HARBOUR (DUES AND CHARGES) (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS 2024

Approved by Tynwald:20 March 2024Coming into Operation in accordance with Regulation 2

The Department of Infrastructure makes the following Regulations under sections 38 and 39 of the Harbours Act 2010.

1 Title

These Regulations are the Harbour (Dues and Charges) (Amendment) Regulations 2024.

2 Commencement

These Regulations come into operation on the day after they are approved by Tynwald. 1

3 Amendment of the Harbour (Dues and Charges) Regulations 2021

The Harbour (Dues and Charges) Regulations 2021² (the "Principal Regulations") are amended as follows.

4 Schedule 1 amended
