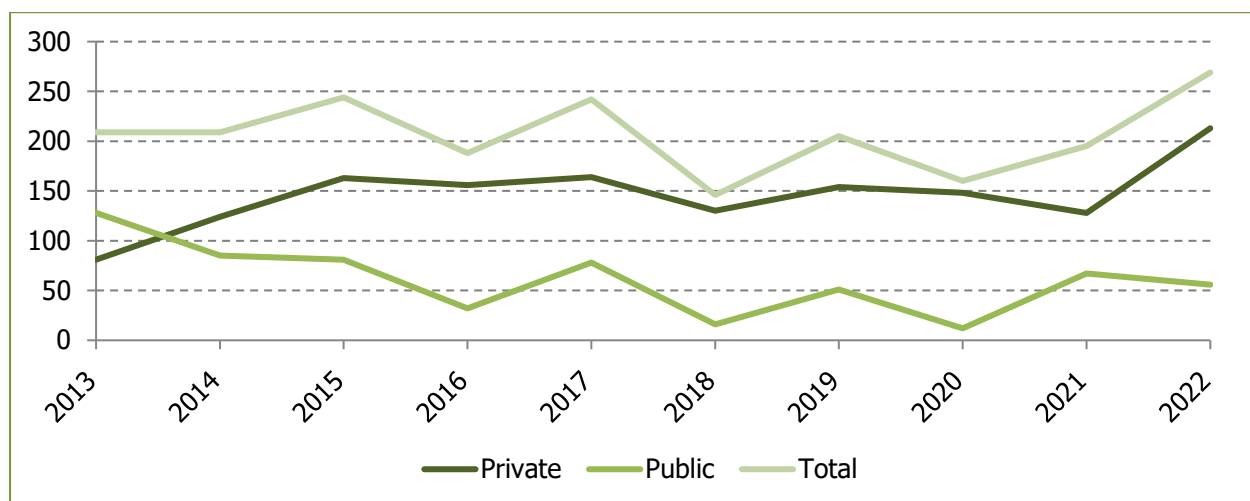
**Figure 66 Planning Applications Determined and Approved**

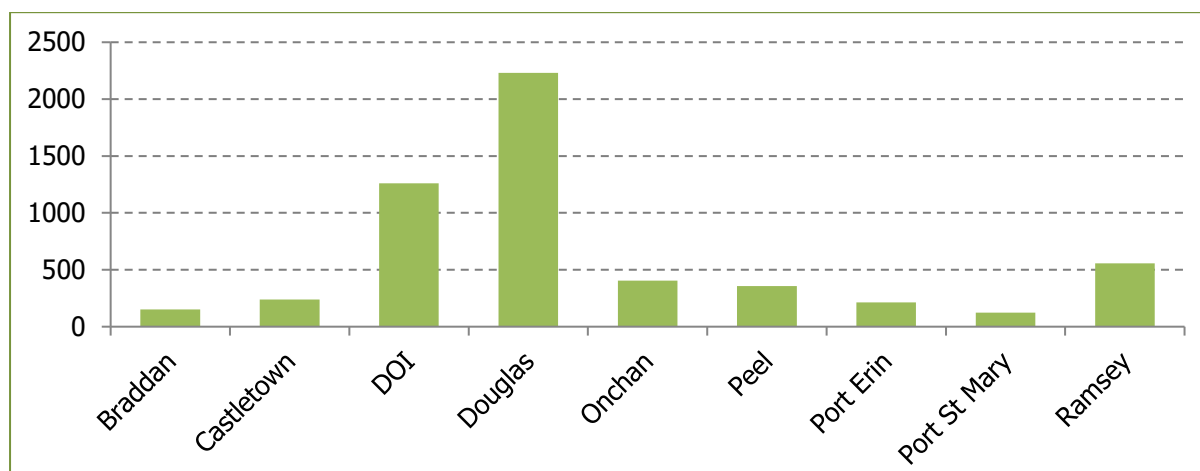

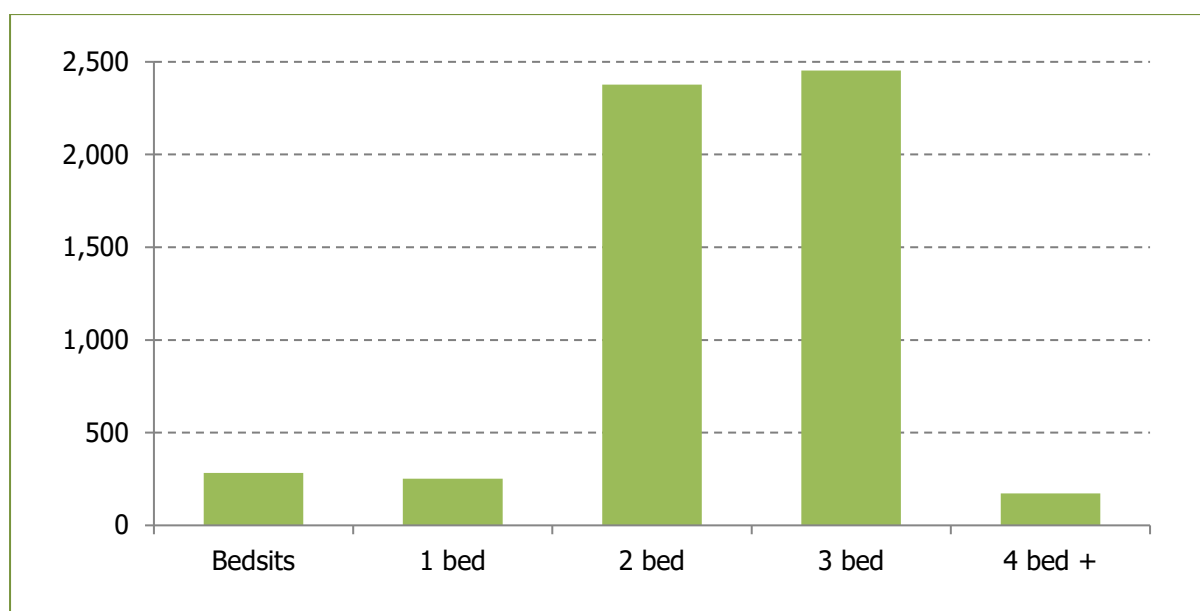
**Figure 68 2022 Local Authority Housing Stock by Location**

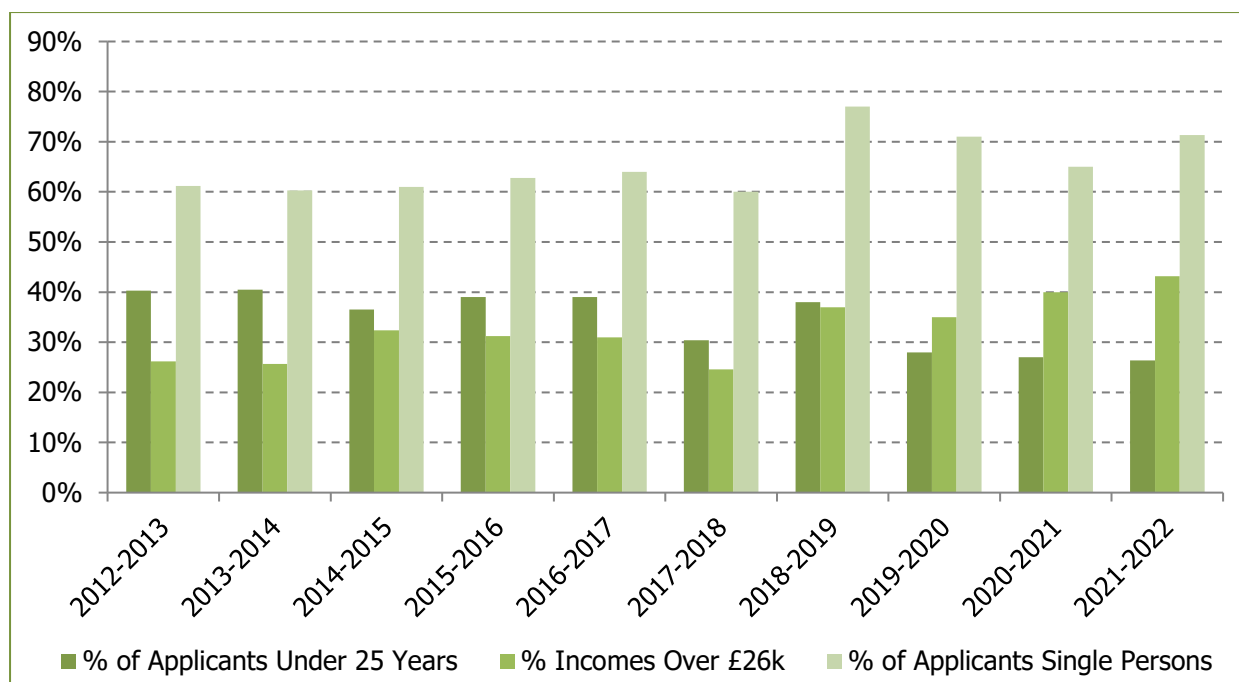

**Figure 70 House Purchase Assistance Applicant Demographics**

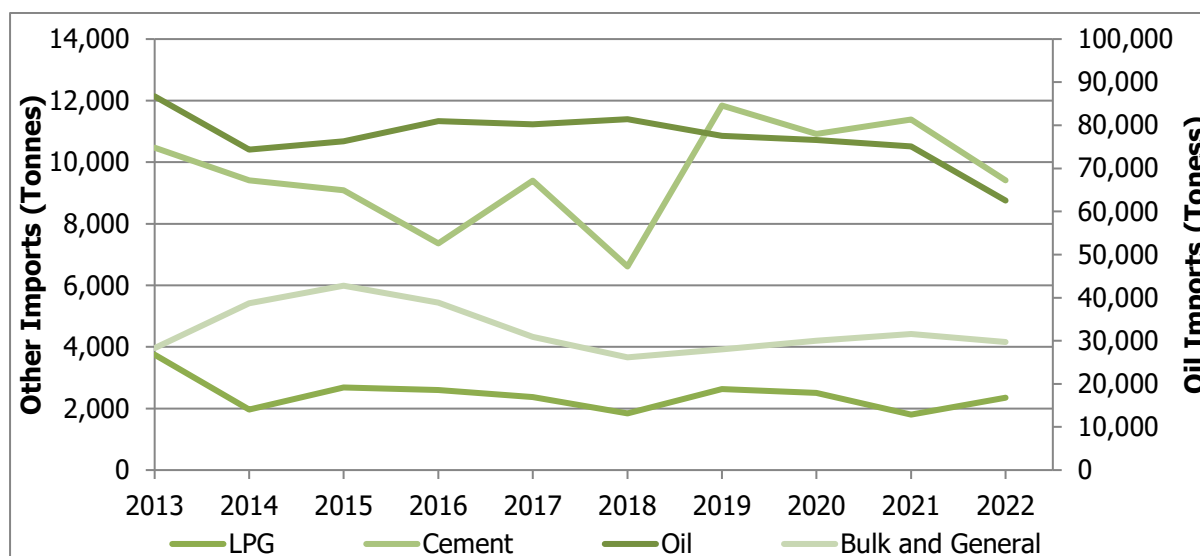

**Figure 71 Freight imports**

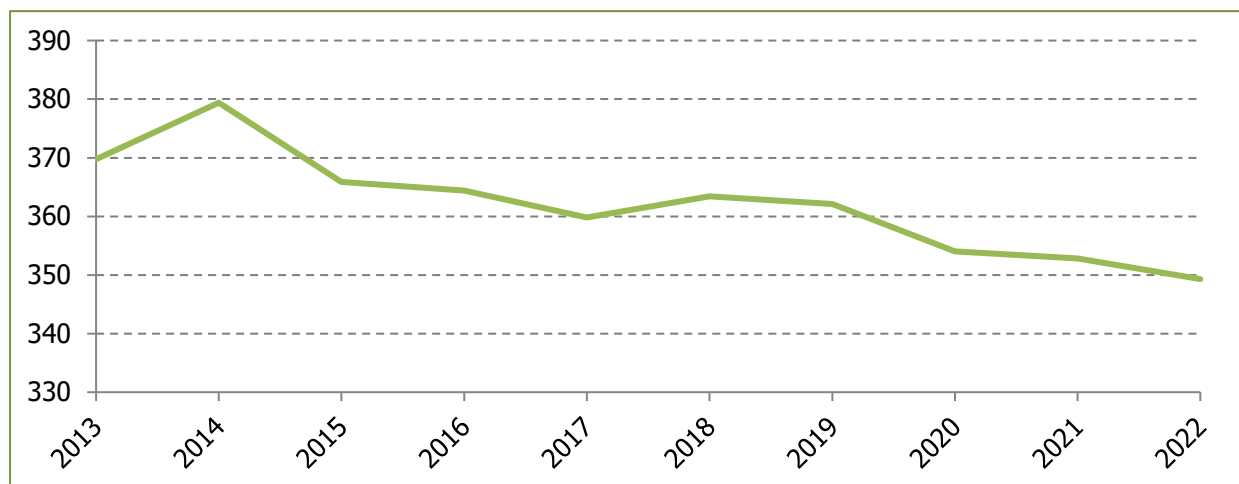

**Figure 72 Electricity: Units sold (GWH)**

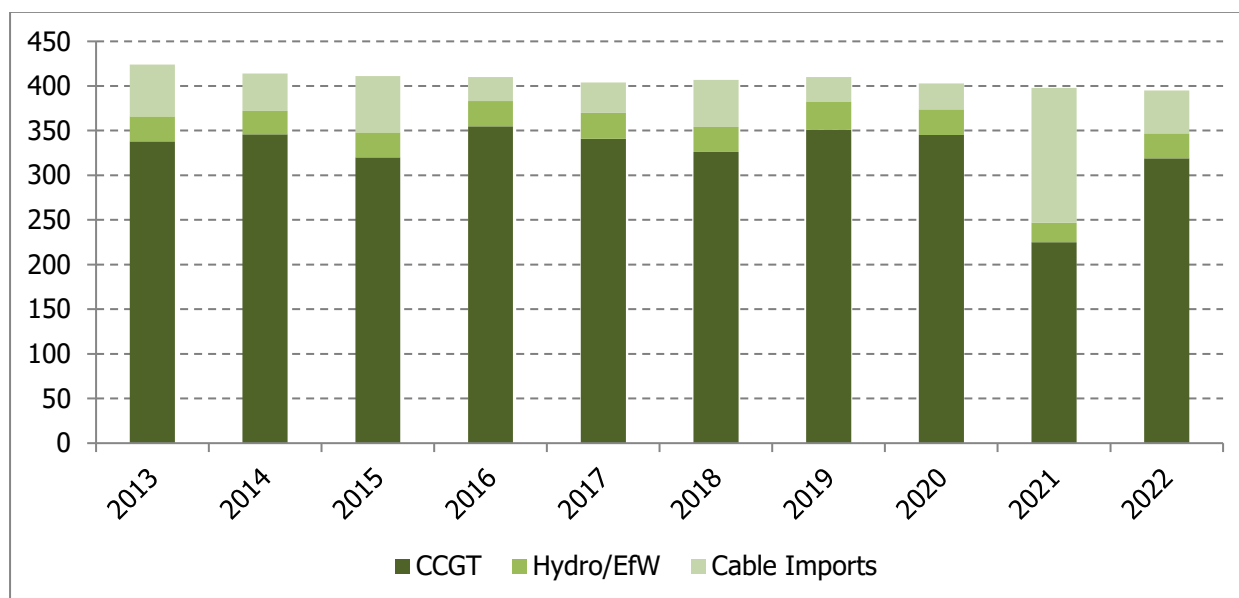

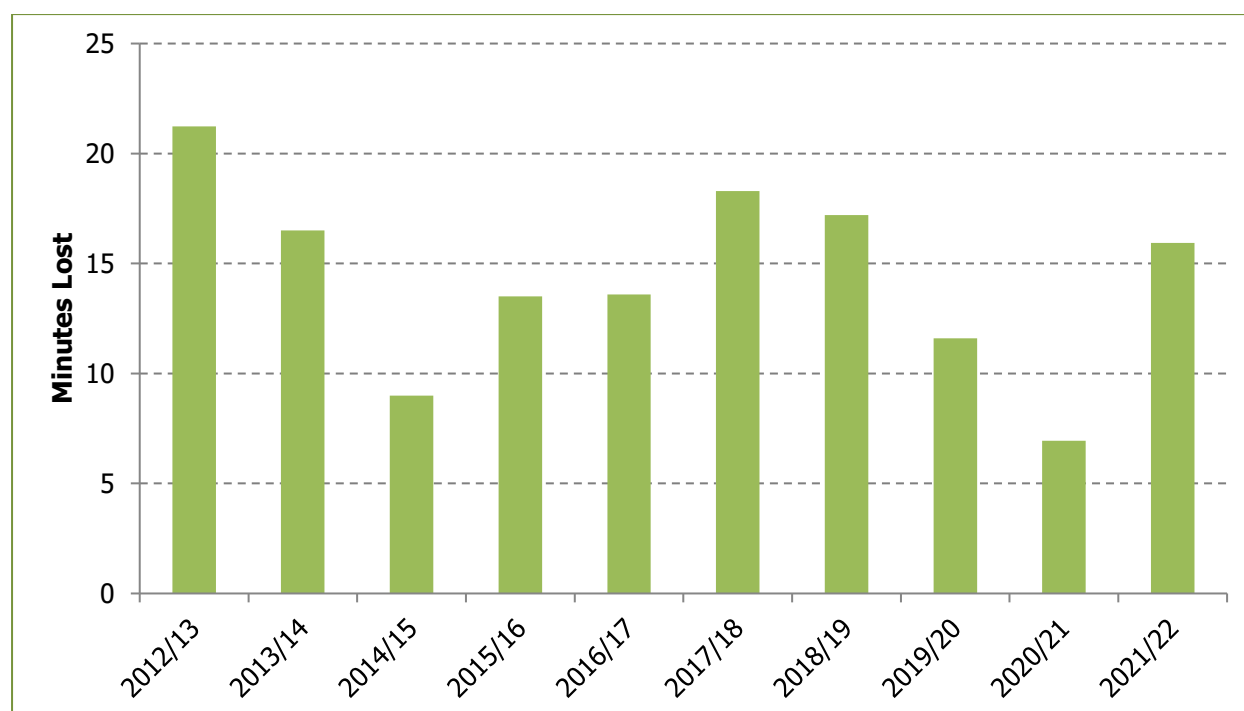
**Figure 74 Number of Electricity Customers, by Type**

**Figure 75 Number of Electricity Customer Minutes Lost**

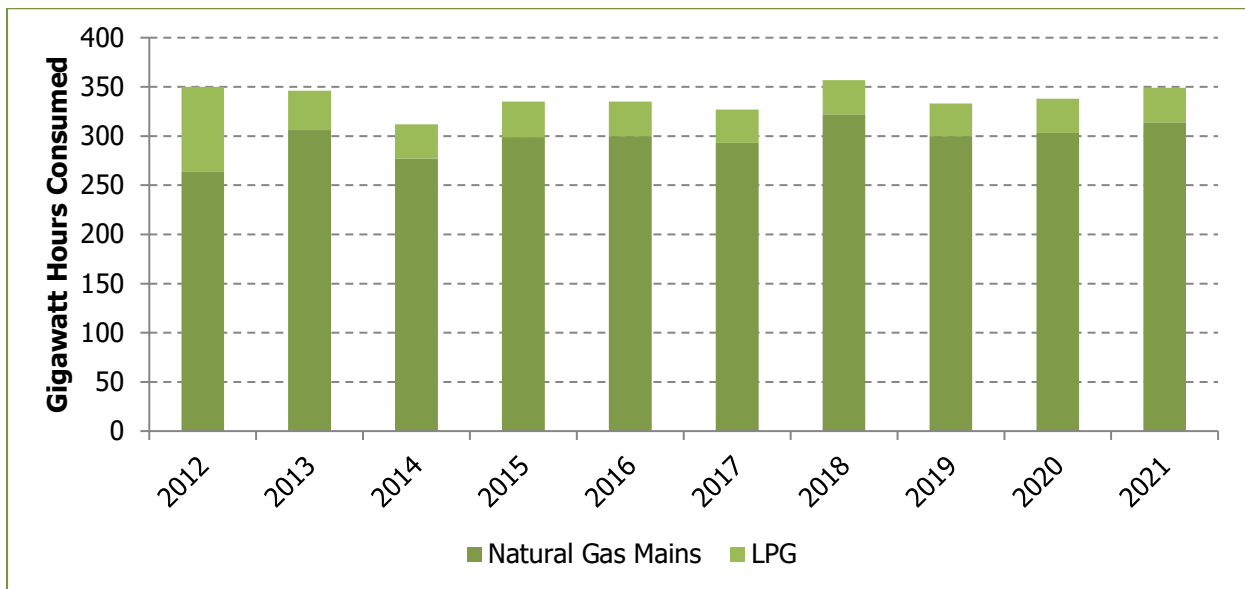

**Figure 76 Gas Consumption, by Type**

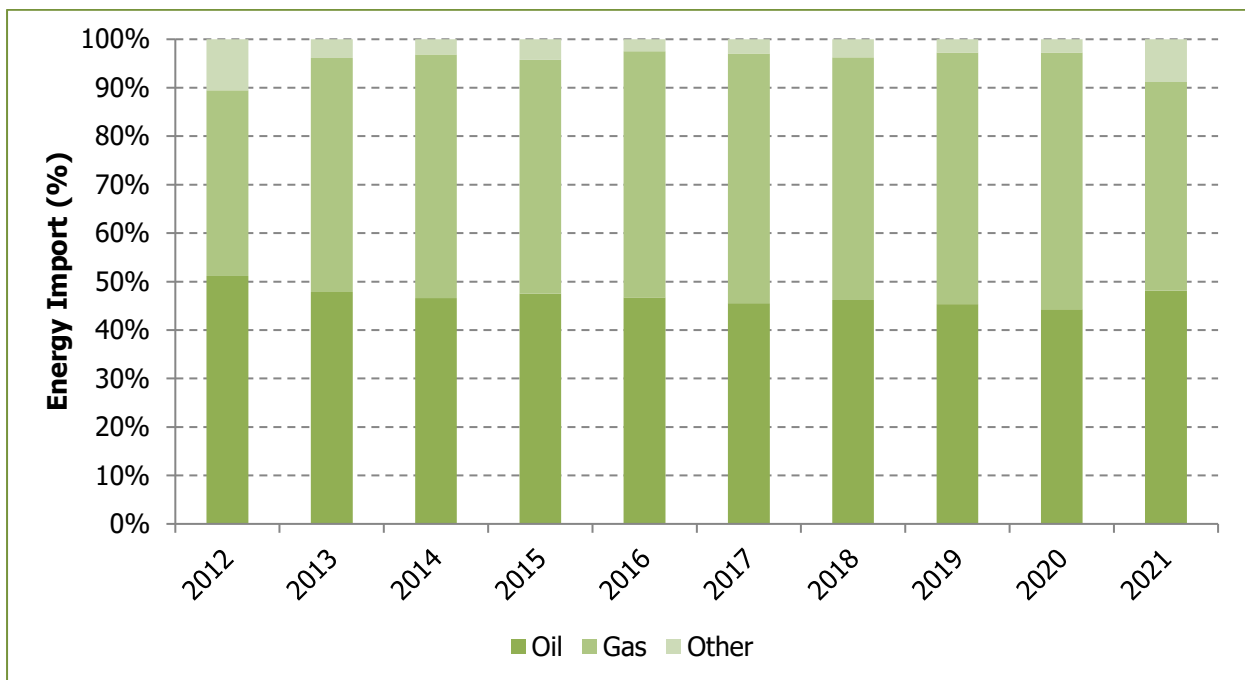

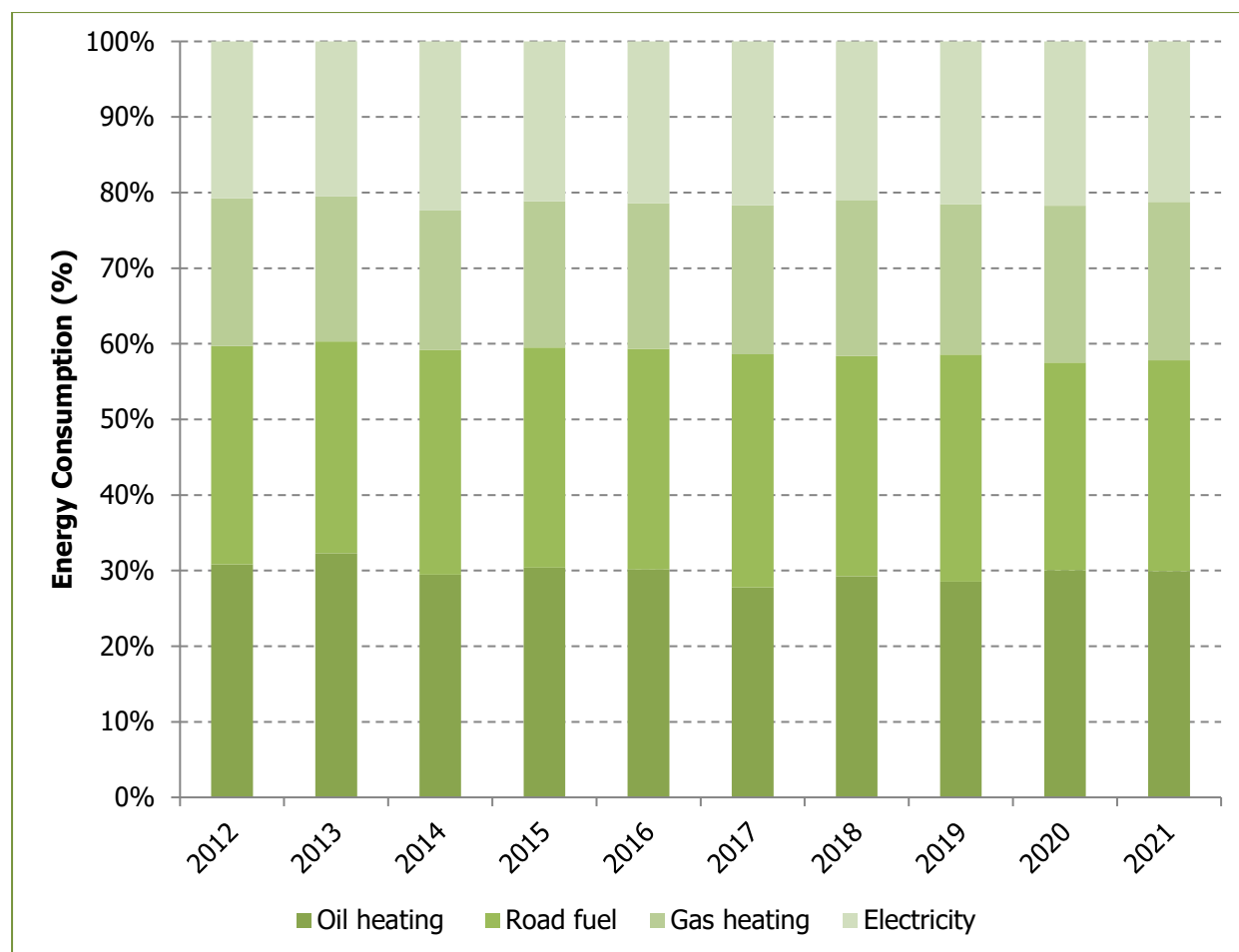
**Figure 77 Fuel Types Imported into the Island**

**Figure 78 Fuel Types Consumed on Island**

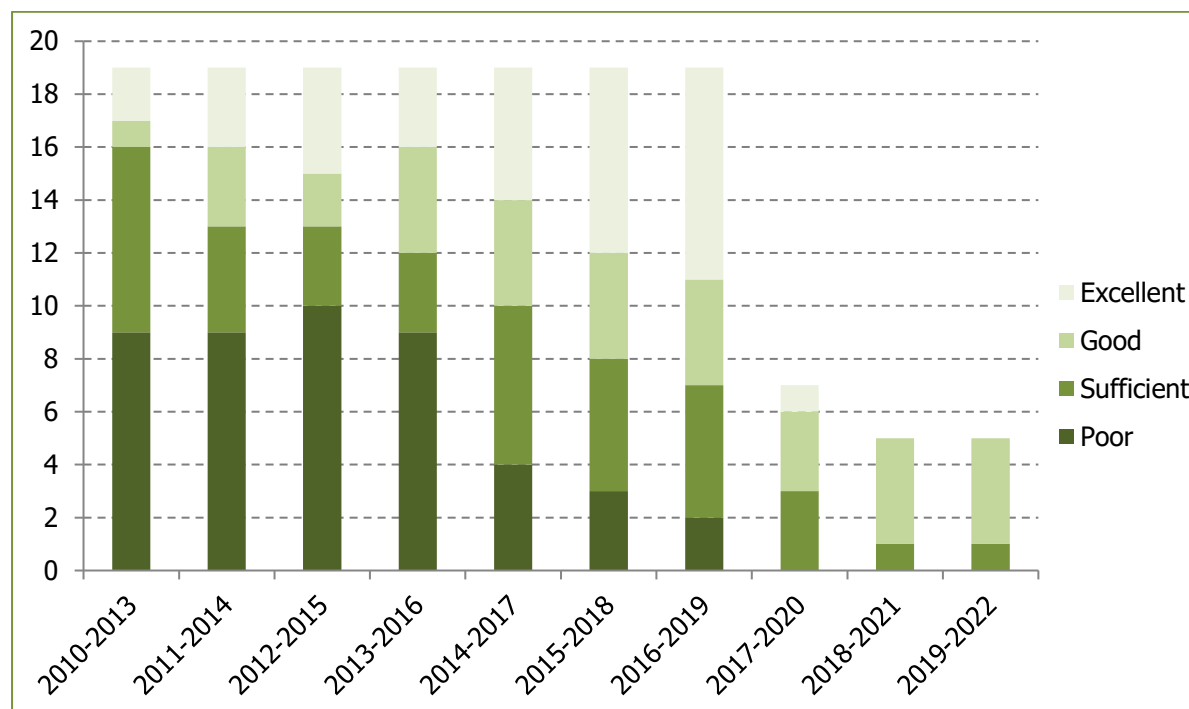

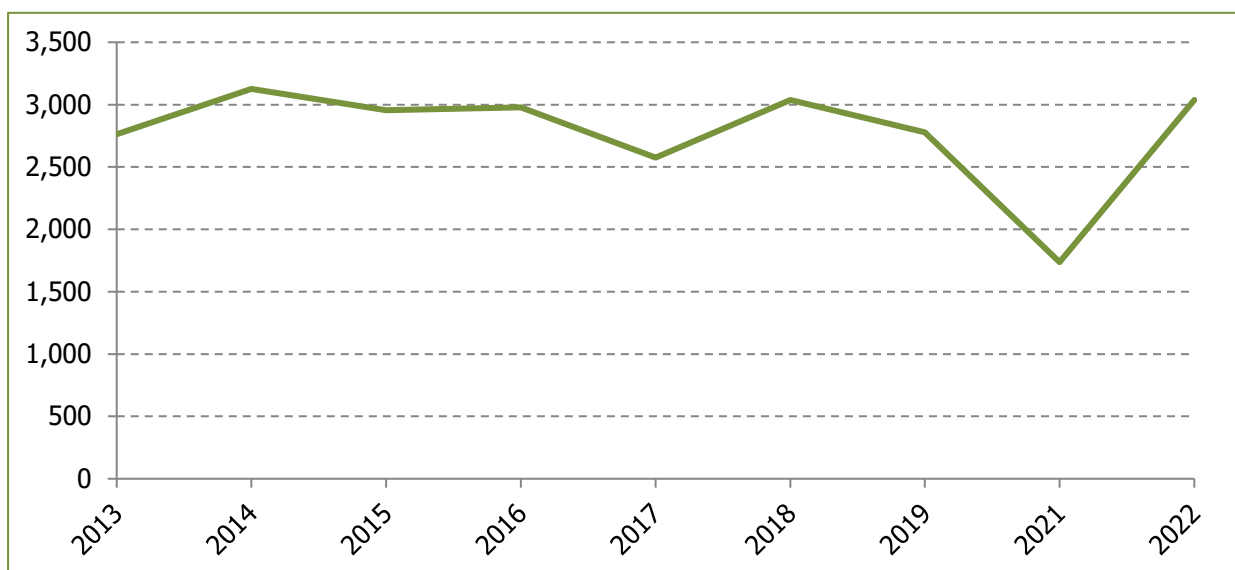

Under the assessment period of 2019-2022, no beaches on the Isle of Man were deemed to have poor bathing water quality under the European Parliament directive, with one being deemed as sufficient, four as good and none as excellent.

Because of COVID the bathing water monitoring was reduced significantly in 2020, and from 2021 there was a reduction in the number of samples as there are now only five designated beaches. Samples were collected on a weekly basis from Port Erin, Port St Mary, Douglas Central, Ramsey South and Castletown.

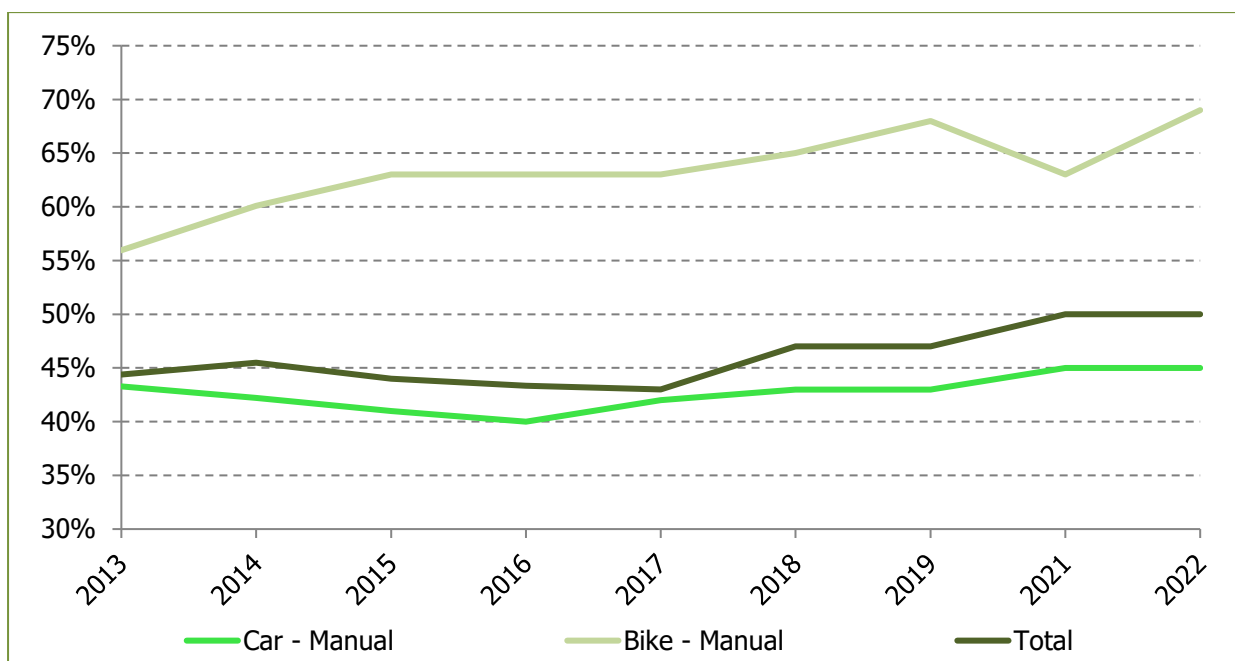
**Figure 80 Numbers of Driving Tests Taken**

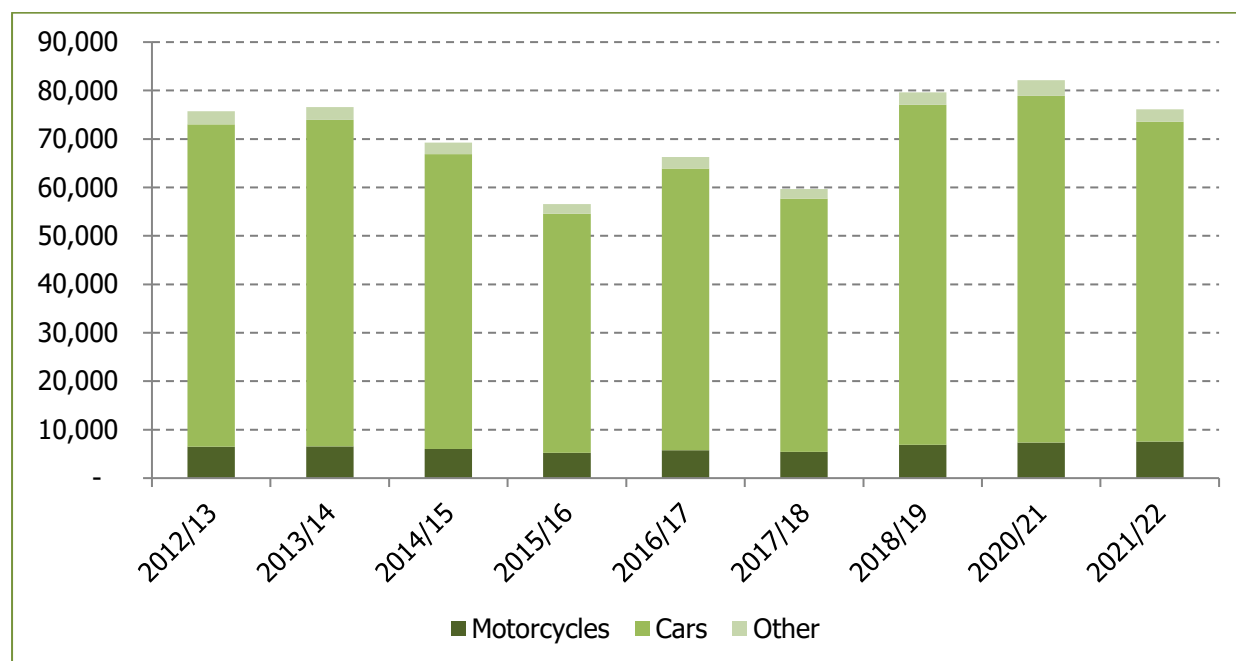
**Figure 81 Driving Test pass rates by Vehicle**
